injuries. Vinnie Grimes was the first to suffer
having to be substituted after only ten minutes.
Only a short time later, Dave Roberts was the
victim and struggled valiantly through the game
as did Alf Wood hobbling with a leg injury.
Halfway through the first half I began to think
we would be lucky to finish the match with more
than half a dozen able to play. Hereford were
allowed to get away with murder and were the
nearest thing to a genuine clogging side I have
had the misfortune to see for years. I knew they
would be rather physical, but I never thought
that they could be or be allowed to be as bad as
they were.

Street — and there were several coach-loads —

He was kicked at every time he got the ball, or
was going to get it. It was credit to the youngster
that he kept in the game knowing that he was

costs rise each year, it is well worth every penny —
one discovery pays for umpteen trials.

Tonight we welcome as our visitors Luton
Town and I am confident you will see and enjoy
a good game of football as Harry Haslam's
Hatters play an open style of football that's
always good to watch.

Not only have our visitors today had the unusual experience of playing in all four divisions of the Football League in the last eight years, but after promotion to and relegation from Division I in a 12-month period they had a particularly mixed time last season.

At one stage mounting debts led to rumours of their complete demise, but almost immediately afterwards a run of seven successive wins not only eased matters a little with a welcome increase in gates but also gave them a chance of promotion. This faded, but they did manage to end the season on a high note with three successive wins.

Last season our opening game was at Luton where we went down 2-0 and they completed the double with a 2-1 win here in December during their 7-match winning spell in which they pulled off their most spectacular success, 5-1 at Charlton. Peter Anderson, who scored twice in that game was transferred to a Belgian club shortly afterwards, but despite the fact that at one stage virtually the whole staff was up for sale there were no other outstanding departures.

In fact, during the close season, they made what could prove to be a most useful signing in the person of striker 'Dixie' Deans from Celtic. If he can repeat last season's tally of 15 goals that he netted in the Scottish Division I and can fit in alongside Ron Fitcher and former Everton stalwart, Jimmy Husband, both of whom reached double figures last season then Luton could find that a few extra goals will put them well up in the promotion race. They were only five points short last season, whilst a year earlier another two points would have kept them in Division I.

Over the years Luton have made headlines in a variety of ways. In April 1936, for instance, Joe Payne netted 10 goals in their record 12-0 win over Bristol Rovers. At one stage in the 50's they had two English international goalkeepers — Bernard Streten and Ron Baynham — on their books. In 1971 they transferred Malcolm MacDonald to Newcastle for £180,000 and until his resignation last season they had comedian Eric Morecambe on their Board of Directors.


Last Saturday they entertained Sheffield United on their return to Division II. It remains to be seen what new headlines they will make in 1976/7 but after coming through the traumas of the last two seasons with such good humour, manager Harry Haslam is a manager whom soccer fans up and down the land will not begrudge any success that might come his way.


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Pen Pictures of the Hatters

KEITH BARBER. After five years of competing for the position, Barber established himself in 1975/76 season as Luton's regular first choice goalkeeper, and at the age of 28 had his best-ever season, winning the supporters club's "Player of the Year" award, the first time it had ever gone to a goalkeeper. He joined Luton in 1971 after being spotted by a scout playing local soccer in Vauxhall, London.

BRIAN CHAMBERS. A Geordie, Chambers made his name and reputation as a midfield player at Sunderland, and they collected £70,000 for him when he was transferred to Arsenal in 1973. But he never broke through to the first team at Highbury, and Luton got him for £30,000 only a year later, when he was 25.

PAUL FUTCHER. Luton equalled their record transfer fee when they paid £100,000 for Futch in the summer of 1974. He was still only 17, and with only a handful of Division IV games behind him with Chester, his home town club. But the big League clubs had already seen his potential, and Luton nipped in to beat them all.

RON FUTCHER. Twin brother of Paul, and identical in looks. When Luton paid £25,000 for him, it was generally reckoned that he had been transferred from Chester just because the boys wanted to stay together. But Ron soon made his mark, he was thrown in at the deep end when Luton were struggling in Division I and marked his debut with a winning goal.

JOHN RYAN. Luton's senior professional, a full back who is now in his eighth season at Kenilworth Road. Fulham must be wondering if they were right to allow him to leave Craven Cottage on a free transfer in 1969. He had a short, unsuccessful spell with Arsenal, but has given sterling service to Luton, including a spell as club captain. He comes from Kent and is an accomplished golfer, with a Kent County Championship to his credit.

JOHN FAULKNER. Don Revie was the first man to give Faulkner his League chance, he was the centre half in the Sutton United team that played Leeds in an F.A. Cup-tie, and did so well that Revie, then Leeds boss, immediately bought him. He joined Luton for £6,000 in March 1972, and has been a regular member of Luton's defence ever since.

JIM RYAN. No relation to full back John Ryan. Jim was a winger in the Manchester United squad which won the European Cup in 1968, but unable to hold down a regular place at Old Trafford. A Scot, he joined Luton at the age of 24 in the summer of 1970.

ALAN WEST. Luton broke all club records when they splashed out £100,000 to buy West from Burnley in October 1973, and he and Jim Husband, who was signed a few weeks later, helped the club to win promotion to Division I within six months.

JIM HUSBAND. Joined Luton in November 1973 with a string of honours already collected with Everton. A Geordie, he was capped by England as a schoolboy, as a youth, and at Under-23 level.

JOHN "DIXIE" DEANS. Luton Town's major close-season signing, they paid £20,000 to bring Deans over the border after he had had four spectacular seasons with Glasgow Celtic.

JOHN ASTON. Like his famous father before him, also named John Aston, John broke into professional football with Manchester United.







We have already played two competitive matches at home in the Anglo-Scottish Tournament and for the second consecutive season, have been eliminated in the early stages without coming into contact with any of the kilted hordes from North of the border.

However, the competition did give us experience of playing against Division I opposition and the general opinion amongst the players was that Middlesbrough were the best side we played against. In our match at **Ayresome Park** (Radio Humberside please note!) we saw two excellent prospects playing on opposite sides. 


