

Our Football League Cup third round tie against Manchester City at Kenilworth Road next Tuesday is all-ticket — and today is the last opportunity for season ticket holders to purchase tickets at discount prices.

Season ticket holders can purchase seat tickets for £3 (juveniles and senior citizens £1.50). If you don't purchase a ticket today, full price of £4 will apply and a seat cannot be guaranteed.

Standing tickets are available for season ticket holders at £2 (juveniles and senior citizens £1). Again, after today, full prices will be applied.

Junior Hatters can purchase their tickets, priced 75p for their own *Evening Post-Echo* special enclosure on production of their membership card this afternoon.

We are offering an attractive family package deal in the Junior Hatters *Evening Post-Echo* enclosure. The minimum requirement is the purchase of four tickets to include at least two juvenile tickets, aged 15 or under. The purchase includes one membership of the Junior Hatters Club and costs only £6.

Additional tickets can be purchased for this scheme priced at £2 for adults and £1 for juveniles.

The ticket office will remain open after this afternoon's game until 6 p.m. and will be open tomorrow morning from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. The ticket office will be open on Monday and Tuesday subject to further tickets being available.

MACDONALD IN PRINT

Malcolm Macdonald only wanted to be known as one of England's great centre-forwards, a man with a reputation for goals. From the moment he experienced the excitement of his first goal in League football, he chased his dream with the dedication and the ruthless streak that are needed to wear the number nine shirt.

Born opposite Fulham Football Club, Macdonald became a real-life "Roy of the Rovers" with spectacular goals for Southern League Tonbridge, Fulham, Luton, Newcastle United, Arsenal, and England. His beloved Newcastle fans nicknamed him "SuperMac" after a debut hat-trick against Liverpool.

As one of the most prolific goalscorers in post-war British football, Macdonald got what he wanted, respect from his fellow-professionals. Alan Ball, who sets his standards at the very highest level, describes him as "the best centre-forward I have played with". Praise indeed for a man who has lived with the greats!

There were many more goals to come from Macdonald's lethal left foot when the last of a series of knee operations ended his career at the age of 29.

In 10 years at the top he had figured in hundreds of headlines, made many friends, and upset others with

his forthright and honest opinions. Despite his very public image, there are not many people who can count themselves close to a man who admits that he is basically a private person.

Now Macdonald has compiled a book which reveals his true self and explains what life is like inside football: the pressures, the frustrations, the lies and the truth behind his career.

He gives a brutally frank account of some world-famous football figures, and of the whole football system, and looks into the 1980s with his hopes for the game.

This controversial book is delivered with the same quality with which Malcolm Macdonald played his football: honesty.

There's an entire chapter devoted to his career at Kenilworth Road and, for Luton fans, it provides compulsive reading. Priced at £5.95 and published later this month, it represents excellent value for money.

Macdonald has not pulled any punches. Read his views on Don Revie and other England managers.

PRE-MATCH ENTERTAINMENT

Luton Indians reached the final of our pre-match cricket entertainment when they beat favourites Chevettes in the first semi-final before the Wrexham game by two runs with four balls left.

The Indians won the toss and put Chevettes in to bat. They made a very poor start and never recovered until skipper E. Crawford and O. Jackson got together and carried their score to 69.

The Indians made a slightly better start, but lost two wickets with the score on 17 and 18. But N. Patel and L. Patel knocked up some much-needed runs and pushed the ball around for the odd single and twos.

Chevettes hit back by taking two wickets in two overs and, with one over still left, the Indians needed five runs to win. Nanu Patel finished the match with a straight six into the stand.

Today's second semi-final — the tournament is sponsored by the *Evening Post-Echo* and *Bernards World of Sport* — features Luton United and Sundon Park. The game is played under Normal MCC rules except that each side has only six players. Each fielder, with the exception of the wicketkeeper, must bowl two overs and the innings is completed when 10 overs have been bowled — assuming the opponents last that long.

The final will be played on 4th October.

DAVID'S DIARY



We are pleased to welcome Orient here today. They have always played attractive football and, like ourselves, continue to play a style which suits their players. Having had the good fortune to sell Cunningham to West Brom for a considerable fee, they had even more good fortune to replace him more than adequately with John Chiedozie. Perhaps that good 'fortune' should read good 'judgement' because, make no mistake, it is a skill to know the right time to sell. I hope today's game is as good as last season's encounters with Orient. We shall not forget easily how we squandered a two-goal lead at Orient with two disastrous back passes.

It could not fail to escape my notice that the crowd during the last home game appeared restless with the entertainment provided. If I could fault effort by the players, I would, but I consider they are working and fighting for each other but in one or two cases that vital touch and confidence is missing. We have good players, having a quiet time. In the week prior to Wrexham I increased the training schedule slightly and possibly this had an effect as the conditions on the Saturday were warm and sultry. Any game needs goals to ensure a positive approach. An early goal for the home side makes the away team open up and the chances are an attractive game can emerge. Unfortunately for us, we seemed to lose confidence when Wrexham scored and found even greater difficulty trying to act through the Welsh team's massed defence. I was delighted when Frank Bunn finally succeeded, but it was rather sad that the spectators did not get behind the team in a manner which they have done before.

On the Saturday morning I looked at John Moore's boys in the South East Counties League fixture at Poynters Road. They showed a splendid attitude because, in the first period, they were second best to a lively Brentford side. However, they not only overcame the opposition with their application but they began to play some fine football too. They finished 3-0 winners following their success the previous week at Bristol Rovers. This is the encouragement we need because make no mistake, clubs who think they can buy success at today's prices are on the road to nowhere. The chances already given to Seamus Heath and Frank Bunn have made our intentions crystal clear. We shall continue to give youth its chance. If players for any reason do not train on, or have difficulties taking the pressure, or seek moves because they cannot hold down places, we will show them our sense of fairness by helping them move on to other clubs.

In my time, we have allowed players such as Jim Nichol, David Carr, Graham Jones and Gary Heale moves to further their careers in the lower divisions. All have proved that their grounding at Luton has proved a sound base — and the value of these sales has helped the football side of the club to pay its way.

When we consider that in the times since February 1978 the overall balance on transfers has been little over £100,000 then our achievements are quietly satisfying and in the opinion of some, quite remarkable.

John's Journal

I, like many others, was appalled with the crowd trouble at Oldham two weeks ago, and believe that not only Football Clubs but the Government should give us a directive on how to combat this hooliganism — which seems to be a way of life these days.

There have been talks of community work, "put them in the Army", report to the police at kick-off times, and many other suggestions, but to me that is only pushing the dirt under the carpet. People have said to me if they want to behave like animals, treat them like animals. Fences and cages have had to be erected at every First and Second Division ground and it is then left to the honest supporter to suffer. My idea would be for every Football League club to operate an identity card system. It would be meaningless for just one

or two clubs to operate it, but if every club did it, at least no-one would get into the ground without one. I would suggest that — people who — have them should be aged between 10 and 35. Then, if anyone misbehaved inside the ground, the card could be taken away for a considerable time. Why this element of society has latched on to football, is anyone's guess, and the sooner clubs and Government get together, the better everyone will feel.

Magistrates, too, must play their part. Fining a person £50, or something in that region is a complete waste of time. I believe they have to be hit where it hurts, and that is their freedom. Parents, too, should be held responsible. If any person under 18 is taken to court, I believe their parents should also be there. I was always taught that

responsibility and manners start at home, and I don't think that is far wrong.

Today we welcome our visitors from Orient and hope they have a pleasant afternoon at Kenilworth Road. I know the tremendous amount of work which goes on behind the scenes to keep clubs going on a sound level, and it must be a hard job for them with all the other London clubs virtually on their doorstep.

I have always been made very welcome whenever I called in at Brisbane Road.

Don't forget today is the last day for season ticket holders to obtain their seats or standing ticket for the Manchester City cup-tie. After today anything left will go on sale Monday morning — first come, first served.

Ardiles

Fans are not the only people who have favourite footballers. The players themselves like other players in particular.

So stand up Alan Hansen and Kenny Dalglish of Liverpool, Glenn Hoddle of Spurs, John Robertson of Nottingham Forest, Andy Gray of Wolves, and last — but by no means least — Archie Gemmill of Birmingham City.

That scintillating sextet have been singled out as HIS favourite British footballers by Tottenham's aristocrat from Argentina, the remarkable Osvaldo Ardiles.

There's a particularly interesting international note about "Ossie's" list.

The South American has plumped for five Scottish stars in his list, and is particularly glowing about Archie Gemmill, now in the veteran class after a career spanning Preston, Derby, Nottingham Forest and Birmingham.

The Ardiles tribute to Gemmill comes in the F.A.'s own New Year Book, and could hardly be more flattering:

"... One of the greatest midfield players I have ever seen, and

someone I would always have in my team."

Ardiles is someone virtually every manager in England would like in HIS team.

NOBODY ELSE

But the little midfielder is quite adamant that he will play for nobody else in this country.

He is happy at White Hart Lane. Tottenham are not just happy with him. They are ecstatic, and have given him permission to play for Argentina in mid-season, which will mean the Ardiles skills will be missing from the Football League for almost a month.

But Ardiles will be back, and fans from North London to Newcastle must be glad of that.

The man who won a World Cup medal with Argentina in 1978, says: "Tottenham is a great club, and the only one in England I shall play for".

Tottenham manager Keith Burkinshaw is to be congratulated for pulling off the relatively inexpensive deal which brought Ardiles and Ricardo Villa to London.

Most shrewd judges reckon that he got a good player in Villa and an absolute masterpiece in Ardiles.

BEST OVERSEAS PLAYER?

He is freely considered to be the best overseas player ever to reach these shores.

Yet from East Anglia, I can hear growls of disagreement.

Ipswich fans will make a strong and justified case for their Dutch Masters, Frans Thijssen and Arnold Muhrem as British Soccer's best-ever imports.

Not unnaturally, Ipswich manager Bobby Robson is quick to agree.

"Taking into account what they cost, their ability and the way they have helped improve my side, I'd definitely say Frans and Arnold are the best buys made from overseas," Robson recently assured me.

One thing is certain. Keith Burkinshaw and Bobby Robson did our game a real service by bringing in the Argentines and the Dutch.

They have given our game a new dimension. They have added a touch of colour to what was becoming a drab scene.

But so, of course, have many talented players from North of the Border.

Ossie Ardiles will tell you so.





WELCOME TO

ORIENT

Orient manager Jimmy Bloomfield made a shrewd move when he persuaded Stan Bowles to move back to London after his spell under Brian Clough and Peter Taylor at Nottingham Forest came to an abrupt and perhaps surprising halt.

Bowles has, for one reason or another, had his fair share of the soccer headlines and his short spell at the City Ground lasted only seven months. Bowles left QPR for Forest after winning five England caps but, in July, agreed to return to the capital with Orient.

Bloomfield obviously hopes that the added experience of Bowles in his team will help the Londoners to make a serious challenge for promotion. Bloomfield also has the experience of Ralph Coates as an added asset. Coates began his career with Burnley before joining Spurs in May 1971 and scored their goal which gave them the Football League Cup when they beat Norwich at Wembley in 1973. He made four appearances for the England team before joining Orient on a free transfer in October 1978.

Striker Billy Jennings has a reputation for scoring goals. He hit 35 for our neighbours Watford before a transfer took him to West Ham where he knocked in another 39. He moved to Orient in August 1979. Orient, in fact, have a habit of signing players from other London clubs. John Margerison joined Spurs as an apprentice but later moved to Fulham where he made 40 appearances, scoring nine goals. Like Jennings, he arrived at Brisbane Road in the summer of last year.

Bill Roffey is a former Crystal Palace

apprentice who made 19 appearances for them before moving to Orient almost seven years ago. The London link is continued with Tommy Taylor who won a Third Division Championship medal with Orient in 1970. Later that year, he moved to West Ham when Peter Bennett joined Orient as part of the deal. Nine years later he returned to Orient.

Although not born in London, Ian Moores joined Spurs in August 1976 from Stoke City where he won England Under-23 honours against Wales and Czechoslovakia. He scored in his League debut for Spurs and repeated the move in his first game for Orient in October 1978. Paul Went joined Orient from school and made his debut when only 15. Two years later, he joined Charlton in a deal worth £26,000 and made 160 appearances for them before another move took him to Fulham for £80,000 when he was only 17. Portsmouth paid a club record fee of £155,000 for him before he rejoined Orient after a couple of seasons with Cardiff City.

Keeper Mervyn Day is yet another player with the London connection. He joined the Hammers as an apprentice and played for them in no less than 219 games in addition to winning Under-23 caps against Yugoslavia, France, Wales and Czechoslovakia and a youth cap against Wales. Joined Orient in July last year.

Alan Whittle was formerly with Everton, Crystal Palace and Sheffield United in addition to a spell in Iran for a year, while Joe Mayo made his mark with West Brom. After four years of soccer in the First and Second Divisions with them he joined Orient in

March 1977 and his partnership with Peter Kitchen was a major factor in the club's successful FA Cup run.

But Bloomfield also relies on his youth policy and Tunji Banjo joined the club as an associated schoolboy before signing as an apprentice in 1976. He was upgraded to a full-time professional the following year and made his debut at Bolton in April 1978. John Chiedozie, born in Nigeria, made a rapid rise to senior soccer after signing as an apprentice in 1976. He found himself in the first team when he was only 16 — a year before signing as a full pro.

Kevin Godfrey was a product of South London Schools' football and has been a professional since 1977. He made his debut a year earlier against Chelsea in the Anglo Scottish Cup tournament but played his first League match against Oldham in January 1978. Bobby Fisher is another youngster who has graduated through the youth scheme while Steve Parson signed from Wimbledon earlier this year.
