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
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# DAVID PLEAT

## WELCOME

FOR OUR Match today we have the pleasure of welcoming a team which the Hatters have not played since 1974 when they met in the First Division. Due to their relegation, the Hammers are now once again visiting Kenilworth Road and we look forward to what is certain to be an eventful and hard fought game.

The West Ham United Football Club was formed in July 1900, but its roots were established in the East End of London in the last couple of decades of the nineteenth century. There were several well-known local clubs playing in the dock areas at that time and it was the interest in these that led to the formation of a team at the Thames Iron Works in 1895. They played at Hermit Road a moat surrounded the ground and canvas sheets were used for fencing. Their name was changed to Castle Swifts, and later on came a connection with the Iron Works.

The Iron Works disappeared during the depressive period after World War I but there are still a few folk who have continuous connections with the club which their ancestors helped to form some 83 years ago.

The first matches were played at Hermit Road and for a brief period at another pitch off High Street East Ham. Then thanks to the generosity of the owner of the Iron Works – Mr A F Hills – a new arena was constructed which became known as Memorial Ground.

The Iron Works team became a professional club in 1898, and gained admission to the Southern League. The team won the Second Division and gained entrance to an enlarged First Division next season. It held its new status by beating Fulham 5–1 in a 'Test Match'. But the club was out-growing its original strength. The formation of a new Limited Company took place under the name of West Ham United, and the Hammers played their matches at the Memorial Ground for the next four years.

The move to the present Boleyn Ground at Upton Park took place in 1904, and in 1919 they were elected to the 2nd Division. Promotion to Division One was

gained in 1923, and after a nine year spell they were relegated to Division Two. 26 years were to pass before they climbed back to Division One in 1958.

This following period saw the clubs major successes. They won the F.A. Cup in 1964 by beating Preston North End 3–2 and again in 1975 when they beat Fulham 2–0. 1964/65 saw their success in Europe when they won the Cup Winners Cup by a 2–0 victory over TSV Munich.

A remarkable statistic is that during 78 years of existence the Club has only had five managers, all but one previously played for the Hammers. The first was Syd King, a full back of renown. He was succeeded in 1931 by Charlie Paynter who began as a winger in 1900, retired through injury, and then in turn served as reserve team and first team trainer before carrying on to complete 50 years service. Ted Fenton took over in 1950, having previously gained international honours with the club prior to leaving to become manager at Colchester United, he served for eleven years as manager before being succeeded by Ron Greenwood.

The fourth ex-Hammer to become manager is John Lyall whom we shall have the pleasure of meeting today. He certainly has thrown down the gauntlet to the rest of Division Two by his determination to go back to Division One and at the moment they look like succeeding by lying in 4th position with two games in hand.

## MASCOTS

TODAY'S mascot is Jason Gornall who attends Whitehall Junior School at Hitchin. Jason tells us that his main hobby is watching Luton Town and his sports are football and cricket. He has supported the Hatters for four years, has full Luton Town kit, and his favourite player is Paul Price.

## FROM JOHN WILKINSON'S DESK

I AM pleased to report that at last Saturday's match with Sheffield United the police made no arrests during the game or outside the ground afterwards. This is very good

news as far as I am concerned because the last thing I want to do is to put names in the programme of people and banning them from our matches. We don't get that many people in to watch us at the present time and to stop people coming in wouldn't do our gates any good, but should it be necessary then I won't hesitate to print.

Just when we think that the weather has changed for the better, back comes the snow and plays havoc again. It caused us a few problems with the reserve match against Queens Park Rangers last week. I don't think I have ever seen two inches of snow disappear so quickly. It left us with a swimming pool in a matter of two hours, so some rapid telephone calls had to be made to stop people travelling.

I do not know if our supporters realise but we have a 24 hour answering service which they can ring to find out about matches. The telephone number is Luton 33010. One match that has been re-arranged is the Cardiff away fixture. It will now be played on Wednesday April 25th. Kick off 6.45 pm. Enjoy the match.

## POINT OF CONTROVERSY

This is the time of year when one pens an article whilst wondering if and when it will actually be read, such is the danger of match postponements. These bring disappointment and expense in their wake in a variety of ways, not the least in the possible wastage of programmes, which can have cost a four figure fee to produce. If the game is quickly replayed then the programme may still be used, but so elaborate are the productions of most clubs today and so discerning the majority of spectators that if, as is quite likely, a game is not played for several weeks, the material will have dated to such an extent that a complete reprint is virtually essential.

Clubs sometimes compromise by issuing the initial programme, as printed, together with a specially printed supplement or insert in order to bring the material up to date as far as possible, but even this can be quite costly and is not a complete success.

This then is just one of the reasons when

clubs do not want to have games called off if this can be possibly avoided and one often hears complaints that a postponed game might have been played. Certainly other things being equal, games are more readily called off today than they were 20 or more years ago, but there is no doubt that the tendency to postpone games when there is considerable doubt as to conditions has saved many a pointless and expensive journey by the visiting team.

An even more important factor is that of players safety. Although only three league games were played on Boxing Day, the one at Bolton was abandoned at half-time and then Peter Reid, the home sides busy little midfielder had been quite badly injured by a collision aggravated by the hard ground. It seems clear then that, even if there is an argument in favour of playing whenever possible on a heavy pitch (and something of a lottery) there can be no risks taken when the pitch is seriously affected by frost.

It seems also then that in this, as in several other aspects of his work, the referee just can't win. This season has seen some referees under fire for allowing games to be played while others have been pilloried for calling them off. Is it not about time then that less responsibility were vested in just one man, who is, after all, a part-time amateur. Just as arguments about injury time might be eased by having an independent time-keeper as in boxing, so problems over postponement might be reduced by vesting responsibility in specialists on pitches. These might be retired groundsmen or former managers of many years experience. The parallel is not an exact one, but in cricket circles Bert Flack has rendered good service in advising on pitch problems. In soccer a substantial panel of 'experts' would be needed, probably on a zonal basis. At this time of year one man might adjudicate on three or four grounds in his area. This would not settle all the problems, but it might reduce some of them.

However, we are now pleased to announce that he is fully recovered and it was a pleasure to see him back in his usual seat at Kenilworth Road.

They all take turns in commentating and apart from the Luton and Dunstable Hospital, the service goes out to St. Mary's Hospital, Green Hills Recreation Centre for senior citizens, Park Street senior citizens Club and the Mount Nursing Home.

It was started in 1953 and is completely voluntary and self-supporting, being financially aided by kind donations by local organisations.





BRIAN CLOUGH'S decision to quit as England youth team manager will inevitably, I feel, signal the end of his brief flirtation with Lancaster Gate.

Clough has made no secret of his ambition to succeed Ron Greenwood as England's manager when the time comes for Greenwood to step aside.

Greenwood was astute enough to give Clough and his No. 2 Peter Taylor, control of his youth team. But club commitments with Forest prevented Clough and Taylor from making any real contribution.

They've done the decent thing by resigning and I'm sure Greenwood will hold on to public sympathy by declaring his intention to call on the Forest duo for help in the future.

At the same time, I've never gone along with those who see King Clough as England's next boss and nothing has happened to make me alter that opinion.

His image is wrong for the Football Association. He's made too many enemies there — it's as simple as that.

Terry Venables of Crystal Palace is my idea of the next England chief. He's already shared control of the Under-21 side and handled himself with the kind of polite assurance which makes him a good ambassador for the game.

Venables is immensely talented — a good motivator and, above all, an originator. He has impressed Greenwood immensely and that will count for a lot when the change is eventually made.

Strangest goal of the season . . . how about this? PAOK Saloniki took the lead against Ethnikos but celebrations went on far too long and, with five players still in the opponents' half, Ethnikos quickly kicked off and equalised.

## ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

A look back at Luton Town a decade ago.

EVENTS ON the soccer pitch took second place in the headlines ten years ago this week when ten dramatic days saw the shock departure of Allan Brown as manager, and the introduction of a famous football personality, Alec Stock.

At the time it all seemed unbelievable and to this day there are many who thought that Brown, manager at Kenilworth Road for two years, had been given a raw deal.

A lot of the facts did not come out until much later, but first public indications of the storm to come emerged on Friday the 13th December, 1968. Leicester City, who had parted company with Matt Gillies, asked Brown to attend an interview to help them choose a successor. Town directors had agreed to allow Brown to be approached two days previously.

But Leicester decided that the man they wanted was Frank O'Farrell, then Torquay manager, and Brown returned to his duties with Luton Town. On the 14th they lost 0-1 at Hartlepool, and that just about finished their promotion hopes.

Three days later, at a board meeting, the directors decided that Brown would have to go. They asked for, and got, his resignation, although he made it clear that in his view he had been sacked.

John Bain, the director in charge because Chairman Len Hawkins was sick, said: "We are not going to be second best

to any club.

"We could not just sit back and wait for the next club to come along and contact Brown. When he went to Leicester he suggested that his future did not lie with Luton Town."

It later transpired that directors Reg Burr and Tony Hunt had already lined up a new manager before the announcement of Brown's departure.

And within a week of Brown's interview at Leicester the Town appointed Alec Stock, 51, as their new boss. He was in his 23rd season in management, having previously been a player with Charlton and Queen's Park Rangers.

He had left the manager's job at Loftus Road a month previously, and came to Luton with the promise that he would continue the revival that Brown had started, and get them out of the Third Division.

His first game in charge was on December 21, 1968, and the team obliged with a 2-0 home victory against Plymouth, with Brian Lewis and Keith Allen getting the goals.

And the final ironic twist to the tail came a few days later when Torquay, robbed of their manager by the lure of Leicester City, found a successor . . . Allan Brown, the man who lifted Luton from the Fourth Division to the Third and then got the sack for Christmas.


# FOCUS ON

JAKE FINDLAY

LUTON'S new £100,000 goal-keeper was born in Blairgowrie, Perthshire on 13th July 1954. Christened John Williamson Findlay he acquired the name 'Jake' whilst still at school and is now known as John only to his wife Sandra.

He took part in trials for both the Scottish Schools and Youth teams but before he could progress further in this direction he was spotted by a perceptive Tommy Docherty who moved with characteristic swiftness and Jake became an Aston Villa apprentice one month after his 15th birthday. Mr. Docherty's haste was justified as Rangers and a number of English League clubs were showing more than a passing interest in the young keeper.

The highlight of Jake's career as a Youth player at Villa was undoubtedly his membership of the team which won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1972 defeating Liverpool in the final. Other members of that side who have earned distinction in later years include John Gidman and Bobby McDonald, an ever present with Coventry last season. The final produced its bad news as well as its good news however for Jake as an injury sustained during the match prevented him from making his Football League debut v Torquay at the age of seventeen. When one has experi-



enced the magnificent Villa Park set up as we did recently it is difficult to believe that this famous club was in the 3rd Division as recently as six years ago. It was a further two years before the opportunity of a League debut arose since Jim Cumbe had made 42 appearances in the Villa goal in 1972/73 and he followed this up with 41 in 1973/74. The odd one out was the home match with Nottingham Forest on which Jake played and helped the Villa to a 3-1 win.

The following season saw a repetition of the one appearance, this time a 6-0 home win over Hull City and in 1975/76 came Jake's debut in the 1st Division. He took part in five League matches and in none of them were Villa beaten so that his personal unbeaten League run had now

extended to seven. During the past two seasons, a great deal of Villa's success has been due to the consistent goalkeeping of Jimmy Rimmer and Jake's opportunities have been limited to a further seven League games. However, despite his few appearances, Villa had steadfastly refused to release him despite a number of enquiries until a few weeks ago when the old axiom "If you don't succeed at first etc. etc." paid off for David Pleat.

Jake and Sandra have been married for three years and their 'family' consists of a large alsation which answers to the name of "Cally". Jake's other interests include tennis, table tennis and golf. As a true Scot he takes the latter game fairly seriously and has a handicap just outside of single figures. He also enjoys listening to music and says that his ambition is quite simply to be successful. The footballer he admires most is his old colleague Bobby McDonald and on the Goalkeeping front he rates Peter Shilton and Ron Simpson who featured in the winning Newcastle FA Cup teams of the early fifties and then won a European Cup medal with Celtic in 1967. In welcoming Jake to Luton we wish him every success on the field and Sandra and himself every happiness in their new home.


