

Even then it went to extra time!

Our opening unbeaten run came to an end after 11 complete games and an extra half hour when we finally succumbed to Oldham at Leicester City's ground last Tuesday.

After a mediocre first half, we began putting it together in the second half and when Peter Ward scored in the 69th minute it seemed that that was that. While the first team have been making a promising start to the season, the Reserves have not been so dominant. True on Wednesday they went some way in putting things to rights with a good 4-1 win at Southend to end a dismal start of conceding the 'double' to Peterborough United, 0-2 twice, and a 1-1 draw at Northampton.

After finishing runners-up in the Midweek League last season we had high hopes of maintaining our

challenge for the Championship this season and are hoping we are now on the right lines.

Last week we said 'Goodbye' to Fred Binney, who has been granted a free transfer at the end of his contract with the Club. We all wish Fred and his family a happy future and are sure it will not be long before he is fixed up with a new Club.

It was interesting talking to Fred about his recent games with St Louis in the American League and soccer seems to be fast growing in popularity in the USA.

On Monday, October 3 we have pleasure in staging the annual George Weedon Trophy match between Brighton Boys and South London Boys, kick-off 7 p.m.

There are high hopes of the Brighton Boys side this season and they recently completed a very successful tour of the West Country. The strength of South London Boys football is well known and, indeed, last season they lifted the English Schools Trophy when they defeated East London on aggregate in a two-legged Final at Millwall FC and Arsenal FC.

The ingredients are there for a most attractive game on October 3 and we hope that the game will be well supported.





League Cup Replay at Leicester

The League Cup second replay against Oldham at Filbert Street, Leicester proved a disappointment to Albion fans who made the trip with the lads going down 2-1 after extra time.

It might have been a very different tale as Peter Ward demonstrates in the top picture that showed the superb skill of the England Under 21 striker, his first goal since his return from illness. The goal after 70 minutes put Albion in front and delighted the large Albion contingent in the meagre 1,840 crowd, some 300 of whom travelled up on the special train to the match.

Their joy though was short-lived, 12 minutes later a misunderstanding in the Albion defence allowed Les Chapman's low corner to creep into the net and there were no more goals in the 90 minutes, the teams once again were forced into extra time.

Albion had plenty of the game and Oldham's 'keeper Chris Ogden was forced into action as the second picture shows, Albion's Peter Ward and Andy Rollings are in close attendance as is the Latic's experienced former Manchester United defender, Paul Edwards.

The same trio again figure prominently in the bottom picture as Ogden is caught off balance but still keeps the ball out of the net.

The winner came for Oldham just before the turn around in extra time when Alan Groves cut in and his low cross found David Irving on the spot to take Oldham through to a third round tie away at Hull next month.

A total of 330 minutes of football was necessary to break the deadlock and the Albion still have yet to meet Oldham twice more this season in League matches.

The attendance at Filbert Street possibly could lead to a re-think on replay arrangements and it might seem economic sense for the Football authorities to decide that venues should alternate, the side playing at home in the first match would also stage a third game if necessary.

Paul Futcher

One of the brightest prospects in League football today, Luton risked their record transfer fee when they paid £100,000 for him in the summer of 1974. He was still only 17, and with only a handful of Fourth Division games behind him. Luton beat off opposition from bigger clubs to persuade him to leave Chester.

Steve Buckley

Officially a left back, Buckley is more than a top class defender – his speed and sharp-shooting make him a dangerous attacker too. He was a free-scoring left winger with Burton Albion when Luton signed him for a bargain price of £2,000 in the summer of 1974.

Paul Price

His hopes of a career in League soccer had to overcome a double disaster before he made the grade – recruited by Luton as a youngster he was on the verge of success when he broke his leg. He fought his way back to fitness, only to break it again.

Ricky Hill

A midfield player who has excited attention all over the country, Hill had a fairy-tale start to his league career. Signed as an apprentice from schools football in North London, he made it into the league team within a year and celebrated his debut by scoring once and laying on another goal.

Pasquale Fuccillo

Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford, midfield dynamo Fuccillo – 'Lil' to his friends and the Luton fans – joined Luton as a 16-year-old apprentice in the summer of 1973. Strong on the ball, he made his name with some storming midfield displays, and marked his league debut with a goal.

Milija Aleksic

Luton paid £20,000 to Plymouth in January 1977 for Aleksic's services, and the fee turned out to be a bargain. Aged 24, he was unsettled at Plymouth, and the move to Luton turned out to be the turning point in his career.

Jim Husband

Joined Luton in November 1973 with a string of honours already collected with Everton, and has served Luton with distinction. He plays as an attacking midfielder or as a front runner, and has provided a regular supply of goals. A Geordie, he was capped by England as a schoolboy, youth, and Under-23.

Phil Boersma

It was the end of a patient search for talent when Luton boss Harry Haslam signed striker Boersma from Middlesbrough in July 1977. Three years previously Haslam had tried to persuade Liverpool to part with the player. He failed, and later went to Middlesbrough, and Haslam finally got his man two years later.

John Faulkner

Luton's senior pro and vice captain, he has given Luton sterling service since they paid £6,000 for him in March 1972. He emerged from obscurity as centre-half in the Sutton United team that played Leeds. Don Revie signed him on, but a broken leg interrupted his career at Elland Road.

David Carr

After learning his trade in defence or midfield in youth and reserve teams, Carr is now competing for regular first-team football. He comes from Margate, and became an apprentice at Luton when he left school in 1973.

Spotlight on LUTON TOWN *Tony Geerts*

The last time the 'Hatters' came to the Goldstone was on February 10, 1973. It was a Second Division clash and Tony Towner made his first team debut for the Albion who chalked up their first win for 14 games through two goals by Ken Beamish. The Albion side that day was Tommy Hughes – the goalkeeper also making his debut whilst on a month's loan from the Villa, Templeman, Goodwin, Piper, Spearritt; Bromley, Hilton, O'Sullivan; Murray, Beamish and Towner with Graham Howell the substitute. Luton included Barry Butlin, later to join Albion on loan from Notts Forest. The Albion were relegated that season, Luton finishing twelfth.

Tonight's visitors have been in all four Divisions in the last 11 seasons – a remarkable record, with the highlight the 1975/76 Season spent in Division

One after being in the Fourth Division from 1965 to 1968.

There have been 10 League and 4 Football League Cup meetings between the two clubs since the war. The first of these was as Second Division teams in the 1960/61 Season when the Albion won the game at the Goldstone with an Adrian Thorne goal on November 12. In the return at Kenilworth Road the following April, Tony Nicholas scored in a 3–1 defeat. Of the seven meetings at the Goldstone, in the two competitions Albion have won three and drawn three of the games.

Luton reached the Final of the FA Cup in 1959 going down 2–1 to Notts Forest. Joe Payne set up a new record for the club of 10 goals on his debut as a centre forward in the 12–0 home win against Bristol Rovers in 1936.

Gary Heale

Now in his second season with the Club after being signed from Canvey Island. Tottenham were very keen to sign him but with the Managers connections in the area, finally persuaded him to join Luton. Good in the air and is a good target man to play to. Big things are expected from him this season.

Ron Futcher

Twin brother of Paul and identical in looks. When Luton paid £25,000 for him it was thought that he had been transferred from Chester because the boys wanted to be together, but Ron soon made his mark with a hat-trick in his second First Division game and has since established himself in Lutons front line.



Eric Potts





LUTON'S BUCKLEY EMULATES BROTHER

Luton's left-back Steve Buckley has been taking a leaf out of his brother's copy book this season. While brother Alan - Walsall's top scorer for the past four seasons - has always been renowned for his goalscoring feats, Steve has normally been content to stop the other side from scoring. But this season he has already scored as many goals as he has ever done before in a completed season!

Before the weekend Steve had scored three goals for Luton, only one short of his brother's tally for Walsall. And two of Alan's goals came from penalties. All Steve's came from open play.

No doubt the Hatters' Buckley will be on the lookout for further opportunities tonight.

Life seems to be getting a shade better for trouble-hit Fulham. George Best, after stating he would never play for them again, indicated that he might just change his mind and the bar on the club signing new players has been lifted by the Football League.

Best returned home from America to play for Northern Ireland in last week's World Cup match against Iceland and, while in Belfast, he announced his change of mind. Fulham manager Bobby Campbell, who has found himself at the end of troubles not of his own making in recent weeks, was delighted.

'I hope we can talk over the whole situation,' he said.

Fulham have now caught up on their hire purchase payments to rival clubs for players signed in the past and the League has now given them the go-ahead to enter more deals if necessary. That was more welcome news for Mr Campbell.

Best of all, though, was the team's performance in smashing Notts County 5-1 in a recent League game. John Mitchell scored three of those goals - his second hat-trick in League football. In May he scored four times against Orient.

Sunderland have been making special efforts to obtain match sponsorships but they lost out on a recent approach from a lager firm. Stoke City stepped in with a better offer.
