


We hope they had an enjoyable evening last night, when the Luton and District Midweek Cricket League held its annual prize presentation function at the Hatters Club.

Consistency is the key and if we cannot achieve it then we will be also rans. It is pointless raising ourselves to superb levels of football one minute and then, one game later, showing that we can look semi-desperate and lose rhythm when we get goals behind at home.

It is not easy when you lose an early goal. The opposition defend determinedly and break out sharply. Wrexham did it really well and their away record is very good which illustrates this strength.

Our youth team put up a splendidly gritty performance at West Ham in the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup before losing to a goal with five minutes remaining.

The upset of losing was galling for these junior players but the way they played in an exciting second-half was most encouraging.

The refusal of many clubs to allow their players to represent their country is ridiculous and illustrates clearly why we are losing face at the top level.

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
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SPOTLIGHT





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FLASHBACK

A look at the Luton Town scene a decade ago

Two away defeats in four days left Luton Town supporters feeling decidedly disheartened ten years ago this week. Realisation was dawning that, while we might be good enough to be safe in the Second Division, the cherished dreams of promotion showed little signs of coming true.

Failure to score goals was the big problem, although it was not confined to Kenilworth Road.

On October 16th, 1971, the Town travelled to Carrow Road to meet a Norwich team which had gone 11

the Town.

Gordon Hindson made his debut for us, and helped to create the opening from which Alan Slough put the Town ahead in the 28th minute.

But if the Town were in control of the first half, Norwich had the better of the second, and ran out 3-1 winners in front of 22,558 spectators.

The next match, on Tuesday October 19th, was at Loftus Road, where Terry Venables was one of a number of players who thought it quite natural to play football on grass. Rangers had Phil Parkes in goal, and the emerging talents of Rodney Marsh in midfield alongside Venables. But they too were looking for more attacking punch, and had just bought John O'Rourke, the former Town favourite, from Coventry for £70,000.

His debut for Rangers was not too impressive, and he limped off with a shoulder injury in the second half. Marsh created the opening for Leach to score the only goal of the game in injury time at the end of the first half, and the Town returned home pointless because in a late effort Don Givens beat Parkes but saw his shot cleared off the line by Frank Saul.

Elsewhere in football the match of the day tens years ago this week was between Manchester United and Derby County. George Best, then at the height of his career, scored the only goal to make Frank O'Farrell happy, but the United manager was not allowed to enjoy himself for long even if the Old Trafford club had reached the top of the First Division. Brian Clough and Peter Taylor picked themselves up from that defeat, and were to lead Derby to the championship that season.

Today's visitors will enjoy recalling their soccer fortunes of a decade ago. Their manager was Lawrie McMenemy, and he was leading them towards the Fourth Division championship. Ten years ago this weekend they beat Scunthorpe away 2-1, and the man who got both goals was another striker with Luton Town connections — Matt Tees.



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Following our article in the Watford magazine asking for your observations on our pre-match games, it was interesting to receive your comments. We reproduce a letter from Michael McConkey of Tottenham:

'I wish to point one or two things out which I have noticed so far this season.'

'Firstly, I think the bingo and "take your pick" are very good ideas but I have some criticism if you don't mind. Some of the questions have been repeated twice and one of them concerning Joe Payne scoring 10 goals in 1936 which we all know. But the compere had, on his answer sheet, 1956. I can't understand how anyone to do with Luton Town cannot know that, but for all that, it's still a very good idea.'

'Secondly, you asked for some comment on the magazine. Well at 50p it's got to be one of the dearest in the Football League but the quality of the programme justifies the price. One thing I would like to see is more of those old team line-ups which appeared in the Charlton programme, I find them interesting.'

We thank Mr McConkey for his comments. Of course Joe Payne did score his 10 goals in 1936, we do apologise for our error and a special apology to Mr Grant, the unlucky contestant, who we have invited back today to have another go.'

Finally, congratulations to recent winners, Mr Erridge, who is featured in the picture receiving a clock radio at the Wrexham game. Mr Kirk, won a £5 voucher for our souvenir shop and Mr Turner won a meal for four at McDonalds.



NOSTALGIC MEMORIES


Luton supporters will be able to relive some nostalgic moments tomorrow when an ex-Town team meets the radio and television commentators side at Clarence Park, St Albans.

Town manager David Pleat has been responsible for organising the Luton team and perhaps the biggest scoop is the return to playing action of Malcolm Macdonald.

Supermac's scoring exploits have never been forgotten at Kenilworth Road and he was easily the fans' striking favourite since the days of Gordon Turner.

Macdonald has now turned his hand to management with Fulham and will be assisted in the Luton team by another former Town player, Peter Anderson, now boss of Millwall.

Mr Pleat has attempted to make his team as attractive as possible and has found room in his side for some old Hatters players who still live and work locally.



Keith Barber, who now runs a Harpenden pub, will play in goal. John Moore, now a Luton coach, has also accepted an offer to play along with Brendan McNally, the Dunstable manager.

Barry Fry, now in charge of Premier Alliance club Barnet, will turn out in addition to Fred Jardine, Alan Slough, Ken Hawkes, Derek Hales and Jack Bannister.

The game is in aid of charity and Luton supporters are welcome to watch the match.

After the events leading up to the Wrexham Football League Cup-tie at home on the 6th October, we ought to emphasise that season tickets are only for Football League Division Two games and, as an added incentive, for admittance to Football Combination matches.

All Cup games and friendlies must be paid for separately. The vouchers in the season ticket books entitle seat holders to claim their usual seat only for a Cup match, but this is paid for separately.

The vouchers in the season ticket books for the standing areas are only applicable if it is an all-ticket match. Then you are guaranteed admission for an all ticket match, but you will still pay for admission.

Regarding season ticket holders seats for Cup-ties, these are usually kept for season ticket holders to claim up to 24 hours, approximately, before the kick-off when all remaining seats go on general sale.

Why not hold season ticket holders seats up to kick-off time? For the Wrexham game, for instance, we sold the majority of the seats normally on general sale, as we do for most home games. We could then have been left with 2,000 unclaimed season ticket holders seats at kick-off time, while turning away other potential purchasers.

Only approximately one third of season

ticket holders seats were taken up for the Wrexham Cup-tie. Therefore we must have a chance to sell these unclaimed seats.

Tickets are now on sale for the Crystal Palace match and we are still willing to take postal applications in advance for future home matches and we will forward these tickets as soon as they are printed. Tickets for the matches away to Wrexham on the 24th and 27th October will be on sale at Wrexham on arrival.

Their box office tell us there will be plenty of seats available.

We announce new facilities for season ticket holders which will take effect from our next home game against Crystal Palace two weeks today.

The Red Bar, situated under the main stand will be made available for their exclusive use — on production of their season ticket book. Under the terms of our licence, we are no longer allowed to sell alcohol to ordinary fans following the problems we have had with a certain element of supporters who occupy the triangle in the Enclosure.

The bar has been renovated and we feel sure it will provide a valuable service for season ticket holders.

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SAVE OUR SOCCER

We are continuously being reminded that football — our national game — is heading for the scrapheap. A decline in attendances and problems on the terraces are all headlines we are familiar with. This afternoon, we start a series where Luton's chief executive JOHN SMITH, provides a talking point with an in-depth examination. It will be continued in the magazine for our game against Crystal Palace on October 31st.

It is disappointing that, having appointed a new President with a fresh outlook and approach, and with a new young progressive and co-operative secretary, the Football League should regurgitate the late Alan Hardaker's proposal for restructuring the League.

For those who did not know better it would appear that, having looked around for something else, a new thought, a new concept, a change in direction, the Management Committee was unable to come up with anything new to improve the face of the game. However, to their credit, they have produced a talking point. Having considered this, one must ask oneself: Is there anything new? This recent presentation has previously

been rejected. The Third and Fourth Division still do not want regionalisation. In their view, gates would still continue to fall.

We know there is little hope of the First Division being reduced in numbers, and therefore in games. Indeed can we afford to reduce the number of games and gamble on a subsequent reduction in gate money at a time of recession and continuing increasing expenditure.

Does the League plan excite the potential spectator into thinking that he must come and see League Football? Like three up and three down, the effect could be cosmetic and consequently glosses over the true problems of today's game.

We are always being told that the Football League is the greatest

League competition in the world. Then why change it? Firstly let us identify the problems:

Everyone can play their part — but there are big problems which will be discussed in future matchday magazines. But briefly, as part of the introduction, they include fear, amenities, transfer fees, newspaper reporting sterile football and other factors.

Fear is a problem which produces sterile football; hooliganism has forced clubs to spend millions of pounds on improvements when the money could have been allocated on positive improvements which, in turn, would produce badly needed income.


Transfer fees are regulated by supply and demand and it is difficult to explain why some clubs cannot spend £100,000 on decent amenities when they spend more on a new player. I think the media should have a bigger responsibility, and the problems we are facing are not helped by television coverage, the recession and other factors. There is no doubt in my mind that the interest shown in football by young children is greater than ever.

What can we do to stimulate interest in the game? There are no easy answers. But they can be found by an in-depth examination and each and every one of us has our part to play.

I have attempted to deal with each problem deeply. No-one is more concerned than I with the decline in the game and I feel the trouble can be resolved eventually with everyone's assistance.

There is also the possibility of a new competition which, if formed, would add stimulation to spectator interest. They are only possibilities, but I believe their introduction could lead to added interest in the game from the terraces.

That is what the game is all about — support. Without it, there wouldn't be football as we know it today. I hope you find the study interesting.

GRIMSBY BACKTRACK

A look at our visitors' history through the years

● Grimsby Town were founder members of Division Two in 1892, of Division Three (South) in 1920 and of Division Three (North) in 1921.

● Goalkeeper Walter Scott saved three penalties when playing for Grimsby against Burnley in 1909.

● Grimsby are the only club to have played in six different Divisions of the Football League, namely the current four plus the former Northern and Southern sections of Division Three.

● Grimsby have met all the current Football League clubs except Wigan

Athletic though they did meet their predecessors Wigan Borough.

● Jackie Bestall, the former Grimsby forward, not only had a street named after him but was also the oldest, smallest and lightest forward to make his England debut when stepping out against Ireland in 1935. He was 35, 5ft 3in, and 9 stone.

● Father and son Jack and William Butler both played for Grimsby during the 1916-17 season.

● Allenby Chilton is the only player-manager to have led his side to top

place in any Division of the Football League. He led Grimsby to the Fourth Division title in 1959-60.

● Pat Glover holds the Grimsby record for the most goals in a season (42 in 1933-34) the most in a career (182) and the most international caps (7 for Wales).

● The late Ralph Hunt scored in each of the first 10 games of the 1959-60 season.

● Former Grimsby managers include Bill Shankly, Lawrie McMenemy and John Newman.

PROGRAMME CORNER

Sheffield United may be in the Fourth Division for the first time in their history, but there is no evidence of declining status in their match programme which remains a 32-page issue in full colour on good quality paper.

Like many other teams, most of them in the top two Divisions, they make use of a 12-page inset of general interest and integrated in colour and style with the 'home-made' part. Whether



or not fans agree with the use of an insert, there is still plenty of material produced by the club itself and this raises the question of how desirable it is to keep up its programme image when it slides to a lower Division.

United's gates are just a quarter of what they were ten years ago when they were topping Division One, but they are paying just the same amount of attention to their programme.

They may well be struggling to break even on sales of the current glossy issue, but at least they are showing fans that they haven't accepted they are now a 'little' club and this is bound to help the morale of fans who may


see in it a determination to climb back towards Division One as soon as possible.

Although figures are not usually published, some clubs are known to have lost heavily on programmes through preparing too elaborate and costly an issue. But what is the other alternative? If, when gates drop, the programme is reduced in size and quality, even fewer will be sold and even if no financial loss is made there is the intangible loss in morale for fans and perhaps even players.

One recalls the way Southport issued just a one-sheet programme a decade ago to cut losses. But these issues were soon proving to be valuable collectors' pieces. The reason? They lost their Football League place.


Barrow, on the other hand, kept their programme up to its established quality (and at one time it was one of the best in the lower Divisions) right to the end of their Football League life.

Maybe neither fact was relevant to the team's problems on the field, but one has the feeling



that if a team maintains a bright lively programme it has done all it can in that direction.

Some fans, of course, never buy programmes or, apparently, care about the sort of issue their club produces. Those who do buy them, however, are quick to add their complaints if the quality drops and this is something no club wants when results are starting to go against them.




Huddersfield's programme has, in general, been less expensively produced than the Sheffield United one referred to above, but at least standards did not fall when they slipped into Division Four. Now they have celebrated their return to a place in Division Three (and last season they came near to Division Two) by increasing the size and improving the appearance of their programme.

Programmes are not all-important of course, but, they do matter in the battle to keep fans devoted to a club in these days of economic stringencies.

Grimsby arrive at Kenilworth Road this afternoon hoping to make their mark just behind the pack chasing promotion to the First Division.

Managed by George Kerr, Grimsby surprised many of their critics last season by finishing in seventh place in the Second Division table. This season, they hope to achieve better things and, under Kerr, there is a faint suspicion they can.

Kerr took the Mariners out of Division Three after a playing

career with Barnsley, Oxford and Scunthorpe United. He became coach at Lincoln under Graham Taylor — now manager of Watford — and succeeded him when Taylor joined the Hornets.

However, Kerr left Lincoln at Christmas 1977 and was appointed trainer-coach at Grimsby in July 1978 and took over as manager when John Newman left for Derby County almost 12 months later.

Now, after 88 years in the Football League —

including a spell in the First Division — Grimsby now find themselves fully established in the Second.

If Luton have ambitions of victory this afternoon, they will have to find a way past keeper Nigel Batch, voted the club's Player of the Year last season. He hasn't missed a game in the last three seasons and joined Grimsby from Huddersfield Town.

Right-back Dave Moore is the son of a former Grimsby centre-

half and arrived at Grimsby in 1977 as an apprentice. Before the start of this season, he had played 64 first team games. Kevin Moore, another right-back, is Dave's elder brother and played for Grimsby reserves as a schoolboy. He has missed only 12 matches in four seasons.

Midfielder Joe Waters is the club's skipper and was signed for only £10,000 from Leicester in 1976 and has been capped by Eire. Central defender Clive Wigginton is in his second spell with Grimsby after rejoining them from Lincoln after a spell with Scunthorpe.

Striker Kevin Drinkell has attracted attention from a host of clubs. A local lad, he top-scored two seasons ago with 16 goals and knocked in seven in Second Division games last season.

Midfield player Bob Mitchell hasn't missed a game in the last two seasons — a record which speaks for his ability.

Striker Kevin Kilmore cost Grimsby £60,000 when they signed him


from Scunthorpe in 1979 and, before the start of this season, had scored 17 goals in 36 games for the Mariners.

Winger Mike Brolly was one of six players signed by Tom Casey, a former manager who cost only £5,000 when recruited from Bristol City in 1976. Defender Mike Czuczman started his second spell with Grimsby when he was signed from San Jose Earthquakes in September 1980. Another player who

joined the Mariners from an American club was the experienced Trevor Whymark who arrived from Vancouver Whitecaps in exchange for an £80,000 fee. Whymark was a former favourite at Ipswich where he played over 250 games and won an England cap.


Kerr's only close season signing was John Ward from Watford. He has scored over 100 Football League goals.
