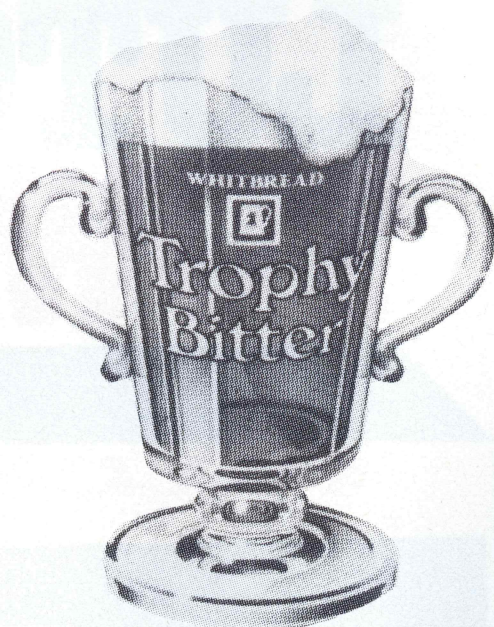

TODAYS opponents Crystal Palace have already proved that they are the favourites for promotion with a dependable defensive record. Successful teams are built on the ability to defend solidly and remain organised under pressure. We hope to stretch Palace today and if we can maintain our attacking approach we are capable of getting through their defence.

Last Saturday was a most frustrating experience. Having been told at 9.45 am that the game was definitely on, we were later to be disappointed. In defence of Leicester City it has to be said that they are comparatively inexperienced in clearing the snow off their pitch!! Their foresight has prevented this situation, but unfortunately, last Saturday their much publicised balloon failed. Certainly the pitch was unplayable and no-body disagreed with the Referee's decision. Hopefully we will play the fixture on Wednesday.

Our youth team deserve far more support than they have been given. These notes were printed before Thursday evening's replay with Man. City. If we have been good enough to win we will be in the semi-finals of the FA Youth Cup for the 1st time ever. It gives me satisfaction to see the efforts of these players who are the clubs future. You only have to look at the success of our visitors today, Crystal Palace, to see the value of a sound youth policy. I shall continue our efforts to improve

the quality of the schoolboys coming into our club. This means that we shall be adjusting our budget for scouting to cover wider areas and hold more trials. I am sure our speculation will be justified in the future.

The youngsters will be competing at Blauw-Wit early in June in an International Youth tournament, regarded as one of the best on the Continent. Several of our 1st team players qualify for inclusion in this competition. I am sure that the experience gained will be valuable and I am even more certain that our performance on and off the field will be a credit to our club.

Next Thursday our players will be out judging a penalty prize competition at 5 local regional sports centres. The finals will be held here on Sat 21st April. It is all part of the "Football & Community" scheme organised by the Sports Council. We now have a splendid floodlit area which opens soon for organised sport, another step forward which will indirectly further our youth policy.

This is all a result of the club providing a suitable scheme to take advantage of a government grant. I am delighted the work has gone smoothly and we are approaching this new facility with enthusiasm.

Enjoy today's game. I hope we get 90 minutes of good entertainment and naturally from our point of view a fair result.



Our good fortune to be able, and fit enough, to play and enjoy the greatest game in the world was underlined last weekend when we learned of the tragic death of our club doctor. Doctor Burrows gave his services to this club for several seasons. He was an expert in his field, a warm personality and the type of man whom we all respected. We shall miss his advice, his humour and his loyalty. The club sends to his widow and family their most sincere sympathies.

## **JOHN BURRIDGE (Goalkeeper)**

Born Workington, signed from Aston Villa on 9.3.78 for £50,000. John took over the 1st team spot from Tony Burns and completed 10 appearances by the end of last season.

## **DAVID FRY (Goalkeeper)**

Born Bournemouth, signed for Palace 24.1.77 and made his first team debut against Blackburn last season. He shows great promise and holds two F.A. Youth Cup final medals.

## **PAUL HINSHELWOOD (Defender)**

Born Bristol, joined Palace as a junior and signed full-time 14.8.73. Played in the first team as a striker and converted to Midfield and finally full-back. An England Under 21 International Paul made 47 first team appearances last season.

## **IAN EVANS (Defender)**

Surrey Born, Club Captain, Welsh International. Suffered serious leg injury against Fulham last season which he is still recovering from.

## **JIM CANNON (Defender)**

Born Glasgow, former Scottish Youth International. Took over from Ian Evans as last season's Team Captain. Voted Club Player of the Year 77/78 and made 44 appearances.

## **BILLY GILBERT (Defender)**

London born, formerly England schoolboy Captain and member of last season's England Youth side. Winner of two F.A. Youth Cup medals and made his first team debut against Blackpool October 1977. Went on to maintain a regular first team place alongside Jim Cannon in the centre of the defence completing 19 appearances.

## **PETER NICHOLAS (Defender/Midfield)**

Newport born, Welsh Youth International and member of both Palace Youth Cup winning teams. Peter made 24 first team appearances last season mainly from midfield but also at right back and in his normal position as central defender.

## **KEVIN DARE (Defender)**

London born, member of last season's F.A. Youth Cup winning team. Yet to make his first team debut.

## **GEORGE GRAHAM (Midfield)**

Former Scottish International star with Chelsea, Arsenal and Manchester Utd. Joined us from Portsmouth

8.11.76. George made 24 first team appearances last season and played for California Surfs during the summer.

## **PHIL HOLDER (Midfield)**

London born, former Spurs player joined Palace in February 1975 and last season made 15 first team appearances. Phil played for MEMPHIS ROGUES in the summer.

## **NICK CHATTERTON (Midfield)**

Born London, joined Palace from school, he had held a regular first team spot over the last four seasons.

## **TERRY FENWICK (Midfield)**

Born Co. Durham. England Youth International scored the winning goal in 2 successive F.A. Youth Cup finals. Terry made his first team debut last season against Spurs and completed 10 appearances by the end of the season.

## **VINCE HILAIRE (Forward)**

London born England Youth International and holder of 2 F.A. Youth Cup final medals. He made his first team debut in season 1976/7 and appeared 28 times in the first team last season.

## **JERRY MURPHY (Midfield)**

London born Eire Youth International and member of both Palace Youth Cup winning teams, made his first team debut last season.

## **BARRY SILKMAN (Forward)**

London born, joined Palace in August 1976 from Hereford Utd and made 24 first team appearances last season.

## **DAVE SWINDLEHURST (Striker)**

London born. England International at Youth and under 21 level. Dave made 42 appearances last season, some from midfield scoring 12 goals.

## **IAN WALSH (Striker)**

Welsh born joined Palace from school. Former Welsh Youth International. Made his first team debut during 1976/7 and last season made 13 appearances scoring 2 goals.

## **MIKE ELWISS (Striker)**

Joined Palace from Preston North End during the close season for a Club record fee of £200,000. Mike, 24 originates from Doncaster playing for the Rovers before his transfer to Preston under Bobby Charlton's management.



## WELCOME

THE YOUNG Palace side have this season won many friends up and down the country with their attractive style of play as they have established themselves as strong challengers for a return to Division One. In fact in recent seasons they have looked rather more like a first division outfit than they did during their previous spell there when after four years of uphill struggle they were relegated twice in successive seasons to land back in Division Three in 1974.

It seemed then that perhaps Palace were a Third Division team after all for after joining the old Division Three (South) on its inception in 1920 they spent all but four seasons there until the reorganisation in 1958. During this time they had to apply for re-election on three occasions and when they ended up in Division Four in 1958 it seemed that life was to continue to be a struggle for them. In fact this proved to be a launching pad, for they won promotion in 1961 and three years later went up again to Division Two.

They continued to progress throughout the sixties and in 1969 they climbed into Division One for the first time ever. In four seasons, however, the highest position they could manage was eighteenth and despite the appointment of Malcolm Allison as Manager they were back in Division Three again by 1974. They did, however, turn the corner again under Allison and in 1975/6 they captured the imagination of the football world by beating both Leeds and Sunderland on their home grounds to reach the F.A. Cup Semi-final. It seemed that a Third Division club might be in an F.A. Cup Final for the first time ever, but Southampton ended these dreams.

With the departure of Malcolm Allison, his right hand man, Terry Venables took over and by last season Palace had climbed back to Division Two where they ended up in ninth position after a useful season of consolidation.

With their basically young side steadily maturing they have not really looked back this season after starting with a draw at

opening home game. It was not until the end of October that they lost their first league game (a surprise home defeat by Fulham) and by this time they had given a good account of themselves in the League Cup by winning at First Division Bristol City and taking Aston Villa to two replays. They have also put Bristol City and Middlesbrough out of the F.A. Cup before going out to Wolves and another remarkable aspect of their record this season is that they have lost only one away game (at Burnley) in the League. As recently as last week they showed their class by winning 2-1 against promotion rivals Sunderland at Roker Park.

England Under-21 international David Swindlehurst is currently again leading scorer this season and he has had good support from another home-grown product Ian Walsh, who established himself in the first team late last season. Close-season 6-figure signing Mike Elwiss from Preston is also likely to be in the front line today.

In midfield Eire Youth International Jerry Murphy and England Youth cap Terry Fenwick, both members of the Palace side that has won the Youth Cup in each of the last two seasons, are joined by Steve Kember now back with his first league club after spells at Leicester and Chelsea. Steve has now played well over 500 league games.

The back four are also one-club men with Jim Cannon after 200 games now captaining the side and being joined at the centre of the defence by Bill Gilbert with highly rated Ken Sanson and versatile Paul Hinshelwood, son of former Chelsea player Wally Hinshelwood, on the flanks. In goal John Burridge, signed from Aston Villa a year ago, has recaptured the form that brought him to the fore with Blackpool after making his league debut with Workington.

## FROM JOHN WILKINSON'S DESK

JUST AS I was giving myself a pat on the back for rearranging all the back log of fixtures, the weather turned on us again to give me another two games to fix up. The snow caused an early postponement of the Leicester reserve match and on the Saturday morning an early call from Leicester City saying that the pitch would be playable sent the first team and officials on their way. Whilst having lunch in a Coventry Hotel the manager was telephoned and asked to get Filbert St. as quickly as possible. He telephoned me about thirty five minutes later saying that the pitch at one end was a sea of mud and if the match had taken place it would have been a lottery. Some of the players went along to watch the Coventry City v Bolton match and the rest of us made our way home. I know that some of our supporters will be annoyed about making the journey for nothing but I can assure you that the City did everthing possible to get the game on.

I have just learned of the sudden death of our club doctor, Peter Burrows. To say the news is shattering is putting it mildly. When I took the call from Dr. Weir early this evening (Sunday) my knees went to jelly, as did the people I had to telephone after with the news. As far as I know Dr. Burrows had been with Luton Town nearly 14 years and the England doctor for the past four. His death will leave a large gap, not only with us and England but also in his partnership at his surgery in Dunstable Rd. The news of his death has not yet sunk in which is the reason why I have not written much about him at this time, but to his wife and family we send our deepest sympathy.

Our youth team did the club proud last week when they held the youth side of Manchester City to a 1-1 draw at Maine Rd. It was a great experience for the lads to play at a stadium like that and the effort that went into their play was a credit to all of them. By this time, weather permitting, we should know if we have beaten them in the replay and enter the semi-finals for the first time in the club's history.

With the pitch being in such a heavy state, it has caused the cancellation of the under 18 final of the Chiltern Youth League due to be played at Kenilworth Rd. last Monday. It is possible that it will now take place on April 25th. K.O. 7-30 p.m.

Today we welcome Crystal Palace, who at this present time are well in the running for promotion. Although we wish them well in their attempt to reach the 1st. Division we will do our best to keep the points here today.

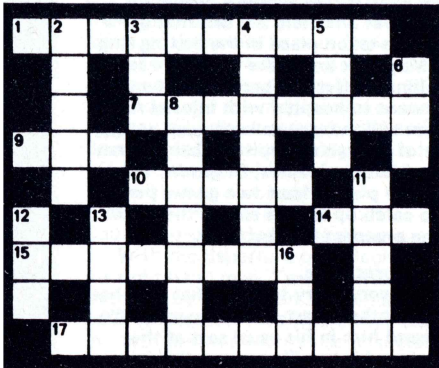

THE FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION/  
COCA COLA SUPER SKILLS AWARD

ON THE 30th November 1978, the Football Association, in conjunction with the English Schools Football Association and the Coca Cola Company, announced the birth of the Super Skills Award Scheme at a Press Launch at the Bisham Abbey National Sports Centre.

An audience, which included some of the greatest names in English Football — Sir Stanley Rous, Sir Walter Winterbottom, Ron Greenwood, Bobby Charlton and Geoff Hurst heard how the Scheme will work, and then saw a demonstration by Reading school children of the different skills in the Award Scheme.

The objective of the Scheme is to equip youngsters from the age of 7 to 16 years with the high quality of individual techniques which they can be encouraged to apply under real playing conditions. The skill's test were devised by The Football Association's Director of Coaching, Allen Wade. These are tests of touch, heading, passing, controlling and trapping, dribbling, kicking and accuracy of shooting.

There are different awards for different levels of attainment progressing as follows:—

1. Blue Award	3. Black Award
2. Red Award	4. Silver Award
5. Gold Award.	

These enable young people to develop more sophisticated skills by moving from one level of achievement to the next, from Blue Award to Red and so on. To win a Gold Award a participant first has to hold two of the other Awards.

When passing one level the recipient will receive a certificate and a lapel badge costing 40p (inc. of p. and p.). Also available is a cloth badge, which is optional, and costs 25p (inc. of p. and p.).

To find out more about the Skills Award Scheme ask your sports teacher or your youth or scout leader to introduce you to the Scheme. England Manager, Ron Greenwood, is right behind the scheme. He says: 'We have all seen during the World Cup the importance of individual technique. It can produce not only successful football, but entertaining football and this is the message I am driving home at International level. What better place to start getting this message over than at schools and boy's clubs'.

The Super Skills Awards will be earned by meeting the standard scores set out in the Super Skills Manual. This manual contains 35 different tests, 5 different levels of attainment for each of the 7 Super Skills. There is no reason, however, why teachers, etc., should not increase or decrease these standards to set more precise targets for individual children.

The administration of the Scheme is being run by Mrs. Joan Pritchard, who joined the Football Association as a Secretary in the Coaching Department in 1962.

A look back at Luton Town a decade ago.

FAMOUS faces in the directors' box at Kenilworth Road were nearly as interesting as the match when the Town entertained Bristol Rovers ten years ago this week, on Wednesday March 19.

For supporters the major interest was in the long-awaited return of Bruce Rioch after a cartilage operation, and 14.506 of us turned up to see him have a quiet but effective comeback.

Also watching, with cheque books at the ready, we presumed, was a clutch of visitors including Hull boss Cliff Britton, Spurs manager Bill Nicholson, Chelsea assistant manager Ron Suart and un-named representatives of Wolves and Leicester. Perhaps some of them had interests other than Rioch — the Bristol Rovers team included a raw young centre-half who was beginning to attract attention, name of Larry Lloyd.

He didn't have an easy ride as the Town swept easily to victory, winning 3-0 with goals by Laurie Sheffield, Brian Lewis and Keith Allen.

The previous Saturday the shadow of another famous name was only just beginning to clear from Rotherham, where the Town pinched a 2-2 draw. The home club was struggling to get out of debt after manager Tommy Docherty had tried to keep them in the Second Division the previous season. He failed, then moved on to take charge of Aston Villa. Goals by Graham French and Lewis gave the Town the point which kept them in with a faint chance of promotion — third in Division three, but seven points behind pace-makers Watford and Swindon.

And ten years ago this weekend, the home record which had been so important in the promotion push almost went for a Burton. Unbeaten for nearly 12 months at Kenilworth Road, the Town produced an unimpressive display against Gillingham, who came to defend grimly and attack on the break. They snatched the lead through Brian Yeo a minute before half time and 14,562 customers feared that the proud run was all over until Sheffield popped up with the equaliser eight minutes from time.

Our other game in the week was a Midland League fixture v Coventry. Played on a snow covered pitch with an

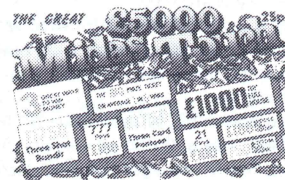

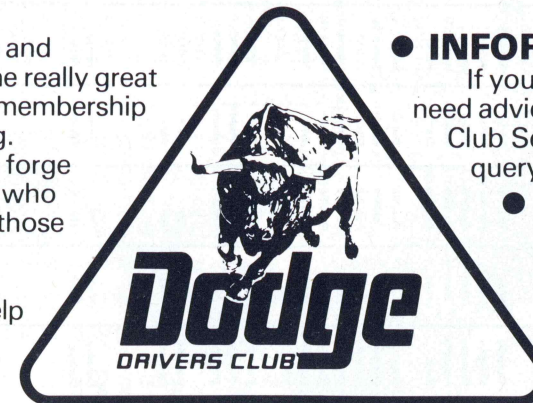

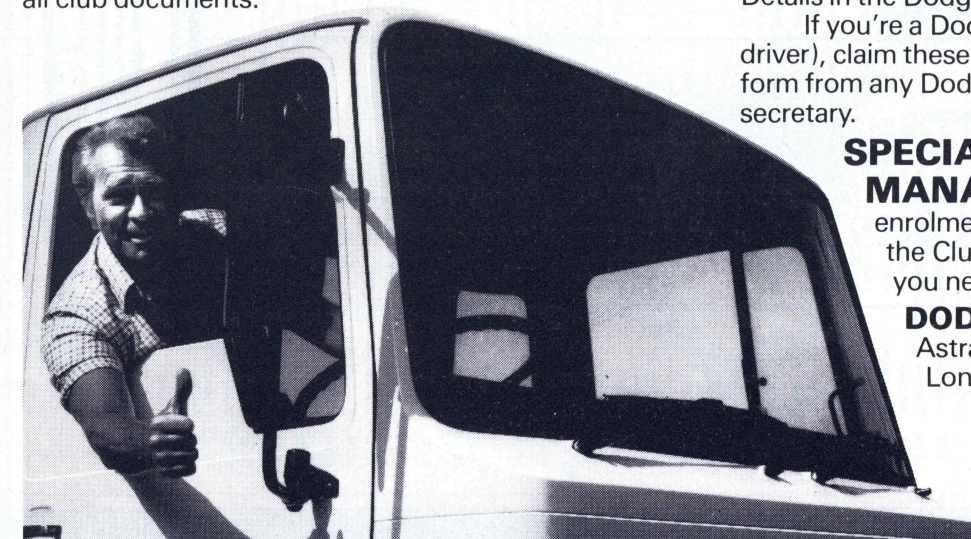
