# WELCOME TO LUTON TOWN FC

Luton Town's post-war history embodies the story-book elements of joy and pathos, in that it portrays a climb up and down the step ladder of football fortune, exciting and sad in turn, then a brave effort to get back to the top.

The Hatters' fans were thrilled in 1955 when, after eleven Second Division seasons, the Club edged into second place after a nerve-racking promotion race with five rivals. Goal average settled the Championship in favour of Birmingham and it also decided which club went up with them. Luton's 88 goals to 53 pushed Rotherham United (94-64) into third place, both finishing with 54 points, and next came a disappointed Leeds with 53.

Four years later Luton Town surprised even their supporters by vanquishing Leeds, Leicester, Ipswich, Blackpool and Norwich to reach the FA Cup Final. Exultation turned to dismay when Nottingham Forest, despite the calamity of being reduced by a serious injury to ten men, won the trophy 2-1.

For Luton the sequel was a tragedy of a good team becoming too heavy with years: experience aged, and twelve months after appearing at Wembley the team were back in Division Two. Three more seasons and Luton dropped into Division Three. They stayed there for two years, then grimly tackled the long haul back from Division Four.

Success was achieved in Season 1967/68 at the third attempt and with no argument about it: Luton scored the most goals (87), and fewer against them (44) than the other 23 clubs and equalled Peterborough's record 66 points for this Division.

The Club's long association with the Southern League before their 1920 attainment of Football League status made even older people forget that Luton were elected to the Second Division when it was only five years old, taking the place of Bolton Wanderers in 1897. The turn of the Century spelt their exit in favour of Blackpool. In modern times Luton have been a League Club for another 41 Seasons and sampled the ups and downs of all four Divisions.

Formed in 1885 by the fusion of the local Wanderers and Excelsior, Luton became the

first Southern Club to pay wages. However, the salary scale seemed hardly worth forfeiting amateur status for: 5/- (25p) and this to only the three best players. That was in 1890. When the season ended, it was decided to pay every player 2/6d (12½p) for away games and an allowance for working time lost. The wages were doubled and further increased as Luton's funds and prestige grew. On losing League status the Club returned to the Southern League and had a spell of two seasons in its Second Division.

In the 1973/74 season, Luton adopted new colours of orange shirts with navy and white vertical stripes down the left-hand side, navy shorts and orange stockings. But in season 1979/80 reverted back to white shirts with orange and navy blue stripes on left side and navy blue shorts and white stockings.

Luton gained promotion to the Second Division in the 1969/70 Season when they were runners-up to Orient, and stayed there until their promotion to the First Division, as runners-up to Middlesbrough, in 1973/74, but after one season were back in the Second Division.

This afternoon we extend a warm welcome to the Officials, Players and Supporters of Luton Town Football Club, and look forward to an enjoyable game of football. Here is the squad of players from whom their Manager, Mr David Pleat, will select his team for today's game.

**Jake FINDLAY.** Luton's highest-ever fee for a goalkeeper changed hands when they tempted Aston Villa to part with the big Scot who had been on their books since leaving school. His chances at Villa Park had been limited, but he quickly became an established Second Division player when Luton signed him for £100,000 in November, 1978.

**Paul PRICE.** Luton's longest-serving player, full back Price was spotted by a club scout as a schoolboy in Hertfordshire. He became an apprentice at Kenilworth Road, in 1971, and had to fight harder than most to break through to the League side - he broke his leg, recovered, then broke it again less than a year later. The second comeback was permanent, and he has been a regular member of Luton's League team for the past four years.

**Kirk STEPHENS.** One of the best deals Luton ever did took Stephens to Luton in the summer of 1978. He was signed from Nuneaton Borough, where Luton boss David Pleat had once been manager, and made a remarkable transition from part-time to full-time soccer. He went straight into Luton's side at right back, and became so effective and popular that his first season ended with him being elected "Player of the Year" by the Luton supporters.

**Mark AIZLEWOOD.** One of David Pleat's first moves as manager of Luton Town was to pay £50,000 to bring Aizlewood out of the Fourth Division, where his performances for Newport County were beginning to attract the interest of First Division clubs. He was then 18, and the former Welsh Youth International has since also been capped at Under-21 level by Wales. A stylish defender, who has the ability to play in several positions. His eventual choice for full International Honour would surprise no one at Kenilworth Road.

**Mick SAXBY.** Luton paid their Club record fee to lure central defender Saxby from Third Division Mansfield in the summer of 1979. Saxby's qualities made him a target for several top clubs. He has the qualities to become a big name in football.

**Mal DONAGHY.** There were disappointed managers all over Britain when Luton nipped in to pick up defender Donaghy from Larne for a bargain fee of £15,000. Already a Northern Ireland Under-21 international, he settled immediately into Luton's League side after the transfer in the summer of 1978. An exciting future is predicted. He was in Danny Blanchflower's International squad last summer, after only one year as a professional in the Football League. Can play midfield as well as defence, Donaghy is a natural athlete.

**Wayne TURNER.** Development of local talent is one of the priorities at Kenilworth Road and Turner, who plays midfield or defence, is now on the fringe of making the complete journey from schoolboy soccer to League duty with his home town club. Signed as an apprentice in 1977, he was skipper of Luton's reserve side within two years, and made his League debut in the final Second Division match of last season.

**Pasquale FUCCILLO.** Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford, and known as "Lil" by his friends and the Luton fans, Fuccillo is another Luton player who has come up through the ranks. A skilful, hard-tackling midfielder with a liking for joining the attack and scoring goals, he became a regular Second Division player in 1976, when he was 19. Broke a leg in a League game at Brighton and was out of action for six months. Lonely hours of training through the close season put him on the road back to full recovery.



**Alan WEST.** A brilliant creative midfielder man, West was one of the many young stars to emerge at Burnley. An England Under-23 International, he moved to Luton in 1973 for a then record fee of £100,000, and has been one of the Hatters' most consistent players ever since. A family man and excellent Club man, Alan has experienced soccer in the States with Minnesota Kicks.

**Ricky HILL.** A midfielder player of tremendous talent, Hill was signed as an apprentice four years ago from North London, after impressing David Pleat in a schoolboy game at Hitchin. Hill has delicate ball control and explosive shooting ability. He was an established League player by the time he was 17, and was rewarded with an England Youth Cap in 1976.

**Bob HATTON.** One of the most experienced strikers in the game, Hatton had already proved that he could score goals in any Division when he joined Luton for £50,000 from Blackpool in the summer of 1978. A respected professional whose knowledge and enthusiasm rubs off on younger players.

**David MOSS.** Having given sterling service to Swindon in the Third Division for nine years, flying winger Moss proved that he was more than capable of upsetting Second Division defences after his £100,000 move to Luton in the summer of 1978. His pace and accuracy, allied with the ability to cross the ball at speed, give Luton's attacks strength on either flank, and he is always likely to pop up with a spectacular goal or two - he was Luton's leading League scorer last season with 13, despite missing a third of the campaign through injury.

**Brian STEIN.** The progress of attacker Stein reads like something out of "Roy of the Rovers". He was a local health authority clerk in North London, enjoying non-league football with Edgware Town, when David Pleat, then coach, spotted him in the autumn of 1977. Within a month he had made his debut and rapidly became an established first-team star. His greatest asset is sharpness in the box, and it brought him 14 League and Cup goals last season.

**MANAGER: DAVID J. PLEAT.** The wheel had turned full circle in unexpected fashion when David Pleat became Manager of Luton Town in the spring of 1978. He had been a player there more than a decade previously, in a career which was cut short by injury.

He had played on the wing for England Youth and Nottingham Forest before spending three seasons at Luton in the early 1960s.

Injuries affected his career as he moved on to Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough, but he was determined to stay in the game. He became a fully qualified coach and went into management with Nuneaton, in the Southern League, where in three seasons he transformed the team into one of the most progressive and successful non-league sides.

In 1975 Luton Town hired him for the second time in ten years, this time as a coach. He stayed at Luton as Manager in preference to leaving with Harry Haslam to Sheffield United.

Pleat began reorganising at Kenilworth Road, turning over more than a million pounds in his first two years in transfer deals. Last year was his first full season as Manager, when several of the younger element of the team secured from the lower Divisions were establishing themselves as outstanding Second Division players.

Last season the Clarets shared the points with the 'Hatters'. In the game played at Turf Moor Burnley defeated Luton Town by two goals to one, but in the return game at Kenilworth Road, Burnley lost by four goals to one. As a matter of interest, one has to go back twenty-one years since Burnley were beaten by Luton at Turf Moor.

The two clubs have never met in the Football League Cup, but have been drawn together in the FA Cup in the past.

The first occasion was way back in 1935, but unfortunately our records do not go back so far and consequently we are unable to give any details of that tie, but in Season 1946/47, however, Burnley and Luton were drawn together in the Fifth Round at Luton, where Burnley made a draw 0-0 and brought the 'Hatters' back to Turf Moor for a replay on 11th February, 1947. Burnley won the game quite easily by three goals to nil before a crowd of 29,576.

The Burnley team that day was: Strong; Woodruff, Mather; Loughran, Brown, Bray; Chew, Morris, Harrison, Potts, Kippax. The Clarets' centre forward Ray Harrison scored a hat-trick, and Burnley went on to reach the Cup Final at Wembley that year.



