JOHN SILLETT'S POINT OF VIEW



WE have completed two-thirds of our Second Division fixtures with 17 points from 28 games and now face one of the toughest challenges in the club's history if we are to avoid relegation. It means that we have got to collect exactly the same number of points, from exactly half the number of games we have already played, to stand a chance of getting out of trouble. It is certainly not impossible mathematically to move clear of the bottom three, as some critics might suggest, and on paper we have an easier run-in than our rivals, with nine of our remaining 14 games at Edgar Street.

A fortnight ago we gained our first league win at home for six months when we beat Fulham and now that we have broken the spell I am hoping that our luck at Edgar Street will start to change. If we are to climb the table it is essential that we build on that Fulham result with a run of home wins, and the players are fully aware of the importance of beating Luton this afternoon.

One bright aspect about our recent results is the fact that we have tightened our defensive play considerably and have only conceded nine goals in our last eight matches. The improvement was noticeable at Molineux last Saturday when we met Wolves, who had previously scored six at Edgar Street. It took a long time, however, for the players to believe that we had a chance of beating Wolves and when they eventually got the message it was too late unfortunately. There was only one team in it during the last 25 minutes and I thought that we were unlucky not to get a point.

In the closing stages the Wolves fans, who apparently were expecting us to be beaten by a cricket score, were appealing to the referee to blow the final whistle to put them out of their agony whenever we got within shooting range, and when he eventually did so no-one was more relieved than the new league leaders.

Our bid to reach the quarter-finals of the F.A. Youth Cup was stopped by Liverpool on Monday but what a tremendous turn out there was from our fans. I doubt if many other matches in the competition have attracted a gate of 2,188 and though we were beaten I think you will agree that our lads put up a good performance against quality opposition. It was great to see so many supporters backing the team, and given time I am confident that our youth policy will pay rich dividends.



FOCUS



IT was a case of history repeating itself on Tuesday night when Wolverhampton Wanderers followed up last Saturday's win over Hereford United by beating Oldham Athletic 2-0 at Boundary Park to take over the leadership of the Second Division.

The last time they moved into top spot for a brief spell was also at Oldham's expense. They hammered them 5-0 at Molineux to edge Chelsea into second place on goal difference.

That was exactly six months ago but, the following week when Wolves were beaten on their own ground by Luton Town, Chelsea regained the lead and have held it ever since—until Tuesday.

It seems, however, that Wolves' reign as section leaders will once again be a short one because this afternoon they will be on F.A. Cup duty when they entertain Leeds United whereas Chelsea have a league engagement on their own ground against struggling Bristol Rovers.

Nevertheless Wolves, beaten in only one of their last 15 league encounters, are beginning to emerge as championship favourites at a time when Chelsea's youngsters appear to have lost their early season sparkle.

Luton Town, the only team to beat Wolves in league or cup since mid-November, when they did the double over the Molineux team a fortnight ago, have also burst into contention for the league title in the past month.

They have staged a tremendous revival since Christmas when they were in the bottom half of the table and have collected 21 points out of a possible 24 from their last 12 matches. They put together nine consecutive wins before Plymouth Argyle surprisingly halted their winning streak by gaining a 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road last Saturday.

Paul Futcher, who has played a prominent role in their recent climb into the promotion race, was nominated as the best number six in the Second Division by fellow members of the Professional Footballers' Association when they held their annual awards ceremony in London's Hilton Hotel last weekend.

With Best out of action with injuries received in a car crash, Fulham are now in dire trouble in the relegation zone and have gone 12 matches without a league win. But it could be lucky 13 this afternoon when they meet Carlisle at Bruton Park. They beat them 2-0 at Craven Cottage in November.

LUTON Town ran into serious financial difficulties last season when their future appeared to be in jeopardy but by making stringent economies, and selling players, the club cut the deficit at the bank sufficiently to gain a reprieve. Although still carrying a hefty overdraft the financial position is now much rosier at Kenilworth Road due to a concentrated effort by officials, players and supporters to keep the club afloat.

There has also been a considerable improvement in their playing record since Christmas and they have emerged as strong promotion challengers under the inspired leadership of Harry Haslam, who played for Manchester United, Brighton and Orient, before serving his apprenticeship as a manager with Southern League clubs Barry Town and Tonbridge.

Luton were founder members of the Southern League in 1894 and after twice finishing runners-up they were elected to the Football League in 1897 but failed to gain re-election three years later when they finished at the foot of the Second Division. They returned to the Southern League and remained there until they became founder-members of the Third Division South in 1920.

They just missed promotion to the Second Division by a point in 1936 when they finished runners-up but they made it the following year when Joe Payne set up a new scoring record for the section by bagging 55 goals in 37 matches. The previous season when he made his debut for the Hatters as

an emgency centre-forward he scored 10 goals in a 12-0 win over Bristol Rovers. It is an individual record that has never been equalled in League or F.A. Cup football.

In 1955 Luton moved up into the First Division for the first time in the club's history after a triple tie on points with Birmingham City and Rotherham United. Birmingham won the title and Luton were runners-up by a fraction of a goal. But in 1960 they were relegated to the Second Division and continued to drop into the Third Division in 1963 and then to the Fourth Division in 1965.

Three years later they started the long climb back to the First Division by walking away with the Fourth Division championship in 1968, finishing runners-up in the Third Division in 1970 and runners-up in the Second Division in 1974. Malcolm Macdonald played a leading role when they won the Third Division title and topped their scoring list with 27 goals. The following season he netted 30 in league and cup and was then transferred to Newcastle United for £185,000, which was then a record for a Second Division player.

Luton's return to the First Division lasted only a season but they made a determined effort to avoid relegation when they collected seven points from their last four games to finish their fixtures fourth from bottom above Spurs, Chelsea and Carlisle. But Spurs still had a game to play and two days later they beat Leeds United 4-2 at White Hart Lane to gain a late reprieve at Luton's expense.

The Hatters twice reached the quarter-finals of the F.A. Cup before they eventually got to Wembley in 1959. In the early rounds they beat Leeds United 5-1, Leicester City 4-1 and Ipswich Town 5-2 but needed replays to dispose of Blackpool and Norwich to reach the final. They met Nottingham Forest and were pipped 2-1 in a game packed with incident between two clubs who had started the season as unlikely contestants for one of soccer's top honours. Both, in fact, had finished the season in the bottom half of the First Division table!

season at Edgar Street, having taken charge of United's match with Notts County in October. 

Meet the HATTERS

Goalkeeper **Milija Aleksic** is one of Luton's newest recruits and was signed from Plymouth Argyle two months ago after loan periods with Oxford United and Ipswich Town earlier in the season. The son of Yugoslavian parents he was born in the North of England and joined Plymouth from non-league Stafford Rangers for £6,000 four years ago. He made 29 first team appearances for Argyle last term. **Keith Barber** was an ever-present for Luton last term when he took his tally of first team matches past the 100 mark, and also became the first goalkeeper to win the club's Player of the Year award.

Steve Buckley was a free-scoring winger when the Hatters bought him for a £2,000 fee from Burton Albion in the summer of 1974 and within six months he had been converted into a First Division full-back. Since then he has made over 100 league and cup appearances. **Paul Price** has fought his way back to fitness to make the first team grade after twice breaking his leg since 1974. He made his league debut last season and played in the team's final seven games.

Brian Chambers made his name as a midfield player with Sunderland and after 63 league games he was transferred to Arsenal for £70,000 in 1973. But he failed to make the first team grade at Highbury and a year later Luton signed him for £30,000. He has made over 50 league appearances. **John Faulkner** was centre-half when Sutton played Leeds United in the F.A. Cup and immediately afterwards he was signed by Don Revie. But a broken leg threatened his career at Elland Road and he later moved to Luton for a £6,000 fee five years ago. He has played over 150 league games for the club.

Paul Futcher cost the Hatters a record fee of £100,000 when signed from Fourth Division Chester in the summer of 1974 and has been a member of the England training squad since moving to Kenilworth Road. He has played over 100 first team games. Twin brother **Ron Futcher** cost £25,000 and has held down

a regular first team place since he marked his First Division debut in December 1974 by scoring the winning goal against Ipswich and followed up with a hat-trick in the next game against Wolves.

Striker **Jim Husband** was signed from Everton for £70,000 in November 1973 after collecting a string of honours with the Goodison club. He was capped at schoolboy, youth and under 23 level by England and scored 44 goals in 165 First Division matches for the Toffeemen. He was also a member of Everton's 1968 F.A. Cup final team. Since moving to Kenilworth Road he has added another 36 league goals to his tally in over 100 games. **Pasquale Fucillo**, son of Italian parents, is nicknamed "Lil" to overcome his tongue twisting name. Aged 19, he joined the club as an apprentice and scored on his league debut in February 1976.

Alan West, an England under-23 international, cost the Hatters £100,000 when they bought him from Burnley in October 1973 and he helped the club win promotion to the First Division six months later. Aged 24, he is the club's captain and was voted Player of the Year at the end of his first season at Kenilworth Road. He made 45 league appearances for Burnley and has added another 140 at Luton.

John Aston won a First Division championship medal with Manchester United in 1967 and then starred in their European Cup final triumph with a devastating performance against Benfica when he was named man of the match. He made 156 league appearances with Manchester United and was transferred to the Hatters for £30,000 in July 1972 and has played over 150 league games for Luton.

Jim Ryan made 24 league appearances for Manchester United, and was a member of their European Cup squad with Aston. He moved to Kenilworth Road in 1970 and has since made in the region of 200 first team appearances for the Hatters.

EDGAR STREET SPOTLIGHT

HEREFORD United Development Association are planning a Gala Day at Edgar Street on Sunday, May 15th, to officially conclude their activities for the 1975-76 season. The highlight of the day will be a soccer competition based on the successful ITN tournament and there will also be a six-a-side tournament for local clubs. During the day there will be side shows and stalls to visit, and in the evening a bumper Barbecue. Watch out for details during the next couple of weeks.

Due to injuries United had to field a patchwork team when they visited Kenilworth Road last October and with four key players missing from the side they were beaten 2-0 but it was not until two minutes from the end that Paul Futcher made certain for Luton with a fine solo goal. Luton's other goal was scored by Jimmy Husbands in the 55th minute. The match, incidentally, was watched by Don Revie and the England team who were having a busman's holiday prior to their World Cup match with Finland the following Wednesday.

One of the absentees at Kenilworth Road was Peter Spiring, who cost Luton £70,000 when he joined them from Liverpool three years ago. Last season he made seven Second Division appearances for Luton before United signed him for £8,000 after he had spent a month on loan at Edgar Street in February.

Congratulations to Alan Peters, who collected a Welsh international youth cap when he played against England in the UEFA Youth tournament at the Hawthorns last week. He is the second United player to be capped at youth level this season. Last month Kevin Sheedy represented Eire against West Germany in Dublin.

Welcome to Jim Coughlin, aged 21, who has joined United on a month's loan from Albion Rovers. Jim, who has made over 100 Scottish League appearances, marked his debut at Edgar Street by scoring a goal last Saturday when the

Reserves drew 2-2 with Orient. Earlier in the season Albion Rovers' midfielder John Doherty spent a month on loan with United but the two clubs could not agree a transfer fee. If Coughlin makes the grade this complication will not arise because Albion's price for his transfer is acceptable to United.

Farewell and best of luck to full-back Tony Byrne, who joined Fourth Division Newport County on a free transfer last week. Tony made a total of 121 appearances for United, including 67 for the club's senior side. He played 54 Reserve team games and skipped the side when they won the Midland Intermediate League last season. Brian Preece has also joined Newport on a month's loan.

The Football League have given permission for United to play the Giantkillers XI in aid of Dudley Tyler's Testimonial at Edgar Street on Wednesday, May 11th. Admission prices will be 60p and £1.20 for a grandstand seat. 
