Our major priority is to do well in the league, but we all like the big-time atmosphere that a cup-tie generates. And I know that all of us in the ground tonight are hoping for something special from this game.

It's a pleasure to welcome City. They're one of the clubs I have a special feeling for. When I was a lad I lived near their ground and used to support them. Then, as a young footballer, I went and joined Manchester United, and the neighbours didn't half give me some stick for that!

You have to know a place like Manchester to understand the rivalry that exists between City and United, but one thing's for sure — they give real solid support to their team.

I know that a lot of City fans have made the effort to come to Luton tonight, and I hope they all enjoy their visit. We welcome their team, and the opportunity tonight's match gives us to compare ourselves with a top First Division outfit.

As I've already said, league games are really the most important part of a club's operations, but the chance for a cup run is always more than welcome. We're hoping that we can get back into the First Division next season and whatever tonight's result I shall be looking for signs that little Luton Town is capable of living with the glamour clubs.

By the time you read this you will know how we fared at Blackpool on Saturday. This seems to be our "Lancashire Week", because after taking on Manchester City tonight we head back up the M6 on Saturday to play Bolton.

One thing is sure: if we can continue to play the sort of soccer produced at our last home game, against Fulham, we must be in with a good chance of promotion.

It's a long time since we have seen two teams combine to put on such a game. I was proud of the football we played, but Fulham deserve some credit for making it an open and entertaining game.

Usually, when we play like we did then, I expect to see a stack of goals. But I couldn't complain when only John Faulkner's went in. I thought the Fulham goalkeeper had a great game, and as it turned out the one-goal lead meant that Fulham were always in with a chance of coming back, and that helped to keep the game exciting right to the last whistle.

That must be good for football and for supporters, and I hope that we see as close a game tonight. I'll be even more pleased if the result is the same, although the lads tell me that John Faulkner isn't taking too many bets on scoring the winner again!

WELCOME



MAN.CITY

JOE CORRIGAN Was spotted in 1965, after playing in Club trials, Joe turned professional in January 1967. Joe soon established himself in the first team, and has received international recognition at full and Under-23 levels for England. City's "Player of the Year" 1976.

KEITH MACRAE Born in Glasgow, Keith was signed in October 1973 from Motherwell for a fee of £100,000 and made his debut at Sheffield United that month. A Scottish Under-23 international, Keith is a brave and capable goalkeeper.

KENNY CLEMENTS Kenny joined the professional ranks in July 1975 after having worked on the Club's groundstaff and playing with the Club as an amateur for three seasons. Graduated through the junior ranks to a regular first team place.

WILLIE DONACHIE Born in Glasgow, Willie joined City as an amateur in October 1968, signing professional in December of the same year. A Scottish international, Willie played an important part in Scotland's winning the 1976 Home International Championship..

MIKE DOYLE Club Captain, Mike was born in Manchester, and started with City as an apprentice in May 1962, after being spotted playing with Stockport Boys. He signed professional in May 1964. An Under-23

and full international for England, Mike was voted as City's "Player of the Season" in 1972 and 1974.

DAVE WATSON Dave joined City from Sunderland in a deal which took Jeff Clarke to Roker Park, with a cheque for £200,000 being the cash adjustment made to Sunderland, in June 1975. Dave is England's regular centre-half, and was born in Nottingham. Voted City's "Player of the Year" 1977.

TOMMY BOOTH Born in Manchester, he joined City as an amateur, then signed professional in August 1967. An Under-23 international; Tommy has also been in the full England squad. He also proved himself as a midfield player after serious injury to Colin Bell during the 1975/6 season.

MIKE CHANNON Mike signed for Southampton in 1964, making his debut two years later. He was the Club's leading goalscorer for many years, scoring over 150 league goals for the "Saints". A regular in the England side, Mike signed for City in July 1977 at a cost of £300,000.

TONY HENRY Born in Sunderland, Tony joined City as an apprentice in July 1974, and signed professional in December 1974. He plays in either midfield or the back four.



ASA HARTFORD Asa was signed from West Bromwich Albion for £200,000 in August 1974, making his debut that month v. West Ham. Born in Clydebank, he is a full Scottish international with a tremendous work-rate. The inspiration in City's midfield, Asa usually wears the 10 shirt.

COLIN BELL Colin joined his first Club, Bury, straight from school, and became their Captain at 19. He signed for City in March 1966, and became one of the most highly rated midfield players in the World, and a regular in the England team until his tragic injury in November 1975 that has kept him out of the game since.

PAUL POWER Paul signed professional for the Club in July 1975, after having been an amateur for the Club for three seasons whilst at University. Paul scored his first goal for the Club in a Derby County match in 1976.

GERARD KEEGAN Gerard signed apprentice for City in August 1971, and then professional in March 1973, and made his first team debut in the 1975/6 season. Gerard was born in Little Horton, Yorkshire. Another England Under-21 international.

GARY OWEN An England Under-21 international. Gary was born in St. Helens, and signed as an apprentice with City in July 1974, and one year later became a full-time professional. He scored his first goal for the Club against West Ham in October 1976.

JIMMY CONWAY Another midfield player, Jimmy is an Eire International with 20 full caps. He started his career with the Irish League side Bohemians before signing for Fulham over ten years ago. Jimmy joined City for £40,000 in the Summer of 1976.

PETER BARNES Born in Manchester, Peter signed apprentice for City in the Summer of 1972 and signed professional in July 1974. Peter is the son of Chief Scout and former player Ken Barnes, having worked his way through the junior ranks to the first team. An England Under-21 international.

BRIAN KIDD Brian signed from Arsenal in the Summer of 1976 for £100,000. He played for Manchester United in the European Cup Final in 1968, scoring one of United's four goals against Benfica. Now settled into the side, Brian scored 21 goals in 39 league games in season 1976-77.

JOE ROYLE Joe was signed on Christmas Eve 1974 from Everton for a fee of £160,000. He made his debut at Liverpool on Boxing Day. An England international, Joe's main contribution to City's attack is his strength as a target man.

DENNIS TUEART Dennis started his career with Sunderland and signed for City in March 1974, in a deal worth £275,000. Dennis obtained his first England international cap against Northern Ireland in Belfast in 1975.

BEHIND THE SCENES

THIS WEEK I thought it would be of interest to our supporters if I gave them some idea of what goes on when the team travel away to a game. Take the trip to Blackpool. The coach arrives at the ground at 3 o'clock and by 3.15 it is on its way up the M1. First stop is at either the Hilton Park or Knutsford service stations, (depending on time and traffic) on the M6, for a cup of tea and a sandwich. This stop is usually about half an hour and soon the coach is on its way again to Preston where the team's headquarters are. In the past we have stayed in Blackpool but we find now that Preston is within easy reach thanks to the new motorways. By 8.15 everyone is settling down to an evening meal. The players are not restricted as to what they have (within reason) and by 9.15 they are all in their rooms watching the television. Reg Game makes the rounds later to make sure that everybody has settled down. The

rest of us usually stay down and have a drink in the bar and more often than not a friend or friends of the manager pop in for a chat. The famous Tom Finney is the usual guest when we are in this part of the world. Sometimes it is the early hours before we get to bed for when someone like Tom is in your company, football past and present is talked about and the time simply flies by. Saturday morning breakfast doesn't tempt many players and they take the advantage to have a lie in. The pre-match lunch is at about 11.30 am, and I can guess that some of our supporters will be most surprised to know what we have. The days of steaks or boiled fish have gone. Our lunch is as follows:— Cornflakes and peaches, (together) followed by a choice of boiled eggs, poached or scrambled egg on toast, beans on toast, omelettes and tea. Our club doctor told us a few years back that there is more instant energy in beans on toast

than there is in steak, and ever since then that is what we have had. It also doesn't make such a hole in the expenses these days. The trip from Preston to Blackpool's ground is done in just under the hour and one of the first persons to greet us is our former centre forward and England International Jesse Pye who now lives in Blackpool. With the game over at 5.30 pm the coach leaves for Luton. This journey is done non-stop as most of the players like to get home as quickly as possible and with Maurice, our driver, wearing his heavy boots it takes about three and a half to four hours. Anyway we are home indoors to watch Match of the Day. ★







ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

THE GOALS THAT NEVER WERE

WHEN DID a player score six goals in a match, and not one of them counted? The question, still regularly popping up in quiz programmes on radio and in magazines and newspapers, poses few problems for supporters of Luton Town or Manchester City.

For the two clubs figured in a game that has passed into soccer folklore, even though it does not appear in the official records. City came to Kenilworth Road for an FA Cup tie on January 28, 1961, and the incomparable Denis Law cracked in six goals. He struck after Alec Ashworth had put the Town two up, but heavy rain which would have put a Manchester cloud to shame saved the Town. City, inspired by Denis the Menace, were skating to victory, 6-2 up. But the rain had been sheeting down, and with 21 minutes to go, and all 22 players caked in slimy mud, the game was abandoned.

And in one of soccer's big upsets the Town, who had been relegated to the Second Division the previous season, won 3-1 when the match was staged again the following Wednesday, with two more goals by Ashworth and one by Jim Fleming. City's scorer — surprise, surprise! — Denis Law.

Records of fixtures between Luton and Manchester City are sprinkled with famous names, and on past performances the one score-line least

likely tonight is a 0-0 draw — the clubs have met 20 times in league and cups in the last 40 years, and not once have they got through 90 minutes without a single goal.

FA Cup clashes have seen City win four times, Luton twice, with one drawn and one abandoned. George Martin, later to be the Town's manager, was Luton's marksman in 1936 when City won a Fourth Round tie 2-1 at Maine Road.

In 1938 City came to Kenilworth Road in the Fifth Round. Frank Swift played a major role in City's 3-1 win, with Joe Payne the Town's scorer.

The next cup confrontation between the sides was in January 1953, when the Town were beginning to put together the side that was to take them into the First Division for the first time in their history. At Maine Road Ivor Broadis scored for City, with Jesse Pye earning the Town a replay. The City side included Bert Trautmann in goal, and a great half-back line of Don Revie, Dave Ewing and Roy Paul. But they were over-run in the replay at Kenilworth Road.

Gordon Turner cracked in a hat-trick as the Town crushed City 5-1. Spurle was City's scorer, while the Town's score-sheet was completed by Bert Mitchell and an own goal by Little.

Bruce Rioch hit a post and in the end City scraped through with a score-line that used to be a standing joke in Manchester — "Lee Wun Pen." It's not as Chinese as it sounds. City won 1-0, with Francis Lee the scorer, from a penalty, and City went on to beat Leicester 1-0 in the final at Wembley.

DOUBLE TALK

I OFTEN saw Jimmy Hill playing in Fulham's No. 8 shirt, oblivious to the crowds light hearted banter. He played in a 'thinking' side, many of whose members went on to try their hand in management at different levels (Eddie Lowe, Jim Langley, Bobby Robson, Johnny Haynes, Roy Dwight) with varying success. Jimmy Hill himself moved mountains as a Manager with Coventry City and can be considered the most successful post war Manager of one Club. Having tasted success he

opted out for a more detached view in television.

But what now? How can he equate his present role discussing and constructively criticising our present standing at international level with his task as supremo of the Saudi Arabian football set-up? The same man who is quite fairly concerned with our standards is tempting our better coaches to the sun and sand with fat salaries. Fortunately, so far, he is succeeding on the whole only with the second best. I am sure, however, that if he receives the nod from some of the cream of the coaching fraternity, like Don Howe, Dave Sexton, Gordon Jago and Bobby Robson, he would try to entice them away. Me, I like Luton!

It is ironical that the same double standards can be applied to the F.A. Coaching Courses. At the annual summer pilgrimage to Lillishall coaches demonstrate and pledge support for more open football including getting defenders forward into attacking areas. They show practises where they gamble with numbers, pushing the sweeper into midfield and dragging their own midfield men to the touch-lines to create space, thereby reducing the midfield 'mash'. Of course we all recognise that they return to their Clubs in July knowing full well that they have no intention of being brave. It's just double talk!

Perhaps we should expect this double talk and double standards in a hard, business-like, professional sport. There must be more honesty and integrity in the game if we are to go

forward to better things, I could not, and would not, criticise the set-up at Watford whilst coaching at Luton so I just wonder about Jimmy Hill.

Many of its members, prior to joining the club, had never seen a game of football in their lives, but the enthusiasm of the others convinced them it was worth joining and there has been no regrets.

Responsibility for the Club and its members is vested solely with its administrators as listed with the Luton Town Bobbers Club and Supporters Club.


