He has now realised his potential, and is a determined captain, responsible to others as well as himself. Paul could have a tremendous season if he maintains his standards.

Mal Donaghy joined us after only a handful of games in the Irish League. He went straight into our first team without any fuss or complications. He has played strongly and skilfully in whatever position he has been asked to play. His calm disappointment of missing the last international in Belfast against England contrasted with my feelings. I am sure he will continue to work hard at his game.


An interesting spectator at our last game at Luton was England manager, Ron Greenwood, O.B.E. He enjoyed the game, and showed just why he is respected throughout football — he has tremendous humility. For a couple of hours after the game, he spoke openly, patiently and honestly to the many people who sought words with him.

We welcome Herbie Smith, our latest signing from Tooting, to the club. He is a 19-year-old front player, who has very limited experience but has assets which we must harness to effect. At 6 ft. 1 in. and 14 stone he has a physique which could prove decisive if he progresses. The ball is in his court — we have given him the opportunity and, providing he works hard, I am sure he can succeed.

Today we welcome Birmingham City, who are sure to provide attractive opposition and help ensure a good attendance with their travelling supporters. They are enjoying a very good run, and have such famous internationals as Todd (England), Gemmill (Scotland), Givens (Eire) and Johnston (Scotland) amongst their ranks. Relegated last season, they will be determined to bounce back, and I am sure they have an outstanding chance.

Thank you, Jim but I am sure that is just paper talk, and you didn't really mean it! When you are nearer the top than the bottom, you are likely to get more press coverage; consequently, the chances of being misquoted or misrepresented are greater.

JOHN'S JOTTINGS



Our visitors today started life as Small Heath Alliance and turned professional in 1885, two years after being formed. They changed their name to Birmingham in 1906, and a few years later added the word City.

Many famous names have worn the colours, including two international goalkeepers, Harry Hibbs and Gilbert Merrick. Merrick made 486 appearances from 1946-1960. 'Gentleman Joe' Bradford scored 249 goals for them, which is still a record for the club.

Welsh international full back, Billy Hughes, was a mainstay for many years and, later in his career, was transferred to Luton where he soon became a popular figure with the supporters. The managers who have been with them since the War reads like a Roll of Honour. Names such as Bob Brocklebank, Arthur Turner, Gil Merrick, Stan Cullis, Freddie Goodwin and Sir Alf Ramsey, just to name a few.

They have also been fortunate enough to have a taste of European football, entering the Fairs Cup in 1955-58 and have appeared in several finals.

One date which will always be remembered at Luton, especially by those involved, was Saturday, September 17 1955, when our team was on its way to play a First Division fixture against Birmingham. Ten miles south of Warwick, the coach was involved in a collision and ended in a field.

Although bruised and shaken, they managed to reach St. Andrews on time for a game which resulted in a 0-0 draw. The teams were: **Birmingham:** Merrick, Hall, Badham, Boyd, Newman, Warhurst, Astall, Kinsey, Brown, Murphy, Govan. **Luton Town:** Baynham, Dunne, A'Herne, Morton, Owen, Shanks, Cullen, Turner, MacEwan, Cummins, Adam. The first match on our records between the two clubs was on February 12, 1898, when, as Small Heath, we played on their ground and lost 4-2.

In more recent times, we did meet in the FA Cup third round — when, in front of 17,543 fans we lost 1-0 on January 4, 1975 — a game in which Bob Hatton took part. We did, however, gain revenge on April 19, 1975, when we won away 4-1 with Adrian Alston scoring two, and John Ryan and Jimmy Husband hitting the others.

At our last home game against Queens Park Rangers, I was pleased to welcome Mrs. Payne to the club to coincide with the opening of the Joe Payne Lounge. She was accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Ted Duggan, our former player, whom we were pleased to welcome back. It was something of a reunion for Ted because, not only is he a former QPR man and met a few old acquaintances, but two former Luton players were here — Norman Stephenson and Les Hall. I saw them having a real old chat about the past. Great to see them here, and I think they must have enjoyed what they saw.

Tickets are now on sale for our home match with Chelsea on New Year's Day. I would advise supporters to buy early to save disappointment. Would our fans who normally stand on the open terrace, please use either the Enclosure or Oak Road end for this game? It will help our stewards and the police with crowd control.

HERE THIS AFTERNOON

BIRMINGHAM CITY



Birmingham manager Jim Smith must have been speechless after the first game of the season when, after watching his team build a three-goal lead against Fulham at St. Andrews, he saw the Blues lose 4-3.

That gave Smith the first indications that things were not all they should be in defence. He could justifiably argue there was little wrong with an attack which was capable of scoring three times in the first game of the season but, since then, may not have been entirely satisfied with the way chances have gone begging.

But Birmingham still occupy one of the high spots in the Second Division's promotion rat race although, like other clubs in the same situation, Smith is deeply conscious that only a run of good results will keep the pot at boiling point.

Smith has, in the last two weeks, suffered the disappointment of learning that Scottish international Archie Gemmill is likely to be out for at least another two weeks with an injury. Smith was looking for a midfield general during the summer — and when he learned Brian Clough was prepared to part with the vital experience of Gemmill, didn't hesitate to bring him to St. Andrews.

A month later, Smith pulled another master stroke when he persuaded Colin Todd, an English international, that his future was with Birmingham's push for promotion. Todd arrived to bring stability to the defence from Everton, after service

with Sunderland and Derby County gave him 500 Football League appearances.

That didn't signal the end of the new arrivals at Birmingham. Willie Johnson, involved in controversy in Scotland's World Cup excursion, arrived on loan from Vancouver Whitecaps and links with Birmingham after service down the road at West Brom and with Rangers.

Smith, however, has plenty of experience at his disposal although he made several changes in the team following that first day's defeat by Fulham. Big things are expected from keeper Neil Freeman, signed from Southend United just over a year ago after spells with Arsenal, Northampton and Grimsby.

Malcolm Page has the benefit of almost 350 League appearances to his credit and can play in either midfield or at the back. He is Birmingham's most capped player — a Welsh international — and made his debut as long ago as 1969 against Everton. Gary Pendrey is another defender with experience. He's made almost 300 first team appearances and is a product of the club's youth system.

Apart from Gemmill's tremendous experience in the midfield department, Smith also relies on Tony Towers, formerly with Manchester City before a move to the North East with Sunderland. Midfield is probably Smith's biggest asset with the addition of Alan Ainscow, signed from Blackpool, in 1978, a player who can also move forward to create and take scoring

opportunities.

In attack, Luton supporters will not need reminding of the threat posed by former Town player Don Givens. He arrived at Kenilworth Road from Manchester United before Harry Haslam allowed him to make the short move to QPR. He has been capped several times by the Republic of Ireland and signed for Birmingham last year when, in 38 appearances, he scored seven times.

England Under-21 international Keith Bertschin, a strong, hard running forward man, occupied one of the forward positions with Givens. He signed from Ipswich almost two and a half years ago, but his career has been held back by leg fractures.

Former West Brom boss Johnny Giles did Smith a favour by allowing Shamrock Rovers' Steve Lynex to move to St. Andrews on trial. It culminated with Lynex being offered a full time professional's contract and, in two games last season he scored once.

Smith also made additional summer signings when striker Tony Evans, who started his career with Blackpool, moved from Cardiff in July. He was followed by defender Terry Lees who spent six years with Stoke City before making the short move to Port Vale. In 1975, he was on the move again, this time to Holland with Sparta Rotterdam and FC Rhoda. Smith's other capture was keeper Jeff Wealands, who was secured from Hull City, also in July, after spells with Wolves and Darlington.




