MAJOR CHANGES FOR JUNIOR HATTERS

There is no doubt that, if Luton are to succeed in their attempts to secure more support through the turnstiles, the club will have to investigate all the avenues open to them. Chief executive John Smith is a firm believer in youth and, in that respect, we announce today major new changes in the format of the Junior Hatters Club.

Mr. Smith believes juvenile supporters will, over the years, provide the club with its main support, and strenuous efforts will be made next season to involve youngsters with Luton Town. We want them to belong to the club, and believe parents will encourage their children to watch the team when they appreciate what we can offer.

The first major step announced today is the appointment of Colin Ball as Youth Development Manager. As a staunch member of the Century Club, Colin is already vastly familiar with Luton Town and its organisation. His immediate aim will be to encourage 1,000 children to watch every home match next season, and to offer them facilities which we believe will be second to none in the Football League.

Mr. Smith explained the appointment, and Luton's future policy on young supporters, by saying: "Our long term plan must begin at the grass roots — and that must involve youngsters whom we hope will become regular supporters over the years.

"In our ten year plan, we hope to increase support by 50 per cent, and the involvement of youngsters with the club is a major part of our plans. The plan is highlighted by Colin's appointment and he will start work with us before the start of the season.

"His priority will be to attract youngsters to watch the team through liaison with youth organisations and schools by spelling out what we can offer.

"We aim to concentrate on a programme of events which will involve youngsters not only in watching the team, but also provide them with the opportunity of being involved in the club. We want to provide them with their own pre-match entertainment and hopefully offer a package deal to them with the help of local companies who may be prepared to sponsor their day out.

"But perhaps the most significant benefit is our intention to provide the youngsters with their own enclosure which will be ready for the start of next season. By taking that action, we can show parents that their children will be free to watch a game in safety. In addition to their own enclosure, we will also provide their own toilets, turnstiles and refreshment bars.

"We are currently talking to several local companies who are interested in participating in the scheme and who also want to become involved with the keen community spirit we want to foster.

"The importance of succeeding with the venture is paramount and we want to develop it as part of an increased function of the Junior Hatters Club, and it is likely current members will retain their membership. We also plan to give the Junior Hatters a bigger say of their own in next season's magazine.

"We are making big strides forward and the last thing we want is for children to watch the team and then go away to forget it. It is important they retain their link with the club."

Further details of this exciting new scheme will be made in the magazine as and when information becomes available. But, in the next edition of the magazine for our home game against Shrewsbury a week today, we will invite Mr. Ball to give his views on the Junior Hatters Club.

It is never easy for referees to decide intent, but where there is doubt, I would prefer to see a quiet word rather than that horrible yellow card!

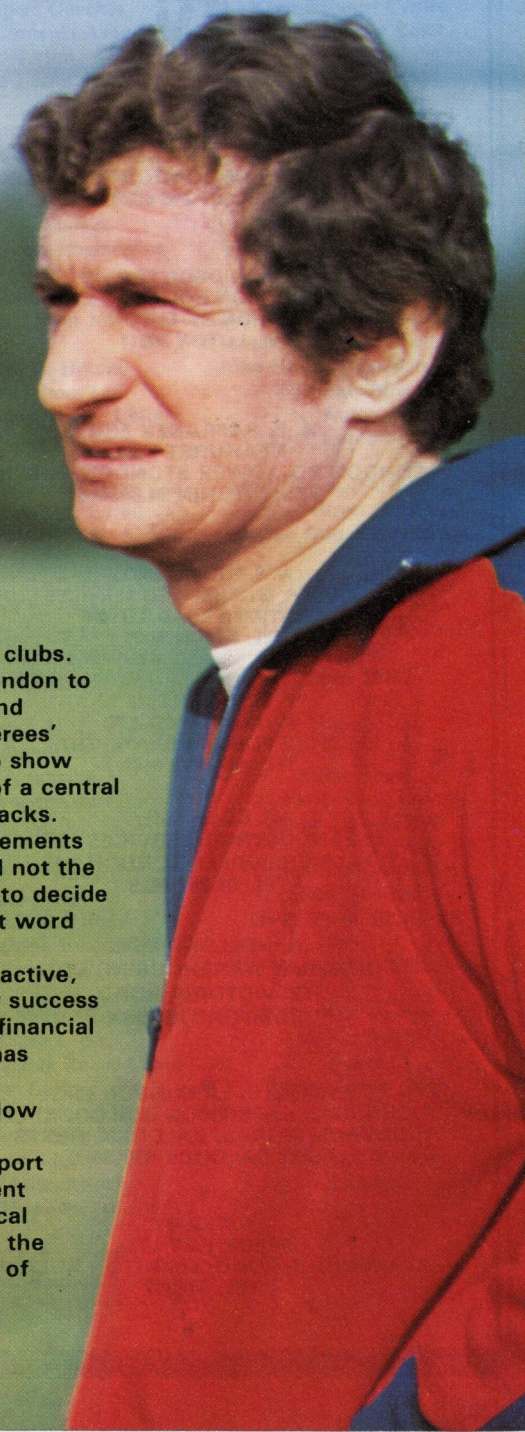


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JOHN'S JOTTINGS



Today's game is the one many people have waited for all season — the local derby with our friends from Watford.

I believe this is the 46th League meeting between our clubs but it is not the case of who has won the most which counts today. The onus is on you, the fans. Not only the Press, but people involved in the running of football will be watching your actions this afternoon. Let's out-shout the opposition, by all means, but let's have no other ugly incidents which we have seen here lately. I have said before — you hurt only the club, and we can't afford to pay the heavy fines which could be incurred should trouble develop. The more noise you make, the better the atmosphere. Let us hope that we can repeat our victory of Boxing Day when Kirk Stephens scored the only goal in the last seconds of the game.

Watford turned professional in 1897, and played at Cassio Road before arriving at Vicarage Road in 1919. Their highest victory is 10-1 against Lowestoft in the FA Cup in 1926, and their record defeat was by Wolves, again in the FA Cup, when they were beaten 10-0. Cliff Holton still holds the highest scorer in a season with 42 goals in season 1959-60. The men who have sat in the driving seat since the war reads like a football 'Who's Who'. Names such as Jack Bray, Eddie Hapgood, Hayden Green, Ron Gray, Len Goulden, Neil McBain, Ron Burgess, Bill McGarry, Ken Furphy, George Kirby and Mike Keen have all done their share in a bid to take the club into the higher reaches of the League. Players moving between our two clubs have not been very numerous — Peter Turner did the journey in the early 1900's, followed in later years by Tony Gregory and Alan Garner. I can't recall any players coming from Watford to Luton. I have no doubt that someone will tell me differently.

I have had many letters from people voicing their opinion on Friday night football, and they all have one thing in common as far as Luton fans are concerned — Friday night is definitely not football night. Out of town fans usually have to leave work early to make a 7.30 kick-off, whilst shift work is the main problem for factory workers living locally. LUTON FIVES A HUGE SUCCESS

Luton's involvement with the community spirit has paid handsome dividends in the shape of a five-a-side competition which involved the club's players and officials with 600 youngsters in the town and surrounding areas.

The tournament culminated with the finals on the Hatters Community Arena when Luton manager David Pleat presented the youngsters with their plaques and medals.

The league was organised by Luton Council's Leisure Services department in conjunction with the club and their players. Each team was named after a Luton player and Kirk Stephens' Dunstable Wanderers won the junior section with another of his teams, Ashcroft Co-op, winning the senior section.

The final emphasised the good football which had been evident throughout the tournament with Dunstable Wanderers beating Tony Grealish's Dunstable Young People's Club 3-2 after extra time.

The manager has been an ardent supporter of the tournament — the first event of its kind which has involved a Football League club. It was so successful that there are plans to run it again next year.

The players showed their encouragement by taking their teams training and have opened various functions and presented prizes. "It has proved we are prepared to become involved with the community," said the manager. "It was a very worthwhile exercise."

The draw was held at a meet the players evening where Ken Gutteridge, Luton's assistant manager, and physiotherapist John Sherridan were rewarded to see 300 young players, coaches and managers, crowd into the room to meet their player.

They were divided into four leagues of four in each group. The first two in each league went through to the next round and carried on in the same way until the top two played each other in the final.

There was involvement of the local community and organisations and a management committee was made up of members of the local community. Local leagues helped with liaison and the Beds FA helped by keeping the cost of the competition to the minimum. The South Beds Referee's Association appointed the officials.

One of the tournament organisers was Luton's Lil Fucillo and trophies were donated by Anthony Evans, the contractor for the Hatters Community Sports Arena. 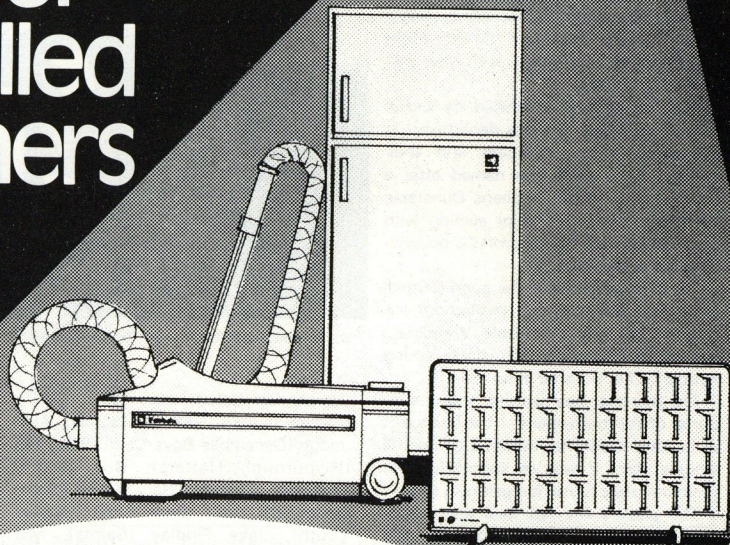
Spare a thought for Blenheim Scouts' goalkeeper, whose back must be aching after conceding 20 goals. The prize for the most original longest named team must be Barnstoneworth United and the hard luck story of the competition was Rovers, who did not reach the semi-finals due to one goal in their goal difference.

The youngest team were Hillborough Hatters who, perhaps, produced the most exciting football, but were knocked out of the semi-finals due to their age. Their reward is to represent Luton at Ipswich in April.

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Football has its area where justice does not always seem to be done and one such grey area concerns free kicks, particularly those awarded to attacking players just outside the penalty area. What I am concerned about is the ease by which a positive creative movement can be killed stone dead by one simple act of foul play, that nullifies the advantage at the expense of a comparatively harmless free kick.

Should we then, not make more of our free kicks and try to place the advantage towards the victims rather than the offenders. A free kick is usually awarded — except in technical breaches such as offside — when an opponent has tried to gain an advantage by foul or illegal means. At the moment, the offenders more often than not achieve their aims, by stopping the flow of play and buying time for their colleagues to regroup in a defensive formation.

Thus a team that had created a quick breakthrough, with maybe only one or two opponents between them and the goal, will suddenly find themselves awarded a free kick, but with eleven members of the defending side between them and the goal. Some reward that for being the innocent party.

One of the ploys commonly exercised by an offending team, is to line up their defensive wall less than the stipulated ten yards from the ball. There then follows a series of gesticulations from the referee, ordering them back.

By this time the offending side have fully organised their defensive strategy and are prepared to repel the attack, which the statistics will confirm is more often than not achieved successfully.

One way of tipping the scales back towards the attacking team would surely be to introduce a rule similar to that adopted in rugby, whereby if the perpetrators of the offence do not retire the statutory distance, the free kick would be moved forward to where they are standing.

As most of these pantomime scenes are enacted near the penalty area the consequences are obvious. Any team employing such spoiling tactics could suddenly find themselves facing a penalty instead of a direct free kick 4 yards outside the box.

A sobering thought for any defence to contemplate, or is it?

Yes! If the offence is punishable by a direct free kick. But if an indirect free kick is awarded the matter becomes very much more involved and open to violation, as the Referees Association found out when they gave the matter serious consideration recently.

Concern was shown that a clever coach might instruct his players to infringe the 10 yard rule against indirect free kicks, in order to bring the ball nearer to the goal line. This would make the angle very acute and also enable the defence to smother the danger with bodies.

For example. An infringement on an indirect kick 12 yards out would bring the ball to within a few yards of the goal. The defending side would then pack everybody onto the goal-line and it would be practically impossible to make a strike on goal.

Should we make more out of Free Kicks



So is there an answer? One leading referee suggested that there should be a secondary penalty. In other words; if as a result of defenders not standing back far enough from the original spot where the kick is to be taken from, the kick is brought forward into the area, a penalty would be awarded irrespective of whether the original offence warranted an indirect or direct kick.

Certainly such a penalty should make it possible for attackers to take their free kicks unhindered and quickly, which is the object of the exercise, but it places a lot of pressure on the referee who has to make a split second decision on whether the defence are 10 yards from the ball.

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TAKING OFF WITH TRICENTROL

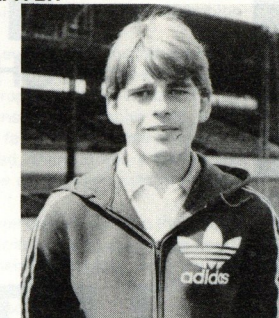

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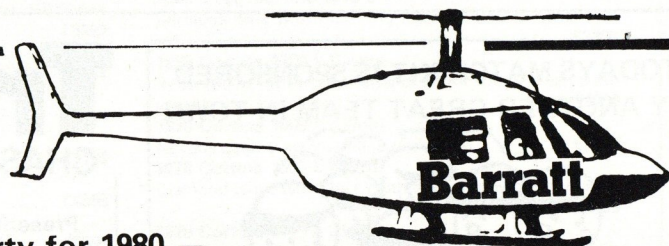
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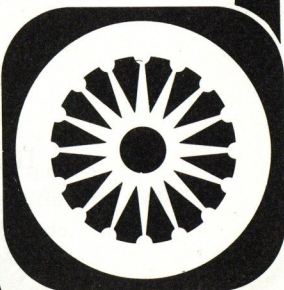
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HERE TODAY WATFORD

A season of struggle to maintain their previous excellent performances of winning promotion from the Fourth and Third Divisions in successive seasons has been overshadowed by Watford's superb FA Cup run.

Like Luton, Watford were eliminated from the Football League Cup by Third Division opposition when they were knocked out by Colchester United.

But not even their own fans could have anticipated the results their team were going to record in the FA Cup. Watford's eye-raising run began in January when, at Loftus Road, the Hornets recovered from conceding an early goal to win 2-1. The fourth round brought a tie against giant killers Harlow Town when, in a nailbiting finale, Watford just beat their non-league opposition 4-3.

That was nothing, however, compared to their next result. Not even the most ardent Watford fan could have expected much change when the draw paired them with Wolves at Molineux. But Graham Taylor's warriors rose magnificently to the challenge by crushing the First Division side 3-0.

But the quarter finals provided a cruel finale for Watford when, after pounding away at Arsenal for 45 minutes, the Gunners' experience finally told when they won — but only by 2-1.

That defeat left Watford clear to concentrate on their bid for Second Division

survival after making tremendous strides since the club appointed Taylor to succeed Mike Keen — a former Luton player — as manager.

They won the Fourth Division Championship in 1978 and sampled Second Division soccer again this season after finishing runners up in Division Three.

Perhaps Watford fans expected too much in such a short time. Taylor had always emphasised that there was no such thing as automatic promotion despite their previous success and, for most of this season, the Hornets have struggled in the lower reaches of the Second Division.

But the yo-yo form throughout the Second Division this season was emphasised when Watford recently travelled to the fancied Newcastle to win 2-0 — the Geordies' first home defeat — and then won a valuable point at Queens Park Rangers to add fuel to the argument that Watford have always been too good to go down.

Taylor certainly hasn't been frightened to spend money in his bid to keep Watford in Division Two. He first looked to Brighton for a striker and paid them £120,000 for Malcolm Poskett, and then bought 'keeper Eric Steele from the same club in exchange for a £100,000 cheque.

Midfield was also strengthened when Taylor signed Sunderland's Wilf Rostron for £150,000, and Martin Patching from Wolves for £125,000. His spree was completed by another £150,000 transfer when

Mike Henderson arrived from Sunderland.

But it was obvious that Taylor would have to trim his staff to cater for the newcomers and departures included Keith Mercer (Southend), Andy Rankin (Huddersfield), Brian Pollard (Mansfield), Roger Joslyn (Reading) and former Luton defender, Alan Garner, who moved on to Portsmouth to try for more promotion luck.

Taylor's rebuilding plans have been so complete that only four players, Ian Bolton, Luther Blissett, Dennis Booth and Ross Jenkins, remain at Vicarage Road from the club's Fourth Division Championship side.

Perhaps even Taylor and his chairman, entertainer Elton John, were surprised with their rapid progress during the last two seasons. But, despite this term's struggle as far as their League programme is concerned, there is still a feeling that Watford are on the right path in the long term.

One of their biggest assets is the support they can command and, even in the Fourth Division, their attendances were the envy of so many other clubs — including some in the Second Division.

Our first meeting this season, on Boxing Day, proved to be a nailbiting affair because, after both sides had failed to provide many clear-cut chances, Kirk Stephens knocked in the Luton winner with almost the last kick of the game.



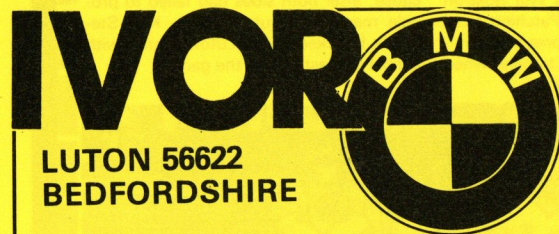
