

Back room battles and bitterness are a sure recipe for failure. It is sad that politics behind the scenes sometimes overrides the pleasure of the game.


In the last home game, we fought back determinedly after a shaky beginning. Most important, we did not allow the few doubters to get on top of us. The players kept to their football, despite the pressure of being a goal down and the difficulties of the muddy ground. The win was fully deserved for our tenacity against difficult if unambitious opponents. Mick Saxby typified the spirit, running through the club by working terribly hard with John Sheridan, our physiotherapist, to get himself fit for the game. Scoring the equaliser was a bonus deserved.

At the other end of the scale, we allowed young Gary Sisman to leave the club, and he has signed for Hitchin Town. Gary is to continue his studies, and we wish him well. Graham Jones also left us for a month at Torquay United. He will find the League far more competitive than the Combination, and will be better for the experience.

A word of praise for two of our young players this week — Neil Madden, who has made splendid progress, is with the England Youth squad at Lilleshall and Seamus Heath plays for Ireland against Wales on Wednesday. They were both in our youth side which lost at West Bromwich 3-1. I hope they can learn some lesson from their defeat as they played impressive football without capitalising on their approach play. The performances of two lads, Michael Small from Bromsgrove and Andy Foote from Coventry, was a fine testimony to our Midland's scouting contacts.

Today's visitors, Fulham, have found it tough going this season. I have seen them several times, and they have better players than their position indicates. Perhaps they have had a bad run of the ball at times, but there can be no questioning the talent in their ranks. Up front they have Kitchen, Davies, Guthrie, Maybank and Marinello competing for places. We shall have to be at our best today as the result has equal importance for both sides.

I hope we shall see a good game, and that our supporters will give us the vocal backing we have merited this season.

JOHN'S JOTTINGS



Our visitors today were formed as Fulham St. Andrews in 1879 but changed to Fulham when they turned professional in 1898. In all, they have played at six grounds in their history, but have been at Craven Cottage since 1896. Their honours include Division Two Champions in season 1948-49, Division Three (South) Champions in 1931-32 and FA Cup Finalists in 1974-75. Their record victory was against Ipswich Town in December, 1963, when, in a Division One match, they won 10-1. That match almost wiped out the 9-0 defeat at Wolverhampton against a First Division match in September 1959. They have also had their share of managers since the war, with Jack Peart, Frank Osborne, Doug Livingstone, Bill Dodgin (Snr.), Bedford Jezzard, Vic Buckingham, Bobby Robson, Johnny Haynes, Bill Dodgin (Jnr.) and Alec Stock sitting in the managerial chair.

Matches between our two clubs have hardly resulted in many goals. Exceptions to this were in February 1954 when we lost 5-1 at the Cottage, March 1955 when we won 3-0 at Kenilworth Road. Our First Division encounters in the 1956-57 season were even. September 12th 1959 saw us lose 4-2 at Fulham in front of a 30,012 crowd, but in the return match on January 23rd 1960 we won 4-1. The gate that day was 17,876. Players, too have passed between us. Names such as Jimmy Jinks, Malcolm Macdonald and Don Shanks found their way to Luton, while Alan Slough and Viv Busby made the trip to London.

The League table puts them in a very serious position, but I am sure that, under manager Bobby Campbell and his team they, will fight their way out of trouble, although I hope they don't start today!

WE'RE IN THE TOP RATINGS

Our performances on the pitch this season will not have come as a major surprise to our managerial team or the players who have always expressed their confidence in all-round ability.

But it is always nice to receive praise from other quarters, and we were particularly impressed and interested to read one column, written by Tony Howard, in a recent Swansea City programme. We think it makes good reading for Luton supporters and we take the opportunity of reproducing part of it here. It will prove interesting for those Luton fans who like to make comparisons.

So far this season my travels have enabled me to see most of the teams in the Second Division and I thought it might be interesting to select a side consisting of players who have impressed me most.

My team would be: Jake Findlay (*Luton*), Colin Todd (*Birmingham*), Glen Roeder (*QPR*), Steve Wicks (*QPR*), Dennis Rofe (*Leicester*), Carl Valentine (*Oldham*), Tony Grealish

(*Luton*), Trevor Brooking (*West Ham*), David Moss (*Luton*), Alan Young (*Leicester*), Bob Hatton (*Luton*). Substitute: Andy Peake (*Leicester*).

Some of the above players I have seen only once this season, others two or three times. In addition I have picked the team giving due consideration to balance and blend so that one player's weaknesses are compensated by another's strengths.

One might expect the goalkeeping spot to be filled by one of the expensive buys like Phil Parkes (*West Ham*) or Chris Woods (*QPR*), but Findlay had an inspired day when I saw him and I have yet to see a better performance from a 'keeper.

Colin Todd is a class defender with enough ability to play at the back or in midfield and his obvious quality made him the outstanding player when I saw Birmingham recently. To complete the back line I have chosen Dennis Rofe of Leicester — despite the two "flukes" he scored at the Vetch! Rofe is a quick, aggressive player with a

good left foot and enough ability to make positive attacking runs in support of front men.

The Division is blessed with a considerable wealth of quality defenders, as witnessed by the omission from my team of the likes of Billy Bonds (*West Ham*), Richard Money (*Fulham*) and that tremendous character, Joey Jones (*Wrexham*).

In the central positions, I have plumped for Tony Grealish and Trevor Brooking, two very different types of players but both very effective. Grealish is always available and he rarely wastes possession, being very aware of situations around him and is an excellent passer of the ball. Brooking, of course, is a world-class player with marvellous control and passing ability and the fact that he can hold down a regular England place whilst playing Second Division football is a testament to his class. To complete the mid-field I have included David Moss of Luton, a consistent goal scorer this season and a deadly penalty taker.

My front two are both the type of player who will cause problems even if they aren't scoring goals themselves. Young moved from Oldham to Leicester at the start of the season, his goals being a major factor in establishing Leicester amongst the promotion contenders and his non-stop aggressive style makes him a handful for any defence. Luton team walked off at half time with the fans showing their anguish by responding with the slow handclap.



FULHAM



After finishing last season in a respectable mid-table position, Fulham find themselves fighting for Second Division survival this term. Bobby Campbell's team accumulated 41 points by the end of last season, but this time — before last week's game against Leicester City — had managed to scrape together only 15 from 25 matches.

But Fulham startled many pundits on the opening day of the season when they visited newly relegated Birmingham City and, after being 3-1 down at half-time, mounted a tremendous fight-back to win 4-3 with Gordon Davies hitting a hat-trick.

Davies arrived at Craven Cottage — his first professional club — from Southern League Merthyr Tydfil for only £2,000 and made a tremendous impact on the Second Division scene at the start of this season.

After his hat-trick against Birmingham, he hit two more in the 3-1 home victory over Burnley on 15th September and, the following week, lashed in another hat-trick in the 3-3 away draw at Leicester.

Before last weekend, the Londoners had won only three home games. Six points from three away victories, coupled with three points from as many draws, leaves Fulham with much hard work in front of them in their bid to escape that dreaded drop into the Third Division.

Campbell has an experienced 'keeper in Gerry Peyton, an Eire international who had 30 games with Burnley before his

transfer from the Lancashire club. But Peyton has been beaten 28 times this season in 13 away games — and Fulham have lost nine of them.

Defender Tony Gale has been playing consistently this season and earned the Man of the Match award in Fulham's recent 2-1 defeat at Burnley where a goal only seven minutes from the end robbed them of a draw. Standing over six feet tall, Gale joined Fulham from school and progressed into the senior side through the club's youth policy.

Geoff Banton is another young defender. He failed to force his way into Bolton's first team — his first club and a transfer to Plymouth produced only six appearances, plus one as substitute, before a third move took him to Fulham. He broke into the senior side last season with seven games.

Les Strong provides most of the experience to help Fulham's youngsters in their attempts to find Second Division stability. Born in London, Strong has over 200 League appearances to his credit since arriving from Crystal Palace where he failed to push his way into the first team.

Midfield sees more experience in the shape of John Beck, who started his professional career in London with Queens Park Rangers where he tucked 32 first team games under his belt before a transfer took him to the Midlands and a spell with Coventry City. Sixty games and

six goals later, he was on the move again, this time to Fulham where he missed only ten games last season.

Also in midfield, Richard Money was a recent buy and has been partnering Beck and Brian Greenaway, another London born player who has spent all his professional career with Fulham.

In attack, Teddy Maybank returned for his second spell with Fulham when he was bought back from Brighton. Maybank scored six goals in 28 appearances for his first club, Chelsea, before knocking in 14 for Fulham. Those goals attracted the attention of Brighton who paid a then record fee of £195,000 to secure his transfer to the south coast.

But his goals partly dried up with Brighton when he scored 14 times in 51 matches, and Campbell decided he was the player to boost Fulham's scoring record.

The much travelled Chris Guthrie also forms part of Campbell's squad. Guthrie, born within site of the Tyne, joined Newcastle before moving on to have spells with Southend, Sheffield United and Swindon before signing for Fulham. His total of over 75 League goals obviously caught Campbell's eye.

Campbell's attack is made up by Peter Marinello, a £30,000 signing from Motherwell. He began his career with Hibs, joining Arsenal for £100,000 in January 1970. He spent three seasons with Portsmouth before returning to Scotland.
