



THIS afternoon the curtain comes down at Turf Moor on yet another football season. Our visitors today are Luton Town and to them we extend a very warm welcome for this final fixture of the season. The 'Hatters', like ourselves, may not have been fortunate enough to have won any major honours this season, but I am sure they will have won many fans by the way they have tried to play entertaining and attacking football.

In December of last year the Clarets came away from Kenilworth Road with two valuable points, defeating Luton 2-1 — the Burnley goals coming from Brian Hall and Steve Kindon.

Here is the squad of players from whom their manager, Mr. David Pleat, will select his team for this afternoon's game.

MILJAJA ALEKSIC. Luton paid £20,000 to Plymouth in January 1977 for Aleksic's services, and the fee turned out to be a

bargain. Aged 24, he was unsettled at Plymouth, and the move to Luton turned out to be the turning point in his career. Son of Yugoslav parents, but born in the North of England, he broke into football as a part-timer with Stafford Rangers. He quickly became a firm favourite at Luton where the locals call him 'Elastic' in tribute to his agility and quick reflexes.

PAUL PRICE. His hopes of a career in League soccer had to overcome a double disaster before he made the grade — recruited by Luton as a youngster he was on the verge of success when he broke his leg. He fought his way back to fitness, only to break it again. He battled back again, and his performances at right-back have made him Luton's first choice at right-back ever since.

PAUL FUTCHER. One of the brightest prospects in League football today, Luton risked their record transfer fee when they paid £100,000 for him in the summer of

1974. He was still only 17 and with only a handful of Fourth Division games behind him. Luton beat off opposition from bigger clubs to persuade him to leave Chester, his home town club, and he has developed into a brilliant sweeper, cool in defence and far-seeing in setting up attacks. He has already been capped by England at under-21 level and Luton supporters are convinced that full international honours are just round the corner. Still only 20, he was one of the players described by Don Revie as 'an outstanding prospect' when the ex-England manager looked back on his experiences with the national side.

DAVID CARR. After learning his trade in defence or midfield in youth and reserve teams, Carr is now competing for regular first team football. He comes from Margate and became an apprentice at Luton when he left school in 1973.

JIM McNICHOL. Luton manager Harry Haslam is used to looking for bargains, and defender McNichol rates as one. Ipswich, prolific producers of youth players, allowed him to look for a new club after ending his apprenticeship at Portman Road in the summer of 1976. Haslam nipped in and although Paul Futcher's brilliance is hard to replace, McNichol has filled the sweeper's position with distinction whenever he has been called into the League team.

GRAHAM JONES. Watched by a Luton scout while playing as a schoolboy in Manchester, Jones was signed as an apprentice in the summer of 1975. Big and brave, he made rapid strides through Luton's lower teams, and made his League debut at the age of 17. Originally played as a back four defender, he has also sampled League soccer in midfield, and seems equally at home whatever the department.

PASQUALE FUCCILLO. Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford, midfield dynamo Fuccillo — 'Lil' to his friends and the Luton fans — joined Luton as a 16-year-old apprentice in the summer of 1973. Strong on the ball, he made his name with some storming midfield displays and marked his League debut with a goal and has been a regular marksman ever since.

ALAN WEST. Luton's club captain and a brilliant midfield man, West is one of the many stars to emerge from the 'production line' of Burnley. An England under-23 international, he joined Luton for £100,000 from Burnley in October 1973. Still only 25, he

is capable of turning defences inside-out with accurate passes.

RICKY HILL. A midfield player who has excited attention all over the country, Hill had a fairy-tale start to his League career. Signed as an apprentice from schools football in North London, he made it into the League team within a year and celebrated his debut by scoring once and laying on another goal. Now 19, he has been capped by England at youth level.

PHIL BOERSMA. It was the end of a patient search for talent when Luton boss Harry Haslam signed striker Boersma from Middlesbrough in July 1977. Three years previously Haslam had tried to persuade Liverpool to part with the player. He failed and later went to Middlesbrough, and Haslam finally got his man two years later. Middlesbrough used him as a midfield man but for Luton Boersma operates as a free-running attacker, with goals the main priority.

GODFREY INGRAM. A local product of Luton's youth teams, Ingram has been tipped for high honours since his outstanding midfield and attacking talents took him into Luton's reserve team when he was still only 16. Luton signed him on schoolboy forms, and he played for England Schools. He became an apprentice in the summer of 1976 and within a year had been upgraded to junior professional.

RON FUTCHER. Twin brother of Paul and identical in looks. When Luton paid £25,000 for him it was thought that he had been transferred from Chester because the boys wanted to be together, but Ron soon made his mark with a hat-trick in his second First Division game and has since established himself in Luton's front line.

GARY HEALE. Now in his second season with the club after being signed from Canvey Island. Tottenham were very keen to sign him but with the manager's connections in the area, finally persuaded him to join Luton. Good in the air and is a good target man to play to. Big things are expected from him this season.

BRIAN STEIN. Signed as a professional on 19th October, 1977, and in less than three weeks had made his debut at Old Trafford in the League Cup replay against Manchester City. Born in Cape Town but educated in London, Brian previously played for Edgware Town in the Athenian League where his speed and skill on the wing prompted Luton to offer him terms.

Clarets We Remember

HARRY POTTS

Born in Hetton-le-Hole in October 1920. Joined Burnley as a 16-year-old inside-forward from Hetton. Turned professional on 18th November, 1937, and got as far as the Central League side when war broke out. Spent a large part of his service with the Royal Air Force in the Far East. Played for Dennis Compton's Service XI in India.

Made his first team debut for Burnley on 31st August, 1946, against Coventry City at Turf Moor. This was Burnley's first League match after the war. Stylish goal-scoring inside-forward was leading goalscorer for Burnley in seasons 1946/47, 1947/48 and 1949/50. Scored in five successive League games in 1947/48.

Only missed two games in the 1946/47 season when Burnley won promotion to the First Division and also reached the FA Cup Final at Wembley. Played his last game for Burnley on 14th October, 1950, against Charlton Athletic at Turf Moor before being transferred to Everton for a reported fee of £20,000 later that month. Played in 57 League matches, scoring 15 goals for Everton.


Became coach to Wolverhampton Wanderers in 1956 and then became manager of Shrewsbury Town in July 1957. Returned to Turf Moor as manager in March 1958. Burnley enjoyed a successful period under his guidance, winning the League Championship in 1959/60 and reaching the FA Cup Final in 1962. Left Burnley to become manager of Blackpool and again returned to Turf Moor, this time as chief scout in 1976. Was re-appointed manager of Burnley in 1977, succeeding Joe Brown.




