Now well past his double century of senior games, he was in the F.A. Cup winning team of 1980 and the League Cup runners-up side of 1981.


Alan has since progressed to the full England team, and appears likely to add further honours against his name

When are we at home again?

Including tonight's match there have been four First Team fixtures at Upton Park in the space of 15 days. We now face a spell of 18 days without a home game—until January 22.

During that time we shall visit Manchester United (next Saturday), Nottingham Forest (on the 15th) and Liverpool (on the 18th).

BUT . . . as two of those fixtures are cup-ties, we MAY get a home game between if we draw at Old Trafford.

This is another of those indefinite situations which necessitate plans in advance. We therefore ask **all** our supporters to take notice of the information given on page 9 of this issue regarding the cup possibilities (they were also in last Saturday's match programme).

An F.A. Cup replay would take place only three days after the result of our Old Trafford engagement is known; but we would have seven days to prepare for a replay v Liverpool. What would happen if we needed a second replay v Manchester United is a situation we would not care to contemplate at this juncture! A spell of bad weather would not be any help either . . .

Fortunately the first leg of the Milk Cup Semi-Final is not scheduled until the week commencing Feb. 7, by which time the Fourth Round of the F.A. Cup will (hopefully) be completed.

On that score, we also insert the information that the draw for the F.A. Cup Fourth Round is expected to take place on Monday 10 January!

We hope that the foregoing details will not be too complicated to follow, but whatever the "ifs" and "buts" it will all be sorted out by our administrative staff and the many others connected with the matches that take place here.

For the further information of our "away" followers, we will amplify

the announcement that no seat tickets will be on sale for the Milk Cup tie at Anfield. Liverpool F.C. made that decision, and in consequence we were not able to lay claim to our 25% allocation of seat tickets which the rules permit on specific seat reservations. It is as simple as that, so admission to seats at Anfield will be by "pay at the turnstiles, first come, first served."

However, Liverpool have allocated a number of tickets for standing accommodation at Anfield, and details of those distributions are also given on page 9.

A South-East Counties "Derby"

Luton Town's last visit to Upton Park took place on the opening day of the 1980-81 campaign; they won 2-1.

If the Hatters had secured three more points that season they would have been promoted with us.

However, the Bedfordshire club eventually regained their First Division status by becoming Division II champions last season.

It has been a good thing for Southern soccer to see them return to the top section; and as they were accompanied by Watford there is a tendency for matches between the three London First Division clubs and these two nearby rivals to have a "local derby" atmosphere.

This was so on the occasion of our early-season meeting, when over 13,000 turned up at Kenilworth Road to see our 2-0 victory last August.

That was our first success against the Hatters since 1978-79, in which season we completed a double over our rivals. In the meantime they had won three and drawn one against us.

Tonight we hope to complete our first double of the present season. However, whatever the outcome, it will not mar our long friendship which goes back to Southern League days.

LUTON SQUAD

Luton Town paid their highest-ever fee for a goalkeeper when **Jake Findlay** joined them in Nov. 1979 from Aston Villa. He had played only 14 League games for the Birmingham club; at £100,000 he proved a bargain, since passing the 150-mark for the Hatters. Born at Blairgowrie, Jake is eligible for Scottish honours.

David Pleat also did well by signing **Brian Horton** and making him club skipper. Renowned for his consistency, Brian played 236 League games for Port Vale and 218 for Brighton and Hove Albion (scoring 33 goals for each club). He had skippered the Seagulls in their run from the Third to the First Division, and in his first season at Luton led another team to promotion—missing only one match.

Three players who appeared in every League game for Luton last season were Mal Donaghy, Brian Stein and Kirk Stephens.

Mal Donaghy came from the Larne club of the Irish League in the summer of 1978. He cost £20,000, and from a comparatively inexperienced youngster this 21-year-old has developed into one of Northern Ireland's World Cup stars.

Brian Stein was born in South Africa. He was playing part-time football at the age of 20 for Edgware Town before joining the Luton staff in Oct. 1977. He made his League debut within a month, and has topped a double-century of senior appearances. He was leading scorer last season with 21 goals, but has been out of action recently due to injury.

Kirk Stephens was recruited from David Pleat's former club—Nuneaton Borough. He is now in his third season as a regular member of the Hatters' team.

Billy Kellock is a much-travelled midfielder. He was signed last summer for £30,000 from Peterborough

United, for whom he scored 43 goals in 134 League games. Previously he had been with Aston Villa, Cardiff City, Norwich City, Millwall, Chelmsford City and Kettering Town.

Ricky Hill missed only four League games last season, and scored five goals. He was also voted "Hatter of the Year" by Town's supporters. Ricky came from schools football in North London, and made his League debut at the age of 17 in 1976. Now a member of the England squad.

David Moss netted eleven penalty-kicks in his 36 League games last season—and four other goals for good measure. He has already passed the hundred-mark in League goals, scoring 60 for Swindon Town in 230 games for the Wiltshire club and 68 in 147 for the Hatters prior to the start of this season. Luton paid £110,000 for him.

Richard Money is now with his fifth League club. He has also played for Scunthorpe United (173 League games), Fulham (106), Liverpool (14) and Derby County (five on loan). Luton signed him last March.

Clive Goodyear had 32 League games for Town last season, coming into the team when Mike Saxby was injured. Aged 21, he is a well-built defender.

Paul Walsh is a newcomer to the visiting side this season. A Londoner, he scored 24 goals in 87 League appearances for Charlton *Athletic* before Luton paid a big fee for him.

Wayne Turner is a product of Luton schools football. A defender or midfielder, he spent part of last season on loan to Lincoln City, playing in 16 League games for them in addition to seven for the Hatters.

Raddy Antic (pronounced "An-teesh") was Luton Town's first Continental signing. Born in Yugoslavia, he has five international caps. Luton signed him for £50,000 from Real Zaragoza of Spain, and he has now made over 50 appearances for his present club.

Pasquale Fuccillo is the son of Italian parents living in Bedford. He made his League debut in 1976 at the age of 19 after progressing through the Hatters' junior teams. A couple of broken legs and other injuries have limited his appearances, but he recently returned to the line-up.

David Geddis has been on loan to the Hatters twice. Between his 43 League matches for Ipswich Town and his move to Aston Villa he made 13 League appearances for Luton (scoring four times). David had netted a dozen in 43 League games for Villa before the start of this season.

Visiting Manager

When **DAVID PLEAT** took over Luton Town at the age of 33 in January 1978, he was one of the youngest managers in the Football League. It was a meteoric rise, as two months earlier he had two members of the staff senior to him in the managing and coaching rôle.

Prior to that appointment David had played for five clubs, including his present one. Beginning as a winger for Nottingham Forest, he won England Youth honours before transferring to Luton Town. Three seasons at Kenilworth Road were followed by spells with Shrewsbury Town, Exeter City and Peterborough United.

A succession of injuries affected David's playing-career, but he had meanwhile taken F.A. coaching courses and became manager of Nuneaton Borough in the Southern League.

He returned to Luton in 1975 as reserve team coach, later moving up to take charge of the senior side.

David led his side to promotion last season, the team losing only four League games in winning the championship.

Assistant club coach to Luton Town is **DAVID COATES**.

He previously played for Hull City, Mansfield Town and Notts County.

David had spells of coaching at Aston Villa and Leicester City before joining the Kenilworth Road staff for the 1979-80 season.

Another coach at the club is **TREVOR HARTLEY**. Trevor began his pro soccer career as an apprentice with West Ham United in July 1964. He played five times in our League side before being transferred to Bournemouth in 1969. He later became the youngest manager in the League whilst with the Cherries, but left Dean Court in January 1975.

Just before Christmas the Hatters also took **GORDON BANKS** on to their staff as a goalkeepers' coach.

Tonight's Referee

Mr. TREVOR D. SPENCER began refereeing in local Hampshire Leagues and the Hampshire Senior League, and continued via the Football Combination to the Football League.

He was a linesman at the Texaco Cup Final in 1971, a European Cup Semi-Final in 1972, and in the 1971 Anglo-Italian Tournament.

Married, with two daughters, Mr. Spencer is an Equipment Planning Engineer for a large oil company.

His interests and hobbies are golf, do-it-yourself work and caravanning.

Match Review

ALL RIGHT AT THE END

The first of our "Christmas" games took place at Upton Park on Dec. 27 (some called it Boxing Day, but that was usually Dec. 26 on the old calendar!).

Although the date was a secondary consideration to the result, at the half-way stage Swansea City had good reason to expect they would receive an after-Christmas present of three points. Two up at the interval, the Welsh club looked well set to gain their first away win of the season.

Playing with considerable determination—and not entirely without skill—the Swans were effectively spearheaded by the evergreen Bob Latchford, who netted beautifully-taken goals; he was ably abetted by Leighton James (who has always played well against the Hammers during service with other clubs).

But shortly after the resumption the "pantomime season" closed down. An almost inevitable penalty award was converted by Ray Stewart, and the Hammers took over the leading rôle in what was to become a 40-minute drama ending with the downfall of the opposition.

Francois van der Elst levelled the count in the 69th minute (the ball seemed to take ages before it went in), and then in a finale of exquisite theatrical timing, victory was confirmed four minutes from time as Paul Goddard's shot took a deflection past Dai Davies.

Not the greatest of Christmas fixtures; but what an (eventual) ending, with a true transformation scene and exciting conclusion.

WATFORD'S WAY

"Watford do what they believe is right . . . territorially they put a lot of pressure on us."

John Lyall's comments at the end of last Wednesday's match gave a down-to-earth view of the euphoria which has surrounded the Hertfordshire club's tactics in the First Division this season. The Hornets have done well (to the surprise and chagrin of many critics at club and media level), and the 2-1 victory which took them into third place was merited.

Our late rally, after reducing their lead from a penalty-kick, might well have snatched a point—for which we could have been reasonably satisfied. But a competent goalkeeper kept out Sandy Clark's header, and the second-highest attendance at Vicarage Road this season went home after a game which did not completely fulfil their expectations from a top-of-the-table clash.

The other side of the picture was painted by Graham Taylor; the Watford manager opined that our changed tactics in order to combat his side's so-called unorthodox methods paid his team a compliment. Obviously the Hammers succeeded for most of the first half, but at the end the homesters had the better of the argument.

The Lord Gage Centre

The West Ham Football Club was represented by Eddie Chapman at the Lord Gage Centre on Wednesday 8 December for the Open Day which was held to mark the completion of the first stage of the building work.

Our Chairman, Mr. Leonard Cearns, is a member of the Fund-raising Committee for this very worthy cause, and we feel sure our fans would like to know about it.

Situated in John Street, off Plaistow Road, the Centre (which has been in existence for a considerable time serving the district) will provide, after re-development, urgently-needed facilities for elderly people in Newham. The Day Centre (catering for at least 60 lunches daily) and the Caring Hostel (providing 30 bedrooms in family groups) and three short-stay rooms are now operational.

The Appeal Committee, under Saxon Tate of Tate & Lyle, has worked hard to bring this scheme to the attention of national companies, grant-making trusts and individuals to seek support. Some £300,000 has been raised from charitable sources.

The Newham Social Services Committee and the District Health Authority have backed the Centre by making a contribution of £100,000.

Now, the appeal is to be launched locally, and through the involvement of the community the Centre will be able to provide a vital service.

To support our local and much-needed Centre, the Club wants to set up its own Appeal Fund and asks Hammers' fans to help this worthy local cause.

HAMMERS' HISTORY

10 years ago . . .

Saturday 6 January 1973. Liverpool at Upton Park for a First Division fixture. Attendance 34,480. The teams :

West Ham Utd. : Bobby Ferguson, John McDowell, Frank Lampard, Kevin Lock (Clive Charles 37), Tommy Taylor, Bobby Moore (capt.), John Ayrис, Clyde Best, Pat Holland, Dudley Tyler, Bryan Robson.

Liverpool : Ray Clemence, Chris Lawler, Phil Thompson, Tommy Smith (capt.), Larry Lloyd, Emlyn Hughes, Kevin Keegan, Peter Cormack, Steve Heighway, Phil Boersma, Ian Callaghan. *Sub.* : Brian Hall.

Billy Bonds and Trevor Brooking were out of our line-up due to injury, and Kevin Lock went off after a mishap before half-time.

The concluding paragraph of our subsequent match report summarised that Liverpool had just two chances and scored from one of them. It was Kevin Keegan who headed in a quarter-hour from time, and that was enough to take the points back to Merseyside. The Reds went on to win the Championship with 60 points—three ahead of Arsenal ; Leeds United were third with 53.

20 years ago . . .

January 1963. Only 13 F.A. Cup ties were "forced through" between Jan 5 and 26, the remaining 19 still awaited a play-off. Heavy snow and frost made Upton Park unplayable, and when we did clear the snow away further frosty nights made it even worse.

Our programme commented that " (like, innumerable householders) we faced both water shortages and water surpluses. The former was caused by the freezing up of supplies in our general system and ground facilities in particular, while burst pipes flooded some offices ; then to add to the difficulties we had a fuel shortage when the supply of coke for our boilers ran out ! It has been a worrying time,

especially for Secretary Eddie Chapman who finalised the unhappy spell by contracting tonsilitis ! 'It never rains but it pours'—or freezes ! "

The weather still poses problems for football, but technical improvements have helped to decrease the risks. We "old stagers" can say to our newer colleagues : " You've never had it so good ! "

30 years ago . . .

January 1953. The programme of our match v Bury on Jan. 3 had some interesting "sideline" items.

At that time Coventry City Reserves played in the Football Combination, and the fixture compilers arranged for us to play there on *Christmas Day* ! So we fielded ten bachelors and only one married player—a fact appreciated by the "married veterans." Goalkeeper George Taylor was the exception, and he had the misfortune to concede the two goals by which we lost ; the youngsters must have also taken the day off !

Fog delays en route to Lowestoft on Dec. 27 meant a late arrival for our Eastern Counties League fixture. So our team changed into playing-gear on the coach, conceded an early goal—and then won 5—2 ; Bert Hawkins got a hat-trick.

We also reported that we hoped to make an official announcement regarding installing of floodlights at Upton Park.

40 years ago . . .

2 January 1943. War-time football. Hammers v Clapton Orient at Upton Park.

West Ham Utd. : Lt. H. Watson-Smith (R.A.), Small, W. Lewis, Sgt. Macaulay, C.S.M.I. Fenton (E.), Burnham (?), L.Cpl. Walker (R.), Gnr. Dunn, Foreman, Goulden, A/C Kippax (Burnley).

That team was in an amended match-programme, but other records show differences. Hammers won 10—3 (6—0 at half-time). Dick Dunn and George Foreman both scored hat-tricks.
