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

DAVID'S DIARY

We welcome today's visitors who have started the season impressively but not without an untroubled record. In progressing to meet Manchester City in the last 16 of the League Cup accumulating useful League points, they had — before last Saturday — collected 22 bookings and two sendings off. It appears a remarkable record but there can be no doubt they must be playing with tremendous enthusiasm.

People looking at problems of the game have connected indiscipline on the pitch as a catalyst affecting crowd behaviour and causing trouble on the terraces. I tend to disagree. Indeed, I believe it is goals — and the lack of them — which causes restlessness and sometimes violence on the terraces. Recent ideas have suggested identity cards and a ban on alcohol as solutions.

Sometimes, the only way to deter is to punish so severely that the humiliation will ensure that troublemakers think twice. We at Luton hope we can continue our good record and make strenuous efforts to weed out the troublemakers. The thought of the punishment issued to Sheffield Wednesday and West Ham should be an incentive for honest supporters to help keep our record clean.

The Manchester City result was most disappointing. I can take small consolation from our contribution in general play against Orient and City although our defensive work was sloppy. Against Orient, we lost a goal when we should have realised we were not unbeatable within seconds of scoring ourselves. Against City, the first goal we conceded came from irresponsible defensive work and the second was an example of how not to mark attackers in scoring positions. They are lessons we have to learn from if we are to move up the table. To assist our scoring problem, we have signed Andy Harrow from Raith Rovers. We are sure he can make the transition from part-time to full-time soccer successfully. He is 23, just a year older than Kirk Stephens was when he was persuaded to join us from Nuneaton.

Being Scottish, Andy should get on well with Jake Findlay, who also plays golf. I am told there is also healthy competition in that respect from Kirk Stephens, David Moss, Paul Price and Mike Saxby. If they all work hard at their football they will, in later years, have more time to enjoy their hobby.

We will shortly have our training schedule disrupted slightly with Mal Donaghy, Paul Price and Tony Grealish away on World Cup duty. We are, of course, pleased with their emergence on the international scene because honours at that level are harder to obtain outside the First Division. But they are aware that only their best form at club level will be enough to maintain their international status.

John Sheridan, our physiotherapist, has recently been the busiest man at Kenilworth Road. After winning his battle to get Tony Grealish, Paul Price and Raddy Antic fit to play against City, he was immediately back in action with injuries received by Kirk Stephens and David Moss. Considering we employ 28 athletes, John's work is absolutely vital to get them into peak condition.



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John's Journal

Today, we again welcome our visitors from Notts County, the oldest club in the Football League.

In the last League match-day magazine, I talked about various ways of beating the hooligan element. They were my views and not the views of the club. I would like to hear from supporters putting their views to me. I feel most clubs have solved the problem inside the ground, and can quell any trouble very quickly. It is *OUTSIDE* the ground where the trouble begins. I could say it is not our problem, but I won't. We are anxious to help the police with all the problems which arise from our crowds, especially outside the ground.

At the Derby County match, we complied with the safety regulations and had every exit gate open. Consequently, there were problems in Kenilworth Road. Against Manchester City, we kept the

gates closed at the end for five minutes to allow visiting supporters to get away first. The exit gates were forced open by the crowd who were then met by a cordon of police. If the police hadn't put the cordon there, we could have had problems again. So you see what we are up against. I would like to hear from people with their views — provided they are constructive. Even in the smallest way, any ideas are worth looking at.


Looking forward to the West Ham fixture on 15th November, we are not going to make it an "all ticket" match, but I shall issue a pass for the Oak Road end and enclosure to ensure that our regular fans gain admission to these areas. Anyone with out one of these passes will *NOT* be admitted to these areas.

The passes will be issued to peo-

ple — not season ticket holders — at one of our games prior to the West Ham match. I do not want a repetition of what happened last season. If our season ticket holders in the Kenilworth Road end would like to stand in either Oak Road or the enclosure for this game they can.

I am not a believer in all ticket matches, unless for something special. I do not think people will come to the ground twice, once to get a ticket for the game and once for the match itself.

I want to try this system as I think it will ensure visiting fans do not get into the wrong areas.




THIS AFTERNOON'S MASCOT

WHICH SIDE WAS HE ON?

THE SEASON was barely five weeks old and five managers were out of work in the toughest profession in Britain... being a football boss.

The knives were out for Bill McGarry (Newcastle) and Jimmy Adamson (Leeds) long before they got the chop. They were the victims of fan power—a new peril for managers in a most precarious profession.

But Bristol City's Alan Dicks was a shock victim after a 13-year reign at Ashton Gate which made him the longest-serving club manager in the Football League.

Dicks had survived his fair share of traumatic experiences in his long reign at Bristol, but the writing was on the wall last April when City finally dropped out of the First Division.

This term he was under the lash from the start and became the senseless victim of carping fans after five games without a win.

It was a situation he was powerless to prevent as City were over £300,000 in the red and money was not available to go out and make a major signing.

Dicks was offered the opportunity to become the club's general manager. But he declined with the same dignity he had shown in tackling a tough job in a long tenure at Ashton Gate.

He never shirked responsibility in the past and he was not going to opt out when the going got tough.

As he once confided: "Managers worth their salt cannot afford to hide in foxholes when the flak is flying. They must stand up and be counted....."

Bond has been in charge of Norwich for over five years and that

makes him the fourth longest-serving boss in the First Division.

Top grade players like striker Kevin Reeves have had to be sold to bring in urgently needed cash.

Others have had to be bartered to strengthen a team that lacks genuine First Division support.

MOTIVATION

Bond recently publicly admitted that maybe he was losing his powers of motivation at Carrow Road. He was becoming disenchanted with the endless struggle to try and make his team a formidable force when he knew the power of the cheque book is still the strongest weapon in a manager's armoury.

Villa's battle-hardened manager Ron Saunders needs no reminding that a sunny future has only come after surviving a personal crisis at a club beset by boardroom squabbles.

That these managers and many others have survived in such a punishing job is pure testimony to their character.

But as one Third Division manager under intense boardroom pressure put it: "We have no divine right to be right. You can train and pressurise players for a month, but once that kick-off whistle blows you are absolutely at the mercy of your team."

That seems to sum up the bitter irony of bosses whose fate must ultimately rest on the shoulders of the people they employ. But they all know there is no room for errors of judgement.

Managers at all levels feel pressure. Some thrive on it—like Tommy Docherty who says simply: "I love the day to day involvement. The only real pressure in life is when you are in an oxygen tent fighting for breath."

Some just grin and bear it like Peter Madden—currently holder of the hottest seat in soccer at Rochdale where they have had seven managers in seven years.

"People say I have the toughest job in football," says Madden, "and they are right. The list of managers at this club is long because many have surrendered.

"I will not do that because I have been a fighter all my life. I have spent my whole career with clubs like Rochdale. I survived at Darlington so Rochdale has no fears for me.

"Keeping Rochdale out of the bottom four of the League would satisfy most managers. But it won't satisfy me. I want much more. I'm still ambitious."

Rochdale at present are thriving. Madden is more than surviving. He acts as manager, coach, scout and part-time physio. It's men like Madden who keep football going. They must never give up. Football owes them more than a living because they are the life-blood of the game.

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

WELCOME TO NOTTS COUNTY

It's 54 years since Notts County — the oldest club in the Football League — last appeared in the First Division.

And, according to manager Jimmy Sirrel who first took charge at Meadow Lane when County were slumbering in the basement before guiding them to respectability, it's about time they returned.

Sirrel said: "It's seven years since we last won promotion and that means we've been standing still for a long time.

"Our regular supporters have been very tolerant during that period and we owe it to them to do everything within our power to make further progress.

Sirrel guided County to promotion twice in three seasons after moving from Brentford in 1969 and then saw them safely established in the Second Division before switching to Sheffield United. But, 18 months later, he was back at Meadow Lane in an attempt to lift County into a position to emulate their Forest neighbours across the River Trent. He was also the architect behind their 4-1 League Cup victory over QPR last week.

Sirrel heavily relied on the QPR connection at the start of the season when he persuaded Eddie Kelly and Rachid Harkouk to throw in their lot at Meadow Lane.

Kelly was skipper of the Leicester side which won the Second Division Championship last season. He rejected Jock Wallace's offer of a new contract and agreed to join County after starting his career at Arsenal where he figured in the double winning side in 1971. He later moved to

QPR and almost won a Championship medal with them four years ago.

Don Masson is another of Sirrel's former QPR brigade and signed a new two-year contract with County during the close season. He is currently spending his second spell at Meadow Lane and was a member of Scotland's World Cup squad in Argentina.

Harkouk is the third County player with the QPR link. He moved to Palace from Rangers for £100,000 but Sirrel secured his transfer for half that amount after he failed to establish a regular place.

Sirrel obviously hopes his new signing can improve on last season's record when County finished sixth from bottom after relegation seemed more than a distinct possibility. Only four League victories at home put them in trouble, but several away wins to their credit pulled them clear.

One face who will be welcomed by Raddy Antic to Kenilworth Road today is his Yugoslavian colleague, Radivoj Avramovic. Sirrel paid a club record £200,000 to secure the big keeper's transfer. That fee appeared to be fully justified when, in his first seven games, Avramovic conceded only two goals until a knee injury kept him out of action for six weeks.

Whether County can make a serious push for the First Division depends on consistency and, in that department, full-back Pedro Richards certainly knows the ropes. He made his debut when only 18 and has since gone on to make almost 200 first team appearances.

Central defender Brian Stubbs is the club's longest serving player after join-

ing County in 1968. He had the distinction of appearing in two promotion seasons and has now clocked almost 450 League appearances.

Striker Trevor Christie cost County £80,000 at the start of last season after topping the Leicester scoring charts the previous year. He took time to settle at Meadow Lane but Sirrel feels he will mature to score valuable goals.

Eire international Ray O'Brien cost £45,000 when he moved to County from Old Trafford six years ago — reasonable money for a Second Division club in those days. He equalled the club record of 10 goals in a season from the full-back's position when he finished last season as leading scorer. Regularly takes County's penalty kicks.

In last season's corresponding game, we won 2-1 after County took a shock third minute lead through Mal Donaghy's own goal. Luton battled back to win with two goals in as many minutes with efforts from Mike Saxby and Bob Hatton.


