




Talking ...**



Our battle for points doesn't get any easier and that 5-1 defeat at Wolves last week certainly looked bad for us. Any Fulham fan who made the trip would agree it was nowhere near such a disaster as the score suggests and the way their goals came proved how nothing is going right for us.

That's not an excuse — its a fact and everyone at the club is determined to force the breaks back our way. I'm convinced that our signing of Alan Warboys will prove a great boost for us. His goal-scoring record speaks for itself and at Wolves he showed every sign of that much needed extra power up front.

He figured prominently in the goal John Mitchell scored and John will undoubtedly benefit from being able to share the striking burden with such an experienced and able player.

As you may read over the past few months, Alan has been the target of several First Division clubs including West Ham and Stoke, but could not be tempted to join them. We were delighted, therefore, when he agreed to come to the Cottage where he feels his career can be benefitted.

Trying to get re-inforcements of Alan's calibre is no easy task these days and we were very disappointed that our other transfer target, George Armstrong, proved unobtainable. We

reached a very advanced stage in the negotiations and the signing seemed as good as finalised when the deal broke down unexpectedly. We just want to make clear that the break-down had nothing to do with our end of the deal.

Obviously I will be watching the transfer market but I feel we have a squad good enough for the job we face and I couldn't ask for team spirit to be any higher. All we need is to be spared misfortune long enough to get reward for our efforts and I am sure this will come. Alan's arrival does mean a slightly new shape to the side, particularly in Rodney Marsh's role, and I hope we can quickly settle down to it.

We have been heartened in recent weeks by the form and results of our reserve team. Our reserves train with the first team squad and we are still trying to instill the same style and attitude throughout the club. To see this working very well in the reserve team has encouraged us tremendously and we are convinced it won't be long before the club is back on an even keel and making the sort of progress we want.

Alan Warboys, who is due to make his home debut this afternoon following last week's transfer from Bristol Rovers, has scored more than 100 Football League goals and can also lay claim to one of the quickest post-war hat-tricks.

In March 1971, playing for Cardiff City against Carlisle in a top-table Second Division match at Ninian Park, Warboys scored three goals in the first nine minutes.

A Yorkshireman from the mining village of Goldthorpe, he made his League debut as a 17-year-old with Doncaster Rovers. After a brief initiation he moved up into the First Division with Sheffield Wednesday before heading to South Wales in December 1970 as Cardiff's replacement for John Toshack who had been sold to Liverpool the previous month.

After two years at Cardiff, it was back nearer home to Sheffield United. Next stop was the West Country and Bristol Rovers whom he joined in March 1973 to form a prosperous 'Smash and



Grab' partnership with Bruce Bannister.

In presenting his Football League career record we wish Alan a long and successful career at the Cottage — and assure him that Wolves last Saturday just happened to be one of those things!

NEWS & VIEWS

Since we have played only one home game during the past six weeks some of the letters we have received are out of date and in the case of Richard Baron, aged 15, of Guildford, we are sorry that space does not permit using the excellent report he sent us of the Charlton home match. Thank you for your good wishes Richard, we hope to be able to use one of your reports at a future date.

Mr M W L Craig of New Malden writes:

"I have been a supporter of Fulham for nearly twenty five years and must write to say how disturbed I was at the appalling behaviour of the 'fans' to Mr Bobby Campbell.

He cannot be blamed. His policy of attacking football with five and sometimes up to seven men, unfortunately, has not paid the dividends that it has deserved. A constant source of annoyance for the last few home matches, has been when so-called supporters continually abuse players such as Bullivant, Strong and Greenaway. These players have qualities of tremendous work rate, unselfishness, excellent position sense, fine covering ability, etc, etc, which far outweighs their slight lack of flair.

Players with these qualities counterbalance other members of the team with flair and therefore produce a side with the correct mixture. Bullivant is a fine example of the kind of young player that Mr Campbell has recently introduced into and enhanced the team.

I am certain Mr Campbell's attacking policy will come to fruition in the near future and

Fulham will finish in the top half of the table at the end of this season.

In addition, I should like to mention a recent publication called 'Fulham We Love You' by Morgan D Phillips. This makes excellent reading and (correct me if I am wrong) is the only book, so far, to be published recording the history of Fulham Football Club."

Thanks for your faith, Mr Craig and we are sure it will be rewarded. We would be interested to hear if there are any other history books about Fulham FC apart from the handbooks the club has published from time to time. An official history of Fulham will be published to coincide with our centenary season which is 1979-80.

Fulham are giving an opportunity to Raymond Hales to follow in the stud-prints of his famous brother Derek Hales, the Charlton goal-getter who recently moved to Derby County in a big-money transfer.

Raymond, who has been playing for Canterbury, is 22 years old and lives in Sittingbourne and has many of the physical characteristics of his brother.

Says manager Bobby Campbell: "Raymond has spent two weeks trial with us and we feel he deserves an extended chance to prove his worth. In his first game for us he scored one and made another goal in the reserves and is quick and direct. He needs to work on one or two aspects of his game but he is very willing to learn, and will benefit from being with us full-time."

WELCOME LUTON TOWN

LUTON TOWN, BECALMED IN THE mid-table vicinity for most of the season, have suddenly popped up as promotion possibilities. A run of six wins in a row has lifted them into fifth place six points behind Chelsea at the top.

The recovery from an erratic five months which really got them nowhere very special began at Bramall Lane on January 22 with a decisive win over Sheffield United which the whole country saw that night on Match of the Day.

Nobody, perhaps not even manager Harry Haslam himself, could have believed that Luton would then proceed to sweep all before them. Home wins followed over Hull and Burnley and an away success at Nottingham Forest brought confirmation of Luton's surge.

PURSING

Further home wins over Blackburn, whom they were beating when the original match was abandoned, and Charlton Athletic eased Haslam's team ahead of the pack of clubs pursuing the four leaders.

Now Luton, who have already disposed of Chelsea by four clear goals, are rapidly closing the gap in search of the First Division status they lost two years ago after only the one season in the top grade.

They may have lost ten of their 27 League matches but, at their present rate of progress, promotion is very much a possibility.

CRIPPLING

To a certain extent, the club's very existence is something of an event itself. Not so long ago Luton were said to have been at death's door with crippling debts.

Today they're alive and well, having built a promotion side despite being forced to sell a number of players to ease their financial difficulties.

Peter Anderson went to Belgium, John Ryan a little closer home to Norwich, Australian Adrian Alston to Cardiff and Andy King, one of the Second Division's best midfield players, to Everton. King was one of a number of outstanding young players who owed their introduction to League Football to Haslam's astute management. 'Happy Harry,' who used to be Fulham's chief scout, may yet end the season back in the First Division.

Even if he doesn't, it won't spoil his sense of humour.....

MILIJ ALEKSIC: Luton's newest recruit, signed in January 1977 from Plymouth. Son of Yugoslavian parents, but born in the North of England, he broke into football with non-league Stafford Rangers. Plymouth snapped him up for £6,000 in February 1973. Luton is his fourth club this season — when they bought him from Plymouth he had already completed previous loan spells with Oxford United and Ipswich Town.

KEITH BARBER After five years of competing for the position, Barber established himself in 1975/76 season as Luton's regular first choice goalkeeper, and at the age of 28 had his best-ever season, winning the supporters club's "Player of the Year" award, the first time it had ever gone to a goalkeeper. He joined Luton in 1971 after being spotted by a scout playing local soccer in Vauxhall, London.

PAUL PRICE Another player snapped up as a youngster, defender Price has had to fight harder than most to break through — he broke a leg early in the 1974/75 season, fought his way back to fitness, then broke it again. His determination overcame his atrocious luck, and he came back to make his debut in Division II last season. Still only 22, he comes from Welwyn Garden City.

STEVE BUCKLEY He was a free-scoring left winger with Southern League club Burton Albion when Luton stepped in to buy him for the bargain price of £2,000 in the summer of 1974. Within six months he had been converted into a First Division full-back, and has been Luton's left back ever since his impressive debut. He still shows his old goal-scoring ability, and his fast over-lapping wing runs and thundering left foot shot make him a lethal attacking defender.

BRIAN CHAMBERS A Geordie. Chambers made his name and reputation as a midfield player at Sunderland, and they collected £70,000 for him when he was transferred to Arsenal in 1973. But he never broke through to the First team at Highbury, and Luton got him for £30,000 only a year later, when he was 25. He had a patchy start at Luton, flitting in and out of the league side, but finally established himself last season when he became a regular member of the Kenilworth Road team. He reinforces his midfield value by breaking forward to score the occasional goal.

JOHN FAULKNER Don Revie was the first man to give Faulkner his league chance: he was the centre-half in the Sutton United team that played Leeds in an FA Cup-tie, and did so well that Revie, then Leeds boss, immediately bought him. But he was unlucky at Leeds, and a broken leg threatened

to end his career. He overcame it and joined Luton for £6,000 in March '72, and has been a regular member of Luton's defence ever since.

PAUL FUTCHER Luton equalled their record transfer fee when they paid £100,000 for Futcher in the summer of 1974. He was still only 17, and with only a handful of Fourth Division games behind him with Chester, his home town club. But the big league clubs had already seen his potential, and Luton nipped in to beat them all. He has since become one of the most popular players with Luton's supporters: a cool, elegant centre-back, with a marvellous football brain. He reminds a lot of people of Bobby Moore at his best, a ball-winner and superb distributor. Don Revie has already called him up for training sessions with England, and no-one at Kenilworth Road will be surprised to see Paul make it all the way to the England team.

JIM HUSBAND Joined Luton in November 1973 with a string of honours already collected with Everton. A Geordie, he was capped by England as a schoolboy, as a youth, and at Under-23 level. He went to Goodison Park as soon as he left school, and became a Merseyside favourite in a ten-year stay there in which he hit 72 goals. Luton paid Everton £70,000 for his services and he was their leading goal-scorer last season.

ALAN WEST Luton broke all club records when they splashed out £100,000 to buy West from Burnley in October 1973, and he and Jim Husband, who was signed a few weeks later, helped the club to win promotion to the First Division within six months. An England under-23 international, West is one of the many stars to emerge from Burnley's "football production line". He comes from Hyde, in Cheshire, and almost went to Sunderland. Luton stepped in after that deal fell through, and West has become a mainstay of their side. Brilliant in his use of the ball, he has been club skipper since early 1975, and in his first full season with the club was named by the supporters as their Player of the Year. Still only 24, he is one of the stars Luton Town want to keep, despite his transfer market value.

RON FUTCHER Twin brother of Paul, and identical in looks.

When Luton paid £25,000 for him, it was generally reckoned that he had been transferred from Chester just because the boys wanted to stay together. But Ron soon made his mark: he was thrown in at the deep end when Luton were struggling in the First Division and marked his debut with a winning goal. He followed up with a hat-trick in his second First Division game, and has since established himself in Luton's front line.

PASQUALE FUCCILLO Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford, players and supporters at Kenilworth Road give this strong midfielder the nickname of "Lil" to overcome their difficulties with his tongue-twisting name. But there is no mistaking his footballing ability: he joined Luton as a 16-year-old apprentice in the summer of 1973, and worked his way through to the League side. He scored on his debut in February 1976, and shows every sign of being a regular marksman on his thrusting runs from the middle of the field.

JOHN ASTON Like his famous father before him, also named John Aston, John broke into professional football with Manchester United, and achieved international fame with an out-of-this-world performance on United's left wing in their European Cup Final triumph against Benfica at Wembley in 1968. Aston destroyed their defence, but a broken leg interrupted his career at Old Trafford. He was 25 when Luton manager Harry Haslam, a former Manchester United player himself, stepped in to secure his services for £30,000 in July 1972, and Aston has been one of Luton's most consistent players ever since. He can tantalise full-backs and provide inch-perfect crosses — a winger in the traditional style.

JIM RYAN Jim was a winger in the Manchester United squad which won the European Cup in 1968, but unable to hold down a regular place at Old Trafford. A Scot, he joined Luton at the age of 24 in the summer of 1970 in a four-player package deal which also took Don Givens from Manchester United to Luton Town, at a total transfer price of £35,000. It must rank as one of the best bargains ever because Luton later recouped £60,000 by selling Givens and Ken Goodeve, and they still have the considerable talents of Jim Ryan. He operates either in midfield or as a winger, and packs a useful shot.

Malcolm Macdonald was the scorer when Luton Town Football Club won their first match at Craven Cottage, in the Third Division on April 8, 1970 when precisely 18,987 spectators turned up.

Luton won at the Cottage again in March 1973, Rodney Fern accounting for the only goal of the game before a much more modest attendance of fewer than 8,000.

Those two particular matches are worthy of recall if only to point out that Luton have fared a great deal better at the Cottage of late than in the previous four decades.

To begin with they were kept waiting 42 years for their first away win over Fulham and, with a fairly decisive victory in our favour last season, the playing record is still pretty impressive.

In eighteen League encounters against Luton at the Cottage we have won fourteen and drawn two. The most handsome home win of the lot came in February, 1954 with Johnny Haynes contributing three of the five goals.

Having won at Kenilworth Road last September, we are now hopefully in a position to complete our first double of the season and wipe out any danger of Luton winning here again.
