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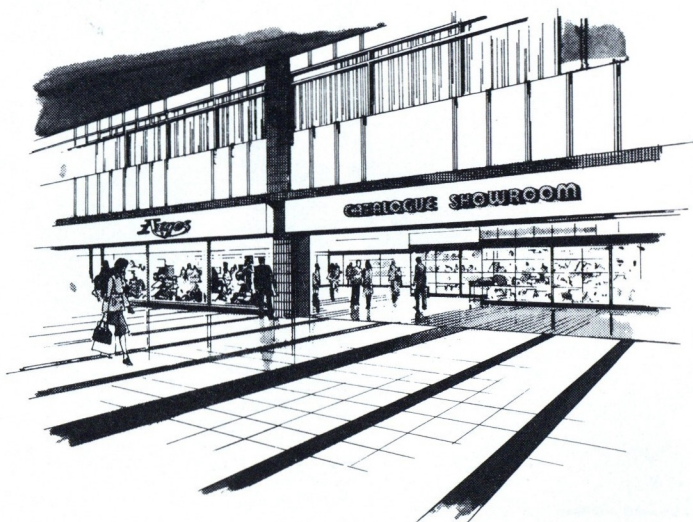

MICHAEL WALE REPORT

Michael Wale, well known for his TV Sports report and "Evening News" articles, will be interviewing members of our staff during the season and will be expressing his views on all aspects of the soccer scene.



Returning to the Midlands last Saturday afternoon, after watching the Watford match on the Friday night and attending the lanching of the Town Mead Youth Club appeal in Fulham (where I spent most of the time discussing the previous night's match with Hammersmith's Mayor and and QPR fanatic Bill Smith), I reflected on not being able to read a match report that recorded every move of Rangers' draw.

It is really horrific that the capital city of England should not print a sporting paper on Saturday night. In our neck of the Midlands you can get either the excellent Coventry Evening Telegraph or the Birmingham Mail. Both give verbatim reports of their teams. Even when the News and the Standard deigned to print on Saturdays they often gave us short shrift. So I am thinking of launching my own Michael Wale Report, cyclo-styled on a Saturday and available in certain selected local pubs and newsagents... if they would handle it.

It was one of the joys of my youth to read the buff or green coloured sports editions in Leicester, recording the doings of the city. A real supporter cannot read too much about his or her team! I would write 1,000 words of report, and add some news about Rangers. Surely there would be a demand and I would become a 1p millionaire overnight— But seriously don't you like to savour a match afterwards in more words than the National Press permit us? For example it would take several hundred words to describe Tony Curry's amazing thirty yard goal a week ago. A perfect dead ball rehearsed move if you ask me. And not so many minutes later going forward, this time without a free kick, the same player was only inches over the bar with a similar shot from 25 yards. In fact I feel that if we had shot more at the unsettled Steele in the Watford goal we would have won. Enough to say that the goal we let in was as bad as the goal which cost Nottingham Forest the League Cup last Saturday afternoon. I admired the irrespressible Brian Clough when he produced the two 'culprits' either side of him on ITV last Sunday and let them own up in public. As it was, it was Peter Shilton who accepted the blame. I agree with him, and thought our ex-centre half David Needham did the right thing in chesting the ball down to a non-existent 'keeper.

One of the privileges of my job is that I go into the Players' Room after some matches. Needless to say they weren't in the best of moods last Friday.

Steve Wicks, who seems to improve game by game, was philosophical enough, and so too was Gordon Hill, our last few minutes substitute. Positively chirpy in fact. I long for him to regain the form that had the Manchester United fans under a spell! Because when he is on top of his game he is the most wonderful talker about it. So too is Steve Wicks for that matter and our 'keeper Chris Woods, who had a wonderful game against Watford. Recalling that game I must mention Clive Allen and Paul Goddard, who really are becoming a deadly duo up front, but I felt at times when four towering giants were lined up behind them they needed some help. It was a David and Goliath action replay. If I were to criticise Rangers for anything it would be that we did not play wide enough and use the open spaces; after all, although you could not fault Watford for effort, they were not the most skilful team I have seen. From my seat where I was surrounded by First Division managers like Terry Venables of Crystal Palace and Keith Burkinshaw of Spurs I felt slightly embarrassed at some of the football. Terry's guest was writer Gordon Williams, who wrote the Hazell scripts for Thames-TV with him, and also the book about never playing on grass again. Gordon is one of those writers who lives the part the public think writers and artists live. At half time he asked where he could phone his wife from. "She'll never believe I'm watching QPR v. Watford", he moaned. It was true. He wrote a book called The Siege of Trencherman's Farm, which was turned into the film The Straw Dogs. Now he is working on another film and 'thinking of becoming a producer'. Despite his career as a highly successful football manager, Terry Venables still remains his writing partner. At half-time we all admired a photo, in the Visiting Directors room, of a Rangers five-a-side team of the past that won at Wembley. Suffice to say that not only Terry was in that team but Phil Parkes and Rodney Marsh.

After the match I met a director of the Northern Irish club Glentoran, who said that we should sign up Dave McCreery's brother, who is a full back. I was assured that although he is a lot older than his brother he would be a snip financially. Being a typical Irishman this gentleman had just returned from Cheltenham Races. And had only come to Rangers because the doorman of his hotel told him there was match on. Thank you, Mr. Doorman.

You meet Rangers' fanatics everywhere,

and surely I am one of the leading fanatics! Only the other day I went into a small bistro called La Vie En Rose, near the Middlesex Hospital for their 'special' lunch when the owner approached me and recounted accurately how we had lost to Leeds United the first time we were in the First Division. For the record they scored very early after the kick off when the floodlights failed. Despite the goal being in darkness at the time the referee allowed the goal. I remember it perfectly too because that night I had been asked to do a blow by blow account for Radio Leeds, who really only wanted to know what their own team was doing. We were bottom of the First Division at the time and Leeds were on the way to the Championship. We lost by that only goal and afterwards Don Revie said that if anyone had watched the match and not known who the two teams were they would have said we were top of the division and that Leeds were bottom. It was a totally truthful compliment at the time.

I understand that when Ron Jones was on Radio London the other week there were callers who said why didn't I write more about the players? Well, for the record I have interviewed all our first team regulars this season, but do promise for the next game to do what they call an in-depth piece involving our two young heroes, Clive Allen and Paul Goddard.

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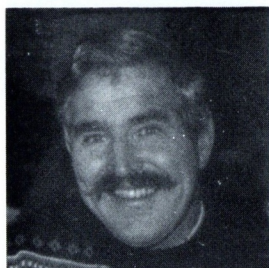

Luton Town

Our Statistics Wizard has assembled one of the best collections of club records in the Football League and uses it to look back on the other times we have played today's visitors.

We haven't played Luton at Loftus Road for just over 5 years, the last occasion being on 1st March 1975 - when we beat them 2-1. This completed a hat trick of home wins, for we also beat them 2-0 in 1973 and 1-0 in 1971.

Luton's last win at Loftus Road, and, indeed, their last victory home or away, was on 29th September 1970, when they beat us 1-0. A look back through the records reveals that apart from 1970, and a 3-0 win in 1948 - these are Luton's only 2 wins at Loftus Road since 1924. Of the matches played since then, we have won 17, 5 have been drawn, and Luton have won twice.

Another strange fact to emerge is that apart from their 3-0 win in 1948, they haven't scored more than one goal in a match down here since 1928.

A look at our record at Kenilworth Road, reveals that recently, we have done rather well. Treble chance experts should remember this fixture, for we have drawn

our last 5 matches there, and 6 out of the last 7. We have only lost 2 of our last 12 visits there since 1937. Although prior to 1937, we only obtained 1 point there in 8 visits.

Should we score 3 goals today, the 3rd one would be our 400th at home in the 2nd Division.

Our record score against Luton was in 1964, when we beat them 7-1. Roger Morgan, Mike Keen (3) - including 2 penalties, and Brian Bedford (3) were our scorers.

Today's match will be our 3169th professional game, our 412th Second Division game, and the 91st time that we have played Luton.

Up to, and including 14th March, Luton's complete league record read:-

Luton's biggest win against us was in 1931, when they beat us 5-1 at Kenilworth Road. Our 1-1 draw with Watford brings our record against London clubs at Loftus Road to only 1 defeat in 19 matches.

Fancy our chances against Shrewsbury next week? We have only lost 1 of our last 6 league matches there - the last two meetings have ended in 0-0 draws. At Chelsea? Well, there's a good chance of one of the teams scoring 3 goals. We drew 3-3 in 1974, won 3-0 in 1974/75, lost 1-3 in 1978 and won 3-1 in 1979.

TONY PULLEIN

The League's top Feature Writer examines the past playing history and achievements of today's opponents. Tony also writes the Pen Pictures on the back page.

Luton's promotion hopes took a severe knock when they were beaten at home by Cardiff last weekend. Apart from losing two very valuable points, the Hatters also lost top scorer David Moss who had to be taken off with a badly bruised ankle after putting his side into the lead.

The Hatters had defender Mal Donaghy off the field for treatment when Cardiff equalised and they later conceded a second goal in a match they were desperately unlucky to lose. But that's the sort of luck that many teams encounter when they are trying to pull themselves back from a run of adverse results. The Cardiff set-back was Luton's fifth game without a win and, unless they can get back to winning form today, Luton could begin to see their promotion ambitions fade.

Manager David Pleat spent a great deal of time this week trying to get his team back into the right frame of mind for the tough closing weeks of the season. Unless he is forced to by injuries, however, he is unlikely to make any changes. The Luton side has remained virtually unchanged throughout the season.

Jake Findlay has been in goal protected by a back four of Kirk Stephens, Mike Saxby, Paul Price and Mal Donaghy. The midfield usually lines up with Tony Grealish, Ricky Hill and Alan West on parade while the attacking line-up has been Brian Stein, David Moss and Bob Hatton.

Mark Aizlewood, a regular member of the defence last season, has come in for only the occasional game while Steve White, a £175,000 signing from Bristol Rovers earlier this season, has made most of his appearances as substitute.

Mr. Pleat has really worked wonders with his squad this season. Last term the Hatters were an average middle-of-the-table outfit but now, with only three more signings, they are running so strongly for promotion. Last summer the manager spent what was then a club record £200,000 to sign Mansfield defender Mike Saxby and then upped the record to £300,000 when securing the signature of Orient's Republic of Ireland international midfielder man Tony Grealish. This season he bought Steve White, a forward of midfield player, from Bristol Rovers for £175,000.

Luton took early exits from both Cups, being beaten by Third Division sides in each competition. Gillingham ousted them 4-1 on aggregate from the first round of the League Cup whilst Swindon beat them 2-0 at Kenilworth Road in the third round of the F.A. Cup.

Luton's attacking policies have brought goals galore from their twin strike force of

Dave Moss and Bob Hatton. Moss's hat-trick against Fulham in mid-February took his total for the season to 21 while Hatton had scored 12 times at the same stage.

Since then, however, their sharpness seems to have been blunted. Until Moss scored against Cardiff last week neither had added to his total in five games.

Away form has been particularly disappointing since the turn of the year and their last four away games have produced only one point from a 1-1 draw at Preston.

Perhaps Luton have taken too cautious an approach since the pressures began to mount? They got to the top by taking a few chances, scoring a lot of goals. Though it's natural to adapt tactics as the season progresses, Luton appear to have been adopting a style of play that is alien to their talents in recent weeks. But of course there's still time to right the situation.

The Kenilworth Road club almost had to close down about five years ago due to crippling debts. But, by shrewd selling of players and stringent economies, the Hatters have now pulled through the crisis and can look forward with much confidence to the future.

Chairman Dennis Mortimer tells some hair-raising stories of the days when Luton seemed certain to crash. The sale of Peter Anderson to Royal Antwerp for £60,000 kept the club in being and, largely through Mr. Mortimer's expert financial guidance, the club somehow pulled through until this season he was able to announce with pride that Luton were finally free of debt.

The club's last spell of First Division football lasted for only one season. In spite of a wonderful late run, Luton suffered immediate relegation at the end of 1974/75.

They were a First Division club earlier on, from 1955 until 1960, and in 1959 they reached the final of the F.A. Cup. Luton lost to Nottingham Forest 1-2.

After losing their First Division place in 1960, Luton slumped into the Third Division three years later and, by 1965, they found themselves in Division Four for the first time. They recovered their Third Division status in 1968 and two years later they returned to Division Two.

Now they can widen their horizons again as the First Division beckons them.

BRIEFING What's happening in Football

Last Saturday's Wembley defeat brought to an end Nottingham Forest's unbeaten run of 25 League Cup ties - a competition record.

Former Ranger Don Givens scored on his debut for Bournemouth at Harlepool last Saturday. He is currently on loan to the Cherries from Birmingham.

Wembley's gate receipts of £641,000 for last week's final were a League Cup record.

When Chelsea, Millwall and ourselves suffered relegation at the end of last season, it was the first time three London clubs suffered that fate in the same season. Sadley, Charlton, Fulham (in Division 2) and Wimbledon (Division 3) seem almost certain to repeat the process. And, if Brentford go too, they could set up a new record.

The big boot and the big kick ruled at Shepherds Bush. With Rangers finishing failing to match their approach work, it was Sunderland's spoiling, brawny defenders who hewed a hard-won draw in this depressing and frenzied battle for promotion points. The Roker defensive heroes in a harsh, tense, tight-marking struggle were 18-year-old Bobby Hindmarsh, their skipper, Steve Whitworth and Jeff Clarke with Shaun Elliott putting together a good technical midfield show after a shaky start. For QPR, Steve Wicks, right back Don Shanks and in particular, the creative Ian Gillard, snuffed out the visiting forwards. While Rangers' 'keeper, Chris Woods, had so little to do in the first half that his manager Tommy Docherty sent him out for a warm up at half-time, Sunderland 'keeper Chris Turner earned his wages with two magnificent saves. Early on, after Paul Goddard - who worked hard all through - had flicked the ball on to Clive Allen, Turner rushed from goal to block Allen's close-range shot with his legs. (Alan Hoby, "Sunday Express".)		Rangers looked more than a class above their hosts, who now seem doomed to tasting Third Division football next season for the first time in their lives. The Londoners' 'keeper Chris Woods had so little to do that he spent the entire interval warming up under the crossbar with sub. Gordon Hill taking potshots at him. The afternoon was scarcely under way when Ian Gillard knocked the stuffing out of Burnley with a third minute goal. Rangers then celebrated with a demonstration of the art of passing and dribbling with Currie in quite unstoppable mood dictating affairs from every quarter. Steve Burke's pace left the Burnley defence floundering and the ball he put across at tremendous speed was chested down by Allen and driven home on the half-volley. Burnley picked up a fistful of bookings - evidence only of their mounting frustration. Rangers took their tally in this season's two meetings between the clubs into double figures with a cracking third goal a couple of minutes from the close. (Ronald Kennedy, "Sunday Express".)

WHEN IS RANGERS' CENTENARY?

Some trace our history back to 1885, others to 1882. I can testify to 1882 because I took the place on the Board of George J. Wodehouse **who was there in 1882**. (He was the father of George F. Wodehouse who served many years as Director, then Chairman and now a Vice President). Before he died in 1947. George Wodehouse, Senior told us the story of the club's formation. He was an original member of the boys' club Christchurch Rangers when that team started in 1882. Also in 1882 J. McDonald and Fred Weller formed a team from the boys of Droop St. School, Queens Park London W. and when they became interested in the Boys' Brigade at St. Judes Church they adopted the name St. Judes F.C. in 1885. One day in 1886 a friend of the family came to watch George Senior play for Christchurch Rangers against their old rivals St. Judes F.C. In the St. Judes team was Albert Pearsall who, like George Wodehouse of Christchurch Rangers, later became a QPR Director. On the way home George's friend remarked that an amalgamation of the two sides would bring about a really good team. The idea took concrete form a few weeks later when some of the Christchurch Rangers of Paddington formed St. Judes F.C. of Queens Park, but, on the question of a name neither organisation would give way. Eventually St. Judes succeeded with "Queens Park" to which Christchurch added "Rangers". This however was

not a complete amalgamation of the two clubs, for the rest of Christchurch continued for, a few years under the name of Paddington.

Queens Park Rangers became one of the senior amateur clubs in the South. In 1898 the present company was incorporated (at a meeting at St. Judes Institute!) and the first professional league match was played in September 1899. In 1967 the Rangers won the Football League Cup at Wembley and in 1976 became Runners-up in the First Division of the Football League.

Those two men, who in due course both became QPR Directors were on rival sides. Albert Pearsall tracing St. Judes F.C., Queens Park back to 1885 (formerly Droop Street 1882) while George Wodehouse went back to 1882 with Christchurch Rangers. Joining the Board in Feb. 1948, when Queens Park Rangers F.C. was well established, and having known both Albert and George (Senior) I vote for the earlier date - which would make Queens Park Rangers Centenary Year 1982. What do you say?

(★ **EDITOR'S NOTE:** In view of the fact that a club's history is recorded from the time its earlier teams started playing and NOT from the date at which it gained its present name, it is clear a case exists for our Centenary Date to be reckoned from 1882. Unless a challenge arises to this proposition, we shall act on it accordingly.)

CHRIS WOODS

Chris's transfer to Rangers last summer did more than earn him a place in League soccer for the first time. His outstanding displays won him a game in the England U-21 side against Bulgaria in November.

DON SHANKS

Play-anywhere Don has been much more settled this season, filling the right-back spot for much of the campaign. A former Fulham apprentice, Don turned professional with Luton and came to The Bush in 1975.

IAN GILLARD

Consistent Ian has been a member of our first-team for more than ten years now. His stylish displays at left-back earned him three full England caps and further honours at under-23 level.

DAVID McCREERY

David is a regular member of the Northern Ireland team. He spent seven years with Manchester United, appearing in two F.A. Cup finals, before joining us last summer for £200,000.

BOB HAZELL

Bob is only in his third season of League football but he has quickly grown in stature. Already he is an England "B" and under-21 international and we had to pay £240,000 to sign him from Wolves earlier this season.

STEVE WICKS

Steve entered League soccer with Chelsea in 1975 and soon became an outstanding First Division centre-back. Derby paid £575,000 for him last season and we had to go above that figure to persuade the Rams to part with him this season.

PAUL GODDARD

Paul got his big break in 1977/78 and earned a regular place mid-way through last season. He is currently enjoying by far his best season and is now one of our leading scorers.

GLENN ROEDER (Captain)

Glen can perform equally well as a central defender or as a midfielder player and this versatility has already earned him England "B" honours. He began his career with Orient and we signed him for £250,000 in 1978.

CLIVE ALLEN

Clive has been the Second Division's leading scorer for most of the season. He showed his potential when introduced to the side last season, hitting four goals in only four full League appearances.

TONY CURRIE

Tony, who joined us last summer from Leeds for £400,000, has 15 England caps. He began his career with Watford and later served Sheffield United before going to Leeds in 1976.

STEVE BURKE

Steve didn't get into Nottingham Forest's League eleven but he soon got his chance after joining us last summer. He made his League bow against Fulham in September and has been a fairly regular member of the side since.

JAKE FINDLAY

Jake got only 14 chances to play in Aston Villa's League team and his career really didn't begin to flourish until his £100,000 transfer to Luton last season. Now he is hoping to get the chance to play for Scotland.

KIRK STEPHENS

Kirk joined the club from Nuneaton Town and went into the first-team last season. Now he is firmly settled at right-back. He scored his first League goal on Boxing Day this season — it gave Luton a 1-0 win at Watford.

MAL DONAGHY

Mal won N. Ireland under-21 honours in his Larne Town days. Luton signed him for £20,000 during the 1978 close-season and now he has switched from midfield to left-back. He has been included in the N.I. squad for the coming World Cup Tie v. Israel.

4

TONY GREALISH

Luton increased their club record payout to £300,000 when they signed Tony from Orient last summer. He had spent the previous five seasons in the O's first-team. Tony won his 12th Republic of Ireland cap against England in February.

5

MIKE SAXBY

Luton paid a then club record fee of £200,000 to sign Mike from Mansfield last summer. He had worked his way into the Stags' senior team for a couple of games in 1975/76 but last season he was ever-present.

6

PAUL PRICE (Captain)

Paul has been with the club since 1971 and he has been a regular first teamer for the past three-and-a-half years. He completed 150 League appearances for them this season.

7

RICKY HILL

Ricky first signed for Luton as a schoolboy in May 1975 and later completed his apprenticeship with the club. He made his first-team bow in 1975/76 and has been holding his place for the past three years.

8

ALAN WEST

Alan is a former England under-23 international who first entered League soccer with Burnley in 1970. Luton paid £80,000 for him in 1973 and he has now played more than 250 League games for the club.

9

BRIAN STEIN

Brian is a local discovery who came into the first-team two seasons ago. He scored 11 goals last season and has hit six so far this term.

BOB HATTON

Bob served Wolves, Bolton and Northampton before becoming a top scorer for Carlisle. Birmingham paid a then record £85,000 for him in 1971 and sold him to Blackpool for £50,000 five years later. After topping their list, he joined Luton in 1978.
