



WHAT A wonderful way to start the season. On a beautiful day with the supporters in short-sleeves it looked all set for the match with Oldham Athletic for a pleasant "cricket-like" atmosphere afternoon, but who would have thought that we were to be electrified by an exhibition of football and goal scoring by a new team only come together a few weeks ago. From the Luton team it was total commitment and the result was well earned.

To open the season's League Cup rounds we have drawn with Wigan Athletic, who as you know are making their debut in the 4th. Division. We take this opportunity to welcome the Directors, Manager, Players, Officials and Supporters and wish them every success in their new venture.

WIGAN ATHLETIC

WHO COULD possibly have forecast a year ago that we should be entertaining Wigan Athletic in the Football League Cup? It is the uncertainty that provides much of the attraction of the game and so we have the privilege of entertaining this Lancashire club in their first ever League Cup, a competition that is now open to them on their return to the Football League.

We say return, because a previous Wigan team, known then as Wigan Borough, were members of Division Three (North) in the first ten seasons of its existence from 1921 onwards. They finished in fourth place in 1928/9 and in fact did not have to

apply for re-election in any of their first ten seasons. Then, however, came disaster when financial problems caused them to resign from the Football League on October 26th, 1931, their record being deleted and Mansfield being elected in their place for the following season.

In 1932 Wigan changed their name to Wigan Athletic and as members of the Lancashire Combination and the Northern Premier League they have gradually re-established themselves as a team worthy of league status. They just missed being elected in 1950 when the Football League was extended by four teams, Scunthorpe pipping them in a second vote and in 1971 a major campaign to secure election ended in disappointment. Around that time, however, their F.A. Cup feats were beginning to speak for themselves.

In the early 70's when GORDON MILNE was Manager before his move to Coventry they fully extended Manchester City at Maine Road before going down 1-0. Then last season they knocked out York City and Sheffield Wednesday before going down to Birmingham. In addition they reached the final of the F.A. Challenge Trophy in 1973, going down 2-1 to Scarborough at Wembley and last season they were runners-up in the Northern Premier League.

All of which brings us to this year, which suddenly came alight for them when at the Football League Annual meeting they tied with Southport on a first vote and then were elected on a

second vote.

The real test then came when they stepped out as a league club and sceptics who doubted their ability to survive with virtually the same side that had seen service last season, were made to think again as they kicked off with a draw against First Division Birmingham in a pre-season friendly and then followed up with a draw at Tranmere in the first leg of the first round of the League Cup and then knocked out the Third Division club by winning the second leg 2-1. Then last Saturday week they went to Hereford for their opening league match and took a point in a goalless draw which they several times came close to winning.

HERE TODAY.

MOST OF the Wigan team may be new to our supporters though the odds are that they will be more familiar by the end of the game. Men to look for up front are JOHN WILKIE who came from Elgin City and has been leading scorer in the past two seasons, and IAN PURDIE, a Scottish Under 23 international who before this season gained experience with Aberdeen, Dundee and Motherwell. Coming through from midfield FRANK CORRIGAN netted twice against Tranmere. He had a little League experience with Walsall before moving to Northwich Victoria and so on to Wigan last season.

PETER HOUGHTON is another man who has an eye for goal, scoring freely last season after moving in from

South Liverpool, while JEFF WRIGHT is an engine room man now in his fourth season and with a fair number of goals to his credit. When it comes to experience, however, skipper IAN GILLIBRAND has now played over 600 games since moving from Arsenal over 10 years ago. He is now club skipper and is usually seen in midfield.

Two far more recent signings are busy little IAN SEDDON ex-Bolton, Cambridge and Rochdale and defender NEIL DAVIDS, ex-Leeds, Norwich and Swansea. Both arrived in the close season.

Neil will probably be at the heart of the defence alongside NOEL WARD, who came from Aberdeen two years ago while on the flanks JOE HINNIGAN is another former South Liverpool man and TOMMY GORE is a one-time Tranmere man who had the satisfaction of scoring against his former club in the League Cup.

Substitute in the opening games was ALAN CROMPTON, a former Blackburn and Sunderland junior signed in the close season.

THE LONG ARM OF COINCIDENCE

IN BRIAN Swain's "All Our Yesterdays" in our opening programme he mentioned the new signings of a decade ago and described how two of them, Harrison and Lewis had scored on their league debut against Oldham whilst the third, Sheffield had only been denied by the crossbar. In the opening league match of 1978/79 the opponents were also Oldham and the "new boys" again had a field day with a brace of goals apiece for Bob Hatton and David Moss whilst Chris Turner missed by inches when his powerful header struck the bar with the goalkeeper well beaten.

IN THE first home league match of our promotion year in 1973/74 Luton achieved the same score - 6-1 as we did against Oldham recently. The similarity ended there however

as our opponents on that occasion, Carlisle, were overwhelmed by six goals in the first twenty minutes but scored the only goal of the second half.

SECOND DIVISION SCENE

THIS IS the stage of the season when every team must have at least a sneaking, even if sometimes illogical hope, that in twelve months time they may be kicking off in Division One.

Putting it another way then, who are the teams that we shall have to contend with if we are to win a place in the top three? One looks first at the teams which narrowly missed out last season and one must fancy Brighton to be in the running again. They missed out only on goal average last season after a fine finishing burst and if PETER WARD can recapture the scoring touch that eluded him in the latter part of the season then he and MALCOLM POSKETT, an inspired signing from Hartlepool less than a year ago, could be the outstanding dual strikers in the Division.

Blackburn Rovers too improved as the season progressed and if ace winger DAVE WAGSTAFFE can have a really good season they could well return to Division One.

At least one of the relegated clubs usually puts a strong challenge and of these West Ham look perhaps the most likely. 'POP' ROBSON and DAVID CROSS may take some holding by Second Division defences and perhaps Leicester under the strict training of new manager JOCK

WALLACE may surprise a few people, but BILL McGARRY's Newcastle will probably need more than one season in which to restyle themselves for a major challenge.

Of the teams coming up Cambridge and Preston will probably be happy if they can consolidate their places, but Wrexham proved last season that they are the equal of any team on their day and in this, their first season ever in Division Three.

Every season brings its surprises. Who could have anticipated Blackpool's relegation at this stage last year? Sunderland could be the side to slip a little this time after disappointing their fans last season by not quite making promotion. They do still have some good young players though. Bristol Rovers, Cardiff and Millwall may again be struggling to stay up, but Crystal Palace with new striker MIKE ELWISS from Preston may do well and Stoke with a useful young side now strengthened by the arrival of MIKE DOYLE in defence may just manage to climb back to Division One after two seasons away from it. One last shot? What about Burnley, who climbed spectacularly out of trouble last season.







NOTHING'S changed has it!

There's yobs in football colours halting the London Underground . . . a policeman seriously injured after being stoned following the Millwall—Newcastle game . . . and players kissing each other like a load of pansies.

Makes you sick doesn't it.

But what are we going to do about it all? Something, I hope — and fast. Because if we don't there won't be any football for us to enjoy.

It's not like this in the rest of the world, you know. And it's rough home whenever one goes abroad to see football.

Foreigners look at English fans aghast as they riot through their streets, screaming, yelling — and then creating more violence and disturbance inside their grounds.

Strange as it may seem, other people don't behave like that.

They take their families to football and sit back and enjoy the game.

Yes, sit back and enjoy it. And therein lies perhaps another problem. Many observers have long felt that if everyone was seated at a football match there would be less trouble.

But you and I know that it is impracticable in this country. It would cost too many millions to put our soccer homes in order that way.

The bigger First Division clubs are being encouraged to put in more seats, however, and that's a good thing. It's harder to have a ght sitting down than standing up you know.

Realistically, however, the cure must come from the courts with stiffer sentences — and more realistic sentences. We must have a deterrent. At the moment, the yobs pay their fine, laugh, and go right out and do it again.

The problem is greater when it comes to our sorties into Europe because English fans are now regarded overseas as the scum of the earth.

That point has not been lost on Arsenal and I applaud their decision to form their own Travel Club so they are able to monitor those fans who go with them into Europe for the UEFA Cup this season.

Their club, which is being run by the David Dryer Sports organisation, who are Britain's leading sports travel experts, will have complete control over the fans.

Anyone wishing to see Arsenal's away legs will have to be a member of their Travel Club — any trouble and those fans will be out forever.

The Dryer organisation has years of experience in handling us abroad and their record is excellent. I would commend more clubs to look at the Arsenal venture and link with Dryer for their European adventures.

That then, is a positive move by one of our greatest football clubs to clean up the game — and if a few more managers could stop their players kissing each other, I'd be delighted with that.

I was enthusing over Alan Gowling's goal for Bolton against Bristol City on BBC's Match of the Day when he was suddenly engulfed in smackers — quite sickmaking.

Hardly, a problem of the same magnitude as hooliganism — it nauseating nonetheless.

FOCUS ON

CHRIS TURNER

BORN in St. Neots where his parents still live Chris Turner almost qualifies as a local lad. However his early allegiance was neither to Peterborough or Luton but to Arsenal and he still admits to a great affection for the "Gunners". His first appearance at Kenilworth Road took place in the colours of the Huntingdonshire Youth side which defeated their Bedfordshire counterparts. As a result Chris was approached by the "Town" who discovered that Peterborough had beaten them to the punch. Joining the 'Posh' at the age of seventeen, Chris progressed to the 1st. team early in 1970/71 season and in one of his first games he played alongside David Pleat who scored his side's only goal. When John Wile was transferred to West Bromwich Albion later the same season Chris moved to the centre half position which he retained until breaking his jaw in the match with Notts County. His first league goal occurred in April 1971 against Brentford and a quite eventful season ended with a total of fifteen league appearances. In 1972/73 he enjoyed the record of being an ever-present with 46 league appearances and 7 goals whilst the following season he made 44 league appearances in the side which won the Division Four Championship conceding only 38 goals. The following year he again



played in every league match scoring 8 goals which left him only one short of the Club's joint top scorers, Robson and Gregory and he reached double figures through the addition of two Cup goals. In 1975/76 due to a slipped disc Chris managed only thirty one league matches but nevertheless achieved nine goals. At about this time Peterborough experimented with the big centre half at No. 9 and his record - 6 goals in 9

matches was good enough to make many a specialist striker envious. Returning to ever present status in 1977/78 at centre half Chris Turner formed an integral part of a defence which had the second best record in the Football League - 33 goals in 46 matches. Only the 1st Division Champions could better this figure.

Other highlights of his career are:- Missing only seven league games in four seasons.

Being twice voted best centre half in the 3rd Division in four seasons. Captaining Peterborough for 3 years.

Captaining New England Tea Men whenever Keith Weller was absent. Being voted player of the year in 1977 by Connecticut Bicentennials (U.S.A.).

Runner-up in Sunday People 1977/78 £250 3rd Division Ratings Contest - to team mate Doyle by a fraction of a point, and scoring one of the best ever own goals seen at Kenilworth Road in a Mid-Week League match in 1972 - other Luton scorer, Derek Hales. Chris and Lynne Turner will be moving to the Luton area from Peterborough in the near future and we wish them every possible happiness in their new home. Also, of course, every success to Chris on the field, and the best of luck in his other 'sporting pursuits', Horse and Greyhound Racing.
