Victory in that match ensured the right finish for us after an exciting struggle with seven other teams to escape from the relegation area. Our aim now is to ensure that all the changes I made in my first full season as manager begin to show positive results. There can be no doubt that new defenders Jake Findlay, Kirk Stephens, Mark Aizlewood and Mal Donaghy should have learned much from their experience in their first season in the Second Division. Hopefully, we can look forward to a season free from the injury hoodoo which plagued us last year.

Lilly Fuccillo has sweated his way through the summer and is progressing after breaking his leg halfway through the season. We hope David Moss and Ricky Hill are free from pelvic strains, and also that Kirk Stephens has an injury-free season.


While we have been working hard in pre-season training, Alan West has been playing in America with Minnesota Kicks, and Godfrey Ingram has been working with the celebrated New York Cosmos. Our supporters will undoubtedly want to give a warm welcome to new signings Mike Saxby, from Mansfield, and Alan Ollis, from Aston Villa. Mick is a centre half who has the ability to play in the highest company, while Alan is a midfield player who impressed us last season but was denied his opportunity by his club's surplus of midfield players. Last season, we reached the quarter finals of the FA Youth Cup, beating Villa on the way.

Tonight's visitors, Gillingham, will provide difficult opposition. They were unlucky to miss promotion last season and, in transfer deals have bought shrewdly. Their manager, Gerry Summers, has high ambitions for the club.

At Luton, the management team and players know that success can be achieved only by a combined effort on and off the pitch. We have reorganised in all aspects of the club and there is now a feeling that we are on the move after a period of adjustment from our financial depressions. # LEAGUE CUP FLASHBACK



The Football League Cup provides additional incentives for clubs to do well every season and, like other competitions, inevitably produces the shocks. Luton have enjoyed their fair share of glory in the League Cup during the last two seasons after taking Manchester City to three games and, last year, eliminating Aston Villa.

But the road to Villa Park had a shaky start when Football League newcomers Wigan Athletic visited Kenilworth Road on August 29th.

In the first half, Luton played well individually but, as a team, stuttered badly and Wigan were unfortunate not to take a first half lead. But there was little doubt the Town were generally on top.

It was finally left to Brian Stein to score in the 64th minute, before emphasising Luton's superiority with a second four minutes from the end.

The third round brought Luton another home tie against Fourth Division opposition — Crewe — on October 3rd. The 2-1 scoreline in the Town's favour was a complete injustice to their domination of the match against a Crewe team which tested Aleksic only twice.

Lilly Fuccillo made the first for Ricky Hill who scored with a fine drive and, two minutes later, Paul Price gave Bob Hatton the opportunity to head the second. Crewe pulled one back 20 minutes from time.

And so it was a trip to Villa Park in the fourth round — and many pundits had written off the Town's chances.

Over 32,000 fans turned up to watch what some had described as a foregone conclusion and an easy victory for the First Division side. But Luton turned giant killers. The atmosphere at Villa Park lifted the Town's players and, when they went in at half time level, there was a sneaking feeling it was going to be their night.

Luton fought for everything, and Bob Hatton brought yells of delight from the Town's fans when, after having one effort disallowed in the 59th minute, cracked the ball past Rimmer seven minutes later for the first goal.

The goal frustrated Villa's fans who responded with the slow handclap. It did nothing for their team who were demoralised a minute from the end when Brian Stein wrapped it all up.

Luton's reward for that superb result was another away trip to a First Division side — Leeds. But the glory trail came to an abrupt halt when, at Elland Road, the Town lost 4-1 — Brian Stein scored their goal — before 28,117 fans.

# GILLINGHAM



Gillingham must have thought that striker Tony Funnell had that promotion touch.

His sequence of eight goals in the last 11 games helped Southampton win promotion to Division One two seasons ago.

Then, last season, he looked like doing it again after joining 'the Gills' for £40,000.

But, although he scored seven times in the last eight games, Gillingham missed promotion to Division Two by a single point.

It was tough on Gillingham who, despite several injury problems, maintained a constant challenge in the promotion race.

Undoubtedly, one of the main reasons why they failed to make the grade was the absence in midfield of John Crabbe.

Another former Southampton player Crabbe broke an arm in March and was ruled out of the crucial promotion run-in.

However, with Crabbe now back in contention, Gillingham hope to go one better this season and finally win that Division Two place.

They should have a good indication of their chances from their two League Cup games against Luton.

Manager Gerry Summers, who joined the club four years ago after spending six years as boss of Oxford, has built a strong squad.

Up front he has three prolific goal-scorers in Funnell, Danny Westwood and Ken Price.

Westwood joined Gillingham from Queens Park Rangers for £17,000 and his speed and explosive finishing made him top scorer last season with 19 goals.

Not far behind, came Price, with 15 goals. He first made his name with Dudley Town, in the West Midlands League, before joining Gillingham in 1976 after a short spell with Southend.

Gillingham also have plenty of strength at the back where goalkeeper Ron Hillyard was an ever-present last season. He kept a clean sheet in 21 Third Division matches and has been first choice keeper virtually since joining the club from York in 1976.

At full back, Micky Barker is Gillingham's record signing — joining them from Newcastle for £40,000 in January.

The player he displaced was Gary Armstrong. But he didn't go down without a fight and by the end of last season, Gary was back in the side giving encouraging displays in midfield.

Another Gillingham signing last season was John Sharpe, a tough tackling defender, who joined them from Southampton for £30,000 after a month's loan.

But it was reluctant defender Mark Weatherly who was everyone's choice as Player of the Year. He started his career as a striker before switching to midfield and then being persuaded to have a go at centre-back, where he partnered John Overton.

Although he wasn't too keen on the idea, he took to the position like a duck to water and was an ever-present last season.

Weatherly's success meant that former Aston Villa player, Charlie Young's first team appearances were restricted after recovering from a broken leg which he received in the first League game of last season.

Young eventually did get back into the side in the unaccustomed role of right back and made several appearances in that position.

Although only 27, Graham Knight is easily Gillingham's longest serving player and has been involved with the club for 13 years. In nearly 300 first team appearances he has played in every position with the exception of goalkeeper.

Another long server is Daimien Richardson, who has also amassed 300 appearances since his arrival from Shamrock Rovers in November 1972.

In midfield, Gillingham have Terry Nicholl, who belongs to a footballing family with brother Chris playing for Southampton and cousin Jimmy on Manchester United's books.

Another midfield player, Billy Hughes, became the youngest player to play for the club when he made his debut against Southend in April 1976 at the age of 15.

Hughes has considerable potential but faces competition from Dean White, who won a regular place towards the end of last season with some forceful displays.

Gillingham also have two good up and coming youngsters in defender Steve Bruce and forward Pat Walker.





## RESERVE REPORT

DAVID COATES

Our youth team will this season compete in the new Wallspan Southern Combination following the collapse of the Chiltern Premier League in May. David Bone, a former secretary of the Luton League and chairman of the Combination, has devised a Knock-out Cup which guarantees every member team a minimum of 28 games a season.

Clubs will have at least eight matches in the Wallspan KO Cup in addition to 18 League games.

Ten clubs have been accepted into membership and will be split into two groups with one comprising Milton Keynes, Aylesbury United, Luton Town, Potton United and Biggleswade Town. Members of the other group are Barton Rovers, Bedford Town, Letchworth Garden City, Stevenage Borough and Dunstable Town.

Teams in each group will play each other on a home and away League basis, with the winners meeting the runners-up of the other group to determine the two finalists. The semi-final and the final will be played over two legs with the aggregate score deciding the winner.

Although the cup competition was necessary to supplement League fixtures, a starting number of ten teams has delighted League officials who see the inclusion of Luton as a fine boost for the competition's status.

Games will start on September 1st, and Luton manager David Pleat explained his reasons for including his youth team in the competition. "It reduces travelling which, in these days of inflation and heavy running costs, must be something we have to give great importance to.

"We felt the new League provided an ideal opportunity for us to experiment with our trialists in addition to giving the youth team players a regular game every week. Good competition at youth level is most important to me and my coaches John Moore and David Coates".

Luton have also made an alteration to their policy for Football Combination matches played at Kenilworth Road. This season, home games will be staged on Monday evening instead of Tuesday — a move designed to give the manager and his staff more time to watch other games.

"We found most clubs played their home reserve games on a Tuesday last season and that restricted the number of other games we could watch," explained the manager.

"By changing our Combination home games to Monday, it means we can watch our own youngsters and, in addition, have more time to watch other players during the rest of the week".

The majority of managers watch at least four games every week in addition to their own teams and Luton's change of policy is obviously designed to increase their scouting activities.


