

## IAN BRENNAN

Ian joined the Turf Moor staff from junior football in Derbyshire. He started his professional career as a forward, but switched to left-back in the reserve team and gradually worked his way into the senior side. He made his League debut for Burnley v Stoke City in May 1974. He fractured his right leg in a road accident in September, 1975, but made a full recovery to win back his first team place. He played in 40 League games last season.

## PAUL FLETCHER

Paul was signed from neighbours Bolton Wanderers, his home town club, for a substantial fee in 1971. A great battler for Burnley, he has been unlucky with injuries in the last couple of seasons. A hard working centre-forward who can be very good in the air.

## BILLY INGHAM

Billy comes from Stakeford, Northumberland, and joined the Claretts from junior football. A fine club man, he can play in virtually any position, including striker or full-back but most of his League games have been in midfield. Tagged "the ginger Pele" by his team mates, he played 32 League games last season.

## LEIGHTON JAMES

Leighton commenced his footballing career with Burnley and quickly rose through the junior sides to establish a place in the first team squad. He is a very skilful ball player and has a tremendous shot. Leighton has 37 Welsh International Caps to his credit. He was transferred to Derby County and later joined Queen's Park Rangers, but in September of this year he returned North to team-up with the Claretts once again.

## TONY MORLEY

England Under 23 international winger Tony is a Lancashire lad from Ormskirk. He was an expensive signing when Burnley bought him from nearby Preston North End. He made his League debut for Burnley in February 1976 against Ipswich.

## PETER NOBLE

Sunderland born Peter, who was formerly with Newcastle United and Swindon Town, was appointed club captain in 1976, and was undoubtedly the inspiration behind the escape from relegation. Peter made his name with Swindon, playing for them in the 1969 League Cup final in which they defeated Arsenal at Wembley. Burnley signed him in 1973 at a real bargain fee and he has repaid it many times over with some sterling displays in defence, midfield and attack as well. A lightweight in build, but strong, big-hearted player who always competes well and likes to push forward from midfield, the role to which he is certainly best suited.

## BILLY RODAWAY

Powerfully-built Billy is a native of Liverpool, and was an outstanding player at schoolboy level for his city team, and for Lancashire and also England. He signed for Burnley in September 1971. He has played in midfield, but his best position is at the heart of the defence, where he was often outstanding last season. He was certainly one of the players who made the biggest contribution to Burnley's improvement in the second half of the 1977-78 campaign and he will be a key player again this season.

## PETER ROBINSON

Another tall and powerful youngster, teenager Peter was spotted by Turf Moor scouts in junior football in the north-east of England. There is football in the family and his uncle was a professional with Hull City. Peter signed professional for Burnley just before the start of the 1976-77 season and his skill, determination and application rapidly got him to first team status. He made his League debut at Bolton on the 9th November, 1976, playing in midfield, but most of his senior appearances so far have been alongside Billy Rodaway at the centre of the back four. He has the ability to make a name for himself.

## MALCOLM SMITH

Malcolm comes from Stockton and began his professional career with Middlesbrough, for whom he made more than 50 League appearances as a central striker. He couldn't quite clinch a regular first team place at Ayresome Park, and had spells on loan with Blackpool and Bury before joining Burnley. His hobbies include Motoring, Reading, Golf and Squash.

## ALAN STEVENSON

Alan comes from Staveley and proved himself a talented goalkeeper with Chesterfield before a big-money transfer to Burnley in January 1972. An England Under-23 international, he has had many outstanding matches for the Claretts and he can make brilliant reflex saves. He is a top-class goalkeeper in every respect. In fact, he enhanced his reputation with great consistency last season. Table tennis helps keep him on his toes and he is good at that game too, having played many times for his native county of Derbyshire. He had 42 League appearances last Season.

## DEREK SCOTT

Derek comes from Gateshead and is a former England Schools international. A very strong young player, he has made most of his League appearances at right-back but he can also play in midfield. Derek signed for Burnley on the 9th February 1975 and made his first team debut when the Claretts were in the First Division and he has quite a lot of experience behind him now. His first team debut was against Manchester City at Maine Road.

## JIMMY THOMSON

Jimmy is a native of Glasgow and he was a Chelsea player under Tommy Docherty for a couple of seasons after being spotted in Scottish junior football. He made 40 First Division appearances for Chelsea including one at Turf Moor against Burnley in which he scored a goal. Soon afterwards he was transferred to the Claretts for a large fee. He has made about 230 senior appearances for Burnley, almost all of them at the middle of defence, although he has also played at full-back on a few occasions. Jim is the longest serving player on Burnley's books.

## BRIAN HALL

Creative Scottish midfielder player who made his name with Liverpool where he was a valued member of the squad for a number of years, playing in two F.A. Cup finals, one U.E.F.A. Cup Final and assisting in two League Championship successes. He moved to Plymouth Argyle in 1976 and returned North to join Burnley in November 1977. Brian hails from Glasgow.

## STEVE KINDON

A powerful front runner who started his career with Burnley, and was a key figure in Burnley's F.A. Youth Cup winning side in 1968. Moved to Wolves in June 1972 and returned to Turf Moor in November 1977. Steve was born in Warrington. He was the Claretts leading goal scorer last season with 14 goals.

## TONY ARINS

Tony hails from Chesterfield and joined Burnley straight from junior football in the Mansfield area. He is a tall, stylish defender, who likes to go forward and whose powerful long-range shooting is a feature of his game. He made his Football League debut earlier this season against Fulham at Turf Moor.

## NEIL MCGREGOR

Yorkshire born Neil hails from nearby Leeds and signed for Burnley in February 1978. A regular member of our young Reserve Team last season. He shows a tremendous amount of talent for the game and has a great future in front of him.

## BOB HIGGINS

Bob was born in Bolsover in Derbyshire. He is a powerfully built Centre Half Back, and again he was a member of our young Reserve Team last season. Signed for the Claretts in July 1976 and made his League debut in September 1977 against Brighton.

## WELCOME

BURNLEY'S capacity to produce their own talent and achieve a reasonable level of success over the years has won them many admirers up and down the country and after a spell of comparative decline, their healthy position in the current Division Two table is encouraging to all who deplore the explosion of the transfer market.

Burnley were one of the original 12 members of the Football League and they have had five separate spells in Division One and five in Division Two, far more of their time has been spent in Division One, however, fifty one seasons compared with thirty. They won the First Division championship in both 1921 and 1960 and a F.A. Cup in 1914. In 1920/1 they played a record 30 First Division games without defeat and this stood until recent times when it was eventually bettered by both Leeds United and Nottm. Forest.

One other distinction they have is that of not ever having played in Division Three, though they were near last season when they were bottom of the table for the first part of the season. They rallied magnificently, however, and after losing only three of their last 20 games they climbed to eleventh place. It was here that they chalked up their first win of the season and this can be seen now as a vital turning point for them.

This season they made a much better start and were unbeaten in their first ten games. After crashing 4-0 at Sheffield United however, they then lost five games out of six, but they recovered again and at the time of writing they have won three games in a row, chalking up their third successive win against us in the process. Only Bristol Rovers, Sunderland and Stoke have won at Burnley this season, while away from home they have won at Millwall and Wrexham and have drawn at six other grounds. Their notable achievements this season have been F.A. Cup wins at both Birmingham and Sunderland before going down bravely at Liverpool.

Two key men in the Burnley front line are both Burnley discoveries in their second spell with the club. Steve Kindon returned from Wolves to top the scoring list last season while Leighton James came back from Q.P.R. this season after a previous spell with Derby. Paul Fletcher is another very useful striker on his day. Despite bad luck with injuries he has scored over 70 goals since moving from Bolton in 1971.

Another major force when it comes to scoring is evergreen Peter Noble. He was in the Swindon League Cup winning team of 1969 and is well into double figures from midfield this season, helped by

the fact that he is the regular penalty taker. He is now captaining the side from midfield where he is likely to be linking up with Billy Ingham a one-club man nicknamed 'Ginger Pele' and young Scotsman Stuart Robinson who has come into the side this season.

In defence Derek Scott and Ian Brennan are Geordies and products of the Burnley Youth Scheme while Jim Thomson is a Scot, who started his league career with Chelsea and Bill Rodaway, a former schoolboy international completes a quartet of one club men. Behind them Alan Stevenson, one of the many fine goalkeepers produced by Chesterfield, has made close on 300 appearances since moving to Burnley in 1971.

**LAST Saturday when both teams took to the field at Sunderland a most welcome sight awaited them. Having the sun on their backs seemed to do something for our lads and we were very fortunate not to come away with at least one point. I wonder what the referee would have done if he had still got it up when play restarted. Welcome to Luton, Alan and we hope that your association with the club will be a happy one. Also making his home debut today is John Smith, our new Chief Executive who started with us last Monday. Lets hope that today we can collect two points for them both. Enjoy the match.

Last year, the Under 19 squad reached the semi-finals of the Barralan Trophy — now a National Competition.

These results reflect a determination by players, team managers, County School's officials and parents to put Bedfordshire firmly on the map amongst the many powerful School's Associations. Our gratitude is extended to all the teachers who give freely and generously of their time in the interest of football, and this must include also the team of three teachers who regularly film our home matches and occasional away games for the Football Club.

Each year in the Easter Holidays the Festival of Soccer, organised by the English Schools' F.A., stages a week of football for the Under 19 age group. Upwards of 50 counties meet at Skegness and although no trophies are there to be won, County pride can so easily be jolted by defeat! The victories to our credit over the last two seasons include: Sussex, Derbyshire, Cornwall and Essex.

Bruce Rioch of Scotland and Derby County and David Peach of Southampton F.C. were players who achieved County Schoolboy honours in Bedfordshire.



EASTER WAS being celebrated ten years ago this weekend. Except around Kenilworth Road, that is. There has always been something about Easter that disagrees with Luton Town teams, and sure enough the bogey struck in early April, 1969, to all but finish our promotion hopes.

Before the holiday things were looking reasonable, with the Town in the top four in the Third Division, although most of their rivals had games in hand.

The week before the holiday Orient were the visitors to Kenilworth Road. Player-manager Jimmy Bloomfield dropped himself to strengthen his team, but his humility brought no reward. Goals by Terry Branstons and Laurie Sheffield saw the Town through to a well-earned 2-1 victory. Then they went to Bristol Rovers, for a midweek match, and even if the accent on playing it tight at the back did not make for much in the way of entertainment, few of us grumbled about the 0-0 result.

The problem was that the other promotion-chasing teams, notably Watford and Swindon, were all going great guns, and those of us who have followed Luton

Town for a long time viewed the approach of Easter with some misgivings.

Our fears were only too justified: the three holiday games yielded only two points. The first came on Good Friday at Torquay, where former Town boss Allan Brown was manager. Billy McDerment gave the Town an early lead, but Torquay equalised with half an hour to go, and in the end both sides were happy enough with a point each.

Then came a trip to relegation-threatened Mansfield. For the superstitious, it followed a run of 13 games without defeat, and sure enough the Easter hoodoo struck with its usual dull thud. After looking set for a point, the Town lost when Freddie Jardine was forced to make a goal-line save with his hands, the Sharkey scored the only goal of the match from the penalty.

And a day later, humble Southport, who should have been lambs for the slaughter, came to Kenilworth Road to complete the Town's holiday misery by packing their defence, stifling the game, and going home with a 0-0 draw.






