side.



Following the disappointing defeat by Wimbledon and the scrambled draw against Luton our youngsters bounced back to form with a devastating performance against Peterborough.



The big London Road Ground was to our liking and we were soon in front when **Pyle** hammered home from the edge of the box in 14 minutes. In the second period we took over completely, **Pyle** adding goals in 49 and 63 minutes before rounding the game off just before the end. In between only the woodwork saved the home side twice, plus a missed open goal by **Longley**.

I'm not much of a believer in magic, least of all in football. Don't get me wrong. Like any supporter I've had my moments of sheer exuberance, and plenty of these too during the past five seasons when United have ascended from Fourth Division obscurity to a mid-way position in a tough Second Division. But none of this was the result of magic. On the contrary it was born of two managers' steady professionalism and a whole squad's dogged devotion to self-improvement.

I choose to record, then, not the moment when some individual player struck out on his own to accomplish the perfectly scored, or perfectly saved, goal (though there have been those moments of glory too). My unforgettable moment was when United, as a team, consummated its inter-dependence and togetherness. And that moment came with the scoring of the second goal against Derby County, our first League game of the season, on August 17th at the Abbey Stadium. I shall never forget it. Over the game hung the questions which herald a new season. How would United begin? What shape were they in? How had individual players developed during the summer period of rest and training? And a question of special significance for this first League fixture: how would they measure up to a recently relegated First Division Club with players of the calibre of Swindlehurst, McFarland and Alan Biley?

George Reilly's goal in the 24th minute put United in the lead and there can be no decrying how important a goal that was. But it came as the result of a serious error by McFarland and by Reilly's standards it was not a difficult goal. Not so the second one. A cross from Streete on the right wing, a glancing nudge from Reilly and a leaping header by Derrick Christie bounced the ball through the scrambling arms of the

MAGIC MOMENTS

Derby keeper. An utterly convincing goal, skilfully built up and marvellously executed! United were not only winning; they manifestly deserved to win. That second goal (it was followed by a third, beautifully judged by Reilly) vindicated United's co-operative style of play. And it was a goal which had a special significance for the scorer. Christie had played a fine game: he had resisted the over-ambitious engagements with formidable defenders, the ill-judged over-runs, the wayward shots at goal. For this game he adopted the deep, well-angled lob into the goal area, the nicely timed pass and good anticipatory positioning. Now as never before he played as an integral part of the team. In that role he gained confidence and poise. Seldom have I seen a player so transformed between seasons. Biley, by contrast, and on paper the star of the match, hovered impotently for the team support that never came.

United have learnt the secret of footballing success: every player works for the Team's success rather than his own. If they retain that spirit there will be magic moments enough in the future. Though don't put too much of it down to magic!

Four defeats for United followed by four League wins — what a contrast! At work recently with United in 20th position, I recall two people asking for early payment of their bet that United would not get promotion this season . . . now they are not so sure!!

Against Wrexham, Malcolm Webster displayed such heroics, despite 'crippling' injuries that the Sun newspaper awarded him £1,000 to donate to a charity. He chose the Spastics Society.

One man probably deserving of a similar award is one of United's 'star' supporters. He is **Andy Peacock** of Fulbourn. Recently, due to his sister's wedding he missed the Oldham game which would have been his 50th consecutive home and away League and Cup 'appearance'. Andy though was soon back to full fitness and had two days off work to watch United at Cardiff and Blackburn. I understand he is sponsoring United for goalscoring this season, likewise a Mr. Jeeps and cousin of Willingham are sponsoring Lindsay Smith to the tune of £2.50 for every goal scored. I reckon that's £5 they owe; for Wolfie's winner against Wrexham . . . and an own goal for Cardiff, though apparently the Wolf only aided the ball into the net! I will also give £2.50 for every goal he scores for United this season and perhaps somebody else will double that or sponsor another player?

Steve Makes it 500!

Fact. Steve Spriggs' winning goal at Cardiff earned United their 13th League point this season and the 500th in total in the League. It came in just 468 matches and works out as nearly 45 points for every 42 games, which based on last season's Second Division table would have put United in 8th place. Now an average placing of 8th over a ten year 'League introduction' period can't be bad!

Another milestone just passed was United's 400th home League goal. **Wolfie Smith** scored that one with his winner against Wrexham. You can't keep 'im down! **John Lyons** and **Richard Key** had splendid home debuts against Wrexham and with the pressure on **Richard** after such a long wait in the reserves, his performance was outstanding — but one performance, I believe, was even better. It was that of **Dave Donaldson** — and I ask — did he put a foot wrong? I watched **Brendon Batson** at Darlington in 1977 and he had what I call the perfect game. **Dave's** performance against Wrexham although perhaps not quite so brilliant reminded me of that day in 1977.



Sir Alf Ramsey - or Alf, as he was at the time - boldly predicted that England would win the 1966 World Cup. They did

So far, England's current Commander-in-Chief, Ron Greenwood, has been leathe to copy Ramsey. He has made no sweeping forecasts for the World Cup Finals in Spain in 1984.

Yet at a time when the Jonahs are having a birthday, when the Doubting Thomases are casting king-sized clouds over our football, Ron Greenwood remains quietly optimistic about his chances of leading England back to the top of the International tree.

Only a fool would have you believe that everything in the English Soccer garden is lovely.

But cast your eye over the rest of Europe; look further afield into South America; are we really as bad as people keep telling us we are?

You can bet your boots - be they Dunlop, Adidas or Puma - that we're not.

Greenwood hit the nail on the head a few months ago, when, sitting in his hotel room in Barcelona before one of England's best performances under his management, he told me:

"As a Nation, we tend to think that the grass is always greener on the other side. It seems to be an English characteristic".

ENVIOUSLY

The amazing thing is that, apart from the emerging, exciting young West German side which won a disappointing European Championship in Italy this summer, other countries throughout Europe are looking enviously at England.

And Argentina are still smarting from the Wembley walloping they received at England's hands last Spring. Argentina, you may remember, are the current World Cup holders!

No one took England's failure in Italy last summer more to heart than Greenwood. Indeed, there were strong suggestions that he was on the verge of quitting, but was sensibly talked out of it by his immediate aides.

Of course failing to qualify even for the semi-finals was a blow.

Yet once the initial disappointment had been experienced, and Greenwood had taken time to appraise the situation, it was encouraging to read his views in the F.A.S. own Year Book.

"As to the future, I do not think we have much to worry about", he wrote.

"We have the players, we have a fine set of coaches; given a reasonable share of luck at the right time, we can take on the world".

SUPREMO

Note he did not say that we can BEAT the whole world. Yet behind those words of encouragement from England's Soccer supremo, I detect an air of more than mere optimism.

Ray Wilkins and Kenny Sansom proved in Italy that they have the skills, the courage and the character to walk into any International side in the World.

Kevin Keegan may have had a disappointing European Championship. But if he could change his nationality over night - Not that he'd want to for a minute! Holland, West Germany, Portugal, Yugoslavia, Russia, even Scotland, would welcome him with open arms into their 'national side'.

What seems to have encouraged Greenwood more than anything of late is the number of young players emerging as international-class players.

Glenn Hoddle. Graham Rix. Bryan Robson. Three young men with the World to conquer.

And there are more coming off the same conveyor belt.

It's a long and winding road to the 1984 World Cup Finals.

Greenwood is no clairvoyant. He won't predict that we'll win it. But I've a strong suspicion that Greenwood and England won't be too far away - despite what the Jonahs and Doubting Thomases say!

LUTON TOWN

After an opening day victory at Upton Park against West Ham the omens looked good for Luton for an early promotion challenge, but sadly it has not been the case and the side that so narrowly missed out on promotion last season and provided some of the memorable entertainment highspots is struggling near the foot of the table.

Apart from poor results in the League Luton were surprisingly beaten at home by troubled Manchester City in the League Cup. Their problems have been linked with the departure of **Bob Hatten** to Sheffield United in June for £75,000, for they have not found a replacement for his proven goalscoring skills and coupled with that last season's scorer **David Moss** has been troubled with an attack of shingles.

One of **Hatten's** possible replacements is transfer listed **Steve White** a £175,000 purchase from Bristol Rovers. He finds rivalry from **Godfrey Ingram**, **Herbie Smith** (a £5,000 buy from Tooting and Mitcham who scored 12 goals in 21 reserve games last season!), 17 year old apprentice **Franki Bunn** and current number nine **Andy Harrow**.

Luton have been striving to improve their attack by venturing further into the market, for example, in the close season they were thought to be favourites to sign striker **Ray McHale** of Swindon before he moved to Brighton.

One purchase to take place was of **Raddimir Antic**, a Yugoslav International midfield player, he has helped to give Luton a real international flavour for he joins Welsh start **Paul Price**, and Irish International's **Mal Donaghy** and **Tony Grealish**.

Another midfielder in the news is **Pasquale Fucillo**, a rare natural left sided midfielder. After two broken legs in the past two years he has at last played some games for the reserves. **Paul Price** has suffered the same injuries as **Fucillo** and no doubt **Pasquale** will be encouraged to see that **Price** has now gained that International recognition.

Away from the playing side Luton appear to have a commercial general in **John Smith**. He has voiced some radical ideas to change the face of soccer in this country and he is foremost in changes at Kenilworth Road including the charging of high admission prices for visiting supporters. To counteract that move, facilities have improved at the ground, although a lot of the £350,000 spent was enforced due to safety requirements. Other new ventures include an up-to-date electronic scoreboard to which a local firm has been given exclusive five year advertising rights worth around £100,000 to Luton Town.



Tony Grealish - £150,000 signing from Orient in 1979; the deal was settled by a tribunal. Eire International who played 41 League games for Luton in midfield last season. Had 171 League appearances for Orient.

Alan West - Well over 250 League appearances for Luton behind him. Signed by the 'Hatters' from Burnley for £100,000 in 1973. A former England under-23 International.

Ricky Hill - Luton beat West Ham to his signing and he made his League debut for them in midfield. London born, over 130 League appearances for Luton.

David Moss - After nine years with Swindon, moved to Luton in 1978 for £110,000. Basically a winger but he scored 24 League and Cup goals last season. Nearly 300 League games behind him.

Brian Stein - Joined Luton in October 1977 from Edgeware Town. Brian, who was born in South Africa has played over 100 League games for Luton and scored eight goals last season.

Godfrey Ingram - former England Schoolboy International whose appearances at Luton have been limited. Scored four goals for Northampton on loan last season; a player for the future.

Steve White - Like Ingram his appearances have been limited since £175,000 transfer from Bristol Rovers last season. Scored last week against Shrewsbury and Steve hopes that will be the springboard to further success.

Mark Aizelwood - Bought from Newport for £50,000 but has had to battle for his Second Division place. Wales Under 21 International who is approaching 100 League appearances.

Frankie Bunn - Birmingham born. Has had games this season in the number 9 shirt; was still an apprentice last season.

Clive Goodyear - Lincoln born. He replaced Saxby at centre-back last week. His first League appearance of the season doubling his previous total.


