

Over the past few weeks it was looking as if Luton, our visitors today, would be coming to Burnden Park destined for the First Division, but how unfortunate for them that results over the past few days have put them out of it — barring of course a major catastrophe on Swansea's part.

Their result at home last Saturday when they were beaten by our neighbours Oldham was a real turn up and it just goes to show how crazy the Second Division has been this season.

Who would have thought that both Luton and Grimsby would have dropped vital home points to struggling clubs on the same day. But Oldham turned the tables on David Pleat's team and Cardiff got a shock win at Grimsby.

For Luton it is a really hard blow, because after going so close to promotion last season, they have shown this season that they are one of the most entertaining sides in the division. David must be tearing his hair out.

It just shows what an interesting season this has been for all of us. Things have gone anything but smoothly for us and its only in the last six or seven weeks that we have been able to put together a settled side and come up with the results to put us in a safe position.

Other clubs have been saying how tough a season they have had because of injuries, but I reckon neither Manchester United nor Liverpool have had as bad a time as us.

It's been a unique season for injuries here at Burnden Park as our physio Jim Headridge points out. Jim says he's never known a season quite like it. He hasn't just had the usual quota of knocks, strains and bruises to contend with. On top of all those, he's had to treat complicated injuries with serious ligament injuries like those of Dusan Nikolic and Mike Walsh. Peter Reid has needed a cartilage operation and both Craig Moores and Paul Keighley have had long spells out with bad knee injuries.

Len Cantello was out for a long spell with an ankle problem and Terry Poole missed a number of games with his shoulder injury.

However, the main thing is that we have come through it and the experience of this season will probably make us a hell of a lot stronger next season.

We need a couple of players to strengthen our squad, but that depends a lot on our financial position.

I would like to thank the supporters for the help they have given us throughout a very difficult season. Things haven't gone as we or they would have liked, but their loyal support has been much appreciated.

THRILLING FINISH FOR LUTON

Luton's nerve-tingling season has culminated in a tremendously thrilling finish following a wonderful late burst that put them right back in line for promotion.

Three successive victories — at home to Q.P.R. (3-0) and Bristol Rovers (1-0) and away to Chelsea (2-0) — shot them into third position in the table on Easter Monday, leaving them locked in combat with Blackburn, Derby and Swansea for the right to the third promotion place behind West Ham and Notts. County.

Manager David Pleat's fear that his team might repeat last season's late collapse has, fortunately, not materialised. Last April, Luton were third in the table, just two points behind the leaders. But, as the pressure increased over the closing weeks, the Hatters managed to win only one of their closing five games and finally finished in sixth place.

It seemed a strange decision, at the time, when Luton sold striker Bob Hatton to Sheffield United at the end of the season. Last season he set up a prodigious scoring partnership with David Moss, scoring 18 goals himself while at the same time helping Moss to take his tally to 24.

The £75,000 fee offered by the Blades had to be a consideration, of course, for a club that still has to

watch the pennies. Yet it is not cash alone that can compensate, or replace, scoring duos of the Moss-Hatton calibre.

Luck plays its part in how the chemistry of two individuals will produce an explosive result, as it did with Bob and Dave.

The situation began to look bleak during the early weeks of the season when the Hatters' attack failed to function fully and in October they were almost bottom of the Second Division.

Then, out of the blue, Brian Stein found his confidence and he began to set up just as fine an understanding with Moss as Hatton had done last season. The goals began to flow, Luton shot up the table and by January they were once again chasing promotion.

That Luton can even consider a further spell of First Division football is really something of a miracle in itself. When it is recalled how many quality players the Hatters have been forced to sell in recent years, since their near financial collapse, it is certainly remarkable how they survived as high as Second Division level.

Malcolm Macdonald, Don Givens and Chris Nicholl rank among the internationals who have been sold. Andy King can be counted among Peter Anderson

Ron and Paul Futcher, Steve Buckley, Barrie Butlin and Vic Halom as just a few of the top players Luton were forced to sell in order to survive.

It was a tribute, initially, to former manager Harry Haslam — and, more recently, to David Pleat — that the club came through such a traumatic experience to survive at its present level.

Mr Pleat's only major signing last summer involved the purchase of former Yugoslav international Raddy Antic from Spanish club Zaragoza.

Following a period of acclimatisation, Antic has now settled with Tony Grealish and Ricky Hill in midfield, to the exclusion of that fine club man Alan West.

Brian Stein and David Moss have been linking up with either Steve White or Godfrey Ingram in attack while the back four has settled with Mike Saxby and Paul Price in the middle and Kirk Stephens and Mal Donaghy on the flanks.

Jake Findlay has been looking as confident as ever in goal.

Luton have scored away League victories at West Ham (2-1), Cambridge (3-1), Watford (1-0), Shrewsbury (1-0), Bristol Rovers (4-2), Notts. County (1-0) and Chelsea (2-0).

They drew at Grimsby (0-0), Oldham (0-0), Derby (2-2), Orient (0-0), Wrexham (0-0) and Swansea (2-2).

But they went down at Newcastle (1-2), Blackburn (0-3), Bristol City (1-2), Preston (0-1), Q.P.R. (2-3), Cardiff (0-1) and Sheffield Wednesday (1-3).

Luton have enjoyed two previous spells in the First Division. They first went up in 1955 and they remained for five seasons but, when they returned in 1974, they stayed for only one season in spite of a wonderful late bid to save themselves.

The club was founded in 1885 and was originally elected to the Second Division of the Football League in 1897. They lost their place three years later but returned as a founder member of the Third Division (South) in 1920.

In 1959 they appeared in their only F.A. Cup final losing 1-2 to Nottingham Forest.

JAKE FINDLAY (Goalkeeper). Jake got only 14 chances to play in Aston Villa's League team and his career really didn't begin to flourish until his £100,000 transfer to Luton in 1978. Now he is hoping to get the chance to play for Scotland.

KIRK STEPHENS (Defender). Kirk joined the club from Nuneaton Town and went into the first-team in 1978/79. Now he is firmly settled at right-back.

MIKE SAXBY (Defender). Luton paid a then club record fee of £200,000 to sign Mike from Mansfield in 1979. He had worked his way into the Stags' senior team for a couple of games in 1975/76 and he was ever-present in 1978/79.

PAUL PRICE (Defender). Paul was introduced to the Wales' team for last season's British Championship and he now has eight full caps, plus one at under-21 level. Paul was introduced to the Luton side in 1972/73.

MAL DONAGHY (Defender). Mal won N.Ireland under-21 honours in his Larne Town days. Luton signed him for £20,000 during the 1978 close-season and now he has switched from midfield to left-back. He is now a full international with 5 N.I. caps before this week's World Cup clash against Portugal.

MIKE AIZLEWOOD (Midfield). Mark rose to prominence with Newport County and Luton paid £30,000 for him in 1978. Mark is now a Welsh u-21 international. Once a defender, he usually plays in midfield these days.

RICKY HILL (Midfield). Ricky first signed for Luton as a schoolboy in May 1975 and later completed his apprenticeship with the club. He made his first-team bow in 1975/76 and has been holding his place for the past three years.

TONY GREALISH (Midfield). Luton increased their club record payout to £300,000 when they signed Tony from Orient in 1979. He had spent the previous five seasons in the Os' first-team. Tony won his 23rd Republic of Ireland cap against Belgium in March.

RADDY ANTIC (Midfield). Raddy is a former Yugoslav international who left his country to join Spanish club Zaragoza. He was transferred to Luton during the last close-season.

ALAN WEST (Midfield). Alan is a former England under-23 international who first entered League soccer with Burnley in 1970. Luton paid £80,000 for him in 1973 and he has now played more than 250 League games for the club.

BRIAN STEIN (Forward). Brian is a local discovery who came into the first-team three seasons ago. He scored eight goals last season but this season his consistent scoring has kept the Hatters in close contention for promotion. He has netted 19 times so far.


DAVID MOSS (Forward). David has been Luton's top scorer for the past two seasons, hitting 24 last term. He is now level top scorer with 19. He previously spent about six years as a regular first-teamer at Swindon until transferring to Luton for £90,000 in 1978.

STEVE WHITE (Forward). Steve made his bow in Bristol Rovers' League eleven in 1977/78 and he was transferred to Luton for £175,000 last season.

GODFREY INGRAM (Forward). Godfrey has been popping up with some pretty important goals as Luton sought to clinch promotion. Originally blooded in the Hatters' first-team in 1977/78, he didn't win a regular place and last season he was loaned out to Northampton Town.

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SYNTHETIC FOOTBALL?

WHEN THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE gave the go ahead to Queens Park Rangers to install an artificial football pitch at their Loftus Road stadium, it signalled a new era for the game of football.

Oh yes I know that some clubs in the NASL have been playing on Astroturf for some years now, but the introduction of a synthetic surface at QPR, opens the door to the whole of Europe.

There is no doubt that the prospect of playing on a true surface week in week out has excited the Rangers playing staff and assistant manager Alan Harris enthuses: "The system we are going to use is sand based and is the nearest thing to grass that I have ever seen. And because it is sand based the water just drains through it when it rains.

"You can also shorten or lengthen the height of the grass according to your requirements, by controlling the amount of sand used. This is important because different events require different conditions, like tennis which needs a shorter cut than say football. With this system there is no problem you can provide whatever conditions are needed."

Rangers are spending £350,000 on the scheme which has a life expectancy of just ten years, so at a cost of £35,000 per annum isn't that rather expensive?

INTRUSION?

"Not when you think of the financial returns you can expect from the commercial activities you will be able to promote," counters Alan Harris, "such things as pop concerts, boxing, tennis, cricket and other entertainments."

Obviously an all-weather all-purpose playing surface gives rise to various commercial activities. For the first time football grounds will be available for use seven days a week, 52 weeks of the year and the financial return could be quite astronomical.

This is a prime reason why football clubs will have to take note of the developments at Loftus Road, but there are many people who feel that the introduction of artificial pitches is an intrusion into the very fabric of our national game.

Manchester United manager Dave Sexton is one who believes that it could change the game. He says: "I can see advantages from the commercial point of view, pop festivals and things like that but from the football angle I don't think you can beat a nice turfed pitch.

"Football on artificial surfaces can be quite good, but it is not ideal to play full blooded football on. It will produce a different sort of game, there will be little tackling and physical play, it will turn into a touch game."

PREDICTABLE

As far as Alan Harris is concerned that will benefit the sport: "Yes" he says; "teams will have to place much more emphasis on skill. I would not say that it will make the game slower, but the players will certainly have to improve their technique. If the emphasis is on skill then surely it must improve the game as a spectator sport.

"I can't see that we will lose any of our national characteristics. I would much rather coach a side versed in skilled attractive football, than one which just rushes about and can win games on glue pot pitches through sheer strength. Where is the entertainment in that?"

However former Spurs star Peter Baker who played in the Londoners double winning side of 1961 made a very pertinent point when I discussed the subject with him. He said: "I think it would make the game more stereotyped. If you have got a true bounce all the time the game will become predictable and one paced."

Certainly there is a danger that if the financial gain from non-football activities proves irresistible, football as we know it today could one day be a thing of the past.

Colin Benson's world of soccer

When the yellow card system was given the red card by the Football League earlier this season that was the end of that, as far as domestic football in this country was concerned. But that is not the case in Belgium where the whole system of red and yellow cards is currently under debate.

The National Football League in Belgium has accordingly come up with a revolutionary idea for dealing with players cautioned during a match. They wanted to create a system which would cut down on the administrative work and came up with this novel idea designed to punish the offending player and his club directly.

The suggestion is that any player committing a foul that invokes a caution will be sent off the field

of play immediately and be replaced by one of two listed substitutes.

A form of instant punishment if you like and certainly one that could cause all sorts of problems if refereed by someone who reaches for the book frequently. Because once the two substitutes have been used there is no replacement player.

It is felt that this will result in fewer cautions being issued because referees would think more seriously before warning players for minor offences. The Belgians also feel that the system would have a favourable influence on the players themselves as they would not wish to provoke their own substitution.

Trevor Whymark — the only addition to Grimsby Town's playing strength this season, cost the Mariners a bargain £80,000.
