IN FOCUS...IN FOCUS...

Luton Town are proud of their relatively fine disciplinary record on the terraces in previous seasons, and are anxious to retain it. Our message to any fans who want to cause trouble at Kenilworth Road is simple — stay away. Football in Focus this week is written by Chief Executive and General Manager, John Smith, who outlines the club's policy for this season.

"We intend to adopt a tough policy for any fans who cause trouble at Kenilworth Road this season. Our own supporters are relatively well behaved, but there is always the minority who spoil a match for the majority — and we have already taken steps to ensure there is the minimum of trouble this season.

"With the attraction of games against Watford and the London clubs this season at Kenilworth Road, we are faced with the prospect of good attendances and we will treat each match on its merits. We will discuss all precautions fully with the local police but, for obvious reasons, I will not be prepared to elaborate on any action which will be taken to eliminate trouble.

"My message for any people who want to cause trouble is a simple one — stay away. Luton Town don't need or want you. Luton won the John White award for well behaved supporters a few seasons ago and we are proud of that achievement and I appeal to all supporters to ensure the maintenance of last season's good record.

"This season, alcohol will not be available for visiting supporters on the Kenilworth Road terraces. In previous seasons, they have had access to a bar under the terraces but this has been a cause of great concern to the police and local authorities.

"During my spell as secretary with Leicester City, I did a survey on the link between bad behaviour on the terraces and alcohol and found that supporters who were arrested for causing crowd trouble were not under the influence. Each visiting supporter was found to have consumed an average of only half a pint of beer which was purchased on the ground.

"I don't think alcohol which is available on the terraces is a major cause of crowd trouble. But I am concerned that visiting supporters can freely purchase alcohol at public houses, supermarkets and off licences which are adjacent to many stadiums. But we at Luton feel we have a duty to stamp out any contributory factor to crowd trouble and that is why only light refreshments will be available to visiting supporters.

"Our own fans have the benefit of the red bar situated under the main stand where they can purchase alcohol be-

fore a game and during half time. But this is a facility available only to those who can use it properly and any Luton supporter who misbehaves will be banned from the stadium.

"We have also made an attempt to persuade local people that Kenilworth Road is a safe place to watch soccer by the introduction of a family area in the Bobbers Stand. We want to attract parents and their children to watch Luton Town — and have been encouraged by the response to the introduction of this scheme.

"I was annoyed by one premature report in a newspaper which talked of possible crowd trouble this season. It only helped to inflame the problem and served no useful purpose whatsoever. We want to think positively and not on a negative basis and that is why I have used this opportunity to attempt to inform all Luton fans that we are taking stringent steps to avoid any trouble.

"Our supporters have a reputation for the good standard of behaviour they have maintained over the seasons. We want to keep it that way and look forward to a happy and trouble-free season. Please remember, if you are in the small minority who can make soccer intolerable for the majority — stay away from Kenilworth Road.

"Finally, we are in the middle of a radical re-organisation behind the scenes at Kenilworth Road. Amenities for our supporters are gradually being increased and, when all our plans reach fruition, facilities will be greatly increased. Further details of these will be published in a future match-day magazine."

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DAVID'S DIARY...

We could not have had a more interesting fixture to open our Second Division programme. Cambridge United have come a long way in a short time because they are well managed under a sensible Board of Directors. They are, above all, friendly neighbours and that is important. We look forward to a competitive game — and the right result for Luton Town.

Mike Saxby, one of our new signings, and Mark Aizlewood, miss today's match as disciplinary punishment from last season and this will give opportunities to other players. The Second Division scene this season looks more competitive than the last campaign when I thought Brighton, Palace and Wrexham would be promotion candidates. This season, I am sure there are far more clubs with positive chances. Sunderland, West Ham, QPR, Birmingham, Chelsea, Newcastle, Wrexham, Leicester, perhaps Watford and Preston undoubtedly fancy their chances. It all indicates some exciting football and the best Second Division race for a long time.

During the summer, we have increased our apprentice staff. These promising youngsters will form the basis of our Youth Cup team after reaching the quarter finals last season. We welcome Jan Petrowski, a central defender from Bedford, Alan Cosby, Ray Brammer and Robert Walker, from the Luton Boys team, and John Cole and Frank Bunn from Solihull. If they work hard, they have the chance of becoming future first team players.

In the close season, our youth team gave a creditable account of themselves in a top Continental tournament in Amsterdam. They were unbeaten in five games, but Leicester deservedly won the competition with a strong side.


One of the biggest changes in the game this summer has been the dramatic rise in transfer fees. Freedom of contract has resulted in much money chasing the best players. This will cause terrible problems for clubs who do not carefully consider their budgets but, hopefully, some loyalty will remain. But the facts show that even the most consistent and highly regarded club players are likely to seek alternatives at the end of their current contracts.

I believe there are good quality players in the lower divisions who will play with enthusiasm and determination if they are given the chance at a higher level. Clubs must proceed with caution. If they step beyond their means to entice "stars", our experience over the last few seasons should provide a worthy warning.

Freedom of contract has made the manager's role even more important and certainly more difficult. It can disrupt the best laid team plans.

Finally, enjoy this afternoon's match. I hope you will give the team your vocal support and respond accordingly.

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PRE-SEASON RUN DOWN

Our teams have been extremely active in their pre-season friendly games, with the senior squad playing two games in Ireland, and the reserve and youth teams also having a hectic programme.

The first team started their action with a visit to Bournemouth where a goal from Andy Pearson in the 67th minute was enough to give the Town a slender victory over Alec Stock's side which included former Luton player Brian Chambers.

One of the Luton stars was striker Bob Hatton, who was a constant threat to Bournemouth with his runs on both flanks and it was his hard work which allowed Pearson to knock in his goal. The Luton team was: Findlay, Jones, Turner, Donaghy, Saxby, Price, Johnson, Heale, Stein, Hatton and Pearson. Subs: Birchenall (for Stein 65 minutes), Stephens (for Turner 65 minutes), and Goodyear (for Saxby 80 minutes).

Goals from Baker and Cole gave Luton their next victory when a young team made the short trip to United Counties League side Ampthill where they won 2-1. Manager David Pleat described the result as a "very encouraging display". He added: "It was a terrific performance by our youngsters, particularly in the second half."

David Moss, who was plagued with a pelvic strain last season, made a welcome return to action when he was given a run-out in the youth team which visited Sandy Albion, a South Midlands League side.

Luton won 4-1 and Moss marked his return with a goal and, as a safety precaution, was substituted at half time. The Town's other goals came from Andy Pearson, Clive Goodyear and new signing from Aston Villa, Alan Ollis.


Luton started their mini-Irish tour with a 3-2 victory over Crusaders — and reserve team striker Gary Heale staked an early claim for a senior place this season by scoring two goals.

Without Steve Taylor — transferred to Mansfield for £75,000 during the close season — and the injured David Moss, Heale's goals gave Luton a victory they secured only after Jake Findlay made a tremendous save from a penalty eight minutes from the end. Crusaders took the lead, but Heale equalised when he headed in Ricky Hill's cross. Paul Price put the Town in front from a penalty, but the Irish side equalised, before Heale's winner.

The Town had to rely on Mal Donaghy in their 1-1 draw against his former club Larne, who took the lead before Donaghy headed Bob Hatton's cross into the top corner. The Luton team was: Findlay, Stephens, Aizlewood, Donaghy, Saxby, Price, Johnson, Birchenall, Heale, Hatton, Pearson. Sub: Stein.

The senior squad completed their pre-season build-up with a game at Peterborough where Mal Donaghy again scored the goal which gave Luton a draw. His effort was a 35 yard cracker in the 12th minute and gave Luton the lead before Peterborough equalised through new signing from Kettering, Bobby Kellock.

CAMBRIDGE



Striker Tom Finney made a big impact when he joined Luton six years ago.

And he hopes to make an impression again today when he returns to Kenilworth Road with Cambridge United.

Finney joined Luton from Crusaders for a bargain £17,000 and was sold 12 months later to Sunderland for £70,000.

He didn't really hit it off in the North East and was soon on the move to Cambridge where he grabbed 16 goals in their promotion winning season.

The first League match of the season gives Luton fans a chance to see another former face in Finney's striking partner Alan Biley.

Biley was released by Luton four years ago without getting a first team chance. But his career has really blossomed since he joined Cambridge.

Last season he was rated in the £200,000 class but it's anyone's guess what he would bring now in the current inflated transfer market.

Another player discovered just down the road from Luton is Cambridge midfield player Floyd Streete.

The West Indian born Streete had trials with Southern League Dunstable before being recommended to Cambridge. He is rapidly gaining experience and could prove a valuable asset.

Another Cambridge player who had a short spell with Dunstable is Bill Garner.

But it was after moving on to Southend and then Chelsea when he made his name. Bill made over 83 appearances for Chelsea, scoring 24 times.

Garner signed for Cambridge in November 1978 and scored three times in 22 League games last season.

Cambridge's record signing is midfield man Derrick Christie whom they bought from Northampton for £50,000 in October last year.

They also have former QPR player Mick Leach in midfield. He joined them last season from Detroit Express for a small fee.

After two seasons of chasing honours Cambridge were happy just to keep their Division Two status last term.

In goal, Malcolm Webster is a former England youth international who made his League debut in 1969 with Arsenal. He was soon transferred to Fulham where he held his place for three years before moving on to Southend and then Cambridge.

At the back, they have David Stringer, who was a stalwart in the Norwich defence for well over 11 years, and appeared at Wembley with the Canaries in the League Cup finals of 1973 and 1975.

Fellow defender Trevor Howard also played at Wembley for Norwich, coming on as substitute in 1973. He joined Cambridge the season before last.

eventually moved to Bournemouth before joining Cambridge three years ago.

Steve Fallon is a local lad who made good. He developed in the Cambridge junior sides and made his League debut in the 1974-75 season.

While Fallon didn't have very far to travel, Ian Buckley arrived at Cambridge after travelling all the way from South Africa.

He was with Oldham and Stockport before trying his hand in South Africa and eventually returned to England and Cambridge the season before last.

Lindsay Smith spent most of his career with Colchester and was in their first team for six years before joining Cambridge.

Steven Spriggs and Jamie Murray were both regulars in the Cambridge side last season. Spriggs was a free transfer signing from Huddersfield, while United are Murray's first League club.

John Cozens was playing for Hillingdon Borough in the Southern League when Notts County spotted him in 1970.

For a while, he held a regular place in the Notts County side before moving to Peterborough where he was their top scorer in 1973-74 with 25 goals. He joined Cambridge the season before last.



photo call session. Big Mike was a record £200,000 signing from Mansfield, while Alan was a free transfer signing from Aston Villa.


