



But it is our final home match, unless of course we are able to arrange Martin Buchan's testimonial against Aberdeen, and I must take this opportunity to thank you all for your excellent support.

Once again you have made Manchester United the best supported club in the country and many of you have been away with us on our travels.

Two points I would like to make: With only very rare exceptions your vocal support has always been positive and encouraging which is something much appreciated by the players. The other point is that again with only occasional exceptions the behaviour of Manchester United fans has been good.

Certainly it is much improved compared with years ago when those of us at other clubs used to dread the excesses of that wild band who latched on to the club.

Happily we seem to have lost that element which is a big relief. It looks as if we will be playing in Europe again next season and the challenge of the continent is severe enough in itself without worrying about the people who are supposed to be helping you!

preciated by everyone at Old Trafford from board level to dressing rooms.

I would like to think that from the club angle we have played our part in giving you something to cheer. We are aiming to finish runners-up in the League Championship and

at worst we could come third. It's a long way behind Liverpool, I know, but we are working on that, and two trips to Wembley must be some consolation!

We have every intention of beating Brighton in the FA Cup Final after the disappointment against Liverpool in the Milk Cup. I promised we would go back and after achieving that we don't intend to waste the chance of finally bringing a trophy to Old Trafford.

The immediate aim as we welcome Luton here for a re-arranged League fixture is to try to end on a winning note. In fact I hope we will be bidding to complete an unbeaten League record at Old Trafford for the season.

Provided we didn't go down against Swansea on Saturday we will be bidding to achieve a home run that has not been managed for some years. Our major excitement this season has come in the Cups, but a consistent home record in the League would really be an excellent foundation for next winter's challenge.

But before we look ahead to that and the Cup Final, a most sincere thank you for your support this season. It's been great.

Will history repeat itself? Last season Spurs lost in the final of the then Football League Cup to you-know-who, but went back to Wembley a few months later to win the FA Cup.

Semi-finals have a reputation for being tense affairs, but fortunately no-one told the players, the result was a match which showed the very best of all that is good about the English game.

Not even the disappointment of Remi Moses' early goal being disallowed and first blood being drawn by Arsenal was enough to shake the conviction that it was to be our day and it was only a matter of time before United struck back. Skipper Bryan Robson led from

the front as he beat Brian Talbot to a ball played forward by Arthur Albiston, he turned quickly and gave keeper George Wood no chance as he struck the ball home.

United were now in full flight and Norman Whiteside, the youngest player on the field, had the distinction of scoring a winning goal worthy of the great occasion. He hit a screaming left foot shot that the Arsenal keeper didn't see, let alone get to!

The determination in the United camp was epitomised by the picture of Kevin Moran as he was stretchered off the field late in the game as United moved closer to their sixth Wembley appearance in seven years.

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

DAVID MEEK'S NOTEBOOK



Manager Ron Atkinson is not a manager prone to bitterness but it is going to take time to repair the damage sustained a week ago in the match at Arsenal.

The United manager feels very badly over the circumstances surrounding the dismissal of Remi Moses. He was so upset that he also landed himself in trouble with the authorities but he makes it clear about his own position when he says: 'I would not tolerate any player of mine attempting to exaggerate an injury. I would take disciplinary action against him if he over-acted in an attempt to get an opponent sent off.'

'The game is about good honest competition and ability. Anything else I don't want to know about.'

Moses will miss the FA Cup final with the automatic suspension that follows his sending off.

'It's the ultimate punishment and no amount of club fining could possibly help,' says the manager.

Ron Atkinson has also got to answer to the Football Association for the uncharismatic outburst from himself.

But the FA have surely got to take into account the United manager's exemplary record. Throughout his career he has gone out of his way to avoid criticising referees and generally has set the highest standards in his managerial career at both United and his previous clubs.

Even if Remi Moses is missing at Wembley I'm sure that Ron Atkinson will be leading the rest of the team out.

The pity of it is that Moses was one of the few players really sure of his place in the Cup Final team before the Arsenal match. Others are still competing.

NOT SO SURE

A number of players must be unsure of a Wembley place. Injuries to Steve Coppell, Arnold Muhren, Kevin Moran and Lou Macari have given others the chance to show their abilities and Atkinson insists the door for the Cup Final team is still open.

Laurie Cunningham has emerged as a contender in his efforts to prove his fitness. Paul McGrath and Ashley Grimes have also done well and are putting pressure on more established men.

In fact it is the development of this strength in depth which is probably the most important aspect of what has been a season of excellent progress.

A top-line position in the League and two Cup final appearances is a remarkable achievement . . . and will remain so even if the team don't pull it off against Brighton at Wembley.

WELL CAUGHT

Remember the FA Cup semi-final at Villa Park . . . the ball Gordon McQueen booted into the crowd and the shirt given to a fan by Bryan Robson?

Both have come to light. The ball was caught by George Bellwood and it appeared at Old Trafford the other day for autographing because the lucky catcher has a friend at court. His cousin is Jimmy Curran, United's assistant youth team coach and regular Piccadilly Attacker.

I understand the young fellow who got the Robson shirt had to stay in the railway station toilet for five hours in order to protect his prized possession from marauding fans.

GUIDE DOGS

Supporters of catering manager Jim Barker's charity sportsman's nights at Old Trafford excelled themselves at the last function.

They raised a thousand pounds in a raffle in aid of guide dogs for the blind and handed over a total cheque of £2,000 to Bill Burgess, the chairman of Warrington Guide Dogs Association.

It was an effort that delighted Derek Bell who leads a team of Greenall Whitley Brewery men raising money for this cause.

'I started 10 or 12 years ago when we gave one of a litter of Labrador pups to become a guide dog. It used to cost £250 for the dog and the training in those days. Now it costs over £1,000. Overall I suppose we have paid for about a hundred dogs,' explains Derek, who is sales director of Greenalls.

A GOOD FRIEND

Manchester United lost a good friend with the death recently of Tom Henry, the retired Editor of the *Manchester Evening News*.

Although editors endeavour to be neutral, Tom always had a particular rapport with Sir Matt Busby and Old Trafford.

Only once did I see his Red affection show through in his editing and that was the day United lost 6-1 at Newcastle. The main headline on the front page of *The Pink* that Saturday night originally said the Reds had been thrashed.

It was, for once, too much for Tom who changed it to read: 'Reds in seven-goal thriller.'

Tom will be remembered in all sporting circles, professional and amateur, with affection. He was a friend to all codes.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN



I am pleased to take this opportunity to congratulate on your behalf Ron Atkinson and his playing staff for their tremendous efforts this season. Although this may seem a little premature, I think that for a depleted team to have lost by the odd goal in the Milk Cup Final to Champions Liverpool, to have reached the Final in the FA Cup and strongly contesting runners-up spot in the First Division, shows a remarkable level of skill and consistency.

I do not think anyone would disagree with me when I say that we have been privileged here, at Old Trafford, to enjoy not only a most successful season but also a thoroughly enjoyable and entertaining one.

The admission price structure for next season has now been formulated and is shown in some detail below. You will see that prices have been uplifted and we are sorry that we have not been able to retain the present level. However, costs do increase each year and although we expect to show a healthy profit (for the first time since 1979-80) it has to be said that these profits are due mainly to our 'off field' activities and successful Cup runs which cannot be guaranteed. In order to ensure a stable financial future for our club, it has been necessary to make the increases shown. We know that even at the new level they still compare favourably with the charges at most of the other clubs.

I have said many times that we need two or three seasons as successful as the present one before we can clear our debts of massive spending undertaken over the last two years which, in the light of the team's success, we feel was justified. It is also our wish to remain competitive in the transfer market, and whilst we are absolutely delighted with the sterling performance of our players, we must remain in a position whereby a shortage of money will not prevent us from competing for the cream of British football as and when players become available. I think it is worth remembering that whilst great emphasis has been made on the qualities of our international players, we are justly proud of the fact that over half the team likely to be on view today are home grown or cost only small fees and have been developed by our training and coaching staff. We salute their efforts.

Although no major structural alterations are due to be made this close season, we are still far from satisfied with the state of the pitch. Accordingly, a good deal of work will again be undertaken during the summer months in an effort to alleviate the problems. This is likely to delay our plans to install soil heating, as without doubt, the playing area must be in first class condition before such an undertaking can go ahead.

One other point which may be of interest. We have negotiated a ground catering contract with Lethby and Christopher Limited, who are leaders in the field of Stadium catering, and a considerable amount of money is to be spent during the summer refurbishing the snack bars. We trust that the new lines available in all parts of the stadium will prove popular with supporters.

In closing, I wish the team on your behalf, great success in the remaining matches this season and look forward to seeing you back here, suitably refreshed after an enjoyable summer break next August.

PROFILE on LOU MACARI

The man known to his team-mates as 'the Judge' (following his appearances on the bench this season) joined United ten years ago last January when new United manager, Tommy Docherty, paid a fee of £200,000 to Celtic. Lou made a total of 57 appearances for the Scottish club, including eight as substitute, and scored 26 goals. He made his debut for United in the 2-2 draw with West Ham and marked the occasion with a goal, since then Lou has made 324 League appearances for United and has scored 79 goals.

Lou has 24 full international caps to his credit, the first being won against Wales at Hampden Park in May 1972 (when he came on for John O'Hare) and the last cap from the 1978 World Cup Finals when he was a member

of the team that faced Iran in Cordoba. A man with an impressive list of honours, he is the holder of three Scottish Championship medals, two Scottish Cup winners medals and three finalists medals. Since his move to Manchester, Lou has featured in our three FA Cup Finals (picking up a winning medal in 1977), the recent Milk Cup Final where he did a magnificent job at full-back when the defence had to be reshuffled due to injuries, and of course a Second Division Championship medal back in 1975. Lou's loyalty to United has recently been rewarded with a new contract and the club are still trying to find a date to play Celtic here at Old Trafford in a testimonial match.

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RECOLLECTIONS

ROY CAVANAGH

It is over twenty years since Luton Town last opposed Manchester United in the First Division here at Old Trafford. The clubs' meetings since the war came in a five year span from 1955-1960, with United coming out on top each time here, starting with a 3-1 victory on October 1st 1955. The cover of the *United Review* No. 5, featured Jeff Whitefoot and Mark Jones in a United portrait gallery. A successful club needs top class back-up from the reserves, and the theme of the *Review* for Luton's visit, concentrating on United's Central League side who were riding high at the top of the table, not surprising really when you realise that the team included the likes of Charlton, Whelan, Scanlon, McGuiness and Greaves. Manager Matt Busby's page spoke highly of the team, and

in particular goalkeeper Jack Crompton, who was having a steady influence on the youngsters.

When Luton came North the following season, Jack Crompton was still in the news, only this time as the trainer for 'The Hatters'! In the *United Review* all the contributors welcomed Jack back to his old stamping ground, recalling his heroics in United's 1948 Cup winning team. United's side of 1956 was heavily involved in League and European Cup action, with action from the top of the table match at Tottenham on the cover of this *Review* No. 10, along with reports on the match in Dortmund which had seen United qualifying for the quarter-finals of the European Cup at their first attempt. Luton felt the full force of that great side going down 3-1 for the second season in succession.

Two years later all was changed again as far as Jack Crompton was concerned, with his role as trainer switched to Manchester United. Matt Busby's column inside the cover of *United Review* No. 11 spoke warmly of United's gratitude to Luton, who had offered any help they could after the Munich tragedy, which included immediately releasing Crompton to return to Old Trafford and help in the rebuilding process. In a series of guest sports personalities, the late

Gerry Loftus, then Granada TV Sports commentator recalled the first coverage by Granada of a United match. It was the European Cup semi-final between United and Real Madrid on April 25th 1957, when the whole match was televised live.

Granada, of course, was then just one year old, who would have thought that twenty five years or so later we would have four channels and Breakfast television!

Luton's last visit for a League match, was on November 21st 1959 with the *United Review* No. 10 showing that things don't always change, as David Meek's 'United Jottings' looked at United's reserve side, that's where we came in! who again were at the top of the Central League, with the likes of Giles, Pearson and Brennan leading the way. The cover of the *Review* showed Warren Bradley in action. Warren, you may be interested to know, is now headmaster of one of Bolton's largest schools, Deane Comprehensive. Among the Luton players welcomed in the pen pictures, was a particular goalkeeping favourite of mine, Ron Baynham and Northern Ireland's present manager Billy Bingham, then Luton's costliest ever signing.

Neither could prevent Luton from going down to a 4-1 defeat which left them stranded at the bottom of Division One.



GIANTS FROM THE PAST DENIS LAW

A CUP-TIE LOSER — AFTER SCORING SEVEN GOALS!

There cannot be anybody with a more valid reason to recall a past encounter with Luton Town than an old-time Manchester United star who ranked among the game's all-time greats.

For it was against Luton 22 years ago that Denis Law had the incredible experience of scoring seven goals in an FA Cup-tie and finished on the losing side! For characters more doleful than the ebullient Scot that might be a hard luck story in which to wallow, but Denis — now a popular TV personality — makes light of it when he looks back on one of the strangest ties ever played. He was, of course, playing for Manchester City at the time, so there would be no United fans at Kenilworth Road to see it. After Luton had raced into a two goal lead Denis staggered former England goalkeeper Ron Baynham with a display of deadly finishing, scoring six times in succession to give City a 6-2 lead. But then, with 20 minutes left, the referee abandoned the game. When the sides clashed again on the following Wednesday Denis scored his seventh goal of the tie, but, to his dismay, City lost by 3-1.

Looking back with modesty on an extraordinary feat, Denis says: 'For the first game it was one of those days that a striker dreams about . . . half a dozen touches and every one resulting in a goal. Although the rain was torrential the pitch seemed to absorb the water and the ball kept moving. Yet for the second match the conditions were three times as bad. The ball was sticking and the game should never have been started.'

With a mischievous grin Denis admits: 'Not surprisingly, a little gamesmanship crept in. When we were leading by 6-2 the Luton players and their fans were clamoring for the referee to stop it. But let's face it, we would have done the same if the position had been reversed. In fact there had been quite a bit of muttering by our players about the conditions when we were 2-0 down.'

'When we knew we were going to have to start all over again after losing our 6-2 advantage we all felt that our luck was out. Later, after finishing up a loser, I was terribly disappointed. Yet at the age of 20 — as I was then — one has the optimistic idea that one can do it all again some day, so I didn't go around with a long face and the feeling that it was the end of the world.'

Denis didn't repeat that particular performance, but he did achieve nearly every other distinction open to him. Not only did he mature into one of the most colourful characters in the world-wide game, but he established a whole string of records — three times as a top-money transfer man; the youngest 'player' this century to be capped by Scotland; later as the most capped Scot and the most prolific scorer for that country; as a top scorer in the European Cup and as the cham-

pion goal-getter in FA Cup football. Denis, who also became Britain's first European player of the year, was a member of the select band of marksmen who have scored more than 300 goals. Yet it is the memory of the goals he didn't get that comes most easily to mind.

There was, for example, that disgraceful decision that robbed Denis and United of what could have been so precious a goal in the European Cup semi-final against A.C. Milan in 1969. After missing out through an ill-timed knee operation on United's triumph of the previous year, Denis had strained every sinew in the bid to help his club through to the final once more. But the French referee ruled out a goal that could have had a crucial bearing on the outcome when the ball had quite clearly crossed the line. 'It was a disgusting decision', says Denis, 'and to this day it still stands out as an ugly reminder of the things that went on before attempts were made to clean up Italian football.'

Another of those goals that Denis didn't get — one he would have been proud of — was in a game against Spurs. Although he scored some of the most spectacular goals that I ever saw, he says: 'This one would have been really special. With my back to goal I drove an overhead shot into the top corner of the net. But, to everyone's astonishment, the referee ruled it off-side. Yet pictures showed both Spurs full-backs near the posts in support of Pat Jennings'.

As his many admirers know, the goal that Denis never wanted to score, but did, was the one with the last kick of his career when, as a City player once more, he helped to put United into Division Two. But Denis made his peace over that unhappy incident with United's fans a long time ago.

As an explosive striker himself, it is not surprising that he was a great admirer of another of football's finest finishers, Jimmy Greaves. 'Defenders facing Greaves couldn't afford to blink an eye-lid', he says. Two other contemporaries who won his undying admiration were human dynamo Dave Mackay and the 'players' player; the late John White. Today the star who gets his vote is fellow countryman Kenny Dalglish — 'A man who has dominated English football while being a marvellous advert for Scottish football.'

Throughout a colourful career Denis feared he would miss the excitement of football when the time came to hang up his boots. But his work as a TV personality with Granada has kept him in touch. 'While there's nothing that can compensate for total involvement', he says, 'this comes pretty near.' He also confesses that he recently came pretty near to a Monty Python situation when he was 'on camera' and the producer realised that the microphone attached to his tie was faulty. 'Suddenly', says Denis, 'I felt a hand up my shirt and I didn't realise at first what was going on. It was a member of the studio crew replacing the mike while lying on the floor. I didn't look down or I might have split my sides with laughing.'


QUIXALL, Albert. Albert was only 17 when he made his bow in Sheffield Wednesday's first team in 1951 and he was still only 19 when he played his first game for England against Wales at Cardiff in October 1953. A quicksilver little inside-forward, with a mop of golden hair, Albert became an instant star though, for some reason, he won only five full England caps. But he also played for England 'B' and Under-23s and for the Football League XI. He won two Second Division Championship medals with Wednesday and, when United signed him in 1958, the £45,000 fee set a new British record.

Albert was a member of our FA Cup winning team of 1963 and played a major role in restoring the club's fortunes after Munich. When his United days were over, Albert completed his League playing days in the lower Divisions with Oldham and Stockport.

Andy made his first League appearance for United at Everton on Boxing Day 1977, when Stuart Pearson was injured, and for the latter part of the 1979-80 season he held a regular place in the team. One of the highlights of that period was a well-deserved hat-trick against Leeds at Old Trafford — a performance noted carefully by Leeds' Scottish international

ROBERTS, Charlie. Centre-halves were attacking players when Charlie was in his prime and he was one of the most skilful of his era. He began his career with Darlington but moved on to Grimsby before joining United in 1904 for a fee of £400. During his first season with the club he won three England caps and then he helped us to regain our First Division status. Charlie won League Championship medals in 1908 and 1911 and was in our FA Cup winning team of 1909. Off the field, he was instrumental in founding the Players' Union — now known as the Professional Footballers Association — and he became its first chairman. Charlie finished his playing days with Oldham and then had a spell as their manager.



ROCCA, Louis. Louis devoted more than 50 years of his life to the club. He joined us as a player at the turn of the century and in 1907 he was appointed chief scout, a position he held until his death in 1950. Over the years he discovered several hundred fine footballers who became stars with United.

LUTON TOWN

Though Luton have been fighting for First Division survival, they refused to adopt negative defensive tactics. 'We reached the First Division by trying to play entertaining football,' explained manager David Pleat. 'Our best chance of staying up is to play the way we know best.'

It's refreshing to find a manager of courage who puts the good of the game above any short-term club problems and football people throughout the country hope the Hatters can survive as a First Division club.

Injuries have taken a heavy toll on Luton. Leading scorer Brian Stein has spent many weeks on the sidelines and is only now being considered for a first team recall. And goalkeeper Jake Findlay is out for the season.

Stein's injury wrecked a fine partnership built up between him and Paul Walsh as an attacking duo. At the time Walsh had scored 12 goals but, after Stein's departure, Walsh didn't score again in the League in four months!

Walsh ended his barren spell in style, hitting a hat-trick against Swansea a couple of weeks ago.

Because of this dearth of goals, Mr Pleat felt compelled to go into the market for a new striker before this season's deadline. He completed the transfer of Trevor Aylott from Millwall for £55,000 and it wasn't long before the new man started to recoup that fee with some valuable goals.

Luton had won four away games in the First Division — at Birmingham (3-2), West Ham (3-2), Brighton (4-2) and Nottingham Forest (1-0). They drew at Tottenham (2-2), Liverpool (3-3), Stoke (4-4), Sunderland (1-1) and Notts County

(1-1). The Hatters were beaten at Aston Villa (1-4), WBA (0-1), Coventry (2-4), Swansea (0-2), Everton (0-5), Norwich (0-1), Ipswich (0-3), Arsenal (1-4) and Watford (2-5).

They reached the fourth round of the Milk Cup after ousting Charlton (3-2 on aggregate) and Blackpool (4-2) at Kenilworth Road. They went out at Tottenham by 0-1.

In the third round of the FA Cup the Hatters ran up a fairly easy 3-0 win over Fourth Division Peterborough with Brian Horton (penalty), Ricky Hill and Paul Walsh scoring the goals.

They bowed out to United (0-2) in the next round at Kenilworth Road.

Luton's best run in the FA Cup came in 1958-59 when they reached the Final during a previous spell in the First Division. Unfortunately they failed to find their form at Wembley and

went down 1-2 to a Nottingham Forest side reduced to 10 men by an injury to Roy Dwight.

This is their third spell of First Division football. They first rose to the top in 1955, remaining for five seasons. When they came up again in 1974, they suffered immediate relegation.

Luton, runaway Champions of the Second Division last season, were realistic enough to appreciate that they were not going to win the League Championship just yet. So Mr Pleat pledged his team to play the sort of rip-roaring attacking football that sent the fans home happy.

The Hatters' first seven League games produced 38 goals — very nearly six per game!

This included a 5-3 home win over Notts County, a 5-0 thrashing of Brighton and a 4-4 thriller at Stoke.


Though they were scoring so many goals, Luton were also conceding a lot so it was natural for Mr Pleat to look for some improvement in his defence. Then the loss of Stein robbed him of much of his goals power.

The club was formed way back in 1885 and originally joined the Football League in 1897. But, after three seasons in the Second Division, they failed to gain re-election. They dropped into the Southern League and it was in 1920 that they returned to the Football League as one of the founder members of the Third Division (South).

They remained there until winning promotion in 1937 but their most successful era began with their first promotion to Division One in 1955. In 1958 they achieved their highest ever placing of eighth and a year later they faced Nottingham Forest in the FA Cup Final.

In 1966-67 they finished 17th in Division Four. You can't go much lower than that.

But a year later Luton were Fourth Division Champions and in 1970 they returned to the Second Division. Luton were on the mend again.
