

With another single goal defeat in our last home game it looks, at the time of writing, as if we have failed again this season. Although I am writing these noted before the Oldham and Bristol City matches, I can't see us gaining promotion even if we have won both these games — it's just hoping too much for the other sides at the top to drop as many points as that and put us back in the running.



Obviously, we are all bitterly disappointed at losing out again, particularly as it is for the second time in two years. But I am optimistic. In some respects we have looked a better side this season, although our results have not shown that. There have been far too many single goal defeats this year but if some of the players had not lost a bit of confidence in front of goal we could have won these games and be celebrating now rather than searching for the reasons for our failure. Some people have said that it is too early for us to go up. Well, I don't think one can

choose a time to be promoted; one must grasp the opportunity when it presents itself. Having said that, if you look honestly at some of our young players there is no doubt they will need another season to prove themselves in this division, never mind the First. We have young players here, as opposed to most other clubs these days, who are natural attackers and one must inevitably have to show more patience with this type of footballer. We shall never send out a totally defensive side as some clubs have done this season; we believe that the best way to play the game is to attack, and we have chosen the side to this end. In many respects we have failed because of these convictions — but we shall stick by them. Young players need time — that is all there is to it.

The club of course cannot wait four or five years for success, but within our framework we must give individuals the time to mature naturally to the kind of play we are sure they are capable of. I think this has been a transi-

tional year for us and we shall be expecting a lot more from some of the younger players next season. We are expecting them to claim their position in the manner that Gary Chivers has done this season; he has had a magnificent year and is an example to all young players. Now we expect the others to better themselves and take on more responsibility collectively and individually.

With promotion looking such a remote possibility we have a chance to try out a few of the younger players again before the close of the season. This is a good thing as it instills sharper competition for next year. No way has our season finished yet and we are now preparing for next term. We are working harder than ever and looking forward to each game — to the next few weeks — and to next season.

PHIL DRIVER

Today we feature the only member of the current playing staff to have scored more goals against us this season than for us — yes, Phil scored both Wimbledon's goals in our pre-season 2-2 draw at Plough Lane and at the time of writing he has just a single goal to his name in Chelsea colours. His performance in that match was instrumental in bringing him to Stamford Bridge in a move that Phil found 'amazing'. And as he talks about his route to Chelsea, it is clear to see why he was surprised by our interest in him: "My career began with the team who are our opponents this afternoon, Luton. I signed for them as an apprentice when seventeen and graduated to the professional ranks about eight months later. Although I had done well as an apprentice, I lost a lot of my form when signing on a full-time contract and David Pleat just had to let me go after a year as I was playing so badly. The best spell I had was as a left-back but I never looked likely to break into the League side, so in the end he had to release me and I moved to non-League football with Bedford. Once again, I played as a full-back but I was 19 then and I thought that my football career was over before it had really started. I resigned myself to playing non-League and started looking for a job. But

that didn't work out too well either and I found myself on the dole at Welwyn Garden City, my home town, for over 6 months. I think at one stage I had been on the dole longer than any other person in the City. Of course


I was hoping that I'd be able to get back into football somewhere but I knew I had very little chance even though I was playing quite well as a defender. After about 20 consecutive matches at full-back I had to move into midfield as one of the lads had become ill. I enjoyed the game and ended up spending more time on the wing than inside. As luck would have it Dario Gradi, Wimbledon's manager then, was at the game and he came back four days later to watch our next fixture, against Welwyn Borough, who

included the England cricketer Wayne Larkins in their side. Well, he signed me after the match and I still consider myself very lucky that he had seen me play in an attacking position as I don't think he would have bought me if I had been playing in the back four. Once at Wimbledon I expected to just play in the reserves but I was taken with the squad to the next League match and that was a tremendous experience after I'd thought my career was over. I went on to play about 5 or 6 games that season, but I was used mostly as the substitute until I suffered a pelvic strain, which along with a knee injury, caused me to miss nearly all of last season. To get some games in, Wimbledon arranged for me to play in Finland during last summer for a couple of months and that kept me sharp for the new season. My first match back was against Chelsea and as you know I scored both Wimbledon's goals. Following that we went to Portsmouth and I thought I'd played well and then we played Brentford. By now I was exhausted, having had only two weeks of hard pre-season training and I had to come off. After that I wasn't selected until, once again, one of our players was ill and I was brought into the side. I was kept in for eight

matches until one Wednesday afternoon Dario called me to one side and said that a club was interested in me. Well, I thought, 'it's non-League again for me'. I really expected that

he had agreed to let me go for a small fee to a Southern League club. At best I thought it might be another 4th Division side. All sorts of things went through my mind in the space of a few seconds and then he said, "It's Chelsea — I've agreed a fee and you can sign when you like." I just couldn't believe it. The rest you all know — I've loved every minute of being a part of such a great club and I'm just aiming at commanding a regular place in the League side and scoring a few more goals. It's a special match for me today, so I hope to be selected — I'd give anything to play well against my first club."

LUTON TOWN

"The second best footballing side in the Second Division", is how Luton have been described several times this season; West Ham being judged the premier exponents of the art in a division that has not boasted an abundance of talented, adventurous sides. Luton, it is true, are one of the more extrovert and have given the Kenilworth Road faithful good value over the past few years. A mid-table Division 4 side in 1967, they were promoted the following season and then spent only two seasons in the Third prior to starting the '70's in the Second Division. By 1974 they were back in the First Division (their previous visit being between 1955-60), but on this occasion they remained for only one season. In December 1975 with debts of £274,000, Luton faced the threat of liquidation, and were saved by the dramatic £80,000 transfer of forward Peter Anderson (currently Millwall's manager) to Belgian club Royal Antwerp. When it is recalled how many quality players the 'Hatters' have been forced


to sell in recent years, since their near financial collapse, it is something of a miracle how they survived at as high a level as the Second Division. Chris Nicholl, Don Givens and Malcolm Macdonald rank among the internationals who have been sold and Steve Buckley, Barry Butlin, the Fletcher twins and Andy King are just a few of the other top stars Luton have been forced to part with in order to survive. It was a tribute, initially, to former manager Harry Haslam — and more recently, to David Pleat — that the club came through such a traumatic experience to survive at its

present level. Last season the 'Hatters' were rarely out of the top three but, like ourselves, they dropped too many vital points on the run-in and finished up in 6th position. But there was plenty to be optimistic about during the summer at Kenilworth Road and promotion hopes were no doubt reinforced by the 2-1 victory at Upton Park on the season's opening day. However, a failure to translate a good approach play into goals has always presented Luton with an uphill task this season. At the time of going to press there remained a slim chance of promotion and a victory today would give their hopes a tremendous lift — if that chance still exists.

Today's Squad: Luton's highest-ever fee for a goalkeeper changed hands when Scots-born JAKE FINDLAY was brought out of the shadows at Villa Park to be given the chance to prove that he is capable of winning International honours. He had been almost permanently in the reserves for nine years before he moved from

Aston Villa to Luton for £100,000 in November 1978, but is now firmly established as one of the best goalkeepers in the Second Division. PAUL PRICE is the Club captain and Luton's longest serving player. Price's career has had more than its share of ups and downs. As a defender he was marked out as something special

as a schoolboy at Welwyn Garden City, and Luton had to move swiftly to sign him as an apprentice. Since then he has broken the same leg twice but has fought back and has been one of Luton's most consistent players for the past five seasons. His battle against adversity brought an extra bonus last summer when he became a Welsh international, qualifying for the country of his father's birth. Defender KIRK STEPHENS was





happily playing as a part-timer at Nuneaton, where David Pleat was once manager, when the Luton boss signed him in the summer of 1978 and pushed him straight into the Second Division. He is now a firm favourite at Kenilworth Road and collected the Supporters' Club Player-of-the-Year award in his first season. Other clubs had made enquiries to Newport County about their Welsh youth international, MARK ALZLEWOOD, but he went to Luton and later was capped by Wales at Under-21 level. Increasing competition for places last season meant that he always had to battle for his chances in the Second Division. Luton's record fee of £200,000 persuaded Mansfield to part with their star centre-half MIKE SAXBY in the summer of 1979. His consistency, particularly his strength in the air, was a major reason for Luton's ability to stay in the promotion race for so long last season. Utility player, MAL DONAGHY was snapped up by Luton for a bargain £20,000 from Larne in Northern Ireland. Inexperienced, and still in his early twenties, he settled immediately into the Second Division and has developed into a versatile and thoughtful player. Luton's first excursion into the European transfer market brought RADO-MIR ANTIC to this country with five Yugoslav international caps to his name. He had been playing for Zaragoza in Spain, and there was a public outcry when they decided to let him go. Luton signed him for a token fee, just a few weeks after the 30-year-old defender had been chosen 'Foreign Player of the Year' by the Spanish soccer press. TONY GREALISH joined Luton from Orient in the summer of 1979. An Eire international, he took advantage of freedom of contract to insist on a change of club, and no-one was too surprised when Orient slapped a £350,000 price-tag on him. By taking the case to a tribunal Luton had the fee cut to £150,000, and it has looked a bigger bargain with each appearance the player makes. ALAN WEST is one of the most experienced players on Luton's books. West played his 250th League game for the 'Hatters' last season — against Burnley, where he began his career. Luton paid £100,000 in 1973, and West has been their midfield inspiration ever since. Midfield elegance and explosive shooting made RICKY HILL outstanding at schoolboy level and Luton beat West Ham to sign him. He made his League debut in 1976 when still only 17. He scored on his debut and has been regularly on target ever since. Fans often argue about which signing was a manager's best and the long list of candidates at Luton has to include DAVID MOSS very near the top. He had spent nine years in the Third Division with Swindon when Luton bought him for £110,000 in the summer of 1978. Leading scorer in each of his first two seasons at Luton and a very talented goalscorer.

BRIAN STEIN was a local health authority clerk enjoying non-League football with Edgware Town in North London when Luton persuaded him to try his luck as a full-time pro'. He made his debut within a month and his sharpness in the box and quick ball control has made him a regular ever since. GODFREY INGRAM is a former England schoolboy international. He developed in Luton's schoolboy and reserve teams and is a youngster of immense promise — has scored in every other League game for the Hatters in his limited number of appearances to date. Direct front-running attacker, STEVE WHITE was making a name for himself as a goal scorer at Bristol Rovers when Luton started to take an interest in him early last season. He scored twice when Luton lost at Bristol Rovers and a couple of months later he joined the Kenilworth Road staff for £175,000. Working away in the background at Luton are half a dozen or more young players who are on the verge of League duty. They include centre-half CLIVE GOODYEAR, midfield man NEIL MADDEN, forwards ANDY PEARSON and HERBIE SMITH and defender GRAHAM JONES. All are expected to make further progress next season.





And that, more than anything, pleased young Halliday, who said: "After what happened down there I was utterly determined that we would keep a clean sheet and it's much more important to me. The goal was a bonus but overall I didn't think I played as well as the other three defenders." Modest, but not quite accurate, because Halliday hardly put a foot wrong and linked brilliantly with Barton. It was a non-event as a match. And one wag got it right when he shouted, "They should put the clocks forward now and blow the final whistle!" We at least expected things to liven up when Halliday scored. They didn't." Chelsea Through The Years

PART 66 WORLD WAR I

Seasons 1917-18 & 1918-19

In the third season of war-time football the London Combination championship was again won. And once more a player on loan played a major part in our success — Bombadier Joe Smith of Bolton Wanderers and England, later a member of the first Wembley F.A. Cup winning side in 1923 and afterwards manager of the successful Blackpool team of the immediate post-World War II period. For much of the season Fulham led the table and only the collapse of our West London neighbours over the last few weeks allowed us to take over top place on the very last Saturday of the competition, by beating Clapton Orient 6-1 at Homerton, as West Ham United, our other rivals, also faltered. Once more, Thomson maintained his usual consistency, leading the goalscoring list with 23, four more than Smith. The difficulty of turning out sides was illustrated by the fact that no fewer than 50 players made first-team appearances, with David Taylor (Burnley) leading the way with 32 games, and Thomson and goalkeeper Joe Hughes (Bolton Wanderers) turning out on 30 occasions. Even if our title win was much less clear cut than that of two years before it was generally agreed that the success was equally meritorious. Perhaps the biggest stroke of good fortune was the unexpected availability of Major Vivian Woodward for the home fixture against Fulham on Easter Saturday, the famous international forward scoring twice in our crucial 7-0 victory.

To underline our claim as London's top team of the season we then beat West Ham United in two "Test Challenge" matches with an aggregate score of 7-4. In many ways the final war-time season (1918-1919) was the least distinguished of the four from Chelsea's point of view. A final League placing of 6th included twelve defeats from 36 games as our final record read:-

P.36 W.13 D.11 L.12 Goals For 70 Against 53
Points 37.

Joe Smith was still appearing regularly but

some of the more familiar pre-war names were gradually dropping out. More and more sides were made up from members of the forces on leave, or from personnel passing through London on their way home from military service in France. Nevertheless, we did manage to reinforce our claim to be the most successful war-time club in the South of England by winning the London Victory Cup, which was played in March and April, without conceding a goal.

Both our semi-final and the final were played at Highbury, on consecutive Saturdays. On the first occasion we defeated Crystal Palace by a comfortable 4-0 margin and then overcame Fulham 3-0 in the final in front of a 36,000 crowd. A newspaper report suggested that "Fulham were the better side for 70 minutes. But a cold driving hailstorm had the effect of rousing the Stamford Bridge side from their lethargy. First, Rutherford scored after a Whitehouse shot had rebounded to him. Six minutes later the same player added a second, before a mix-up and a muddle between the Fulham goalkeeper and left-back presented Wilding with number three. On the whole Chelsea had shown the greater stamina." Our team which played in that final reflects the abnormality of the times: — Jimmy Molyneux; Walter Bettridge, Jack Harrow, Stewart Davidson (Middlesbrough), Will Dickie (Kilmarnock), Nils Middelboe, Harry Ford, Charlie Whitehouse (Birmingham), Harry Wilding, Jock Rutherford (The Arsenal), Ted Vizard (Bolton Wanderers).

And so the curtain fell on four seasons of success and high entertainment. But probably even more important than the achievements on the field was the news, received during the closing weeks of the 1918-19 season, that Chelsea, having finished in last but one place in the final First Division pre-war campaign of 1914-15 were to be saved from relegation by an extension from twenty to twenty-two clubs. The decision, by no means universally approved, was a result of much campaigning by Chelsea chairman, Mr. Claude Kirby. So, we were able to restart normal football in company with the country's top clubs — and a new chapter in our history was about to be written.
