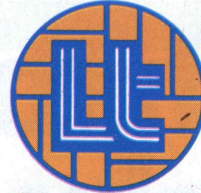


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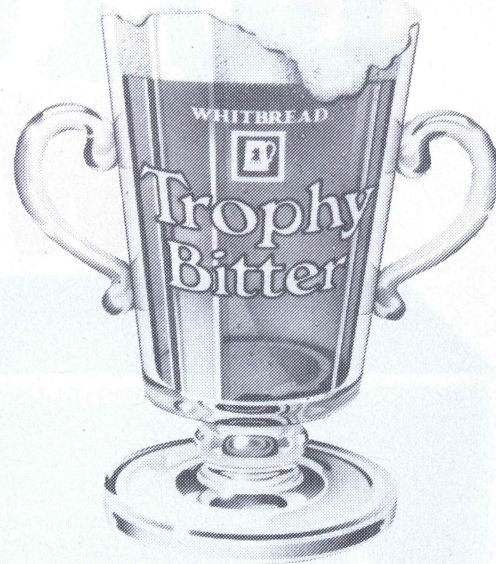
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DAVID PLEAT

Cardiff City

RON HEALEY. One of the finest goalkeepers in the second Division. Made a First Division debut at 18 for Manchester City and, after loan spells with Coventry City and Preston, he signed for Cardiff at a bargain £20,000 fee. Agile and with superb reflex reactions, he is an Eire International — having been born in Salford of Irish parents.

JOHN DAVIES. Wales Youth squad goalkeeper and one of the tallest in the game at 6 feet 3 inches. Rated an outstanding prospect who has made impressive progress at Ninian Park after signing as an apprentice from local football in West Wales. The only Welsh speaker on the City staff.

Defenders

PHIL DWYER. A player almost impossible to categorise in any one position — but has played most of his games for his hometown club as a right-back. Also plays with powerful authority as a centre-half, energetic enterprise in mid-field and was one of the sensations of the British Championship as a robust Trevor Ford style striker.

FREDDIE PETHARD. Consistent Glasgow-born left-back who moved to Cardiff after a spell with Celtic. Former Scottish Schoolboy International who can also operate with constructive skill in mid-field.

GERRY BYRNE. A young Scot who forced his way into the

first team squad last season and impressed in his dozen first team appearances with cool, confident tackling and intelligent anticipation.

BRIAN ATTLEY. Poised, talented full-back or mid-field player who takes every chance in either position to display his eagerness to attack. Another of Cardiff's locally-born and raised players. Former Wales Youth international

ROD THOMAS. The most experienced international defender of all time — won his 50th cap for his country against Czechoslovakia earlier this season. Signed from Derby in a bargain £10,000 deal to lend his experience to the Cardiff defence. Can play in any defensive position but at his best at right back. Born in Glyncoirwg, started with Swindon Town and played in their 1969 team which won the League Cup. Later transferred to Derby for £100,000 and was a member of their 1974-75 Championship winning side.

KEITH PONTIN. Made his real breakthrough last season. Although he had played a handful of first team games the previous season, he came into the side regularly last season and played game after game with increasing confidence and ability.

RICHIE MORGAN. Cardiff's club skipper and longest serving player. Experienced central defender with a record of battling to the last reserves of skill and stamina in the cause of his only

— and hometown — club.

ALBERT LARMOUR. Fought his way back into the side last season and immediately clicked into the form which has marked his six years at Cardiff; cool, efficient defence playing alongside the centre-half.

Mid-Field

JOHN BUCHANAN. Cardiff's top scorer last season as he alternated between orthodox mid-field and striker. Possesses one of the most explosive shots in the Second Division and can hit the ball with equal power from either foot. Born in the Highlands, he signed for Cardiff in 1974-75 from Northampton Town.

DAVID GILES. A busy, eager worker in mid-field who has been capped at both Youth and Under-21 level. Signed for Cardiff after some exciting displays in local Schools football and has worked his way from ground staff to the first team.

ALAN CAMPBELL. The experienced 'Hub' of Cardiff's mid-field after his signing late in the 1975-76 season from Birmingham City helped to clinch an immediate promotion back into the Second Division. A player who possesses the traditional Scottish skills of control, 'vision' and intelligent prompting.

STEVE GRAPES. High paced flank attacker, either as an orthodox winger or playing wide in mid-field. A brilliant crosser of the ball, this former First Division player for Norwich City has created a great many goals for Cardiff City since his transfer in October 1976.

Forwards

TONY EVANS. One of Cardiff's biggest success stories in recent years. Signed on a free transfer from Blackpool during the 1975 close season, he promptly scored 28 goals to play a leading part in restoring newly relegated Cardiff back to the Second Division. Top scorer again the following season.

RAY BISHOP. Took his chance eagerly last season with the injury to Evans. In exactly the same mould of sudden acceleration and direct breaks for goal, he stunned opposing defences with his neat control and darting breaks.

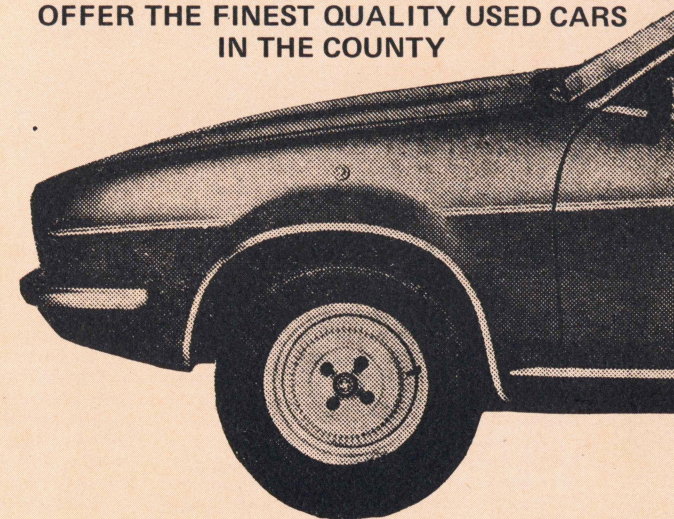
TONY BEASLEY. A newly signed winger of immense promise. Joined Cardiff from Southern League Trowbridge too late last season to win a Second Division place — but this could be breakthrough season. A player of natural attacking flair, blistering pace and rocketing shot.

Our secretary, John Wilkinson, has mentioned in his news that ground safety is ever present in the minds of all clubs, we at Kenilworth Road achieved quite a lot during the last summer close season but more remains to be done and will be done.

This Saturday we have the pleasure of meeting our friends from Cardiff City. To the Directors, Manager, Players and Officials we extend a sincere welcome and look forward to a good game.

THINGS have not gone too well so far for JIMMY ANDREWS' Cardiff team this season and it could well be that they will find themselves fighting another rearguard action against relegation, something they have achieved successfully in each of the last two seasons since bounding straight back from Division Three in 1975/6.

It doesn't seem long of course to our older supporters since we were meeting them in Division One where they have enjoyed three spells — in the 20's, the fifties and the early sixties. In fact they were runners-up there to Huddersfield in 1923/4 and during this same purple patch they shook the football world by beating Arsenal in the 1926/7 F.A. Cup Final to take the trophy out of England for the one and only time.

LAST SEASON

LAST season we did the double over them and after our 3-1 win here in March they dropped into serious trouble with only two wins in their next ten games, but just when it mattered they beat Bolton, Sheffield United and Notts County in quick succession and so scrambled to safety.

In the present campaign they have been

put out of the League Cup by Oxford and after drawing their first league match at home to Preston they have lost successively at Stoke, Bristol Rovers and at home to Oldham.

RAY BISHOP, who won a place near the end of last season, has been the most consistent goalscorer since then whilst former Northampton man JOHN BUCHANAN (swopped for John Farrington three season ago) has also popped in the odd goal from midfield where he is likely to be joined by local lad DAVID GILES and vastly experienced DAVID CAMPBELL, formerly with Charlton and Birmingham.

Ex-Norwich man STEVE GRAPES may also come into the reckoning in this department, while in defence current Welsh international PHIL DWYER, DAVE ROBERTS (newly signed from Hull and another Welsh cap) line up with Scotsman FREDDY PETHARD who has played all his league football in Wales and ROD THOMAS, who arrived from Derby last season and has over 400 club games and 50 internationals to his credit.

In goal new boy JOHN DAVIES has had a few outstanding games so far this season having made his debut in place of former Manchester City man RON HEALEY. At 18 he looks an outstanding prospect for a team that has fielded some outstanding goalkeepers, men like RON HOWELLS and GRAHAM VERNCOMBE.

LAST MONDAY, accompanied by our Chairman Mr. D. Mortimer. I attended the first of this season Group 4 meetings. The other clubs in attendance belonging to our group were Cambridge United, Chesterfield, Derby Co. Grimsby Town, Ipswich Town, Lincoln City, Leicester City, Mansfield Town, Northampton Town, Norwich City, Nottingham Forest, Notts County, Peterborough United and Scunthorpe United, with Mr. J. Dunnett M.P. the Notts County chairman in the chair. Many items were on the agenda, ranging from 'local radio to Artificial playing surfaces. We believe that these meetings are essential these days, because clubs can get together and discuss not only their own problems but also the problems that exist in the game today. One subject discussed and I think that every meeting we have had for the past two years, this item has been on the agenda, and that is the Safety of Sports Ground act. Our visitors today have been hit very hard by this act as everyone who has visited Ninian Park lately will know. 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SECOND DIVISION SCENE

STOKE CITY are now clearly establishing themselves as the pace-setters so far with only one point dropped and only one goal conceded in six league and cup games so far. BRENDAN O'CALLAGHAM chose just the right time to score his first goal of the season on Saturday for it earned two points at Orient, this being the fourth defeat in a row for JIMMY BLOOMFIELD's boys.

Crystal Palace, though holding on to second place, dropped a surprise home point to Sunderland on Saturday, this being the first point the Rokerites have picked up away from home this season after four defeats in a row in league and cup.

Oldham looked for a time like causing an upset at Brighton where they had avoided defeat on each of their last two visits, but in the end a JOHN HURST own goal gave the Seaside's their fourth league and cup win in a row.

Despite the fact that they are in third place Brighton's gates have dropped this season, Saturday's was their third in a row below the 20,000 mark though last season this happened only once all season.

In fact the one gate that did top the 20,000 mark on Saturday was at Newcastle where PETER WITHE opened his account for the Magpies with two goals in their 3-1 win over Blackburn, this being the first time they have scored as many as three goals since last December. Manager BILL McGARRY, who once sold Withe cheaply in his Wolves days, must be pleased with his form to date, even though he cost £200,000 this time.

Still maintaining their reputation of winning all their home games and losing all their away games Bristol Rovers beat us 2-0 on Saturday with young striker PAUL RANDALL scoring for the fourth time in five home games.

Apart from Stoke and Crystal Palace the only other two unbeaten teams in Division Two are Burnley and Wrexham. While the latter drew at Charlton for the third time in successive visits. Burnley won a 'Match of the Day' thriller 3-2 against West Ham, who had not previously lost an away game.

Leicester are finding goals almost as difficult to score in Division Two as they did in Division One last season. They have scored just once in four home games to date, losing to Notts County by the only goal of the game on Saturday. This was County's first away win since their 3-1 success at Mansfield last October.

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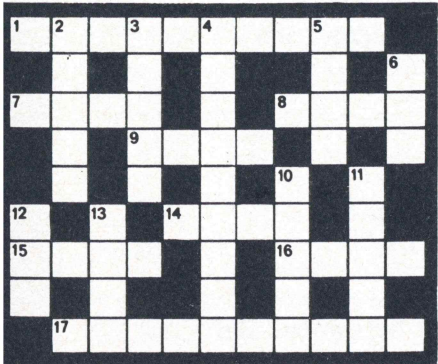

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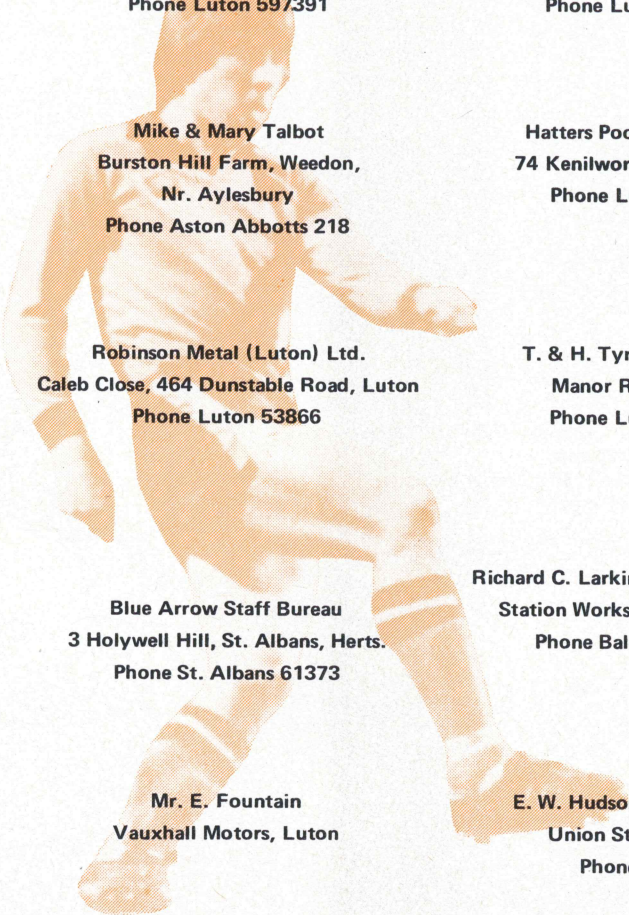
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N ACTION ACT

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LUTON CHARLTON

IT WAS a case of the old one-two making three as our good home form continued against Charlton. Midfield men and forwards produced some sparkling combination work at times, with one-two passing movements breaking down Charlton's defence and leading directly to all three goals.

Perhaps in Brian Stein's case it was more a matter of one-two making four: the picture left shows him slamming the second goal of the match, and his fourth of the season to give the Oak Road end a treat.

Bob Hatton's low cross made the opening, and once again the camera shows how we managed to get men into the box and away from defenders for the final strike.

Goal machine Hatton had already started the demolition of the Londoners' rearguard with the opening goal in the first half. Probably goalkeeper Jeff Wood should have made a better job of his attempted save, but the picture below illustrates Bob's textbook technique: high off the ground, perfectly balanced, and eyes still on the ball as it speeds towards the top corner of the net.

ANGLIA TELEVISION'S MATCH OF THE WEEK COMMENTATOR

ARE YOU fit enough to be a Football League referee? You might not be too sure of this. But until a few weeks ago you would have been in good company because the men in the middle themselves weren't too sure either.

As part of a joint venture between the Football Association and the Football League minimum fitness tests have been introduced this season for Football League referees for the first time here. It is, however, nothing new. The tests are standard procedure in every other FIFA country in Europe. And indeed any referee in Great Britain aspiring to a FIFA appointment has to pass a fitness test first.

So when Ken Ridden, the Football Association's National Training Officer for Referees, suggested the idea there were plenty of grounds why it should be accepted.

What are the standards? There are four tests:

1. Run 400 metres in under 75 seconds.
2. Run 50 metres in under 8 seconds.
3. Complete 4 shuttle runs of 10 metres each in under 11.5 seconds.
4. And complete a minimum of 1750 metres if you are over 40 (2000 metres under 40) during a run which must be continued for ten minutes.

The long distance run is something of an experiment. The test along FIFA lines was a specific distance which had to be completed in under 12 minutes. But most of the referees found it too easy and completed the distance in, say 8 minutes, and stopped running. The idea here is to push them longer.

These tests of course have to be run consecutively. The official order is number 1, 2, 4 and finally number 3. A maximum recovery period of five minutes is allowed between each test.

Football League referees have come out of the tests well so far. There were one or two failures in the first batch of tests. And the refs know that they will be given no Football League appointments until all four categories have been successfully passed.

To begin with Ken Ridden had to set up twenty one different test centres. The reason for this was simply to cut down expense. In an ideal world all the referees would be called together in one or two areas and put through their paces. This would be fairer and easier to administer. It would also be more expensive. The object now is to cut the centres down to about six.

Remember, this is only a minimum fitness test and will no doubt be developed in the next few seasons. The Germans for instance require their officials to complete the 50 metre sprint in 7.5 seconds. How demanding should these tests become?

Another question involves the thorny point of enforced retirement to League referees at the age of forty seven. These tests will perhaps indicate what many have often thought — that some referees under 47 are not fit enough . . . and that many who reach the enforced retirement age are well capable of continuing in the middle for a few more years . . . in a game where experience is so valuable.

A number of optional items are also available to members — tie clips, cuff links and plaques all incorporating the club insignia and all profits raised from the sale of these items, together with any surplus from membership fees will in due course be donated to the Benevolent Funds which exist to benefit those people connected with the game, who have given members so much pleasure in the past, namely the Football Association, Football League and Professional Footballers Association.

ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

A look back at Luton Town a decade ago.

SOME OF the most important football news of the week a decade ago was an off-the-field announcement from Kenilworth Road. Bruce Rioch, called an inside left in those days, reached his 21st birthday and the Town announced that he had marked the occasion by signing a new contract which would keep him with the club for the next four years.

Scouts from many First Division clubs had been casting envious eyes at Rioch, and it was made known that bids of £80,000 had been rejected. The new contract, said a Town statement, should end speculation about Rioch's future. It didn't of course, and it is now a matter of record that Rioch was transferred within a year of that announcement.

On the field, Rioch was in a team which could do no wrong in the eyes of its supporters. On September 7, 1968, they had a big following to see them meet Leyton Orient in East London. Both teams were undefeated, and it turned out to be a rugged, physical game. The gate of 13,719 was Orient's biggest for two years. There were fouls galore by both sides, and Alan Slough, stand-in centre-half for the injured Terry Branston, had a personal triumph by playing Vic Halom out of the game.

Orient used their sub, player-manager Jimmy Bloomfield, for the second half, but the stalemate continued and it ended in a 0-0 draw with home supporters furious at the Town's well-organised offside trap.

The following Saturday 12,965 were at Kenilworth Road to see the Town defend their 100 per cent home record, on a day when heavy rain made the match a doubtful starter.

The Town controlled most of the first half in dreadful conditions. Brian Lewis had an early "goal" disallowed for offside before Laurie Sheffield made it 1-0 in the 21st minute from Mike Harrison's cross.

But things went wrong after Tony Read misjudged a cross-shot just before the interval to give McNamee an equaliser.

Tranmere started to show signs of earning a draw until Slough and Rioch set up a goal for Lewis in the 60th minute and Terry Branston made it safe with the third goal after a corner by Graham French five minutes later.

The Third Division table looked lovely that night: the Town were top with 12 points from seven matches, three points clear of the field.

FOCUS ON

MAL DONAGHY

ALREADY a firm favourite with the Luton fans as a result of some excellent performances, Mal Donaghy has experienced a meteoric rise during the past two years. His first ever Football League match on August 19th was only the second that he had seen, the only previous experience having been as a spectator at Old Trafford when Everton were the visitors.

Born 21 years ago last Wednesday in Belfast, Mal was denied the opportunities that we take for granted, that is to play soccer at school and youth level. His school engaged only in the Gaelic variety of football and as a more than useful exponent Mal represented County Antrim at this sport.

It was not until he joined the Post Office that Mal experienced organised soccer and he quickly progressed to their representative side at the age of eighteen. At the start of 1977/78 season he was playing junior football but by Christmas he had been signed by Irish League Club, Larne and immediately established himself in their first team at Centre-half. After a further dozen matches the Irish selectors drafted him into the first ever Northern Ireland Under 21 side which drew with Eire 1-1 in Dublin. It was at this point that Luton became one of a number of British clubs taking a close interest in the talented young defender and

after his performance in the international the chase 'hotted' up. A week in Glasgow ended with Celtic showing definite interest but, fortunately for the Hatters, the changes in management there delayed the decision. This was followed by a week-end at Loftus Road and the offer of a contract by Queens Park Rangers. Despite this interest by these and other senior



clubs David Pleat's persistence was rewarded and some weeks after he and Assistant Manager, Ken Gutteridge had watched the Dublin international the latter made another crossing of the Irish Sea to clinch the deal. Mal Donaghy was a Luton player for a modest fee and largely because he had been told that there was a first team place for
