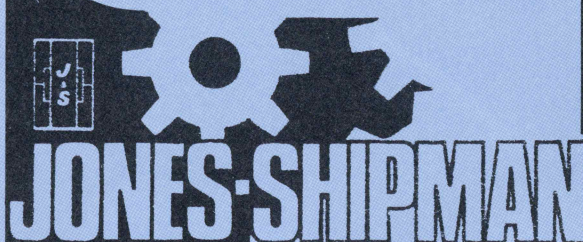

I made it clear before our trip to Bristol last Saturday that it was a game we could not afford to lose and so in view of the result I was quite pleased with the way things went.

I was especially happy with the effort and determination we showed, especially in attack. It's not an easy job to create chances but our front-runners worked hard at their task.

Having said that one of the best performances on our side was produced by Larry May, who had a splendid game in the heart of defence.

The way he has developed has been one of the most pleasing things for me this season, and you must remember that he returned from playing football in America during the summer with a serious ligament injury.

I'm sure that in time, if he makes the same progress as he has been doing in the past few months, Larry could make it at the highest level in the game.

Even now I place him higher than anybody else in his position in the Second Division, and he's still got a long way to go and a lot to learn.

Gaining that point at Bristol gave us all a bit of a tonic after the three defeats we had suffered on the trot and we were pretty confident of achieving another result at Millwall last Tuesday night.

As it happened the game was called off but not before we

had set off and, like many of the City fans who had travelled down for the game, we did not find out about the postponement until we arrived in London.

I felt sorry for the people who had taken time off work to make the trip and I was surprised and annoyed that Millwall did not give us some indication that the match was in doubt, especially as it appeared to have been raining for most of the day in that area.

That game being called off just means that we will have to continue our improvement against Luton this afternoon. A victory would see us return to our winning ways at home and also complete a "double" over Luton whom we beat at Kenilworth Road earlier in the season.

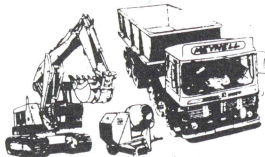

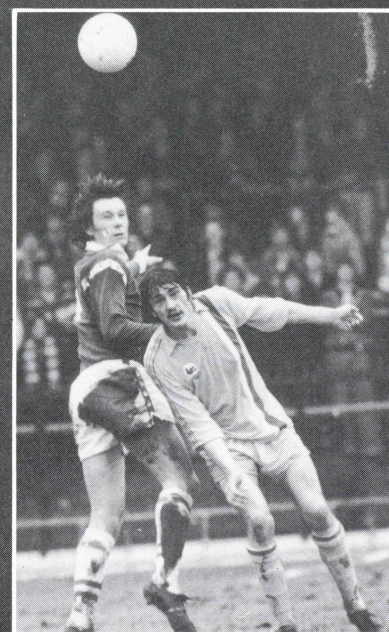

CITY SECRETARY

For the first time football is feeling the effects of this country's involvement in the European Economic Community with relation to the freedom of movement of labour.

One of the fundamental principles agreed upon by the EEC partners is that there should be a non-restrictive and fluid movement of labour, between one country and another.

In most people's eyes outside the game a professional footballer has the same rights as a goldsmith, a miner or a computer programmer, and of course this is a reasonable argument if one ignores what I have previously called the historical financial interest in a footballer's registration. If one could pool and redistribute all the profits and losses from the transfers which have taken place in the past five years and all start again from scratch then freedom of movement would work.

But while the financial security of clubs is wrapped up in this value then it would be like pulling the mat from under their feet. The EEC now seems to have accepted this principle in that an agreement has been reached between the National Football Association involved in the Community and the EEC lawyers, which provides for compensation to be paid if a player leaves one country for another when his contract expires.

In a nutshell, if a player with say Arsenal joins the German club Hamburg for example then the English club will receive a fee based on his last year's earnings at Highbury times a multiplying factor based on his age.

The EEC has seen fit to impose a maximum transfer fee of two million Swiss francs, which is approximately £600,000. One weakness in this system as far as British clubs are concerned is that the level of earnings in Europe are much higher than in Britain, which means one of our clubs will pay more compensation for the same standard of player than their European counterparts.

This limitation on the fee will also eventually have an effect on the size of the transfer fees currently being paid in this country. For example if a club has just paid £500,000 for a 25 year old player and he signs a three year contract when that expires the club would receive his final year's earnings of £30,000 multiplied by six, which is the laid down factor.

That means more than £300,000 will have been written off in just three years, which means that clubs will think again before paying huge transfer fees.

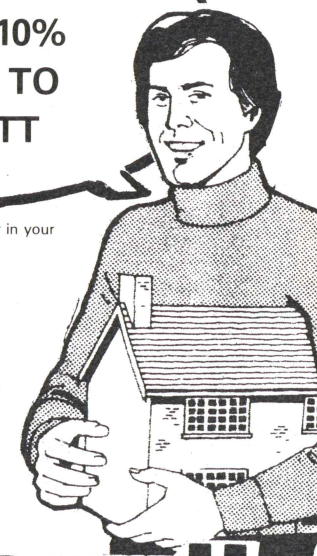

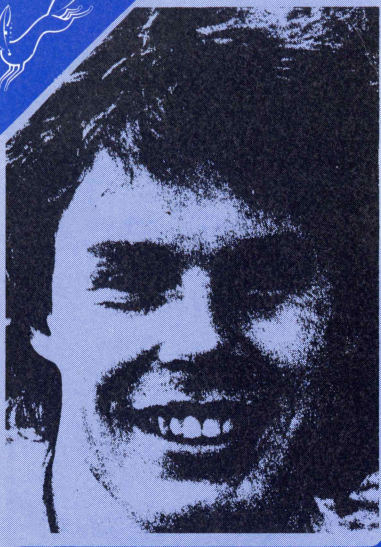

ALAN LEE



Alan Lee's short taste of soccer in America has made him vow never to play out there again. "It was a nightmare," says the 18-year-old winger who spent last summer with Philadelphia Fury.

"All they seemed interested in was making money. There was no real interest in the players' feelings. Admittedly they gave us a car and a luxury flat and paid well but if you had an off day or something was bothering you they didn't want to know."

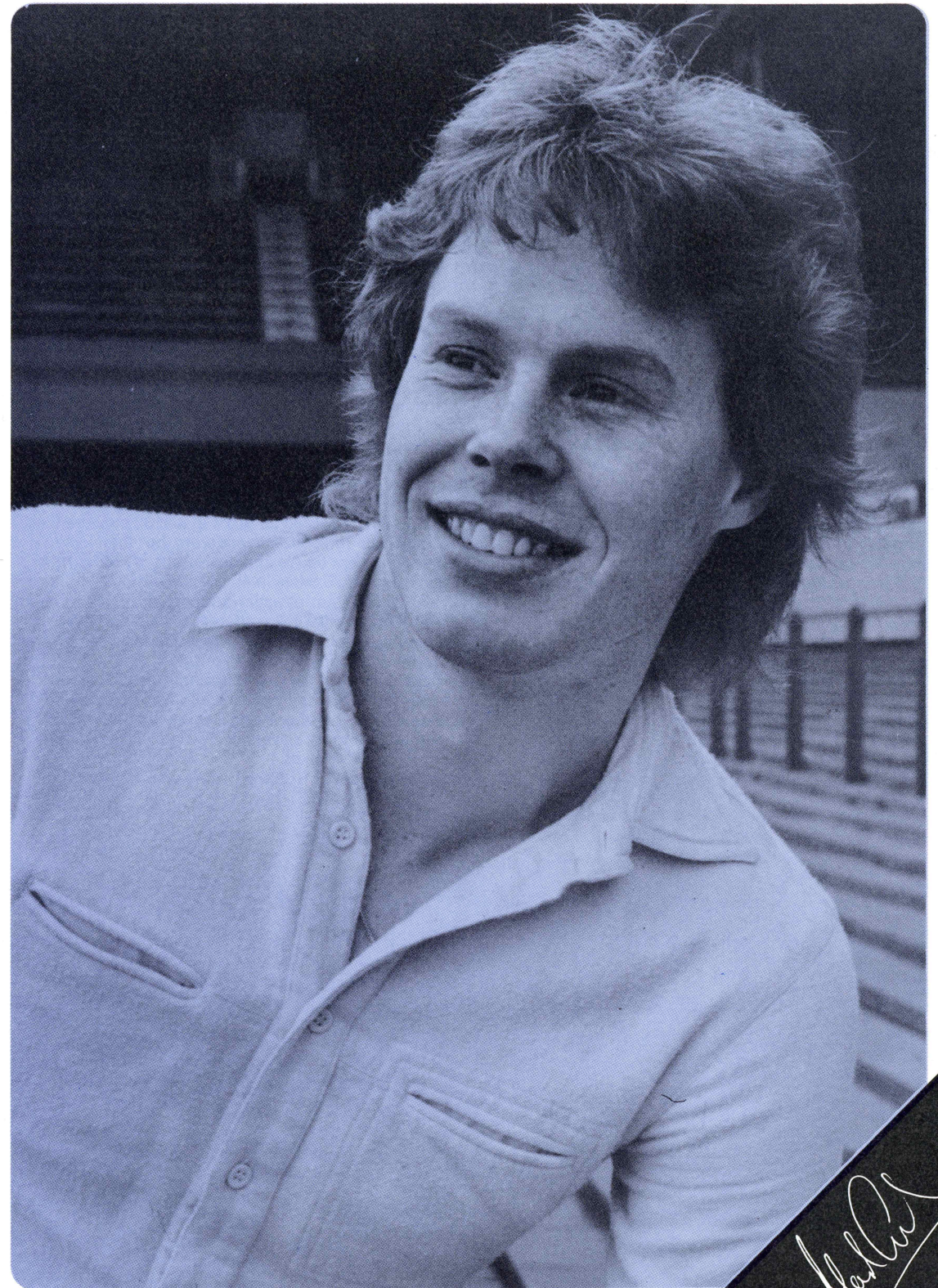
So when Jock Wallace moved in to bring him to City it took Alan "about five minutes" to make up his mind to move. He explains: "Through all the time I was at Philadelphia I was hoping that someone would show an interest in me and I was delighted when Mr. Wallace came along."

The sandy-haired youngster had been under the City's manager's wing at Rangers, the club he signed schoolboy forms with at 14. Born in Wegberg, West Germany where his father was stationed with the RAF, Alan's family moved back to Scotland shortly afterwards to live in East Kilbride near Glasgow.

"I suppose it was still every schoolboy's dream to play for either Celtic or Rangers and I was no exception. It's quite a moment when you sign for them. I had some good times with the club and travelled to Europe to play with the youth side and I was amazed then that Mr. Wallace managed to find the time to be bothered about each one of us."

Alan — who has a flat in Leicester — was helped to settle with City not only because he had played under the manager before but because another colleague from his Rangers days — Martin Henderson — is also at Filbert Street. Martin and Alan had joined Philadelphia at almost the same time too.

He has also found it easy to get on with other players. A keen snooker and table tennis player he finds time for girlfriends. But Alan has a word or two of criticism for local girls. "They haven't got much sense of humour," he says "And I like girls who smile and enjoy a joke."

LUTON TOWN



David Pleat, one of the youngest managers in the game, embarked on an ambitious re-building plan when he became Luton Town's manager just over a year ago. Succeeding Harry Haslam in December 1977, he has a interesting career history. He played for Luton after winning England Youth honours with Nottingham Forest. But after three seasons at Kenilworth Road, he was forced to retire because of injury. It brought a premature end to a very promising future. But David was determined not to give in. He turned to coaching and managed Nuneaton in the Southern League before being appointed as Luton reserve coach in 1975. At 33 he was given the manager's job after Haslam decided to join Sheffield United. Last term, Luton finished in 13th place and Pleat went into the transfer market during the summer. Major signings were Bob Hatton from Blackpool, Chris Turner from Peterborough, Mark Aizlewood from Newport, together with Kirk Stephens, who came from Nuneaton and Mal Donaghy from Irish club Larne. Pleat admits that Luton are concerned only with buying players who are capable of doing a job for the side in the top flight. But, after thrashing Oldham 6-1 on the opening day of the season, Luton have failed to consistently sparkle. He surprised a number of people by selling goalkeeper Milija Aleksic to Spurs for £100,000 late last year. But he quickly snapped up Jake Findlay from Aston Villa. David Lawson also came from Everton, so the competition for the number '1' jersey has been extremely tough. At the present time, Findlay has been Luton's regular keeper. He costs £110,000 and is expected to develop into a very fine prospect. Findlay, 24, arrived at Aston Villa nine years ago as a 15 year old apprentice and finally turned professional in 1972. But his first team appearances with Villa were

strictly limited and he was getting disillusioned with reserve football. After talking to Villa boss Ron Saunders, who informed him that Luton had made enquiries, Findlay became a Luton player in only a matter of hours. Now Findlay has two main ambitions. He wants to get into the First Division with Luton and also play for Scotland. He confesses that the set up at Luton is different from Villa Park. But Findlay is already beginning to settle and he has impressed Pleat with his good handling. Pleat also paid out £50,000 for Bob Hatton who scored 22 goals last term for Blackpool. Hatton must be one of the best known strikers in the Football League. He began his career at Wolves and has continued to be a consistent scorer at Bolton, Northampton, Carlisle, Birmingham and Blackpool. Brian Stein is Hatton's partner up front. He made his debut fourteen months ago and is rated highly in the list of Second Division strikers. Another recent Pleat signing was Steve Taylor, who came from Oldham in January for £60,000. Aged 23, Taylor scored 20 goals in just 32 appearances two years ago for Bolton Wanderers, but then joined Oldham and kept up his impressive tally by hitting the back of the net 25 times in 45 League outings. Taylor has been out of action for part of the season with a thigh strain and he felt a change of club and new surroundings would help his career. He feels certain that at Luton his scoring touch will return. He made his debut for Luton against Bristol Rovers. Although he didn't get onto the scoresheet himself, Town still won 3-2 after being 2-0 down at half time. Now there are three players, Hatton, Stein and Taylor fighting for two places. David Moss cost £110,000 when he was signed from

Swindon Town and he is rated by Pleat as one of the most talented wingers in the country. Pleat says he cannot name six players who are better in his position. But Moss has been out of the team in recent weeks because of a back injury. Ricky Hill was discovered by Pleat when he was in charge of the reserve team. He quickly spotted his talent and after a trial Hill became a Town player. Hill, a former England Youth international, made his debut at the age of 17 in the last but one game of the 1975-76 season, and marked his first appearance for the side with a goal in a 2-1 win. He prefers to play on the right side of midfield, but he is capable of switching like skipper Alan West. West has been with the club for six years and is now approaching 200 League games. Pasquale Fuccillo, an extremely skilful player, has been out of the side for two months with a broken leg he received last December in a game against Brighton. Luton's back four is built around centre half Chris Turner, who was signed for £95,000 from Peterborough United. Mark Aizlewood came from Newport County almost a year ago and Paul Price, who has twice recovered from a broken leg, has spent seven years with the club.

Young defender Mark Ratcliffe, who has just signed professional forms with City, could not have found himself a better tutor than reserve team coach Eddie May.

Like Mark, Eddie's position during his playing days was at centre half, and the 550 or so appearances he made for Southend, Wrexham and Swansea, make him more qualified than most to offer advice.

Eddie says: "It's nice to be able to pass on the tips that I learned during my career and like most of the youngsters at the club Mark is prepared to listen."

"He's progressed tremendously since the start of the season when he was switched from full back to his present position and he is now starting to look quite a useful prospect."

"He reads the game well for a lad of his age, he's composed and is developing good distribution. More importantly for a centre half he has picked up a little bit more pace."

Mark has already shown this season that he is capable of coping with opponents who have League experience.

Eddie points out: "When we played Ipswich reserves earlier in the season they had Trevor Whymark and David Geddis and the pair of them hardly got

a look in. Mark did a grand job on Geddis while John O'Neill marked Whymark out of the game too."



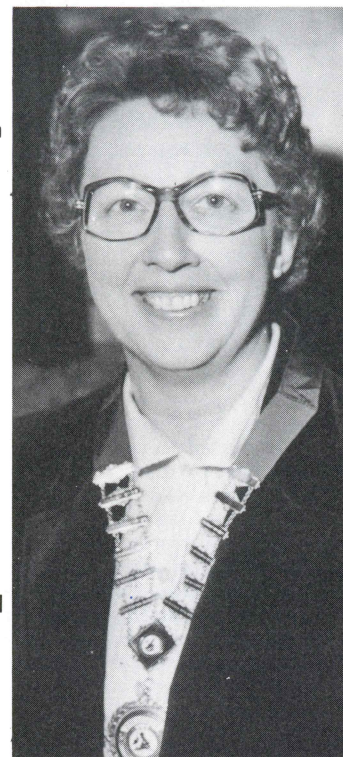
FIRST WOMAN PRESIDENT TAKES OVER

JACKIE'S MISS FIX-IT

JACKIE SYKES

When Leicester City's first team squad are forced to take overnight accommodation for an away match it takes more than a quick telephone call to make a block booking at a hotel near the ground.

In fact, few City fans must realise the involved planning which goes into making the arrangements for putting up a party of footballers, management and the travelling directors.

Team travelling and hotel expenses cost the club many thousand pounds a year, so with that amount of money involved, the planning behind the team's away trips is understandably a highly responsible job.

And the person at Filbert Street whose task it is to guarantee that these trips go through without any

hitch at all is Jackie Sykes, the personal assistant to manager Jock Wallace and secretary John Smith.

Jackie told us: "We have to start planning an away trip a good three weeks in advance of the fixture, and even before that if it is a holiday game."

"But the job is made easier by the fact that over the years we have built up a good relationship with hotels all over the country." At the start of each season City are flooded with brochures from hotels in the towns and cities the side have to visit and Jackie said: "The hotel managers seem to regard having a football club party staying overnight as being of some prestige value."

Obviously City look for value for money when they choose a particular hotel but many other factors are

taken into consideration. Jackie explained: "The players bedrooms must be quiet and not above a room where a function will be held into the early hours."

"They also like to have a television at their disposal and if there is a games room all well and good."

Another important factor which has to be dealt with is the players' meals.

For example on the recent away trip to Brighton dinner had to be laid on for the team for when they arrived in the early evening. Then a light lunch was planned for late morning the following day with a packed meal arranged to eat on the coach during the trip back to Leicester.

Timing on these trips is also vitally important. Players become frustrated if they are left waiting around and conversely the club could face heavy fines if they were to turn up late for a match because of a delay at the hotel for one reason or another.

Jackie is also responsible for working out the team's travel timetable. Details of the times journeys take are kept in a file at the office and allowances have to be made for unforeseeable hold ups.

Jackie said: "In all it is quite a complicated job but one that gives a great deal of satisfaction when everything has run smoothly and there have been no complaints from the manager or players."

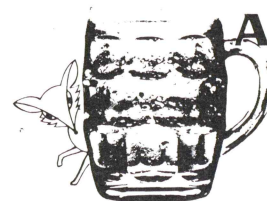

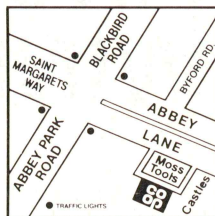

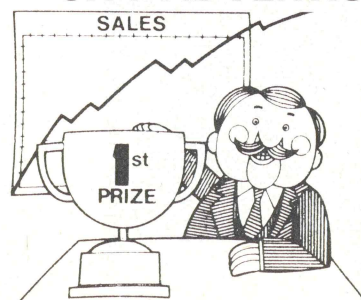

Updated programme news . . .

Once again we faced a situation for tonight's match where a major part of the programme had been printed before the postponement of the game between City and Luton just over a week ago.

The majority of the facts and other content of the original issue is still very much up to date but even so we have again decided to include a four page insert.

The supplement gives supporters the latest statistical information, together with news of our brand new lottery ticket and a look at the way the Second Division is shaping up as the season draws to a close.

When we issued a similar insert in the programme for the game at home to Fulham last week we were pleased that our fans understood the difficult position we were in and we trust you feel the same way tonight.

Remember Blackpool . . .

As the season enters its final quarter, it is a time for nerve tingling tension for teams at every level in the Second Division, whether they are bidding for promotion or struggling hard to beat the drop.

Even the middle of the table clubs, like tonight's teams, cannot consider themselves guaranteed a safe position and the club they have to thank for this lack of complacency is—Blackpool.

No-one outside the current top six teams can erase the memory of that shock demise the Seaside suffered last season. At Christmas, they were outside bets for promotion—at the finish they were relegated.

This has served as a warning to every Second Division club, who all started the season full of hope for a chance of promotion. Their enthusiasm is offset by a nagging apprehension that someone is going to "do a Blackpool" this season as well.

But most attention naturally enough is drawn to the top of the table where the race for promotion is beginning to enter the "crunch" phase and Leicester City's remaining matches will be doubly significant.

Stoke, Sunderland and Crystal Palace, all grouped just behind leaders Brighton, have still to come to Filbert Street, where City will be trying to make sure of their own consolidation in mid-table, if not higher.

Having swapped victories with Brighton, City are finished with the Sussex side but, of course, have a really tough trip next Saturday to face West Ham and it is becoming clear that the three lucky teams to go up

are going to come from those five.

Once again the old question of "games in hand or points in hand" is raised. Recent history suggests that pushing out in front like Brighton and having the rest chasing is the best bet for success.

But Brighton's mathematics are the same as everyone else's and they know that if their rivals win their games in hand while keeping pace with Brighton's own results then Alan Mullery's men will miss out to Stoke, Palace and the Hammers.

At the other end of the table, only Oldham and Cardiff seem to have cashed in on their games in hand, pulling themselves clear of the bottom three for the time being, but down here, as opposed to the top section, games in hand can be looked on as much less of an advantage.

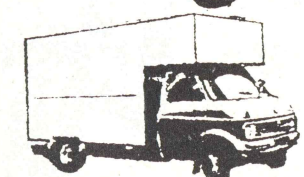
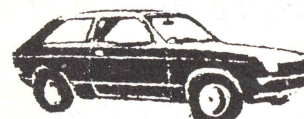
As Wrexham are currently finding out after having their season decimated by winter weather, games in hand are no use if you don't win them. They have only played 27 games so far and at one stage not so long ago were in with a chance of promotion.

Now they are languishing sixth from the bottom having slipped up recently, so they can be far from confident of turning the situation to their advantage.

So the Second Division scene is split three ways. The big guns are looking up, the basement boys are hanging on grimly and, for the rest, the message is ringing loud and clear as the managers purge complacency from their dressing rooms—"Remember Blackpool".
