TWO Bristol Rovers supporters popped their heads inside the Charlton team coach just before it left Eastville on Saturday and congratulated the team on "the best match seen at Rovers ground for many years. Lets hope both our sides get promoted," said the two fans.

Thats the sentiments shared by most of those who saw this incredible match which ended in a 5-5 draw with Paul Randell scoring a hat-trick for Rovers and Dave Williams getting 2 goals, one from a penalty. Charltons goals being scored by Mick Flanagan 2, Martin Robinson 2, and Dick Tydeman 2.

Both teams were given a standing ovation as they left the field after providing top class entertainment, but despite being the first team to take a point from Eastville this season the Charlton players were disappointed at not winning the match.

They were twice in front by 2 clear goals and Rovers final equaliser came from a dubious penalty decision.

There was a shock for Charlton even before the match started with Dick Tydeman pulling a groin muscle in the pre-match warm up but Dick played for the first 16 minutes during which time he put us in front.

9 goals were scored in an incredible 37 mintues spell during the game and we almost snatched a dramatic winner in the last minute when Martin Robinson's shoot skimmed the goal post.

Martin Robinson and Mike Flanagan are having a rare old goal scoring tussle. Martin now has 10 and Mike 9.

The draw left us undefeated away from home for 2 months and our last defeat was in fact against tonights opponents Luton Town.

This evenings match promises to be another high scoring affair because Luton are the second division leading goal scorers and they are closely chased by West Ham and ourselves.

Town beat Newcastle 2-0 at home on Saturday and gave a debut to their goal keeper Dave Lawson recently signed from Everton. There should be an interesting dual tonight between Luton defender Chris Turner and our Mike Flanagan who are both team mates for the net England tea-men side in the North American League.

We have another important match here on Saturday when Fulham who are also doing well visit us. Fulham lost 5-3 in a high scoring match at Turf Moor against Burnley on Saturday and play West Ham tonight at Craven Cottage.

The colts slumped 5-1 to Arsenal on Saturday in a South East Counties league match and last night, Monday, they played Ford United at Dagenham in last seasons final of the London Youth Cup.

Tomorrow afternoon 2 p.m. we visit Brentford at Griffin Park for a mid-week league match.

Luton Town's Greatest

LUTON TOWN

PAUL PRICE: Luton's longest-serving player. Price has been a model professional since being recruited from youth soccer in 1971. Moss gave sterling service to Swindon in the Third Division before Consistent performances in junior and reserve teams marked him moving up a division last summer. He was their leading scorer, and out as an exciting prospect, but the full-backs path to the top had to Luton liked his pace and accuracy. His £110,000 transfer was a overcome near-tragedy. On the verge of the league scene in 1974, he major part of David Pleat's re-building operation in the 1978 close broke his leg. He fought his way back to fitness, only to break it for season.

DAVID CARR: Spotted by a Luton scout near his home town of Margate, full-back Carr joined Luton when he left school at 16 in 1973. Can play equally well in the back four or in midfield, but made his major breakthrough last season when he made the left back position his own after Luton sold Steve Buckley to Derby County.

GRAHAM JONES: Recruited from Manchester schools football at 16 in 1975, Jones turned out to be a highly versatile player. He made rapid strides through Luton's lower teams, and seems equally at home in either department. He started as a centre-half, but has made his league debut at 17. He sampled a midfield role in the Second Division, and seems

PASQUALE FUCCILLO: Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford, midfield dynamo Fuccillo — "Lil" to his friends and the Luton fans — supplies a lot of Luton's midfield attacking drive. Signed as a 16-year-old apprentice in the summer of 1973, he broke through into the league side within three years, and his power and regular goals have kept him in the side ever since.

BOB HATTON: One of the most experienced strikers in the game, Luton moved quickly to secure the signature of Hatton in the close season. He had proved that he could score goals in any league in service with Birmingham, Carlisle and Blackpool, and his disappointment at Blackpool's relegation to the Third Division was cancelled out when Luton's £50,000 cheque took him back up to the Second.

ALAN WEST: A brilliant creative player in midfield, West was one of the many young stars to come from Burnley. An England under-23 international, he moved to Luton in October 1973 for £100,000, and is still one of the best long-ball passers in the game today.

GODFREY INGRAM: A product of Luton's schoolboy and youth teams, Ingram became a regular member of Luton's reserve side while he was still only 16. His combination of effortless speed and powerful shooting gave him an England Schools international cap. He became an apprentice in the summer of 1976, a junior professional within 12 months, and a member of Luton's league squad a year later.

DAVID MOSS: Respected throughout the game as a model clubman, Luton splashed out £50,000 to bring him out of the Fourth Division, where he was playing for Newport County, when he was still only 18. He is a former Welsh Youth international skipper.


MARK AIZLEWOOD: David Pleat's confidence in this stylish defence or midfield player was backed dramatically in April 1978. Luton fought off rival overtures from First Division Norwich to secure the services of accomplished defender Turner, who had been a mainstay at Peterborough for nine seasons.

MAL DONAGHY: Glasgow Celtic, Queen's Park Rangers, Sheffield United and Wolves were all reported to be interested in the future of Northern Ireland under-21 international Donaghy in the summer of 1978. But Luton were first off the mark, and secured his transfer from Larne, and manager Pleat rates the centre-half one of the best young players ever to come into the English game.

Luton Town. Manager — DAVID PLEAT: Few managers in football can have been thrust into their jobs more dramatically than Luton's boss David Pleat. As a player he had played on the wing for England Youth and Nottingham Forest, and then had three seasons with Luton. Injuries affected his career as he moved on to Shrewsbury Exeter and Peterborough, but he took FA coaching courses to stay in the game, and tried his hand at management with Nunaton, in the Southern League.

In 1975 Luton Town hired him for the second time in his life, to be coach to the reserve side. And events really moved rapidly a couple of years later. In December 1975 Luton's first team coach Roy McCrohan left to take a job in the USA, and Mr. Pleat moved up into his job. And within two months Luton lost manager Harry Haslam to Sheffield United, and asked Pleat to take charge. At 33 he was one of the youngest managers in the league, but within six months he had shown his intentions of re-building the Luton side.

Last season, after a good start, they slipped to within a point of the relegation zone, and Pleat's answer was to carry out the biggest shake-up of players anyone at Kenilworth Road can remember. His transfer turnover approached £900,000 in eight months, with four players sold and nine new faces introduced.

On the other hand, players like Brady must learn to control themselves.

I am one of those people who take the view that some terrace trouble is the result of what happens on the field.

The continual niggling and nagging by some players definitely gets the fans going.

How many times have you seen a couple of players engage in a running battle throughout a game — and the referee do nothing about it?

Let's toughen up all round. But let's see our top stars setting the example in every way.

COLIN MURPHY holds a particular affection in my football heart and I'm cheering for him to make a success of his job as Lincoln City manager.

Right now Murphy is remembered as the man Derby County booted out for Tommy Docherty.

Colin and I grew up together and I know him as a talented individual who can offer much to the game.

I hope Lincoln give him a proper chance to do it.

TERRY VENABLES is never less than honest and it was refreshing to sit in on the Football Writers' splendid luncheon with the Crystal Palace manager.

When you listen to Venables it's easy to see just why he has turned out to be such an excellent manager who is right on course with his No. 1 ambition — to take Palace into the First Division within five years of succeeding Malcolm Allison at Selhurst Park.

A couple of defeats have provided Palace with the real test they need. I reckon they'll come through it o.k. and end up in the top bracket next May.

Focus on Division III

Charlton's Valley of Enterprise

OUR defeat against Sunderland was a bitter disappointment to all of us, for victory against the Weariders would have put Charlton into third spot in the Division. It's not often Charlton's colours are lowered at The Valley. In fact our analysis covering the period since Andy Nelson took over as manager shows we've lost only sixteen home League matches since August 1974.

Only Crystal Palace, of the other London Clubs, have lost fewer games — twelve in all — during the same period. Palace, however, are only marginally in front of us when averaging out the points per game because we have won a greater proportion of our games.

Excluded from our survey are Wimbledon who were only elected to the Football League at the beginning of last season.

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
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News & Views

Looking Back

WITH COLIN CAMERON

IN ALL we've met Luton on 44 occasions, and it's certainly been goals goals goals all the way since our first meeting 56 years ago.

We've shared 141 to date — 65 to Charlton, 76 to Luton—and that represents an impressive average of three goals per match.

One of the most important matches in Luton's history occurred at The Valley on 20th August 1955. On that day, the Hatters played their first-ever game in Division 1 in front of a crowd of 28,460 — the highest to attend a Charlton v. Luton match.

Luton, managed by "Dally" Duncan who played for Derby against Charlton in the 1946 Cup Final, got off to a great start when their all-time record goal scorer Gordon Turner netted in the 31st minute.

The brilliant Stuart Leary replied for Charlton before the break, and after debut boy Jimmy Gauld had given us a 56th minute lead it was left to MacEwan to secure Luton's first point at the top with a 70th minute equaliser.

FRANK HILL had been Charlton manager only three months and his side, despite a run of six matches without defeat, was bottom of the Second Division when they visited 10th placed Luton on 10th February 1962.

What followed is now Charlton Club history! After Gordon Turner had scored the seventh of his nine career goals against Charlton, we turned on one of our greatest ever performances.

At the interval we had secured a 3-1 lead, and after the break we continued on the rampage to finally record a 6-1 victory — our highest ever away success. Our scorers that day to remember were Dennis Edwards (3), Stuart Leary, Brian Kinsey, and an opponent.

By the time of that Luton match we had, despite our precarious position, developed into a magnificent team. After totting up only nine points from our opening nineteen games, our yield from the next 21 games was 30 points.
