ERIC STEELE

Born Newcastle. Joined the Albion in from Peterborough United in February 1977 and played in last fifteen games in promotion side. Played for Newcastle United before joining the Posh. Was voted Third Division Goalkeeper of 1975/76 season by the Players' Panel. 5' 11".

GRAHAM MOSELEY

Signed by the Albion before Christmas 1977 from Derby County for a fee of around £20,000. Played a number of first-team games at Derby including one against the Albion in the League Cup in 1976/77 season. Played his Albion debut against Bristol Rovers and kept a clean sheet in a 4-0 win.

KEN TILER

Sheffield-born full-back who signed for the Albion from Chesterfield in October 1974. He originally joined Chesterfield as an amateur in 1967 but signed full professional forms in 1969. Transferred to Albion in October 1974. 5' 11".

CHRIS CATTLIN

Born in Milnrow, Lancashire, his first professional Club was Huddersfield Town. Joined Coventry City for the then record fee for a full-back and played for England at under-23 level and for the Football League against the Scottish League in 1973. Made over 250 first-team appearances for Coventry before joining the Albion in May 1976. 5' 11".

GARY WILLIAMS

Born Liverpool. Made his League debut at Preston North End at the end of 1971/72 season. Voted "Player of the Year" by Preston North End fans in 1976. 5' 10".

MICHAEL KERSLAKE

Born in Fulham. Joined the Albion during July 1978 from Fulham which was his only previous Club. A promising young full-back who is anxious to make the grade and has already represented England at youth international level.

MARK LAWRENSON

Preston-born defender who signed for the Albion from the Deepdale Club while holidaying in Spain in June 1977. Cost Albion Club record fee at the time. Full international with Eire. 5' 10".

GRAHAM WINSTANLEY

Graham joined the Albion in November 1974 after a loan period. Played seven times for Newcastle before making 165 appearances for Carlisle United, gaining promotion to the First Division with that Club. Born Croxdale, Co. Durham. 5' 11".

ANDY ROLLINGS

Born North Weston. Product of the Norwich City Youth Scheme. A 6' 2" defender, he signed for the Albion in April 1974.

PAUL CLARK

Signed from Southend United in November 1977. Represented England at both schoolboy and youth level.

Born South Benfleet. 5' 11".

BRIAN HORTON

Albion's skipper, signed in March 1976 from Port Vale after playing some 200 games for the Potteries Club. Originally an apprentice with Walsall but went into non-League football with Hednesford Town before joining Port Vale. 5' 10".

PETER SAYER

Welsh International who joined the Albion February 1978 from Cardiff City for a six-figure fee. Has gained International caps at schoolboy, youth, under-21 and full level. Gained promotion with Cardiff City from the Third Division and also earned Welsh Cup winners and runners-up medals.

TEDDY MAYBANK

Signed from Fulham in November 1977 for Albion's record fee. Played for South London Schools and from school joined Chelsea before joining Fulham.

PETER WARD

Born Derby. Began professional career with Burton Albion and joined Brighton and Hove Albion in May 1975. Made his League debut at Hereford United in March 1976 and scored after 50 seconds. Ever-present in 1976/77 promotion side and broke 47-year-old Club goalscoring record with 32 League goals and four Cup goals. Played for England Under-21's against Norway in September 1977 and scored hat-trick. Selected for the full England squad in Luxembourg the following month.

MALCOLM POSKETT

Striker who signed for the Albion from Hartlepool in January 1978. After leaving school he played for Middlesbrough but went out of full-time League Football to learn a trade. Scored a hat-trick for Albion at Bristol Rovers.

TONY TOWNER

Born Brighton, product of Albion's Youth Scheme. Signed professional forms in October 1972 and played regularly in the first team after making his Second Division debut.

ERIC POTTS

Born Liverpool. Joined Albion in June 1977 from Sheffield Wednesday. Made debut as substitute for Wednesday for one minute in October 1970 and made full debut versus Q.P.R. in April 1961. Played for Oswestry Town before Joining Sheffield Wednesday in December 1969. 5' 5".

JOHN RUGGIERO

Born Stoke-on-Trent. Joined Albion from Stoke City June 1977. Had short spell on loan at Workington. Played his way into Stoke City's League side towards the end of the 1976/77 season. 5' 10".

PETER O'SULLIVAN

Born Colwyn Bay. Moved to the Albion from Manchester United in April 1970. Represented Wales at Schoolboy-Under-23 and Full International level. 5' 8".

WELCOME

THIS AFTERNOON our greetings to the Officials, Players and supporters of Brighton and Hove Albion F.C. Like our match with West Ham, this game is a vital one to us and to them. Formed in 1900, the Seagulls were an original member of Division Three, and a year later entered Division Three (South). Then followed a long spell of 37 years in this Division, and it wasn't until 1958 that they gained promotion into Division Two. Five seasons later they slipped back to the Third Division, and after only one season in this Division they dropped to Division Four. 1965 saw them back in Division Three, and 7 years later they gained promotion once more to Division Two. The 72-73 season saw them struggle to hold their place, but unable to rally in the closing games of the season they went again to Division Three. 1977 saw promotion back to Division Two, and after a 2-0 win over Sunderland early in the season they went to the top of the table.

Unable to sustain their opening form, however, they slipped eventually to sixth place after drawing with Crystal Palace. Early in the season the Town went down 3-2 at Goldstone Ground, but evened the honours on the last day of 1977 by defeating the Seagulls 1-0 at Kenilworth Rd. After a nail biting finish to the season, Brighton were unlucky not to gain promotion to Division One, being prevented only by goal difference, Spurs just piping them to the post, both teams with 56 points.

The first half of this season saw them hovering in the top third of the table, defeats by Burnley (3-0) and West Ham (2-1) close together, put them in 12th position, the lowest they have been. Wins over Sheffield United and Wrexham brought them up a few places but defeats by Sunderland and Notts County dropped them again to 12th spot.

Then apart from a surprise 2-0 defeat by Preston, they played 11 games at the time of writing without defeat, the last 5 games being draws. This string of point-gathering games has put them into the first position with 5 games left to play, and it seems that

bar any unforeseen accidents, they are destined for Division One, the first time in their career. We wish them well, but our lads will be fighting for two points.

VIEWPOINT

ARSENAL'S Sammy Nelson, who for years has had a reputation as a no-nonsense defender and skilful overruber, seems now to have ensured that his name will be even more meaningful after his shorts-dropping escapade against Coventry City.

Though one sympathises with his anger at a section of the crowd that had been

baiting him, it was clearly an undesirable action and it is ironical that Arsenal, who over the years have seemed to demand a higher standard of decorum than most, have had the embarrassment of two of their defenders (Terry Mancini was the other) in the space of three seasons baring their buttocks to the public. Maybe Nelson was a little unlucky that a photographer managed to snap his act for remarkably, referee Clive Thomas, who over the years has acquired a reputation for making the most of trivial offences that have been visible to most eyes, seems not to have seen anything amiss. One wonders, however, just how fair it is that a player should be punished by his club (a 2-week suspension with loss of two weeks wages) and also face an F.A. disrepute charge. This is one walk of life clearly in which a man can be punished twice for the same offence.

It was ironical too that Nelson was suspended for the following Saturday's game in any case and in fact had this suspension come one game earlier or if Arsenal had drawn their F.A. Cup semi-final with Wolves, Nelson would clearly not have been playing in the Arsenal v Coventry game and the chain of events that led to his shorts-dropping would not have occurred.

Maybe by now he is reflecting that having scored one goal despite the baiting of the crowd he might have rammed home his message of what he thought of them by seeking to instigate an Arsenal match-winner. One recalls a few years back when Nelson scored a remarkable goal against Coventry that was one of the goals of the Season on Television.

When all is said and done, this was after all, an act of impetuosity that the player probably regretted immediately afterwards. It would be a pity for him and for Arsenal if it rules him out of the F.A. Cup Final.

HATTERS COMMUNITY SPORTS ARENA
JUST BEFORE the kick-off of today's game, a brief but nonetheless highly significant presentation is being made to mark the involvement of the Hatters and Luton Borough Council in the Sport's Council's

imaginative "Football and the Community" project. In all, the Sports Council has made a grant totalling £38,026 to the club and the Borough Council to help establish new opportunities for the youth of Luton to participate in sport and recreation. The total project has cost nearly £50,000.

Other league clubs and authorities in Britain have also benefitted from the scheme, the grants coming from the £1 million made available last summer by the Government specifically for the purpose of "harnessing" the charisma and magic which professional football clubs engender to encourage young people to participate in sport and recreation.

The presentation this afternoon sees Miss 'Mickey' Bradley, Principal Regional Officer of the Sports Council's Eastern Region and a former England women's cricketer, hand over a commemorative plaque to Hatters' Chairman Denis Mortimer. She is also presenting a cheque for £3,650 — the final grant payment towards the cost of

launching the scheme — to Councillor Ken Woodbridge, Chairman of Luton Recreation Services Committee. The bulk of the grant, £34,376, has been used to construct a flood-lit all weather outdoor playing surface, the Hatters Community Sports Arena, mainly for football and netball, at our Maple Road, car park, together with Portakabin accommodation, which includes showers and changing rooms. The club has provided a further £11,541 towards this development.

The local authority's role involves staffing and planning the programme of activities to take place on the new playing surface. Only days ago, this area was used for the first time when a netball tournament was held for the under 12s, and under 16s together with football coaching, and it looks like becoming well occupied from now on. In fact a full time 'motivator' is already busy organising the programme. This has proved to be a really exciting project and we are confident hundreds of local youngsters will have good reason to be grateful for the new facilities. And as a club, we were delighted to be able to participate in a scheme from which only good can result.





But with Brian Clough's team anything is possible....

WHAT a remarkable comeback by Frank Worthington!

His two goals for Bolton at Manchester United put him on 24 for the season — not bad for a bloke a lot of folk said was finished.

CONGRATULATIONS to Millwall for reaching the FA Youth Cup semi-final for the first time.

Their 0-0 draw at Goodison in the first leg makes them

favourites for the return on April 25 — and a place in the Final. Manager George Petchey is quick to praise David Payne, the former Crystal Palace and Orient defender who is responsible for the youngsters at Cold Blow Lane.

Payne has knitted them into a fine side and the future looks bright for Millwall even if their first team are struggling once again to avoid relegation to the Third Division.

TOUGH luck story for Crystal Palace's £200,000 striker Mike Elwiss.

He could face a second cartilage operation that would jeopardise his chances of playing again even at the start of next season.

Poor Elwiss has found the hanging around murder after his first operation in December.

Better news though of Palace's Welsh international defender Ian Evans who has been out for almost a season and a half after breaking a leg. He's progressing well and hopes to make it next season.

NICE touch of loyalty from Chelsea giant Micky Droy.

While all around him at Stamford Bridge must look like chaos, Droy took time out to say:

"Relegation or not — I'm not interested in playing for any other club."

That's the kind of talk manager Danny Blanchflower wants to hear as he prepares to sort things out for the Second Division next season.

Droy went on: "I've never been interested in moving. Obviously there's still a great deal of hard work to be done but you can't be successful whether you're a plumber or a footballer without giving 100 per cent effort."

Droy has always given maximum effort and Chelsea will need his power to pull them through the next few months as they try to build a better future.

ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

A look back at Luton Town a decade ago.

PENALTIES awarded in soccer are very often controversial incidents remembered long after match results are forgotten. And there was a penalty at Kenilworth Road ten years ago this week which still sticks in my memory as the most amazing I have ever seen — it was won by some bright spark in the crowd.

The game was a Third Division encounter with Stockport County, and there was a crowd of 12,055 to see the Town keep alive their slight hopes of promotion.

The visitors were outclassed, with the Town defence never in trouble. Brian Lewis scored in the sixth minute, and Bruce Rioch added another a minute later.

The points seemed to be assured, and Stockport's attacks were nearly non-existent. The trouble erupted when a whistle blew as a Stockport raid fizzled out. Keith Allen picked up the ball ready to take a free kick, and to the astonishment of all but one of the assembled crowd and players referee John Yates immediately blew up for a penalty. He had no option

— the first whistle, it turned out, had been blown in the crowd behind the goal, and all the protests and screams of abuse from the terraces were to no avail.

Young scored from the spot to pull the score back to 2-1, but Lewis replied for the Town within a minute, then added his third ten minutes from time to give the Town a 4-1 win.

It's tough on Lewis, but I still remember the game for the penalty incident — I had forgotten his hat-trick until I looked up the match details.

The previous week a sharp lecture in the dressing room at half-time by manager Alec Stock had brought the desired effect in a game at Tranmere.

After a dull first half the Town scored twice in seven minutes after the break, through a volley by Moore and a close-range shot by Rioch and the 2-0 victory kept the Town in third place in the table, still hoping for a slip-up or two by top teams Watford and Swindon.


