INTRODUCING THE LEADERS

This afternoon we welcome our local friendly neighbours LUTON TOWN to the Abbey.

After an embarrassing League Cup defeat by Gillingham the "Hatters" have really taken the Second Division by storm. They have lost just once in 11 games and taken seven points out of the last eight.

HOTSHOTS

Apart from being leaders, the "Town" are also the division's leading goalscorers with 25 goals to date.

OPENER

The "Hatters" and the "U's" met at Kenilworth Road for the first game of the season. Alan Biley opened the scoring for the U's ten minutes from the end with a disputed goal but David Moss scored a deserved equaliser for the "Hatters" with a twenty yard free-kick with just two minutes remaining.

HISTORICALLY

Apart from a spell from 1900-1920 Luton have been in the Football League since 1897.

Until 1955 they spent all their time in Divisions 3, 3 (S) and 2. In 1955 they finished Division 2 runners-up and thus joined the elite in Division 1 where they stayed for five seasons.

In the past few years the club has received its greatest publicity due to the financial problems which existed. These problems appear to be straightening out and now it is the successful playing side of the club that is getting all the publicity.

Their most successful league spell was from 1969-1974 when they rose from Division 4 to Division 1, a phenomenal achievement. After one season in Division 1 they have been in Division 2 ever since.

LAST SEASON

Luton only finished two points and two places away from relegation. This was a very surprising end to a season which promised so much. In the first six home matches they scored 25 goals, taking eleven points (the U's grabbed the other one), and scored seven goals against Cardiff and six versus both Notts. Co. and Oldham!

MANAGER—DAVID PLEAT

In charge since spring 1978 after playing for Luton a decade earlier. His career started as a winger with Notts. Forest before moving to Luton, Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough. His playing days were cut short due to injury.

"HATTERS" TEAM

JAKE FINDLAY—Keeper, costing £100,000 from Villa in November '78. He joined Villa from school and played 14 first team games for them.

KIRK STEPHENS—Full-back signed from Nuneaton Boro' last year by Dave Pleat who used to be the Nuneaton manager. After a tremendous transformation from non-league to Second Division soccer the Supporters voted him "Player of the Season".

MIKE SAXBY—A centre back who was a £200,000 buy from Mansfield during the summer. Mike played 76 games for the "Stags".

PAUL PRICE—Longest serving player at Luton, who became an apprentice in 1971. He has broken a leg on two occasions but has been a regular of the first team scene for the past four seasons.

MAL DONAGHY—Defender who played 40 league games last term. Bought from Irish team Larne for only £15,000. Mal is a Northern Ireland Under-21 International.

RICKY HILL—This brilliant ball player with a tremendous shot signed as an apprentice four years ago. Ricky seems to have been around for years, but is still one of the youngest players in the side.

TONY GREALISH—Signed in the close season from Orient for around £200,000 after playing 169 games for the "O's". Tony plays in midfield and has been capped for Eire. He scored against Bulgaria in the recent International.

ALAN WEST—Along with Hill and Grealish completes the expected midfield trio. Arrived from Burnley for £100,000 and has since played 230 games for the "Hatters". Every summer he plays for Minesota Kicks in the States.

BOB HATTON—One of the most experienced strikers in the country who has played for seven clubs and scored over 160 goals in league football. This season he has scored seven goals and grabbed a hat-trick against Bristol Rovers.

BRIAN STEIN—Before being spotted by Dave Pleat as a potential league player in 1977 was working as a clerk and playing for Edgware. Made his first team debut less than one month after signing for Luton. Scored 14 league and cup goals last season.

DAVID MOSS—Leading league scorer last year with 13 goals, and looks like being the same this season as he has already notched 11! After nine years with Swindon moved to Luton for £110,000 in 1978. His role is generally to play as a winger, but scores a lot of goals from that position!

GODFREY INGRAM—Cover player for the front three at the moment and is the youngest member of Luton's first

MEMORY MAN

Mr. John Ison of Hartley Close, Waterbeach, has won two tickets for the match of his choice as a result of correctly answering questions from the Orient programme.

Jimmy Thompson played most games for the U's in the 1969-70 Southern League season and George Harris was the highest scorer.

SEASIDE GOLD

On the 3rd January, 1977, the U's were thankful to Pat Kruse of Torquay for scoring the fastest own goal in league history. He headed past his keeper after only six seconds!

"HOT" IMPORTS

United's Canadian-born striker, Gordon Sweetzer, 18 months out of football, is back. "Albert" scored two goals in a recent mid-week game and was rewarded with 60 minutes against Newcastle. Gordon is a tremendous finisher, as in his league career to date he has averaged over one goal in every two games.

Ex Boston "tea-man" Roger Gibbins, with three goals in only four full league matches, looks like one of the season's bargain buys, at a mere £15,000.

TOWN MATTERS

Luton Manager, David Pleat, last year predicted a long goal-scoring future for his £50,000 buy, Steve Taylor, from Oldham. However, it wasn't to be as in July, Steve was transferred to Mansfield for £75,000 after scoring just one goal in 20 league games.

The transfer of Orient's Tony Grealish to Luton was subject to the decision of the "League Transfer Tribunal". He cost around £200,000, £150,000 less than Orient wanted!

John Chiedozie, the Orient winger who scored against us with a brilliant left foot shot is being watched by Ron Atkinson in case Peter Barnes is unable to settle.

TEAM NEWS

Team selection at United has been hindered somewhat by injury, as 18 players have already been fielded in League and Cup games this season.

Despite a poor run recently, United's league record this season is as favourable as that of last season. Remember we finished twelfth last term.

Back from Geordieland pointless, goalless but unbowed, we ran into Newcastle on what must have been one of their better days. We never really recovered from the first goal, unfortunately an own goal from a near post corner.

A feature of Second Division football this year has been the many thrilling saves and generally good goalkeeping performances including some fine stops from our own Malcolm Webster, in fact in recent weeks the goalkeepers have been given star rating which is all very frustrating to the goal scorers but something we have to live with in the higher divisions.

Our injury list has been very extensive recently disrupting our team preparations. Ian Buckley has had the plaster removed from his knee and the specialist is quite happy with the result and we hope to have Ian back in a few weeks. Bill Garner and Floyd Streete are still being plagued by their leg injuries, however one bright note is the return to full fitness of Gordon Sweetzer after being sidelined for more than twelve months.

This afternoon we welcome League leaders Luton Town to the Abbey. Our first point this season was gained at Luton and we look forward to an entertaining game today as we endeavour to double that tally.

David Pleat's men have a good away record including a fine win at Leicester and will be a difficult hurdle to overcome but I am sure the players will rise to the challenge.

VIEWS ON 2

Luton Town come here today as Division Two leaders. They are playing with a settled side with two new boys in Tony Grealish and Mike Saxby. Midfield player Alan West recently stated that he believed that Luton could finish very high but was worried if the winter months and bad weather would affect his side.

A greater worry could occur if the "Hatters" have injury problems. An unsettled side and less experienced players can easily pick up a few bad results.

Second place team Newcastle are having a good run at the moment; they have lost only once in the last 13 league and cup games. However during the season they have had some luck with penalty decisions—Newcastle defeated Oldham and Leicester 3-2 thanks to two Alan Shoulder penalties in each game! They also scored a 1-0 win over Wrexham with another penalty in an incident nationally shown on Match of the Day.

Chelsea have had a tremendous run recently but will the bubble burst? Certainly there were signs of it in the 2-0 defeat by Fulham at Stamford Bridge last week. Geoff Hurst may find that his forwards are not scoring frequently enough, for despite picking up 10 points in the last six games, Chelsea scored just seven goals!

Q.P.R. with their obvious talent will be near the top at the end of the season but will their "heavy pitch" be a problem for them in the winter? Anyway they have picked up 14 points out of the last possible 18.

Preston are fast improving. They are very secure defensively and have not lost for seven matches. They have taken three points off Newcastle this season and were unlucky not to pick up two at Luton last week. Luton could only score from a penalty.

Leicester City with their blend of youth and experience look more than capable of holding their own in the First Division, should they get there. By then the youngsters will have developed individually and as a team and will be far more experienced in situations when they find other teams putting them under pressure. Unfortunately the Leicester lads may drop too many points early on this season due to mistakes through inexperience and may miss out this season. Potentially they look the best of the bunch.


ABBEY BACK-TRACKING


