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# MATCH PREVIEW

Welcome to Kenilworth Road for our first home midweek League game of the season.

Because our printing deadlines dictated that this copy should be written before our trip to Leicester last Saturday, we certainly hope the team shook off the effects of the home defeat against Wednesday.

Cardiff come to Luton with manager Richie Morgan still looking — before last Saturday's home game against Blackburn Rovers — for their first victory of the season.

Tonight's game is the first of the season at which we have not staged Six-a-Side cricket as the pre-match entertainment.

We did consider bringing forward the final of our tournament, which is due to be played on Saturday, but found that it posed considerable difficulties.

We managed to discover where we could buy white cricket balls, but to stage floodlit cricket you also need a lot of other specialised equipment, like dark batting pads and dark sightscreens.

The Luton and District Midweek Cricket League also found that players would not be able to get to the ground early enough to start the match at 6 p.m.

Floodlit cricket may come to Kenilworth Road in the future, but in the meantime we hope that supporters have enjoyed this year's daylight efforts.

The second semi-final was played at our last home game, and Luton Five Star beat Luton Pakistanis to earn a place in the final, against Luton United. It will be played before Saturday's match with Watford.

The cricket will start at 1.30, and as early admission to the ground is likely to be in everyone's interests, we hope supporters will come to see the cricket, enjoy the quick-fire action, and show their appreciation for the players.

As a club we would like to put on record our appreciation as well — to the clubs and players, to sponsors *Evening Post-Echo* and *Bernard World of Sport*, and to the Luton Midweek Cricket League and its secretary Brian Swain for organising the tournament.

# PERSONALITY PROFILE



A series on some of the sporting men and women from Luton.

A tiny down-page news item appeared in some of the national papers during the summer, and probably most people who read it thought "That's life" and passed on to other and more sensational stories.

But a lot of people in Luton must have had more than a passing pang of sympathy for the man involved — Syd Owen, who had got the boot yet again through no fault of his own. He's the living proof of the saying that football can be a very cruel game indeed.

This time last year he was working happily with a couple of old mates with Luton connections. He was coach and manager of the Manchester United youth team.

His boss was Dave Sexton, a former Town inside forward, and one of his colleagues on the coaching staff was Jack Crompton, goalkeeper turned coach who was at Kenilworth Road as a trainer until he returned to Old Trafford after the Munich air disaster.

The big Old Trafford headlines in the summer were devoted to the sacking of Dave Sexton the manager. The small paragraph follow-up stories recorded a sad sequel which now seems to be inevitable — new man Ron Atkinson wanted to bring in his own supporting staff.

Syd Owen was sacked. Life never seemed so hard on Syd the player, and it is no offence at all to Mike Saxby to recall that the fair-haired stopper was the best centre-half I have ever seen playing for the Town.

A gentleman, and with a firm belief in Christianity, Syd signed for Birmingham soon after the last war. At 24 he was transferred to the Town in the summer of 1947, and Kenilworth Road was to be the scene of considerable success for him.

Luton converted him into a centre-half, and he was also skipper in a team which was to see the club up into the First Division in 1955.

For my generation the backbone of that team was the marvellous half-back line of Bob Morton, Syd Owen and Wally Shanks. Morton and Shanks still live locally, but had the good sense to get out of soccer when their playing days were over.

Mind you, Owen is still not a moaner, and all his friends are heartened to hear him speak so well of the game that has given him heartbreak as well as pleasure since he put his boots away.

He went on international duty with FA touring parties, and the climax of his career was in the perfect setting of Wembley. He had been capped by England, was voted Footballer of the Year, and skippered the Town in the 1959 Cup Final. And things started to go wrong from that day on.

The Town lost, the club was about to start a slide down from First to Fourth Divisions, and immediately after the Wembley disappointment Syd was made manager of Luton Town.

It didn't work out. Towards the end of the 1959-60 season Syd asked to be released from his contract, which still had two years to run. The late Sam Bartram took his place and after 13 years at Kenilworth Road, Syd moved on.

He became coach at Leeds United

and was a top man for 16 years as Don Revie's side scooped an incredible collection of honours. But Revie left to become England manager. The new man wanted to change the coaching staff as well, and Syd was out of work.

He went to be coach at Birmingham City, his first pro club. Willie Bell was sacked to be replaced by Sir Alf Ramsey. Once more Syd got his cards.

He moved to Hull, where the management team was Bobby Collins and Billy Bremner, old friends from his days at Leeds. You can guess the next bit, if you can't remember . . . Collins and Bremner got the sack, and Owen soon followed.

And so on to Old Trafford, to work for Dave Sexton. The last I heard Syd Owen was still living in Leeds, and looking for a job in football.

There can't be a single Luton Town supporter who will deny his right to be allowed to earn a living in the game he has served with so much distinction.

I am not being clever. To lose is sometimes a bitter pill to swallow, and bad enough. But to see spectators determined to wreck our club's good name is intolerable and makes one feel as though all our efforts are worthless. Please don't let it happen again.

Michael Small has been selected for the England Youth squad to travel to Australia. It is an Under-20 group and includes many players already holding their place in League sides. Well done — keep working hard.

Finally, a note for your diary. We will be playing Spurs here on 12th October as the agreed testimonial game for Paul Price. There is sure to be some attractive football for you to enjoy.

Meanwhile, we must concentrate on getting back our rhythm and style that has earned us a reputation which we must work hard to improve. Hope you enjoy tonight's game.

# BACKTRACK

## A look at our visitors' history through the years

- In 1928-29 Cardiff City conceded fewer goals (59) than any other club in Division One but were still relegated.
- In the course of three successive appearances in 1946-47 and 1947-48 ROY CLARKE played for Cardiff City in Division Three (South) and Division Two and for Manchester City in Division One.
- In 1949-50 Cardiff City fielded brothers ROBERT STITFALL (goal) RON STITFALL and ALBERT STITFALL (full-backs) in their defence.
- GRAHAM MOORE scored in the last minute of his debut game for Cardiff against Grimsby in September 1958 and in the last minute of his Wales debut against England in October 1959.
- Two Cardiff players, FRED KEENOR and JIMMY BLAIR were captains of Wales and Scotland respectively in the international match played at Cardiff on 14th February 1924.
- The Cardiff v Arsenal FA Cup Final in 1927-28 was the first Final to be broadcast. Cardiff became the only non-English team to win the FA Cup and their line-up included four Irishmen, three Scots, three Welshmen and one Englishman.
- When travelling to Rashkent for the second leg of a European Cup-tie in March 1968, Cardiff made the longest journey ever undertaken in the competition, meeting Moscow Torpedo.

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
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# SPOTLIGHT

*What was your occupation before you signed as a professional footballer?*


'I was a printer with a local newspaper in Mansfield before signing on as an apprentice for Mansfield Town.'

'My preparation for a game begins Friday night with a hot bath and a relaxing couple of hours listening to my stereo, followed by an early night. I like to wind down after a game with a few drinks with my family and friends.'

'I have to say Billy Bingham at Mansfield, who gave me my first extended run in the Football League. I'm also very grateful to David Pleat who gave me an opportunity of playing at a higher level.'

*Who was, or is, the best player you have played with or against?*

'Trevor Francis has to be the best player I've faced so far, and I believe our own Ricky Hill has everything it takes to become the best player I've teamed up with.'

*What do you remember about your Football League debut?*

'I have rather mixed memories of my League debut. On the credit side, I was lucky enough to score the winning goal in the last minute of a 2-1 victory at Halifax. I was brought down to earth with a bump the following week though, when I was left out of the side!'

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

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# FLASHBACK

**The Luton Town Scene a decade ago**

PEOPLE WERE going crackers over ker-nockers 10 years ago this week. A new toy, two solid plastic balls joined by a cord, was all the rage, and everywhere children gathered you would hear the clack-clack of a craze doomed to vanish quickly — the pleasure soon wore off if you could get the rhythm right, and if you didn't bruises on the wrists were painful.

Among Luton Town supporters, there were other reasons for some of us to go crackers — we were about to play our seventh Second Division game of the season, and still hadn't managed a victory.

Six draws had kept us out of the relegation mire, but on 18th September 1971, we faced a

tough hurdle with an away match against Millwall.

They were unbeaten and third in the table, and we didn't need reminding that the previous Town visit had been disastrous — it was part of a chronic Easter earlier that year when we had blown the promotion chance by losing to Bristol Rovers, Millwall and Leicester.

The danger men at the Den were twin strikers Barry Bridges and Derek Possee, and Benny Fenton's team was widely tipped for promotion.

Millwall's manager today, of course, is Peter Anderson, and he should remember the 1971 confrontation with considerable pride. He scored two brilliant goals, in the early stages of a career which was to give much pleasure to a lot of us at Luton.

The Town had a bad start — in the second minute Possee headed a free-kick by Dennis Burnett goalwards and it went

into the net off the leg of Don Shanks.

But seven minutes later Don Givens raced down the right-wing, pulled the ball back, and Anderson launched himself horizontally to equalise with a flashing diving header.

Twenty minutes later John Ryan downed Harry Cripps in the penalty area and Cripps made it 2-1 with the spot kick, but as the game developed into an end-to-end thriller Anderson struck again in the 70th minute. He picked up a long clearance by Tony Read, went through on his own and blasted in an angled shot.


It was our sixth draw in seven games, but at long last there were signs that better results were just around the corner.

There was another Millwall connection with Kenilworth Road 10 years ago this week. Terry Newman, Luton Town's assistant secretary for two years, moved to the Den to take up a similar job. John Wilkinson, now club secretary, and a former youth player and coach, was appointed to take Newman's place.

One man who wasn't changing clubs in the same week was centre-half Chris Nicholl. Bobby Robson was trying to build a top side at Ipswich, and had a stopper named Bobby Bell.


He asked Alec Stock to take Bell and cash in exchange for Nicholl. Stock refused, and Robson went to Blackburn instead, and there managed to do a deal which took Allan Hunter from Ewood Park to Portman Road.

# PROGRAMME CORNER

Some of our older supporters will readily recall the emergency measures that were taken during the war in setting up local regional leagues so that travelling was kept to a minimum and football fans had something to watch to keep up their spirits during a trying period.

Soldiers in uniform were allowed into grounds at half-



price and with teams fielding whoever happened to be available at the time there were some lively and often high-scoring games.

Programmes were, of course, also of an emergency nature, usually just a single sheet with the teams printed on one side and fixtures and perhaps a few notes on the other.

Many teams fielded 'guests' from amongst servicemen stationed nearby, which meant that Aldershot, for instance, could often field a team composed mainly of

internationals because of the army base there.


The London clubs were a little more fortunate than most in that they could usually field a majority of their own players. An Arsenal v West Ham programme dated October 1944 for instance reveals just two guests in the home side, Stan Mortensen of Blackpool and Billy Wrigglesworth of Reading, while Jock Dodds led the West Ham attack.

As often happened, this programme listed not only the game but also the rank of the player concerned so that Arsenal have CSM Swindin in goal, Sgt. Scott at right-back and F/Lt. Bernard Joy at centre-half.

Another feature of the time was the large number of Inter-Service games that took on virtually an international aura. A programme of an Army v Western Command game played at Wolverhampton in

1944 lists 15 internationals and also provides an interesting sidelight on a typically unusual event of the time.

Stan Mortensen is stated to be of Blackpool and Wales. Stan of course was England-born and bred, winning many caps after the war, but he had in fact made his wartime in-



ternational debut when going on as substitute for Wales to meet an emergency in the previous season, when Ivor Powell was injured and no Welsh player was available.

Programmes of the time also carried grim warnings, a typical one reading: 'In the event of an Air Raid Warning being received, the Police will instruct the referee to stop the game when they deem it necessary and the players must leave the field. Spectators must take shelter and remain under cover until the "all clear" has been given.'

*John Lewis* has been one of Cardiff's outstanding players over the last two full seasons and gave up a clerical post with British Steel to become a full-time professional and quickly made up for lost time.

*Keith Pontin*, another defender, won his first Welsh caps against England and Scotland, in the 1979-80 British Championships.

*Rod Thomas* is the most capped of all Welsh defenders with 50 games in the red shirt. He is now a central defender of

*Peter Kitchen* finished his first season as a Cardiff player as leading scorer for 1980-81 and scored 89 League goals at an average of almost one every other match for Doncaster; then equally consistent for Orient including a goal in every round as the London club reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1978. He moved from Fulham in September 1980 for £125,000 and quickly took over as Cardiff's dangerman. *Paul Sugrue* was signed during the close season from Manchester City where he played nine First Division matches.
