





PRE-MATCH ENTERTAINMENT

In addition to sponsoring our ambitious youth development programme, the *Evening Post-Echo* — in conjunction with *Bernards World of Sport* — are also responsible for backing our six-a-side cricket tournament which was such a success last season.

We are strong believers in providing our supporters with pre-match entertainment and sincerely hope you enjoy this afternoon's sport with the smaller ball.

CRICKET

The innovation of playing 20-over cricket on the pitch as pre-match entertainment really caught on last year and many will no doubt recall last year's exciting tournament which saw Luton United triumph over Sundon Park.

This year, Luton United will be missing star performer Ossie Clafk, who is now living in America. However they can still call on that talented pair of "Gappa" Hendrickson and Steve Clausden.

Starting favourites for this year's competition will be Chevettes, new champion of the Luton District Midweek League who today take on Luton Indians.

The second semi-final featuring Luton United and Sundon Park will be played on 20th September when we play Orient and the final will be on 4th October.

The game is played under normal MCC rules, except that a side has only six players. Each fielder, except the wicketkeeper, must bowl two overs and the innings is over when 10 overs have been bowled — assuming the opponents last that long.

TODAY'S BALL SPONSOR

TODAY'S REFEREE

CHALLINOR, ARNOLD (Maltby, Nr Rotherham). Commenced refereeing in 1955 with Rotherham Leagues and then via Midland and Central Leagues to the Football League line in 1971 and later to referees' list. Refereed Midland League Championship and Cup Final matches, and lined an International Youth Tournament match in 1976 and a Sixth Round FA Cup match the same year. Officiated in a UEFA Cup match in 1977.

Married, with a married daughter and younger son, is an Assistant Personnel Manager with the National Coal Board. Is interested in Youth Clubs — was part-time youth leader for 10 years — gardening, badminton and table-tennis. Holds a preliminary badge in coaching and also a first aid certificate.

DAVID'S DIARY

Looking at the Second Division fixture list, you realise there are no easy games. At this stage, there is no definite pattern emerging, and there is unlikely to be a side outstanding enough to make everyone else chase.

Our early form has been somewhat mixed, some good play and some not so good, but what we have shown quite clearly is a fine "never say die" attitude, and a tremendous spirit when the opposition is exerting pressure. Every player is different — some are slow starters, some like the heavy going, some find it difficult to adjust to new tactics, etc. We have to take all things into consideration, and make sure that on any day when one or two are below par, the rest pull them through.

Since taking over the club, I have always admired the way Wrexham have played. They try to build attacks with passing football, an extension of manager Arfon Griffiths' attitude and persist with this method regardless of any setbacks. Last season, they had an unkind injury list which stopped their chances, and the previous season suffered terribly through postponements, and didn't play for a period of seven weeks during the season. I have always regarded them as a good promotion chance, particularly as they have goalscorers like Edwards and Vinter supported by McNeil.

The early season attendances have not startled me, for sadly I predicted this. Saturation football, hooliganism, the unemployment position and the role of television have had the effect of combining to dull or deaden the appetite of the public. Regardless of winning or losing, consider carefully that Derby County defeat. We shall continue to do our utmost to entertain and play positive football. It is not in our nature to do otherwise; all our players have awareness and touch and in full stride I can relax and enjoy their efforts. If all teams played to win it would help solve the gates problem.

I notice with some satisfaction that we were highly placed in a national newspaper's entertainment league table after the first two weeks of the season. At the same time, a Hertfordshire newspaper's report of our game against Watford was brought to my attention. It was a stinging biased view of the match. We also lose games as well as winning them and defeat has to be taken on the chin. Fortunately, overall Press reporting is of a high standard.

Although I welcome the television cameras here today, and the exposure, hopefully good, that we might receive, I still believe that their attendance at games is detrimental to regaining crowds. Three times a week, we can sit by our firesides and watch football. What good value for a fraction of the licence fee! Too many people have become "armchair critics". If we deny them this opportunity they might just come back to the terraces out of curiosity, particularly if we all play positive football.

Might I remind supporters that if they have a suggestion, a complaint or something constructive to say about anything other than the team, then they should not write to me direct. In recent weeks, I have had letters arrive on my desk about the programme, season tickets, away travel, etc. I can assure you that I and the hard working coaches have enough to deal with regarding our players! All such letters should be addressed simply to the Luton Town Football Club, and will be dealt with by the appropriate member of staff.

Congratulations to Mark Aizlewood for gaining a further Under-21 cap for Wales and Paul Price also included against Holland as the over-age player. Next week, Paddy Grealish plays for the Republic of Ireland. Further down the scale, Frank Bunn and Alan Cosby have been called up for England Youth training at Lilleshall.

Remember to get behind the team this afternoon. We will not get anywhere this season unless we all pull together.





Football fans will forever argue on the merits and misgivings of managers. Some were born to succeed – Brian Clough is a prime example – others were destined to sink or swim.

Joe Mercer, that patriarch of managers, has always been one of my favourites. He was a man with a ready smile, a certain smile, in victory or adversity. A true philosopher and one of football's rare poets when it came to analysing a match or a magic moment.

Bill Shankly, a master of the extravagant tribute, radiated cocky confidence and was a dream after-match summariser for any reporter bereft of good angles or smart copy.

Alf Ramsey had an icy genius for imparting as little as possible. He would summarily dismiss your question as totally irrelevant or rebut any slick remark that suggested any irreverence. All were highly successful managers in a tough, competitive profession.

Among the younger breed you could not fail to be impressed by Ron Atkinson, a Soccer showman with a big, extrovert personality; quiet-spoken Liverpool maestro Bob Paisley - a man who let his record do the talking - or Forest supremo Brian Clough, who let his distinct distance lend enchantment to his charisma.

BOBBY ROBSON

But for me Bobby Robson takes pride of place simply because he has worked a minor miracle at Ipswich in the last decade and has few peers in the art of man management.

Last October Ipswich were floundering at the foot of the First Division. The rumours were rife that there was deep discontent at Portman Road.


Several established players in the side were clearly below form, fans were critical and Robson faced the biggest crisis in his 11 year career as Ipswich boss.

But Robson has a bulldog tenacity for holding on in such situations. Slowly, but surely, the results started to come. The confidence came surging back and Ipswich went sprinting up the table to pip Arsenal for a coveted place in Europe last season.

He is an intensely ambitious man and part of those early-season troubles were sparked off when his name had been freely linked with Sunderland.

But that came as no surprise. In the past Leeds, Everton and Derby had all tried to lure him away from Portman Road. Ipswich responded by giving him a ten year contract. Then last season mighty Barcelona tried to prise him away with a mammoth offer that was finally blocked by the Ipswich board.

Ipswich had no intention of parting with one of the best managers in the business and he was rewarded

with a testimonial match to prove their loyalty.

SUCCESS

Robson has played a telling part in Ipswich's growing emergence as a First Division power. He has bought and sold shrewdly, backed his players and his board and given the fans of this quiet East Anglian market town the sort of success demanded in Liverpool, Manchester and London.

When he first came to Ipswich he quickly sorted out player problems and launched an enormously successful youth scheme.

When he was forced to sell mid-field star Brian Talbot to Arsenal for a record £450,000 fee, he quickly replaced him with Dutch ace Frans Thissen and still showed a neat £250,000 profit on the deal.

He, once described Ipswich's phenomenal rise as a steady evolution

rather than a startling revolution. Robson can't afford to compete for the £1 million player at a club where gates average around 20,000. He must use his resources wisely.

Says Robson: "Obviously, we cannot compete financially with teams like Liverpool, Manchester United or Manchester City. We haven't got the gates; we haven't got the chimney pots.

"Ipswich is a small town with a population of 120,000. How can you compete on level terms with the Manchesters, Liverpools and Birminghams who draw their support from millions? We're out of the contest geographically. If you go 11 miles east of Portman Road you are in the North Sea. We can't expect the fish to support us, can we?"

But Ipswich are still big fish in the First Division pond!

That luxury went to their Welsh rivals Newport County who knocked them out in the fifth round.

So promotion is currently the main aim of Wrexham manager Arfon Griffiths. But his team made a poor start to the season, taking only one point from their first three games — a record which would not have been acceptable to Griffiths who demands nothing less than 100 per cent from his players.

After reaching the heady heights of the quarter-finals of the Cup Winners' Cup in 1976 when they lost on the away goals rule to eventual winner Anderlecht, Wrexham sampled a good FA Cup run by reaching the sixth round two years later.

That followed promotion to the Second Division for the first time in the club's 105 year history and, since then, Griffiths has taken the opportunity of considerably strengthening his team.

Two players compete for the keeper's position, Dai Davies and Eddie Niedzwiecki. Davies was the Welsh number one choice for several years and arrived at the Racecourse Ground from Everton for an £80,000 fee. A great future is predicted for Niedzwiecki. Born in North Wales with a Polish father, he has deputised capably for Davies and had a run in the first team at the beginning of last season.

Another Welsh international, Joey

Jones, was king of the Anfield Kop where he spent three years with Liverpool. His spell there gave him the boost of all the top honours before moving back to Wrexham for a club record fee of £200,000 in 1978. Terry Darracott is a great competitor who is equally at home in either full-back position. He arrived at Wrexham last September after a spell in America with Tulsa Roughnecks.

Club skipper Gareth Davis led Wrexham to promotion from Division Three in his second season with the side in addition to taking them to the final of the Welsh Cup. Yet another international on the books. John Roberts has represented Wales 20 times and had spells with Northampton and Swansea before joining Arsenal where he was a member of the double winning team in 1971. He moved on to Birmingham before joining Wrexham for £30,000.

Alan Dwyer was switched from a striker to full-back after joining Wrexham from a local junior side while Wayne Cegielski, a much travelled defender, arrived after spells with Northampton and Spurs and in America and Germany. He is a utility player who can play in all defensive positions.

Griffiths' right hand man is assistant manager Mel Sutton. Wrexham bought him for the modest fee of £15,000 from Cardiff and was given the number two job when John Neal left to join Middlesbrough in 1977.

Many of Wrexham's goals have come from Dixie McNeil, one of the most prolific scorers in the game. He has seen soccer with Leicester, Exeter, Corby, Northampton, Lincoln and

Hereford and was voted Wrexham's Player of the Year last season.

To supplement the service for McNeil, Griffiths spent £125,000 on Chester striker Ian Edwards, another Welsh international who progressed from Cheshire League football with Rhyl before moving to West Brom. One close-season capture was Colchester's Steve Dowman, transferred for a £75,000 cheque — a record for the Fourth Division club.

Steve Fox, Frank Carrodus and Ian Arkwright occupy midfield positions. Carrodus figured in two League Cup winning sides and joined Wrexham from Aston Villa in August 1974 for £95,000. Arkwright joined the Welsh club from Wolves after spending a period on loan and was persuaded to make the move permanent at a fee of £100,000.
