I just hope that supporters will continue to rally round and give the lads the encouragement they need and which has always been given in the past. With your help we will get through and give you a team to be proud of despite the occasional disappointment.

TOWN

Burnley

ALAN STEVENSON: Alan is an England under-23 international goalkeeper. Born in Derbyshire, he came to prominence with his local club, Chesterfield, for whom he had a long run of consecutive appearances. Several clubs were interested in him but Burnley signed him in 1972 for a substantial fee and he has played many fine games for the club. Lost his place last season to Gerry Peyton but at his best Alan is a top-class goalkeeper, capable of exceptional reflex saves.

KEITH NEWTON: Keith was appointed Burnley captain at the end of last season. He was born in Manchester and became a member of the England team during his years with Blackburn Rovers. He holds a total of 28 full international caps. He was transferred to Everton from Blackburn for a big fee but did not settle in at all well at Goodison Park and moved to Turf Moor in 1972 on a free transfer. A cool, cultured, vastly experienced full-back who is happy on either flank.

IAN BRENNAN: Comes from Chesterfield and is a very promising left-back. Began his professional career as a forward, he switched effectively to defence in Burnley's reserve team and gradually worked his way into the senior side. Broke a leg in a road accident in September 1975 and did not play again all last season.

PETER NOBLE: Peter was born in Sunderland and began his professional career with Newcastle United, who sold him to Swindon Town. He made his name with Swindon,

playing for them in a League Cup final and distinguishing himself as a dangerous attacking player. He joined Burnley for a bargain fee in 1973 and has played mostly in mid-field, but also at right-back and centre-forward. A lightweight in build, but a brave, competitive player with a happy goal snatching knack. He was troubled by injuries last season but hopes for better luck in this respect during 1976/77.

JIM THOMSON: Another experienced Turf Moor campaigner, Jim comes from Glasgow and was a Chelsea player under Tommy Docherty for some time. He once played for Chelsea against Burnley at Turf Moor and scored a goal and it wasn't long afterwards that he was signed by the Clarets for one of the largest fees the club have ever paid out. Thomson has been in and out of the Burnley team over the last few seasons but he can be a very effective defender on his day, and he is particularly good in the air.

BILLY RODAWAY: Billy is a native of Liverpool, and used to live only a couple of goal kicks away from Anfield. He is a former Liverpool, Lancashire and England schools player, who can operate either in a mid-field capacity or as a central defender, where he has played most of his games for Burnley, the club he joined as a junior. A strong, forceful player with a great deal of natural ability

BRIAN FLYNN: One of the smallest players in the Football League, midfield man Brian is now virtually an automatic choice for Wales. He comes from Port Talbot and joined the Turf Moor staff straight from school. A host of clubs were interested in him but Burnley was always his first choice. A clever player who can make and take goals and works very hard for the team. Another vital cog in the Burnley machine.

PAUL FLETCHER: Signed for a large fee in 1971 from Bolton Wanderers, his home town club, Paul has been a great battler for Burnley. He has been very unlucky with injuries in the last couple of seasons but at his best he can worry any defender. A very industrious centre-forward, whom the Clarets have used most effectively as a target man. Can be brilliant in the air, and another of his great assets is his undoubted bravery.

BILLY INGHAM: Billy comes from Stakeford, not far from Newcastle-on-Tyne. He joined the Turf Moor staff as a junior and made rapid strides through the reserve team to senior status. Stocky and ginger-haired, he can play effectively in virtually any position. Most of his Football League appearances have been in midfield, but he has scored some useful goals while operating as a front runner and has also played well at right-back. A really excellent club man who now has considerable experience. Certain to be a valuable member of the first team squad.

MALCOLM SMITH: Striker Malcolm is a native of Stockton. His first professional club was Middlesbrough for whom he scored 11 League goals in 32 appearances plus 24 as a substitute. He had spells on loan with Bury and Blackpool and then joined Burnley on loan this season. During a two month loan period he scored six League goals, including one on his debut at Carlisle. Signed for Burnley on a permanent basis in November 1976. Aged 22 years.

TERRY COCHRANE: Outside right. Northern Ireland international winger who joined Burnley from Coleraine in November 1976. Played for his country against Norway and Israel, winning his first cap in October 1975. Born Killyleagh. A quick skilled winger who can both make and take goals. Made a Second Division debut for Burnley against Orient at Turf Moor on 9th October and scored a goal in a 3-3 draw. Also scored on his second appearance the following week against Charlton Athletic, a 4-4 draw. Aged 23 years.

COLIN MORRIS: Colin comes from County Durham and served a long apprenticeship in Burnley's junior and reserve teams before finally making a senior team debut in the First Division. He is a tricky, deceptive type of forward who can operate on either flank or in midfield. When he was a schoolboy his next door neighbour was Brian Little, the Aston Villa and England star.

All Our Yesterdays

A look back at Luton Town a decade ago.

BAD WEATHER at home and bad finishing away were bugging Town boss Allan Brown and their supporters ten years ago. And the manager was trying to do something about both problems.

On January 28, 1967, the Kenilworth Road pitch presented a remarkable sight. Luton had been deluged by two days of torrential rain, and York City had travelled south for a Division IV game.

On the Friday the pitch looked wetter than Southend beach, and early on the Saturday morning Brown and trainer Charlie Watkins joined a team of 30 groundstaff and volunteers in attempts to mop up the rain-water.

Twenty tons of sand had been spread, and every single grain seemed to have

vanished. The Bobbers Club sent a team of helpers in, armed with their own forks, spades and wellies. But two hours before kick-off referee Ken Burns, of Dudley, decided that the effort was all in vain and the fans missed their Saturday afternoon entertainment.

The postponement did nothing to help the Town's preparations for their next game, away to Aldershot. They hadn't won away from home all season, and the dismal record continued on February 4, 1967.

The Town opened brightly, but John Moore hammered one good chance high over the bar, Bruce Rioch rolled another wide and Graham French shot straight at the keeper.

That was all in the first 20 minutes, but Aldershot survived, went ahead after 25 minutes, and never looked like losing after that.

A disputed penalty made it 2-0, and after

He plays on Sundays for Co-op Taverners, and even if Allan Brown did reject him he has still enjoyed ten years of football without leaving Luton.

John Bond, Norwich; and Bobby Thompson, ex-Luton and Player/Manager of Hartford USA.

What do these managers talk about? I don't know, but the talking went on for some hours.

COACHING

SOMETIMES, when I watch Schoolboys and Youth players, I feel a little disillusioned at some of the advice, though well intentioned, that is given from the touchline.

I like to hear constructive comments; players being advised to take defenders on when the opportunities arise, or forwards encouraged to hold the ball and manoeuvre positions.

What I do take exception to is the win-at-all-costs attitude of some officials who shout battle ground instructions of 'Push out', 'Get tight' or 'Close them down.' If the player *understands* the reasons for pushing out, then I can accept this tactic, but my experience has taught me that many run when instructed with little or no thought.

Why does a team, after clearing the ball, move out quickly from their defensive areas? Even some men of the media may tell us it is to catch the opponents offside and, in their view, help cripple the games spectator appeal.

Not so. Pushing up from the back when the ball is cleared shows that we want to support our front players quickly. By keeping compact, our opportunities and alternatives of accepting passes from our front players are greater. Also if we lose the ball, we are in a challenging position to win the ball back early.

Supporting from the back must always be done with caution and only (a) When your players have a clear possession (b) When there is a challenge for the ball between your player and an opponent (c) When an opponent has possession but your own player is pressurising to restrict his passing opportunities. It is foolish to follow a clearance out of defence at speed without assessing the situation. Sometimes, an opponent may receive the ball unchallenged with time and space to aim a penetrating pass beyond your last defender. Moving out from the back is not a mass charge. *Think why? When? and How?* we can move out com-

fortably as a unit without being too square at the time. Also, who gives the signal to push out? Think about it. It has to be worked at.

So, on Sundays when I rest from the professional game and watch the youngsters, I like to think they understand what they are doing and why they are doing it when they are told 'Push out'. If in doubt, do not attempt moves that relate to team movement. This requires much practice. Keep it simple, think about skill alone, place emphasis on encouraging the lads to appreciate good play, as opposed to thinking the result is the be all and end all.
