The testimonial match against Arsenal has been arranged for the widow of the late Peter Angell on Tuesday, March 17. I sincerely hope that everybody here will attend and ask friends to do so, as our memory of Peter is such that we feel his wife deserves the support on that night which will enhance all our thoughts concerning a very great club man.

Moving back to the topic of Sunday football, I hope

that it can develop into a family day and that the crowds will build up. Most of all, it would be nice if the harmony and friendship that used to exist on the terraces at the Orient and other clubs, should be in evidence once again, and that the language and other attitudes of people be adapted so that we can encourage back the wives, the mothers and the younger children to enjoy themselves. Thank you.



THE JIMMY BLOOMFIELD VIEW



This morning we experiment with a Sunday match here at Leyton Stadium, and in doing so I hope we are demonstrating our readiness to do what is right for our public.

Within football there is, I feel, an urgent need to think again about our attitudes to winning, losing — and entertaining.

Football is above all else meant to be enjoyed by the people playing it and those watching it.

That was my belief when I was a player and it continues to be my belief as a manager.

If, because of our geographical position — and I refer to our proximity to Arsenal, Spurs and West Ham — it proves better to stage our matches on a Sunday, then Sundays it must be.

Better crowds eventually mean better players. That is the object of the exercise.

A look at the player assets of our three neighbouring major clubs demonstrates what I mean.

Arsenal's most costly player is Ken Sansom, who is valued at over £1 million. Garth Crooks cost Spurs over £800,000. A similar sum took Paul Goddard to West Ham.

Here at Orient our biggest transfer outlay stands at £150,000, and reflects the relative size of our attendances.

If, by being successful on a Sunday, we could attract crowds of 15,000 to 20,000 then everything else becomes possible.

Although Sunday football will certainly cause a lot of disruption to my own family's private life, I recognise that here is a change that is potentially to the benefit of my profession and livelihood — and a possible means of making Orient successful.

Darlington for their Sunday game with Mansfield, attracted a crowd twice their customary average. Hopefully, we may expect a similar increase.

I am pleased to report that Steve Parsons, our casualty at Grimsby, has now left hospital and is back at home but with the prospect of having his broken leg in plaster for three months.

Even within a couple of days of suffering this injury Steve was planning an eventual programme of fitness runs in Richmond Park.

I am sure that with such an attitude he will make a rapid and successful recovery.



Brisbane Road Briefing

Henry Hughton could by now have joined the ranks of Orient players to have earned international recognition.

Henry was due to join the Republic of Ireland's newly-formed under-21 squad for their baptismal match against England at Anfield on Wednesday, and it is our hope that congratulations are in order upon an actual debut in the international sphere.

As recently revealed in our Man Of The Orient series, Henry was in theory qualified to play for England, Ghana or the Republic of Ireland, so the last-mentioned country's venture into under-21 fixtures probably came at a particularly opportune time for both parties!

The presence of Midland TV cameras at the Baseball Ground last weekend raised hopes that those of our supporters who did not journey to the Midlands might have been treated at least to highlights of our match with Derby County.

In the event, our 1-1 draw with the Rams was passed over by the independent TV producers, and Orient's players and management were denied an action replay of what was to be a mildly controversial incident that brought Derby a tenth minute corner.

O's defence claimed a goal-kick, Derby — or perhaps more specifically their supporters — felt a penalty kick might have been in order, while referee Pat Partridge awarded a corner.

From the flag kick Derby centre half Roy McFarland headed his team into the lead and, until departing early in the second half with a hamstring injury, was this game's outstanding p

with his first League goal of the season for Orient's equaliser.

Overall, the outcome was probably just about right. While Derby had undoubtedly had their problems on the afternoon, Orient had had to amend their line-up from that which had been envisaged midweek in that his showing in a Thursday practice match had suggested Joe Mayo might be able to resume competitive soccer in this game.

Mayo, it was found, was still not totally fit and manager Jimmy Bloomfield commented, "This meant a total change in the formation we had planned.

Our previous game at Grimsby's Blundell Park, was marred by the loss of Steve Parsons, who suffered a broken left leg in the 24th minute.

Our player was unquestionably on the receiving end of a tackle. Certain press and media reports of this incident — and indeed of the match overall, were to say the least bewildering.

The Sunday Mirror probably made a valid point with the comment, "Although the Orient side had to be re-shuffled after this blow they were still holding ordinary-looking Grimsby with ease — and a penalty looked the only way the Mariners could break through. In fact, they had two!"

But after a Saturday night TV reporter had referred to Parsons suffering his injury on a frozen pitch — the playing surface comfortably took a stud in virtually all areas — another Sunday paper, that had best remain unidentified, had it that "No player was within yards of Parsons when he suddenly collapsed . . ."

The same writer also incorrectly credited Bill Roffey with a caution that was awarded to Ian Moores, and had it that John Margerrison conceded the second penalty (when in fact Roffey was this time the "culprit").

The somewhat unfamiliar numbering of Orient's defence at Blundell Park — the changes to the programme having been publicly announced, we should hasten to add — may have been a contributory factor in such wayward reporting, which in turn created tell-tale problems for those southern scribes who use the national press as reference for compiling their own match reports . . .

Perhaps we best say no more.

Steve Parsons was in fact brought back to London the next day by private ambulance and on the Tuesday underwent surgery at Bart's Hospital.

Earliest tentative predictions are that he will have his leg in plaster for three months and be out of football for six.

Among Steve's visitors at Bart's has been our young goalkeeper Lloyd Scott, who even when clubmates are not detained pays periodic calls on patients in that hospital.

He particularly asks us to pass on best wishes for an early return to health for Alison Randlesome, from Wickford.

Alison is seven, the daughter of Mr. D. Randlesome, an Orient season ticket holder for many years, and is currently a patient in Lucas Ward.

Luton's senior squad has changed little since the last meeting of the clubs. Scot Jake Findlay, a £100,000 buy from Aston Villa two years ago, continues in goal. Kirk Stephens, current Player of the Year at Kenilworth Road and not so long back with Nuneaton Town, missed the FA Cup tie through injury, but has since returned as a regular in the back four.

His fellow defenders have usually been under-21 Northern Ireland international Radomir Antic, who joined Hatters from Zaragoza, Pasquale Fuccillo, Bedford-born son of Italian parents who has overcome the setback of two broken legs to continue his career, and former Mansfield centre-back Mike Saxby, who started the season as a regular in the defence.

Tony Grealish — Orient Young Player of the Year in 1976 — has become very much a Luton stalwart in midfield since moving to Kenilworth Road as the 1979-80 season opened.


One-time Burnley under-23 international Alan West has come back

into the regular reckoning — since appearing in Town's previous game here — with former England youth cap Ricky Hill completing the midfield trio.

David Moss, once with Swindon, and South African Brian Stein, once with Edgeware Town, have continued to figure prominently in the Second Division scorers list, while Godfrey Ingram, a one-time England Schools international, has begun to fulfill the club's expectations of him in the number nine shirt.

Also available are goalkeeper Alan Judge, Yugoslavian midfield international Radomir Antic, who joined Hatters from Zaragoza, Pasquale Fuccillo, Bedford-born son of Italian parents who has overcome the setback of two broken legs to continue his career, and former Mansfield centre-back Mike Saxby, who started the season as a regular in the defence.

Clive Goodyear, defender, Wayne Turner, midfield, Frank Bunn and Steve White, former Bristol Rovers striker who was recently made available for transfer by his present club, are also on potential call.



MAN OF THE MONTH



It all happened for Orient's Kevin Godfrey when he made his first appearance of 1981 in a Football League match at Grimsby recently.

Coming on as substitute for the luckless Steve Parsons, who had suffered a broken leg, Godfrey caught the eye with the elegant balance and neat ball control that has been seen relatively rarely at this level since he burst on to the first team scene as a 16-year-old on the eve of the 1976-77 season.

KEVIN GODFREY

Born Kennington. Nowadays lives at Brixton.

Interests away from soccer: Badminton, custom cars.

Opponent who has most impressed him: Everton defender John Bailey. "I played against him a couple of times while he was with Blackburn," says Kevin. "Perhaps it was because he used to be a winger himself and is very quick, but I found him particularly difficult to get past."

Favourite opposition ground: Swansea City. "I went down there with Orient and while I did not play I thought the atmosphere was really tremendous," he said.

CAREER RECORD

(as at start of season)
Football League debut at Oldham. Appearances: League 16 (six as sub.) one goal; FA Cup seven.

Most objective observers rated Godfrey desperately hard done by when he was adjudged to have handled and so conceded the first of the two penalties that brought Os a 2-0 defeat in this match.

Given a spot of compensatory luck, Godfrey could have more than made amends for that setback when he three times ghosted into scoring positions and threatened to dent Grimsby's notable record of having conceded only three League goals at Blundell Park this season.

Each time he was foiled by Mariners' goalkeeper Nigel Batch, yet overall the message from Godfrey a fortnight ago seemed to be that he could well be back in the first team reckoning after what to date has been a somewhat fluctuating career.

Says manager Jimmy Bloomfield: "As with Tunji Banjo, the last player featured in this series, Kevin was - by circumstances prevailing at the time - given his first chance in the senior side while still somewhat short on experience.

"But he is still only 20 and has time on his side to come through.

"He did very well for us when John Chiedozie was out of the side with a leg

injury in 1978 and made a useful contribution to our FA Cup run.

"There continue to be times when he shows flashes of potential, but he has now got to become more consistent and believe in himself for he does have the qualities to become a good player."

For many players of his age, being part of such an FA Cup run - cut short at the sixth round stage in Kevin's case - would probably rate as the high spot of a relatively brief career.

But in Godfrey's case he tends to

look even more fondly on his debut as an Orient first team player in an Anglo-Scottish Cup match against Chelsea at Brisbane Road in August, 1976.

"I will always remember it for the

way that everybody, especially the other Orient players, went out of their way to be helpful to me," he says.

Godfrey finished on the winning

side on that occasion - Os eventually reached the final - while virtually a year later I recall writing of him in a press report:

"While it was the already proven

Occasion was an Orient Football Combination fixture with Chelsea and Godfrey had created such an impression against opponents that included Peter Bonetti, Gary Chivers, Mick Nutton, John Burmstead, Ray Lewington and Lee Frost.

By one of those quirks of the game, the name of Chelsea both before and after that afternoon has tended to represent something of a recurring milestone in the soccer life of Kevin Godfrey.

"It was the first club I went to as a schoolboy for training," he reveals. "Nothing came of it and a friend later got me a trial with Orient."

Being left out of Os' 1978 FA Cup semi-final side against Arsenal - at Stamford Bridge - was obviously something of a setback for him at the time.

Strangely, it was on Orient's visit to the same West London ground last December that brought this player from the reserve side wilderness after virtually a year out of the first team reckoning. Reserve team football, he admits, is something of an anti-climax for a youngster who has sampled the bigger time.

"Even so," he says, "my ambition is to establish myself in Orient's first team and to go as far as I can in the game."

The talents of Chiedozie obviously tend to stand between this South Londoner and Orient's number seven shirt on a regular basis.


Yet for his part Godfrey certainly does not see his potential limited solely to the role of right winger.

"If anything I like playing up front in the middle. You tend to be more involved there," he maintains.

Perhaps it should also be put on record that when pressed into emergency duty at Grimsby his far from unimpressive performance was in effect as a left-sided midfield man.

Orient's numerous injury problems of late have allowed scope for such experiment and team permutation. So it is just possible that from out of the club's mid-winter woes will come the opportunity for the like of Kevin Godfrey to fulfil his undoubtedly potential in some first-team sphere during the weeks ahead.



YOUTH AND RESERVE TEAM REVIEW

Orient's memorable run in the FA Youth Cup was halted when Birmingham City won a fourth round replay 1-0 on this ground.

Just when it looked as though two very tired sides would be required to undertake extra time, Birmingham's Phil Hawker — whose name has frequently appeared in City's first team line-ups this season — scored the decisive goal with only two minutes remaining.

Although Hawker had earlier had a goal disallowed for offside, Orient were close to taking an 80th minute lead when Mark McNeil weaved his way through the opposition, only for his fierce drive to be turned over the bar by David Coles, City's 'keeper.

A goal at that stage could well have settled this close tie in Os' favour — besides maintaining McNeil's personal record of scoring in every FA Youth Cup game in which he had taken part this season.

It was interesting to note that City midfielder Ian Handysides had played for his club's League side when they shared a 2-2 draw at Liverpool the previous Saturday.
