FEW COMMENTATORS mentioned the sapping mud at Blundell Park last Saturday which favoured the rugged Grimsby long-ball chasing, and frustrated the closer skills of a Rams' side master-minded by Charlie George who was one of the few players who also maintained standards in the quagmire.

Despite showing much better liaison and pattern under Charlie's baton the luck the lads needed to get the goal, which would have galvanised their confidence, eluded them.

They had limited chances, and those they had went astray — once when Paul Emson, given 'birthday boy' service from Charlie to celebrate his 100th League appearance, slotted across a great chance for Kevin Wilson which stuck in the mud at the vital moment — and when great saves from former Rams' apprentice Nigel Batch denied Kevin and the ever-battling Swindles. Please note, they are both going to benefit from the 'Georgian' service before too long.

The big slice of luck that broke the deadlock went to the home-side, when some slack marking from a throw-in led to a sucker-punch ball which found two home players in space behind the offside trap for the only goal of the game.

'Offside', screamed Rams' fans, and Charlie, who was booked for his pains. But did Barry Powell (in a Slough of Despond at the moment) move out too late? The linesman decided on the affirmative for what must have been a hairs-breadth decision.

Said John Newman: "We deserved a point". We agree, so did most of the marvellous 2,000 who travelled.

## Derby County 4 Crystal Palace 1

ONE THING is for sure... there is always something unexpected about Derby County at the Baseball Ground these days.

They can be quite brilliant, as they were against Palace, or frustrating as they were against an insipid Shrewsbury. But the fans do get their money's worth.

Against Palace they found themselves trailing to a 17th minute goal put past Banovic by John McAlle, trying to clear his

line. Then they went on to destroy the visitors with four clinical goals.

Mind, until Kevin Wilson's two great efforts in the last 12 minutes Palace were rarely out of the game, but they also rarely matched the home side for determination. Bucko got things on an even keel with a tremendous 22-yard free kick three minutes after McAlle's blunder. It went in off the underneath of the bar. Glenn

Skivington headed home a Barrie Powell corner for his first League goal in 39 minutes, and Dave Swindlehurst made Wilson's first in 78 minutes with a superb back flick which gave Kevin the space to volley superbly over the keeper into the roof of the net.

Five minutes later he met a perfect cross from Paul Emson, who had switched to the right to make it 4-1. In between Banovic made some neat saves in a thrilling game.

## AND IDIOTIC MISTAKES LIKE TOWN'S GOAL COULD NOW PROVE TERMINAL

DERBY'S DEFENSIVE LAPSES have cost them dear this season, as the goals against total of 57 in 31 games emphasise. But never can they have conceded one as daft as that which let Shrewsbury in for an equalizer they had never looked like getting.

here, but confidence, and experience. And I've got both. But I can't perform miracles, I need the crowd to help me get the confidence back".

Hardly any of the giant 2,000 horde of Derby fans who trekked to Grimsby were disappointed in Charlie. Nor was the *Derby Evening Telegraph*.

Said Gerald Mortimer: "... his return gives sounder reason for optimism. He had played only a couple of games for Bournemouth since returning from Hong Kong, but immediately confirmed that he is one of the best passers of a ball in the game.

"He plays the game at the pace he dictates and his ability to read situations, and put the ball in the right place, remains uncanny. His signing could be a master-stroke, but only if other players develop because of his presence".

That, in our view, is a precise summary of the Charlie George situation.

Charlie's view after ten days training with the squad, most of whom are new since his departure more than three years ago, and after that one game at Grimsby is: "We'll get out the rut, don't fret. And take it on next season".

Charlie George, popular hero of the man-in-the-street intends to make his presence so felt that he is offered a contract to stay in his favourite habitat outside his London birthplace well beyond the end of 1982.

That not only depends on him, we feel. It also depends on the way Derby's fans nurture the young "chicks" he has been brought here to help mature.

Your continued support today as they face the well-balanced, attractive Luton Town League leaders could set the seal on the way the vital last ten games of the season unfold, whatever today's result.

# RAMARENA STAYS



**THE NEWS** that after talks with Derby City Council, it has been agreed in principle that they, together with Derby Football Club, jointly market the playing area land for industrial development is yet another reflection of the changing financial climate in the game.

Its sale by the club will provide a substantial capital injection into DCF, and its loss as a training facility will not be crucial if formal negotiations to share facilities with Derbyshire at the County Cricket Ground are successfully concluded.

The highly successful Ramarena venture is not to be disposed of, nor any of the surrounding facilities and the gymnasium.

Derby County are at present re-negotiating lease terms with the City Council which would

enable the leisure centre to be even more extensively used by the general public, with a retained use by the club for its own use and events.

We place on public record our gratitude to the City Council for their sympathetic consideration of the situation; it is heartening to realise they appreciate the value of successful League football and County Cricket Clubs to the industrial and commercial life of the city and county.

They are as keen as we are to get Derby County back on the map, and are placing every helpful advice possible into our path.

**Two honorary vice presidents**

HONORARY vice presidencies have been bestowed on Mr. Rex Stone and Mr. Tim Brooke-Taylor, who both recently stepped down from the Board of Directors. Their former colleagues decided on this course to show their appreciation for the work done by both men on behalf of the club.

In his letter of resignation last week Tim Brooke-Taylor said he appreciated that all the other Board members had injected substantial cash deposits into the club, which he had not been able to do at this time, and he didn't feel it equitable that he should have an equal say with them in the formulation of club policy.

His resignation, he emphasised, was not 'political' anyway. In fact, he applauded two of the Board's most recent decisions:

1) The appointment of John Newman as manager and 2) the signing of Charlie George. He had had a happy relationship with the club's officers and supporters, and he would continue to be a most ardent follower of Derby County FC.



## Central League change foreshadows cuts all round as slump bites

A SIGN of the current football times came last week at an extraordinary general meeting of the Central League, in which our Reserves side performs. They decided that from next season the League would switch from Saturdays to a mid-week competition.

*Clubs found it necessary, because of the current financial climate bedevelling the game. We often tend to think that Derby County are the only sufferers ... but that is far from the case. The cash squeeze is widespread.*

The switch to mid-week means that clubs will no longer have to find playing personnel for three full teams on Saturdays, and will inevitably mean most will now cut down on their playing staffs.

• • •

At the meeting club after club confessed they could no longer afford to carry players on first team wages in their Reserve sides. Inevitably, too, in some cases, the change will mean a depletion in the coaching staff necessary to keep the playing wheels turning.

It is all one of the tragedies of the occasion which, until this week's figures brought them a few thousand under that total, has meant three million unemployed throughout the country. Now the knife is biting deep into professional football, too.

• • •

*One small silver lining will certainly be that managers and senior coaches will now be able to check on their Reserve players most weeks because the first team will not be playing at the*

*same time ... and this, too, will inevitably mean tactical differences in the nature and function of a Reserves' squad. It could bring long term benefits.*

The Central League, now constituted of 22 clubs and generally regarded as the strongest of its kind in the country, may well decide at its annual meeting this year (and I have a strong feeling that it will) to extend to two divisions of 16 teams each, so allowing more League clubs

• • •

Divisional sections of 16 clubs each, rather than one of the present 22, would mean fewer matches and less travelling, with fewer consequent expenses ... an attractive proposition in the contemporary climate. It would also mean that 32 reserve fixtures would be easier to fit into next season's programme, which starts on August 28.

It is no secret that clubs have been concerned by the dropping of standards in the Central League this year, where economies by clubs have meant a big increase in the number of apprentices appearing in team line-ups.

This switch will mean a strengthening of standards, albeit with fewer senior professionals on the staffs of most clubs. That, in the long run, could only be for the

good as far as playing standards are concerned at Football League level, too.

• • •

Derby County welcome the moves. We are aware that we have a hard-core support who follow the Reserves at every home match, and we hope they appreciate that continued husbanding of leaner resources simply has to be adopted, not only by us, but by all clubs. Mid-week evening kick-offs will, we do hope, mean that even more people will come along to watch what is proving to be a most promising batch of youngsters.

**I END ON A SAD NOTE.** This week-end my assistant secretary and friend Steve Paxton moves outside football to secure his future.



What Charlie needs is space and a lot of the ball. Given that we feel he can extract even from this injury-hit squad the rich potential of which we have always believed it capable.




Chasing a George ball, Wilson snaps in a shot which keeper Batch smothers brilliantly.

## A FORTNIGHT AGO THE BASEBALL GROUND WELCOMED BACK KING CHARLES WITH GUSTO

### The decline began with his injury against Stoke on March 24, 1976

THE RECEPTION WHICH CHARLIE GEORGE RECEIVED on his "home-coming" a fortnight ago said it all. Back in the fold was a former Ram who was, and still is, a special favourite with all Derby County supporters.

When he joined Derby County for the first time in July 1975 the club had just won the First Division Championship, for the second time in four seasons. The team, then, was full of household names — internationals Roy McFarland, David Nish, Colin Todd, Archie Gemmill, Francis Lee, Bruce Rioch, Henry Newton, Kevin Hector and Rod Thomas, plus Roger Davies, Ron Webster, Steve Powell, Peter Daniel and Colin Boulton.

Later that season Welsh maestro Leighton James was signed from Burnley, and the Rams' machine was very much in the hunt for the League and F.A. Cup double to add to their scalps.



In playing terms Charlie George figures at the beginning of the end for Derby County as a First Division power in the land. The date was 24 March 1976, almost six years ago to the day. A Wednesday evening, it was a rearranged League fixture with Stoke City at the Baseball Ground and Charlie suffered a shoulder injury which kept him out for the rest of the season.

Despite defeating Birmingham City 4-2 here in March, the rest of the season without Charlie was an anti-climax. In a lack-lustre performance at Hillsborough we lost by 2-0 to Manchester United in the F.A. Cup Semi Final, and the results went badly in the League ensuring that Rams finished fourth instead of first.

Indeed, their only victory in the last five games came at Portman Road when Ipswich Town were trounced 6-2.

After that season changes came quickly. Alan Hinton and Francis Lee retired, Roger Davis left for Bruges. Derby were desperately short of fire power at the front, and it was not until after the departure of Dave Mackay that the free scoring Derek Hales was signed from Charlton. But that elevation proved unsuccessful, and Hales found it much harder to find the net for the Rams in the First Division. Following the axing of Colin Murphy, Tommy Docherty soon sold Hales to West Ham at a great loss of over £200,000 to the club.



As a result, Charlie was often left 'ploughing a lone furrow'. He filled the role in a truly professional manner, and there were no grumbles from him about the hard work he had to put in. It is this facet of his game that will be called for in his new role in midfield for Derby. The odd goal or two will be a bonus. A player of the quality of Charlie does not arrive on the scene very often, so the Rams long suffering (but faithful) supporters should be in for a treat.

Injuries have played their part in Charlie's career to such an extent that, at the age of 31, he had made only 374 senior appearances in his career when he returned to us.

While at Forest he made two League appearances, and helped them to win the European Supercup in 1980. On January 30 1980, he scored the only goal of the first leg at the City Ground after just nine minutes, and played in the 1-1 draw in Spain against Barcelona on February 5. Then, after returning to Southampton, he completed that season with 20 league appearances and 3 goals, his combined total for the League for Southampton then being 22 appearances and three goals.



Last season he played a further 22 league matches scoring eight goals. His last appearance for the Saints was at Stoke on March 14 last year.

The previous Saturday he had scored, what proved to be, his last goal for Southampton, in the home victory over Norwich.

During Derby's relegation season Charlie played in both games against the Rams, the second being his last competitive appearance here. On February 16 1980 the teams drew 2-2. He played against Derby seven times in the League for Arsenal and scored four goals. One a penalty. One of those goals was his only goal scored as a substitute after he had replaced Terry Neill on November 8 1969 when the Gunners drubbed the Rams 4-0.



He scored twice in three F.A. Cup games for Arsenal against Derby. All these appearances and goals were in 1972 when the Rams drew at the Baseball Ground and Highbury before losing 1-7 at Leicester in the second replay, thanks to that now famous John McGovern backpass which Ray Kennedy gleefully converted. Charlie scored both goals in the 2-2 draw here in the first of these three games.

For Arsenal the only club he scored more against was Sheffield United, against whom he also made his League debut for the Rams on August 16 1975 at Bramall Lane. He scored yet again that day in the 1-1 draw.

Playing for Arsenal, Derby, Southampton, Nottingham Forest and Bournemouth, that total is made up as follows, (goals in brackets):



Charlie reached three century milestones while with the Rams, the first his 100th goal in first class football. This was achieved in a 4-1 home League victory against Leicester City, Charlie's first goal of two, bringing up the century. That game was played on April 22 1978.

On August 22 1978, the first away fixture of the following season marked Charlie's 100th League appearance for the club. Charlie's 100th appearance in all competitions came on Saturday December 3 1977 in a home game against Manchester City which the Rams won by 2-1.

The corresponding fixture of the following season was the 'curtain raiser' and Charlie obliged with the first goal of the game, heading in a cross from Gordon Hill. He scored one other goal in the 2-1 home win over Southampton on September 23 1978, a game which was the luckless John Duncan's second appearance for the Rams.



Charlie made 11 appearances for the Rams in 1978-79 before being injured in the 5-0 defeat at Anfield against Liverpool on October 14. Indeed he had not fully recovered from injury when Southampton signed him on December 21. In order to prove his fitness he was loaned to Nottingham Forest on January 14 1980. He had made only two League appearances for the Saints, the previous season after leaving the Rams.

His favourite opponents in a Derby shirt were Coventry City against whom he belted five in as many league appearances, two of which came from the penalty spot.

At the time he left Derby there were only three First Division teams Charlie had not scored against, Chelsea (in nine League games) Norwich (in five meetings), and Bolton Wanderers whom he played against for the first time in a League match in September 1978. He will want to forget that match, though, because he was sent off and the Rams lost 2-1.

It's a privilege to have Charlie George back at the Baseball Ground. The memories linger on concerning his performances for us, particularly in his first season. The vision, the breathtaking passes and the plumb with which the ball was sent into the net were all hallmarks of the great player we know.

While not expecting miracles, we just hop that a little rub-off of that class will enable Derby to improve their present position and will instil into some of our younger players what true "class" is all about.

form of Signatures at the lower end of cheques and, as I said originally, I appreciate I speak from a privileged position.

(Privileged enough to know that being a Director is not all Beer and Skittles). Directors are not paid individuals, but have many responsibilities and tasks that consume time as well as cash. Derby County is important to them.

Players are bought and sold. They form one of the assets of the Club. All are professionals, doing the job they are paid for, but I can; forgive me, I will, tell you all, that aside, some play for Derby County because that was always their ambition. Others have been bought, and stayed long enough to love the Club, some indefinable character about the place. As well as the generous wages we have paid in the past that have forged links between the Club and Players.

Apart from our home-bred locals, how many Ex-Players settle here. Even those who have been around after leaving us, seem finally to adopt Derby as their homes. The present squad, many of them youngsters, some setting up home and families, earn their bread and butter at Derby County. Yes, Derby County is important to them, too.

Do you know the full measure of support there is for Derby County? I doubt it. I repeat, from my multi-rolled privileged association with the Club I am continually amazed at the interest, support and concern for Derby County, from the most unusual and unexpected quarters.

The actual attending-matches supporter, is fantastic considering all the circumstances. But please, I beg of you to believe me: this is only the tip of the iceberg!

Let me introduce you to Joe Bloggs, Sarah Smith, Harry Jones, Bill Sykes and literally hundreds, nay thousands, of others. Each listens to Radio Derby, reads the Telegraph, eagerly snaps up items of interest from the Baseball Ground, discusses them at work and at home, but rarely see them for a variety of reasons.

Shift work intervenes, illness or infirmity prevents, cannot afford it because of unemployment, has to help at home because the wife is working, is working away, is exiled abroad, or is afraid to venture because of the hooliganism.

I've met each and every one. And so have you. The numbers who support Derby County in principle, if not at the turnstiles, is legion. And did anyone ever

point out to you how local trade benefits from the presence of DCFC! Few realise just what volume of business there is directly involved with a football club. The individual trade is far-reaching, and can be a goldmine in times of success.

Yes, Derby County are important to all these people. They help publicise the city and county, when the club is successful it raises the morale of the people, its value as a reducer of stress is acknowledged by the health authorities, it adds to the area's facilities and there are countless other "spin-offs" too numerous to mention. The importance of DCFC is immeasurable.

So, please, all you big business tycoons and small business stalwarts, recognise that the club is invaluable to you, as it is to all the Mine Hosts at the various hostels who tell you that trade picks up when the Rams have a good result.

Derby County, folks, are a worthy cause. They're your club, and mine. We need it, as it needs us. Your support is an investment, and if you can invest a little cash as well as time, so much the better.

Let me lastly add; your individual response to the crisis of recent weeks has been truly fantastic. Every man-Jack and Lady Jill of you who have thought about all this, and dug deep into your pockets, have proved by practical gesture you know that Derby County is important to you. Even considering the gigantic contribution from the Board of Directors, I do seek credit for, and add my personal accolade to, the ordinary supporter who has been magnificent.

When the club history of these last two decades is written the names of Brian Clough, Dave Mackay and Roy McFarland will figure big, as will the names of the present board. But no-one will be able to ignore the hard financial support given by the ordinary man-in-the-street who now proudly proclaims to be a shareholder in Derby County Football Limited.

The day will come when people who have opted out at the hour of need will envy the hundreds who heeded the call. Especially when they get privileged positions at the head of the queue for big match and season tickets, when once again success means that they are at a premium.



# ZAK (MARK TWO) BEGINS TO STRIKE

## KEVIN WILSON'S RECENT RECORD GIVES RISE TO OPTIMISM

KEVIN WILSON WILL WANT TO BE RECOGNISED in football for his own ability. But comparison with the former occupant of Derby County's No. 10 shirt, Kevin Hector, will come automatically from our supporters.

As the goals are scored, the reminder of the other Kevin will be something with which my namesake will have to contend.

Kevin Wilson has burst on to the scene in recent weeks, and the victories at the Baseball Ground against Sheffield Wednesday at the end of January, and Crystal Palace two weeks ago were achieved with the help of two goals in each game from the young striker.

A week before the Wednesday fixture, Wilson scored a hat trick in the Reserves' 4-1 victory over Leeds Reserves at Elland Road.

Since then, injuries to David Swindlehurst and Andy Hill have given him yet another chance to stake his claim for a regular place in the team. He has responded well.

He has played in nine of the last ten fixtures, and two goals in the Palace game brought his total to six, making him joint leading scorer with Swindlehurst. Four of them came in the last three appearances at the Baseball Ground.

Just before the Newcastle fixture, Kevin chipped in with two goals when the first team

met Walsall in a Midland Intermediate League match at the Baseball Ground. So, in his last four competitive matches at Derby, he has netted six times.

Kevin was signed by Derby County in December 1979 from Southern League Banbury after he had had trials with Sheffield United and Stoke City. He made his League debut when the Rams were still in the First Division at Anfield against Liverpool when he replaced Paul Emson with 17 minutes left. Liverpool won comfortably by 3-0. Kevin then played in three of the final four matches without scoring.

His first goal for the senior side was scored, also as a result of a substitution. Coming on for Glen Skivington at Bristol on October 25 1980, he added to a Paul Emson goal to give the Rams a 2-2 draw against City. In the reserves Kevin has also shone scoring five goals in 13 appearances in both 1979-80 and last season.

This season he heads the list for the second XI with nine goals in as many appearances, two of which have been as substitute. In all, Wilson has scored 13 goals in 46 first team appearances and 19

in 35 second team appearances. His appearances as substitute are seven and two respectively in the following record:-

Kevin's six goals in 15 appearances this season, if projected over a full season, would give him a very creditable 18 goals, but the projection of his return in the last nine fixtures only would give him an unbelievable near 30 goals.

As the defence is still taking shape, and as Charlie George hopefully settles in midfield, it is vital for Derby County that Kevin's thirst for goals prevails.

Goals mean points, that could be so vital to the future of this club. Stability in the Second Division is the first important step. The rest can follow.

Wilson has done well in a short time, and the combined total of Central League and senior records gives him a total of 32 goals scored in 81 appearances. Which, these days, is not a bad rate of striking.

He has shown he has the ability to score goals and in recent games has looked very sharp and lively. The problem for most strikers is the creation of enough chances by the team as a whole, in order to put a large enough percentage away.

With the midfield struggling for balance, the defence have been under far more pressure than they should have been and, in consequence, the creation of chances for the strikers, particularly in away games, has been very limited.



With Kevin posing more problems for opposing defences, hopefully that will take the pressure off David Swindlehurst to allow him, too, to upgrade his output.

There is no doubt that Swindles is a class player who needs a man like Alan Bailey alongside him to extract his best.

If Charlie can feed them with some of those inch-perfect defence-splitters for which he is renowned, then the two strikers could yet reap a rich harvest before season end.

## Away Strength is Key to Hatters' Success...

BEATEN ONLY TWICE this season away from home, the last time at Newcastle as long ago as last November, Luton Town pose an obvious threat to Derby's home record where they have remained unbeaten since last September, writes **Phil Tweed**.

*The main hope for the Rams came a fortnight ago when the League leaders were held to a home draw by their bogey team Wrexham, defeat by whom a year ago led to a faltering finish, which finally denied Luton the promotion their fine, attacking football so obviously deserved.*

It was their second successive end-of-season disappointment. Was the Wrexham result (the Welshmen also ousted them from the League Cup) the harbinger of another "blow-out", or merely a hiccup on their way to Division One?

No-one at Kenilworth Road needs this column to remind them of the pitfalls when promotion looks as inevitable as it has for Luton Town throughout this season.

Their consistent attacking football has been rewarded by 50 goals from 29 games, with the club's away form being a firm indication of pending success, and a return to the First Division after a seven-year absence.

There are those who suggest that if Luton adopted a more defensive system, then promotion would be a mere formality. Heaven forbid - and spare us that David Pleat should ditch his attacking principles which have set the Hatters apart from other outfits, and made them one of the country's most attractive teams.

Their positive manner has branded them a quality collection. Their creative style will prove more than a match for many current First Division sides.

Town will be relieved to be rid of the Second Division 'label' harnessed to them for much of their League life. Indeed, it would be no more than this progressive club deserves if their approaching centenary year were to be celebrated among the First Division elite.

Formed in 1885, turning professional five years later, Luton were elected to the Second Division in 1897. In 1900, though, along with

Loughborough Town, the Hatters failed to be re-elected and had to wait until 1920 when the formation of the Third Division let them back in.

This status, subsequently transferred to the Southern Section of that Division, was maintained until 1937 when the club's folk hero and latter-day 'superstar' Joe Payne, a former full-back who, the previous season, scored ten goals in the 12-0 demolition of Bristol Rovers, claimed 55 of Town's 103 goals. It was sufficient to win the Third Division championship.

*It was not until 1955 that Luton again tasted success. Finishing runners-up to Birmingham City, they joined the top 22 for the first time.*

Although they finished eighth in 1957 and were to make their only F.A. Cup final appearance two years later, losing to a depleted Nottingham Forest, they never posed a serious threat to the Championship contenders. And in 1960, when they were relegated in company with Leeds United, few eyebrows were raised beyond the confines of Kenilworth Road.

So to the Sixties, which were to prove most unkind to Luton. The club's decline was rapid. The first three seasons proved a struggle for Second Division respectability, to such an extent that in 1963 the Bedfordshire club were back in the Third.

*Worse followed with the advent of Fourth Division football. In 1965 and 1967, a mere ten years after recording their highest-ever League position, they ended only four*

*places above the re-election zone.*

The following season (1968) brought a transformation, as Luton raced clear to the Divisional title which proved to be a prelude to a rapid reversal in fortunes. Two seasons later, as runners-up, Luton regained their original Second Division status. Continuing on the crest of a wave, they strove once again for the top. They were rewarded in 1974, when, along with Middlesbrough and Carlisle United, they completed a trio bound for the First Division replacing Southampton, Manchester United and Norwich City to herald the first season of the "three-up-three-down" system.

*This was to be a brief flirtation. Just 42 games later, The Hatters, again in tandem with Carlisle United, were somewhat unfortunate to again be involved in an "excuse-me please" with Manchester United and Norwich.*

After finishing fifth in the Division Two last season Luton Town are pressing hard for a place in Division One where they have so far spent just six of their 57 seasons as a Football League Club. There is certainly a forward look about the whole 'Hatters' organisation this season, writes Geoff Allman.

Yet just six seasons ago storm cones were being hoisted with talk of bankruptcy after a one-

Perhaps justice was seen to be done in the eyes of those doubters opposed to the new system.

*From that season, with the exception of the 1977-78 campaign, Town have generally threatened to return to haunt their peers. When David Pleat succeeded Harry Haslam to the managerial position early in 1978, he rapidly set about the task of restoring Luton's former (albeit brief) glories.*

It may be tempting providence to suggest that his ambition is almost fulfilled. But whatever fate may await him at this season's end, he has performed a minor miracle at Kenilworth Road by assembling a team well worth the admission charge for entertainment value.

This, in itself, is a rare service to a game so often said nowadays to be stripped of entertainment. Given this approach, Luton Town will never really lose.
