





Town recorded their highest League win of the season against lowly Bristol City in their last home game. Ian Atkins set up the victory — laying on goals for Steve Biggins and David Tong before scoring himself. Dean Edwards who came on as substitute for Graham Turner added number four — his first ever League goal.

Fluent football gave the Bristol side a clear edge in the first-half and they should have taken the lead after 10 minutes, but Trevor Tainton missed his chance.

Shrewsbury sorted themselves out in the second-half and by the end of the match could have doubled the score.

That was not the case when Town travelled to Orient last weekend. Although they put up spirited resistance they eventually went down to the only goal of the game scored by Peter Taylor after 66 minutes.

Shrewsbury's Youth team reached the third round of the FA Youth Cup competition with a 1-0 win over Leicester City at Filbert Street. Tim Cooke scored the goal which gained the youngsters a home draw against Cup holders Aston Villa.

In the fourth round of the Welsh Cup Town will entertain South Wales League side Abercynon.

No firm date has yet been fixed, but the match must be played by 17th January 1981.

It was a disappointing draw for Shrewsbury in the third round of the FA Cup — Huddersfield Town away.

Town seemed to be making a habit of being drawn away to Third Division opposition in this competition. Last season they travelled to Millwall going down 5-1, although the season before they travelled to Mansfield which is a match manager Graham Turner well remembers, it being his first game in charge after the departure of Richie Barker to Wolves.


That 2-0 win signalled the start of Town's best ever Cup run, when they reached the sixth round before being knocked out by Wolverhampton Wanderers after a replay.

Not much is known about Huddersfield except they are at present lying fifth in the table having lost only one game at home. Two players Town will have to keep a close watch on are former Burnley and Wolves winger Steve Kindon, and Ian Robins who has averaged a goal every other game since his move from Bury.

It was in the 1920s-1930s that Huddersfield made a name for themselves. Under the managerial guidance of Herbut Chapman they won the First Division Championship three consecutive seasons and finished runners-up on three occasions. They also reached five FA Cup Finals in that period, winning only one in 1922 (1-0 v Preston North End).

To reach the third round of this seasons competition they have disposed of non-League Northwich Victoria after a replay in the first round and Tranmere Rovers 3-0 in the second.

ESCAPING THE FAMILY TIES

When did you last have the urge to bring the family along to the game? Did you ever bring the wife and kids?

I ask because the dreamers, some of them in high places, are suggesting the panacea for dwindling crowds is to do away with the hooligan, to redesign the stadiums so that dad and mum, little Johnnie and Mary and baby Freda and maybe Grannie too can pile en bloc into the nice family atmosphere you have created.

Be honest, now: is that what you want? My belief, for what its worth, is that the conception of football as family entertainment is misguided. The traditional fan possibly took his son to the match (and that, certainly, is threatened by hooliganism), but the vast majority actually went to football as an escape from family life.

The terraces were the working man's equivalent to the upper crust's exclusive clubs; a place where blokes met, were entertained, could shout their heads off, bait the referee in language that was colourful though nothing like as obscene as today, and share a pint. A man's world.

O.K., the world is changing, the liberated women might actually want to mingle amongst us (and, logically perhaps, play with the fellers, too?) Well, welcome. But the family? My household, and my friend's and acquaintances households must be terribly reactionary because, quite frankly, football is pretty low on the

list of things we wish to follow as a unit.

In fact, though there are so far no personality clashes in my admittedly young family, there are times we all function best going our own ways. Hasn't it always been so?

But, again the planners (who needn't take the folks because they, you understand attend the game in the course of duty) tell us times have changed. They point out that in America, soccer booms best where the families drive up, have their picnics in vast car-parks, and enjoy their entertainment together. It is true, as I have seen; it is also true that the Disney wrappings are necessary to camouflage a second rate game, that there is no tradition and no passion for soccer, and that the trappings designed to keep the families - and, more important it seems, the sponsors - happy in the States would irritate the knowledgeable football man to utter distraction.

Again, the advocates of all-seater stadia and family blocs - including kindergartens - point out that increased leisure time creates the climate for family attendance. I don't follow the logic. In the old days, the working man clocked off at lunchtime on Saturday and used the first third of his 1½-days' rest to have a drink with the boys and watch the match. So, now that he has two or even three days at home, isn't it likely that the football fan would appreciate at least as much the

privacy of his Saturday afternoon world away from family ties?

Besides, chauvanistic or not, a couple of hours of prime Saturday shopping time still seems as good a time as any for the menfolk to get out from under their women's feet.

Getting back, briefly, to the hooligan problem. It obviously is a seriously poisoned cancer - in our social lives as well as our sporting times. It obviously needs to be cut away from our terraces before father will take even Johnnie, the next generation fan.

But don't blame it for too much. Violence is a cause, but the fact that you are reading this in your match programme says that it hasn't deterred you. It also suggests you know the other reasons that have turned your mates off the sport - negative play, the stifling of personalities, poor sportsmanship, too much television, expensive prices and (not entirely bad for the nation) the growth of participant sports.

You will also be fully aware of the gulf that has grown between the footballer and the fan and the decrepit facilities offered the supporter at so many grounds. Perhaps the pie-in-the-sky hierachy, instead of trying to change the nature of the audience will get down to improving the lot of those who do attend? And the smallest start might follow if those leaders were to be taken on a guided tour of, say their own stadium's toilet facilities?







LUTON TOWN

Luton's highest-ever fee for a goalkeeper changed hands when Scots-born **Jake Findlay** was brought out of the shadows at Villa Park to be given the chance to prove that he is capable of winning international honours. He had been almost permanently in the reserves for nine years before he moved from Aston Villa to Luton for £100,000 in November 1978, but is now firmly established as one of the best goalkeepers in the Second Division. **Kirk Stephens** was happily playing as a part-timer at Nuneaton when Luton manager David Peat signed him in the summer of 1978 and pushed him straight into the Second Division. **Mal Donaghy** was snapped up for £20,000 from Northern Ireland football and has since made such good progress that he became a Northern Ireland international last summer. **Tony Grealish** an Eire international took advantage of freedom of contract to insist on a change of club, and no-one was too surprised when Orient slapped a £350,000 price-tag on him. By taking the case to a tribunal Luton had the fee cut to £150,000.

Luton's record fee of £200,000 persuaded Mansfield to part with their centre-half **Mike Saxby** in the summer of 1979. His consistency, particularly his strength in the air, was a major reason for Luton's ability to stay in the promotion race for so long last season. **Paul Price** is Luton's longest serving player. As a defender he was

marked out as something special as a schoolboy and Luton had to move swiftly to sign him as an apprentice. He has been one of the clubs most consistent Second Division players for the past five seasons after twice breaking a leg. **Ricky Hill** made his League debut for Luton in 1976, when still only 17. He scored on his debut and has been regularly on target ever since. **Brian Stein** was a local health authority clerk playing non-League football with Edgware Town in North London when Luton persuaded him to try his luck as a full-time pro. He made his debut within a month and has been a regular ever since.

Steve White was making a name for himself as a goal-scorer at Bristol Rovers when Luton started to take an interest in him early last season. He gave them an unwelcome reminder by scoring twice when Luton-Jost at Bristol and a couple of months later was transferred to Kenilworth Road for £175,000. **David Moss** spent nine years in the Third Division with Swindon Town when Luton bought him for £110,000 in the summer of 1978. He was their leading scorer in each of his first two seasons with the Hatters. **Alan West** played his 250th League game for the Hatters last season — against Burnley, where he began his career. Luton paid £100,000 in 1973 and West has been their midfield inspiration ever since.


