MILIJA ALEKSIC — Goalkeeper

A £20,000 buy from Plymouth in January, 1977. Son of Yugoslav parents, but born in the North of England, he started his career as a part-timer with Stafford Rangers. "Elastic" — somewhat easier to chant than Aleksic, and a tribute to his agility and reflexes — is the nickname he has come by at Luton.

ALAN JUDGE — Goalkeeper

Hertfordshire schools product. Joined Town as apprentice in summer of 1976. Became a junior professional within a year.

PAUL PRICE — Defender

Luton's longest-serving player, having been recruited from youth soccer in 1971. Has overcome a double major setback in the shape of a broken leg when on the verge of a League place in 1974, and then suffered a similar injury. His subsequent comeback has been permanent, having been League side regular for past three years.

JIM McNICHOL — Defender

Surplus to Ipswich Town's requirements when he completed his apprenticeship in 1976, this Scot was snapped up by Luton. Eleven League appearances last season.

KIRK STEPHENS — Defender

A £5,000 buy from Nuneaton who had played for David Pleat while he managed the Southern League club.

GRAHAM JONES — Defender

Recruited from Manchester schools football at the age of 16 in 1975, he made his League debut a year later. Can play as central defender or in midfield.

STEVE SHERLOCK

One of nine players to join Town during first four months of David Pleat's managership. Played 80 Central League games for Manchester City, but was kept out of First Division reckoning by Scottish international Willie Donachie. Left Maine Road for Luton in May.

DAVID CARR — Defender

Hails from Margate. Joined Luton from school at 16 in 1973. Can play in back four or midfield. Established himself last season with 25 League outings in all after Steve Buckley was sold to Derby.

MARK AIZLEWOOD — Defender

Former Welsh youth international skipper bought from Newport County — as their record sale — for £50,000 last April at the age of 18.

TERRY HAYES — Midfield

Ex-captain of Northern Ireland youth side who has also won an under-21 cap. Luton, in face of competition from elsewhere, signed him from Linfield in March.

MAL DONAGHY — Defender

Northern Ireland under-21 international signed in the summer from Larne.

CHRIS TURNER — Defender

Nine seasons with Peterborough, where he was a one-time playing colleague of Luton manager Pleat. Joined Luton during past summer for £95,000.

PASQUALE FUCCILLO — Midfield

Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford. Joined Luton as apprentice in 1973 and broke into the League side within three years. Ever present in League games last season, scoring five times.

ALAN WEST — Midfield

Creative player who progressed to England under-23 international status while with Burnley. Signed by Luton for £100,000 in October, 1973. Has had North American Soccer League experience.

RICKY HILL — Midfield

Now 20, he joined Luton from North London as an apprentice as a 16-year-old who went on to gain England youth honours. Had 37 League games last season.

JOHN LUCAS — Midfield

Luton signed him at the second attempt, since this Welsh schoolboy international turned them down on leaving school at 16 to join Manchester United. Within a year — this past

June — Town got their man when he decided his prospects might be better elsewhere.

GODFREY INGRAM — Forward

England Schools international whose speed and shooting earned him Combination soccer with his home-town club when only 16. Became junior professional within 12 months of starting apprenticeship in 1976.

NIGEL JOHNSON — Forward

Second year professional who joined Luton from schools football in Welwyn Garden City. Earned League debut last season.

GARY HEALE — Forward

Canvey Islander who opted for Luton rather than Spurs. Marked League debut with goal. High spot of career to date: scoring twice at Maine Road last season in a second League Cup replay at Manchester City.

DAVID MOSS — Forward

After 45 League games and 17 goals for Swindon last season, Moss moved to Kenilworth Road for £110,000 during the summer. Scored five times for Town during their early-season goal spree.

BOB HATTON — Forward

Prolific scorer with Birmingham, Carlisle and Blackpool before jumping at chance to stay in the Second Division with Luton when Bloomfield Road club were relegated last season. Hatton cost Luton £50,000 and he has already repaid them with six goals so far this term

BRIAN STEIN

Born in Cape Town, Stein was educated in London and played for Athenian League Edgware Town before joining Luton in October, 1977 — and making his debut in that notable long-running League Cup "series" with Manchester City just three weeks later. Three goals in 18 League outings last season. Eight times on the target this term.

SECOND DIVISION SCENE

Fulham's quiet climb up the table makes today's visit to Crystal Palace an especially intriguing one in that the League leaders face opponents who have won on their past two appearances at Selhurst Park — by 3-2 last season and 2-0 back in 1973-74.

Fulham last Saturday doubled their home goals tally so far with that 5-3 victory over Preston.

One of the Cottagers' goals came from North End's Mike Baxter. So, remember two of Brighton's goals came from this unlucky player when they beat North End 5-1 on September 30, he currently tops the Second Division's own goal chart.

Baxter's consolation at Fulham came in the shape of his first goal of the season at the opposition's end.

Cardiff, whose Phil Dwyer and Steve Grapes had already scored for the opposition this season, were for a change the beneficiaries against Leicester, whose Steve Sims obliged in last Saturday's 1-0 win by City at Ninian Park.

Luton today bring to Brisbane Road Brian Stein, whose eight Second Division goals put him close on the heels of Bryan Robson, the section's top marksman with nine. In addition, Luton would appear to enjoy the services of a confident spot kick taker in Pasquale Fuccillo. His four successfully-taken penalties are also a "divisional best" so far this season.

While Bristol Rovers with their 2-1 win over Orient maintained a 100 per cent record at Eastville, Blackburn Rovers earned their first away points with their 1-0 win at Cambridge. This was thanks to defender Kevin Hird's second goal of the season for Rovers.

Cambridge of course represents new territory for Orient in terms of Second Division soccer next Saturday. Os' visit to the Abbey Stadium is their first, apart from games in the Midweek League and a pre-season friendly.

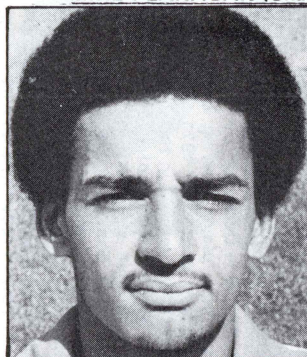
Men on the move: Bristol Rovers were reported to have decided against re-signing Ray Graydon, their one-time wingman more

recently with Coventry and Washington Diplomats. Graydon, whose successfully-taken last match penalty was largely instrumental in Aston Villa denying O's the victory that would have taken them into the First Division in May, 1974, seemed set to make his return to the English League from Washington by dropping a division and joining Oxford United... Norman Piper — who like Paul Went and Os' current coach Alan Stephenson — was a member of the Portsmouth side that overcame Orient in a twice replayed FA Cup tie also in season 1974, has also returned to Britain from American soccer. In his case he has joined Southern League Yeovil.

OUR GAMES WITH CARDIFF AND BRISTOL ROVERS BRISTOL ROVERS 2 ORIENT 1

With Peter Kitchen the victim of a heavy cold and Ralph Coates developing a strain in a thigh muscle late in the week, our first team's preparations for last Saturday's visit to Bristol Rovers were destined to be much disrupted.

The re-organisation of the side prompted by their absence was followed by an early goal from Rovers' skipper Frank Prince — his first of the season — and for the remaining 41 minutes of the first half O's were very much aware they were facing opponents eager to record a remarkable sixth League win in a row at Eastville.

Yet within two minutes of the second half starting Rovers' 100 per cent record came to be very much in danger when the recalled John Chiedozie created space for himself down the right touch-line and swung over an accurate centre from which Ian Moores headed an equaliser.

(In the case of our ex-Spur it was, by coincidence, precisely a year back that he scored a hat-trick in that remarkable 9-0 win over Rovers at White Hart Lane).

Rovers clinched the points when Phil Lythgoe dropped his 64th minute corner short, Stuart Taylor headed on and Dave Staniforth added a further touch. Neither Taylor nor Staniforth, even after consulting a goal-line cameraman, was 100 per cent certain as to which of them was the scorer, though Staniforth has apparently since been credited with this goal.

Incidental point to ponder was just how much of this match could be seen by the crew of a hot air balloon that hovered in the Eastville area of Bristol for much of the afternoon many feet above the stadium!

ORIENT 2 CARDIFF CITY 2

City manager Jimmy Andrews readily acknowledged after this intriguing struggle that, fearing the threat likely to be posed by Orient's tall strikers Ian Moores and Joe Mayo, he had late in his planning for the game re-organised his defence to accommodate big Welsh international centre back Dave Roberts.

While this re-think by Mr. Andrews certainly proved a big factor in his side gaining a point after twice leading with goals from John Buchanan and Gary Stevens, Orient counterpart Jimmy Bloomfield felt that a 3-1 half-time lead could so easily have reflected his side's positive first half showing. In the event it took goals — one in each half from Mayo and Tony Grealish, with the latter's scored three minutes from time — to earn us our draw.

Coming when it did, Grealish's splendidly-struck effort swept away any impending sense of disappointment that would have surrounded another odd-goal home defeat.

Certainly not to be overlooked were two retrospective considerations.

Cardiff's determined and well-organised resistance added stature to Orient's feat in going to Ninian Park and winning an all-or-nothing relegation decider barely five months back. While our first home draw of the season represented nine out of ten possible points gained in our past five meetings with these opponents!

Specialist's advice during the week suggested he put the injury to the test, and Peter was pleased to have got this game under his belt. New face around Brisbane Road is that of St. Louis-born Chris Carenzar, 26, a centre back currently on trial after being recommended to the club by former O's Tommy Taylor on the strength of their acquaintance when Hammer Tommy was playing in Hawaii. Chris has more recently been with Los Angeles Aztecs Match-day birthday greetings to Eric Roukin, an Orient supporter for many years, for whom a win over Luton would obviously crown his "21st."

ARSENAL

This programme is an outsider for the top awards. Best articles include a personality page which contains interviews with top players and staff.

Marks out of 100 — 65.

IPSWICH

An excellent programme which is exceptional value for money. This publication in full colour includes articles by top commentator, John Motson.

Marks out of 100 = 95

NEWCASTLE

This must be the top programme in Division 2. It has an excellent balance of pictures and comment.

Marks out of 100 = 85.

NORWICH

Another of the better programmes of the moment. Not as many action photographs as I would personally like, but the articles compensate.

Marks out of 100 = 90

NOTTINGHAM FOREST

Forest's programme could surprise many. Well presented. One of it's best features is the profile of the visiting team.

Marks out of 100 = 80

SPURS

A rank outsider, its best feature is the scrapbook.

Marks out of 100 = 60

Q.P.R.

A small programme, but very informative. Writers include Michael Wale and Tony Pullein.

Marks out of 100 = 70.
