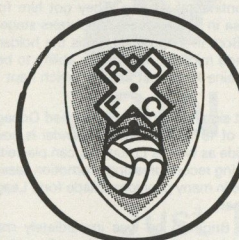
However, times move on and we look to tonight's game as a chance to show our new team the experience of taking on top flight opponents.

When Luton were last here in April 1982 they were on their way up to Division One while we were handily placed just behind the Second Division pacemakers. Now they are in mid-table in Division One with every chance of improving on last season's final position of eighteenth. Football fans up and down the country are hoping to see them make further progress this season for their exciting brand of soccer may not always please the game's theoreticians, but it is the kind that the average fan loves to watch.

It also heartens other small town clubs to see a team such as the 'Hatters' emerge from what seemed to be a permanent lower Division position to take their place alongside the 'big' clubs.

Founded in 1895 Luton were elected to Division Two in 1897, lost their Football League place in 1900 and then had to wait twenty years before returning as members of the new Third Division in 1920. This changed to Division Three (South) a year later and Luton remained there until 1937 when they climbed to Division Two. Without making many headlines they made steady progress either side of the war and won a place in Division One in 1955.

Four years later they reached the F.A. Cup final, going down to Nottingham Forest at Wembley, but then came a decline. In 1960 they lost their First Division place, in 1963 they slipped into Division Three and then in 1965 they became the second club (Brentford had been the first) to slip all the way from Division One to Division Four.

To their credit they fought back and by 1974 they were back again in Division One, albeit for just one season. At this stage they survived a severe financial crisis that threatened their very existence. The storm was weathered and after finishing sixth in Division Two in 1979 and fifth in 1980 they won promotion a year later, topping Division Two by an eight point margin and losing only four games all season.

They soon made it obvious that they had carried their goalscoring habits into Division One and in the first two months of the season they beat Notts County 5-3, Brighton 5-0 and drew 3-3 at Liverpool and 2-2 at Tottenham. Then came a lean spell and a run of ten games of which they won only one plunged them into the bottom half dozen by Christmas. By April they were next to bottom and though they rallied for a few games two draws and two defeats left them needing to win their last game at Manchester City to stay up and send the home side to Division Two.

### THIS SEASON

This they proceeded to do and they are aiming not to have such a close call again. So far they have won 3-0 at Leicester while losing at Arsenal, Manchester United and Nottingham Forest while at Kenilworth Road they have beaten Sunderland (4-1) and Wolves (4-0) and drawn 2-2 with Norwich.

Former Edgware Town man BRIAN STEIN, PAUL WALSH (from Charlton two years ago) and DAVID MOSS (from Swindon five years ago) are topping the scoresheet this season as last while RICKY HILL (capped by Bobby Robson last

season), home-grown FRANK BUNN and BRIAN HORTON (over 600 league and cup games in a career that started with Port Vale and blossomed with Brighton) provide the midfield strength.

In defence MAL DONAGHY, one of the Northern Ireland World Cup heroes, links up with local lad WAYNE TURNER in the centre with KIRK STEPHENS (ex-Nuneaton Borough) and PAUL ELLIOTT (from Charlton last season) on the flanks and LES SEALEY (from Coventry this season) in goal. Substitute recently has been Yugoslavian international midfielder RADDY ANTIC, who got the matchwinner to keep Luton in the last game of the last season.

Luton's best season in the League Cup was 1978/9 when they reached the last eight.

**RADDY ANTIC.** Antic was Luton's first continental signing. They got him for a bargain price after he had played for Zaragosa in Spain where supporters staged a protest when the transfer was announced. Born in Yugoslavia, he is the holder of five international caps. Effective in defence and midfield, he has the ability to bend shots both ways. Scored the only goal at Maine Road last season which kept the Town in the 1st division.

**MAL DONAGHY.** One of David Pleat's first signings when he snatched Donaghy from Larne, Northern Ireland in the summer of 1978. The classy defender is now a regular in the Northern Ireland International side as well as Luton and can play either in defence or midfield. Scored eight goals during record breaking promotion season. He is an outstanding Club player and is reliable in many positions. Made forty League appearances last season and scored three goals.

**BRIAN HORTON.** On joining Luton from Brighton he was immediately made Captain and soon earned the reputation of being the hub of the side with his prompting and consistent play. Played a big part in the second division promotion season and only missed two games through injury last term. This campaign will be his third at Luton and he seems destined for a coaching/managing post when he bows out.

**KIRK STEPHENS.** David Pleat went back to his old club Nuneaton to sign this right back. It wasn't long before he was a regular in the side. Not very tall but his speed, tackling and accurate passing have made him a vital link in the Club's success. He has a great passion for soccer and his determination and willingness to work has ensured a successful transition from non-league to 1st division soccer.

**DAVID MOSS.** Played for nine seasons for his local club Swindon Town mainly in the third division before being persuaded to join the Town. A £110,000 cheque exchanged between the two clubs and he was an immediate success. He makes goals and takes them and is well over the 130 total in the Football League. Has the reputation of being a marksman from the penalty spot. Although near the 30 mark, his fitness and dedication has given him belated success and opportunity at 1st division level.

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**RICKY HILL.** Born in North London, Luton beat West Ham for his signature when he was a Youth. Made his League debut at the age of 17 in 1976 and marked it with a goal. Is now the proud possessor of a full England cap. Was picked to play against West Germany at Wembley last season. He did not miss a game last season which was remarkable because he was burdened by a troublesome injury. He is now fully fit. Ricky is a loyal clubman and one of the club's most popular players. Not only skilful and a goalscorer, but has outstanding team responsibility when defending.

**WAYNE TURNER.** A place in Luton's league squad was just reward for a player who thrives on hard work. Born in Luton, he can play in midfield or defence. He had a spell at Lincoln City in season 81/82 and returned to Kenilworth Rd a better player for the experience. Made twenty nine 1st division appearances last season. Strong in the tackle. Has the qualities to become a captain. Coaches a local youth club.

**BRIAN STEIN.** Was playing for Edgware Town when Luton persuaded him to try his luck as a full time professional in October 1977. Within a month he made his 1st team debut against Manchester City in the Football League Cup. Since then he has never looked back scoring some fine goals and causing problems with his fast and accurate dribbling. Missed nearly half of last season after breaking a bone in his foot against Manchester City. At that stage, he was leading scorer in the 1st division. Was substitute for England against Wales and David Pleat predicts he will become a regular international.

**CLIVE GOODYEAR.** Born at Lincoln and signed professional forms for Luton in 1978, seized his opportunity of a first team place when Mike Saxby was injured and gained a second division championship medal in his first season in the Football League. Stands over 6 ft. tall and weighs 12½ stone. Steady player with good pace to compete with fast attackers. Recently married to a Luton girl.

**PAUL WALSH.** David Pleat gave Charlton a big cheque by Luton's standards to secure this lively forward. A regular England U21 player and also gained a full cap against Australia during England's summer tour this year. A fast mover with excellent ball control has brought him much praise from opposing teams. Stands only 5 ft. 7 ins. tall but is a real handful for any defence. Missed only one game last season and scored 13 goals including three hat-tricks. Has the ability to develop into an outstanding forward.

**FRANK BUNN.** Born in Birmingham and is a reliable goal scorer for the reserve side. Made only five Football League appearances including two as substitute last season. Signed professional forms in May 1980 after being an apprentice for twelve months. Strong forward with good skill and ability to shield the ball. A popular player with his colleagues.

**PAUL ELLIOTT.** Admired throughout football for the attacking style last season, Luton's only problem was a poor defensive record. Manager Pleat went to Charlton with a £100,000 cheque to help solve it. He bought Paul Elliott and had no qualms

about plunging him straight into the first division. The 19 year-old centre-half had an immediate effect — his Luton debut was a rare 0-0 draw after they had conceded 47 League goals in their previous 27 games! A Londoner, Elliott's height and pace marked him out as an outstanding prospect when he joined Charlton straight from school, and he holds eight England Youth international caps.

**TREVOR AYLOTT.** Injuries which threatened Luton's first division survival last season helped to give Trevor Aylott's career a new lease of life. A Londoner, he had begun his career at Chelsea and then moved to Barnsley after a brief loan spell at Queens Park Rangers. Big, strong and brave, he was with Millwall when Luton persuaded him to move for a bargain £50,000 fee late last season. With Brian Stein injured the Hatters needed extra attacking power, and Aylott became an immediate hit with fans and team-mates alike. At 25, he looked as though he had been playing in the 1st division all his life.

**LES SEALEY.** Freedom of contract and a major team rebuilding job elsewhere resulted in Luton changing their goalkeeper last summer. Jake Findlay, formerly of Aston Villa, decided not to accept a new contract after five years with Luton, while at Coventry City new Manager Bobby Gould was making major changes to the staff he took over from Dave Sexton. Les Sealey was happy to leave the Sky Blues after well over 100 League appearances for them, and Luton signed him for £70,000.

**MIKE SAXBY.** David Pleat's amazing ability to spot bargains in the lower divisions of the Football League took centre-half Saxby to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1979. But third division Mansfield knew that their 21 year-old six-footer was something special and Luton were happy enough to pay their Club record fee of £200,000 to get him. An injury against Crystal Palace in November 1981 caused the centre-half to miss most of the promotion campaign. Had a two month spell at Grimsby towards the end of last season which helped a lot towards him gaining full fitness and to be in contention for a place in Town's side for this coming season.

**RAY DANIEL.** An ex Luton schoolboys player who also played youth soccer with Limbury Boys Club, was offered an apprenticeship with the Town in June 1981 which he took and signed professional in September 1982. A midfielder player who reads the game well and has skill and shooting ability which should enable him to play in good company. Made his Football League debut against Manchester United at Old Trafford last season.

**JAKE FINDLAY.** Luton paid their highest fee for a goalkeeper when they parted with £100,000 for his transfer in 1979 from Aston Villa. He had languished in their reserve side for nine years before David Pleat gave him a chance to wear the green jersey in the Town's league side. He grasped his opportunity immediately and it wasn't until the match at Highbury last season when he broke his thumb did he miss a large number of matches. With the arrival of Sealey from Coventry City he will now find that he has competition for the first team place.

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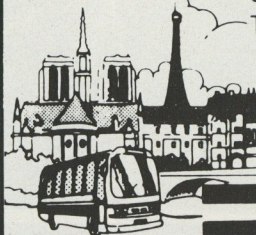
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# It's in the Laws



## Law 5

This law deals with the vital question of referees, who are required to do ten different things in the knowledge that 'on points of fact' his decision is final.

Several of the requirements of a referee are inevitably rather controversial. For instance it is difficult for him to judge exactly when to 'refrain from penalising' on the grounds that by penalising an offence he would give advantage to the offending team. There is just as much debate too over when exactly he should 'stop the game if, in his opinion, a player has been seriously injured'. Most of us can recall instances of a referee blowing up when a player has exaggerated a trivial injury and, more seriously, of a referee leaving a player in agony with a broken limb before a trainer is allowed on.

There is also a thin dividing line between the requirement of a referee to 'caution a player guilty of misconduct or ungentlemanly behaviour' and yet to 'send off the field a player in his opinion guilty of violent conduct, serious foul play or the use of foul or abusive language'. Many anomalies have occurred in this area with some referees clearly more ready to send off players than others.

One of the ancillary duties of the referee is that of timekeeper and here again controversy has occurred in cases where it has seemed that he has been distracted by the

significance of a stoppage and has not accurately added the time that has been lost. Many fans have over the years expressed the view that an independent timekeeper would be able to give his whole attention to ensuring that exactly 45 minutes were played in each half.

One might even consider the possibility of the senior linesman recording the timing of a game. Nowadays of course linesmen will signal that time is, in their opinion up, but the referee is not required to heed these. In fact this is the case with all linesmen's signals since an International Board Decision rules that 'in no case shall the Referee consider the intervention of a Linesman if he himself has seen the incident and is from his position on the field better able to judge'.

When the referee is uncertain of what exactly has happened, however, he is expected to consult a linesman and may even, on the advice of the latter, reverse his original decision provided that the game has not already restarted.

Two other pieces of advice from the laws are also interesting. It is stated clearly that 'Constant whistling for trifling and doubtful breaches produced bad feeling and loss of temper on the part of players and spoils the pleasure of the spectators' and in the section on 'Advice to Secretaries' it is stated that 'notoriously bad characters should be refused admission on to the ground'.

Soccer As Family Entertainment (SAFE for short) is the brain-child of John Maiden, a Norfolk school teacher who has devoted this season to co-ordinating the project which he hopes will become an established part of League football.

The idea is to promote a family spirit and encourage mum, dad and the kids to come to the big matches as a unit in safety and comfort.

Explains John: "It all arose out of my own experience both as a parent and Physical Education teacher. I was doing my Masters Degree Course at the University of East Anglia at the same time that Desmond Morris's book, 'The

Soccer Tribe' was published. It impressed me and led me to propose a small scale research project which we called 'Initiation into the Soccer Tribe'.

"This was followed by the making of a video film, with David Cleveland of the Audio Visual Centre at the University, featuring a group of very young children from a Norfolk First School on their first visit to a Football League match."

It seemed to John from this experiment that the majority of pupils enjoyed the experience but many were denied the opportunity of regularly attending their local

club because in recent years the image of the game has been blackened by the acts of the minority hooligan element.

Thus if he could create the right facilities he could open the way up, for children currently deprived of watching the game they enjoy, to attend their local club.

Armed with his idea, John contacted the National Dairy Council and convinced them that dairy products and soccer have an appeal to children, so they willingly sponsored the project.

Initially this season the scheme will be limited to East Anglia and Lincolnshire; incorporating the help of Norwich City, Ipswich Town, Cambridge United, Lincoln City and Peterborough United, who have all provided accommodation for family parties.

Some clubs have offered special concessions for their home games in the Milk Cup and all have issued invitations to local schools so that teachers can organise reasonably priced excursions for the children and their parents.

The campaign was launched at Carrow Road when the Canaries entertained Nottingham Forest in the Canon League. Dairy Crest Dairies issued leaflets entitling children under-16 to enter a draw for free tickets for the Norwich City v Cardiff City tie and some lucky contestants received their entry forms from Alison de Feyter, the National Dairy Queen.

Also at that Norwich City Nottingham Forest game was a party of school children from Litcham High School in Norfolk. The school was invited to be the first one to participate in the SAFE promotion and to mark the occasion The National Dairy Council provided a carton of milk for each pupil presented to them by the Dairy Queen.

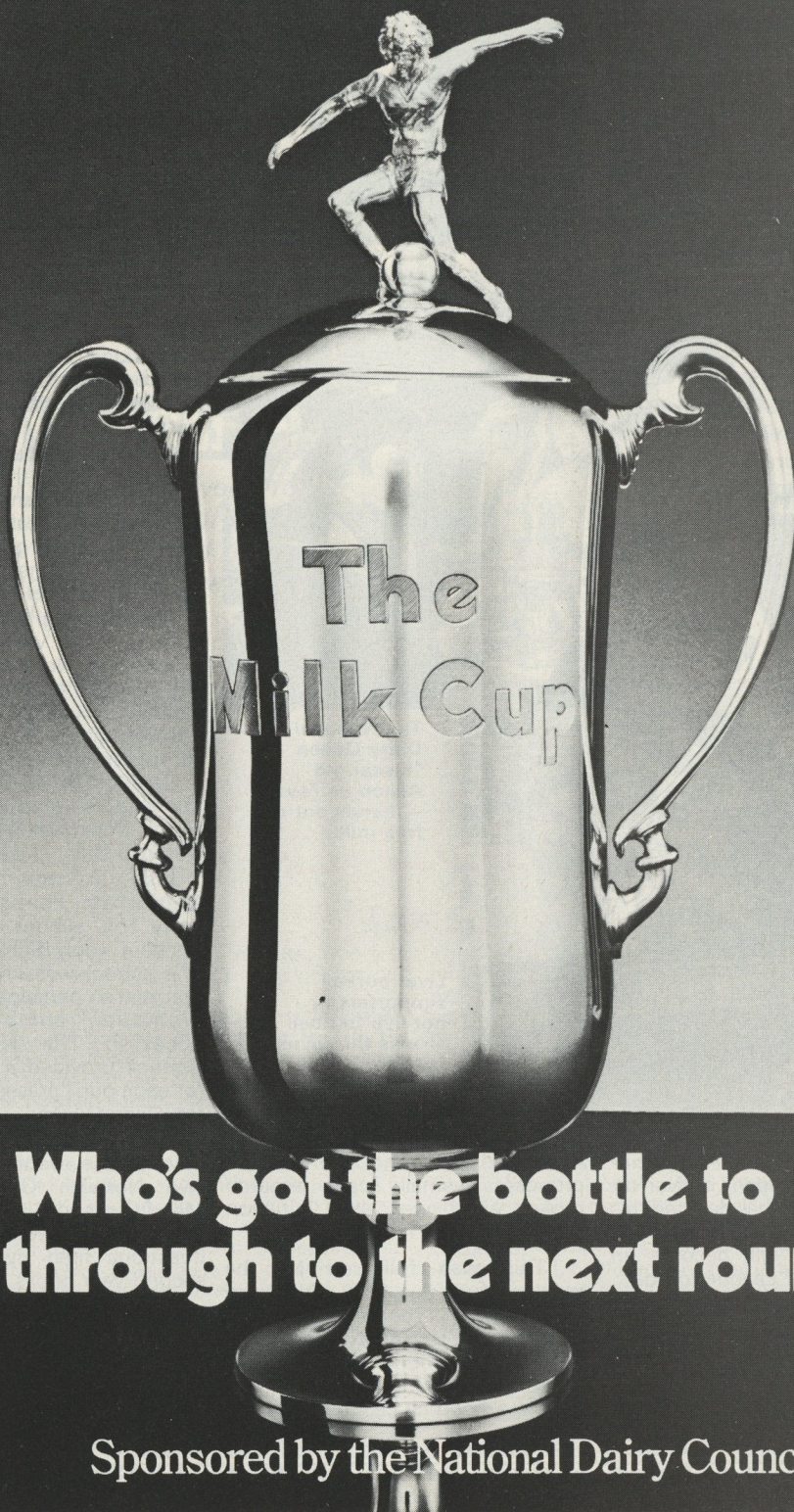
A BBC television film unit also covered the event and the visit of two Norwich City stars, Peter Mendham and Greg Downs, to the school to answer a barrage of questions fired by 200 first and second year pupils.

Of course there are other family schemes operated by other League clubs and John Maiden intends to collate all the relevant information covering all 92 League clubs and submit a report to the Football League at the end of the season.

If the SAFE project has proved to be worthwhile then we can expect the scheme to be expanded across the whole country next season.

The unique decision to seed the draw for the second round of the Milk Cup has provided a nice mixture of David v Goliath fixtures which promises a feast of potential giant-killing acts.

The reasons have been purely commercial of course. The chance for the little clubs in the Third and Fourth Divisions of the League to meet one of the First Division giants at least once in a season can mean the difference between survival and further deprivation.

The clink of money at the turnstiles will be music to the ear for clubs like Third Division **Brentford**, one of 19 unseeded clubs at home in the first leg. They are probably one of the better supported clubs in the lower regions, averaging 6,000 last season, but the gates were expected to swell near to the 30,000 capacity of Griffin Park for this Milk Cup tie against the holders and League Champions **Liverpool**.

The 'Bees' had eliminated **Charlton** in the previous round on a 4-2 aggregate score when Ron "chopper" Harris, the former Chelsea veteran, who is now a player coach, was hauled out of retirement.

Now 38, the hard tackling defender has been stimulated by the prospect of renewing his battles with the Mersey giants and says: "At my age it is impossible to play every week but I would love to play in the two matches against **Liverpool**."

For little **Port Vale** the draw has rekindled memories of a great past as well. The Valiants eliminated **Wrexham** on a massive 8-2 aggregate after completing a stunning 5-1 victory in the away leg of the previous round and now they face the FA Cup holders and Milk Cup runners-up **Manchester United**.

It could be that **Port Vale** will not progress beyond the second round of this tournament for the first time in the clubs' history, but with the first leg at home Vale Park should be bulging at the seams.

**Rotherham United** also have a golden opportunity to cash in on their attractive fixture with the positive **Luton Town**, and up in **Carlisle** the visit of high flying **Southampton** has caused great excitement.

The **Saints** were runners-up in this competition in the season of 1978-79, but in recent years have not enjoyed a good track record. In the season of 1980-81 you will remember, Lawrie McMenemy's side took a 4-0 lead to Vicarage Road to meet Second Division **Watford**, and returned home with a 7-1 defeat ringing in their ears.

The following year **Chelsea** tipped **Southampton** out at the first hurdle and last year **Manchester United** proved too strong in the fourth round. **Carlisle**, semi-finalists in 1969-70, have also suffered from poor results in recent years, but in the cup anything can happen and that is the hope of their faithful followers.

There can be few more optimistic fans than those at **Portsmouth** where Bobby Campbell has created a fine balanced side, and one which **Aston Villa** will certainly respect.

**Pompey** have already had a taste of Milk Cup action this season just skimming John Newman's **Hereford United** on a 5-4 aggregate, thanks to a 3-1 victory in the second-leg at Fratton Park.

Villa have contested five finals — winning three — and with a £64,000 prize now available for the winners will be anxious to maintain their fine record in this tournament. European competition in recent years has certainly given them great experience of two-legged ties.

Up in the Midlands **Derby County** fans are also relishing the Rams' meetings with **Birmingham City**. Manager Peter Taylor is a great one for lifting players for the big games as witness Derby's fantastic 2-0 win over **Nottingham Forest** in the third round of the FA Cup last season.

They still remember clearly **Derby's** best season in this competition, 1967-68, when the new managerial partnership of Clough and Taylor prompted a run through to the semi-final stage... whether Mr Taylor can rekindle the flame against vastly improving **Birmingham City** remains to be seen.

The seeding process was a recommendation in the Chester Report and last season's First Division clubs, plus the top ten from the Second Division were separated from the rest. The result is a very entertaining selection of matches but of course the fact that the major powers have been kept apart means that there is much less likelihood of the smaller fry progressing to the next round.

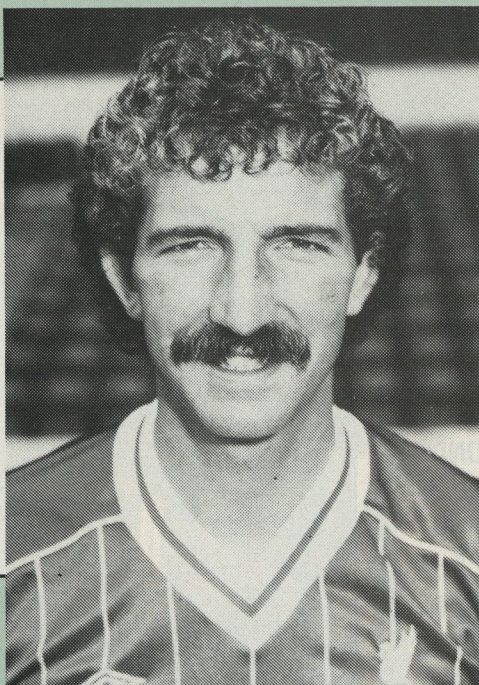
However another suggestion which was accepted from the Chester Report was that the home and away gates would be split equally between the two participating clubs, so even though Third Division **Lincoln City** run the risk of heavy defeat at White Hart Lane in the first leg against **Spurs**, they can still expect a relatively rewarding pay-night.

Not that the Imps believe their task is impossible. Colin Murphy's team gave a good account of themselves against **West Ham United** last season, losing just 2-1 in a replay at Upton Park; and they are quick to remind **Tottenham** of their shock exit at the hands of struggling **Burnley** last season.

All in all this newly formulated Second Round looks set to generate maximum excitement. There are plenty of enthralling fixtures such as **Shrewsbury Town** — going well in the Second Division — pitted against Third Division favourites **Sheffield United**; **Chesterfield** against **Everton**; and **Grimby Town**, conquerors of **Everton** and eliminated in a third match by **Wolves** in 1979-80, facing the surprise team of the First Division, **Coventry City**.



## SOUNESS IS PLEASED TO HELP



Graeme Souness, the captain of the Milk Cup holders Liverpool and the only player in the history of the Milk Cup to have been handed the trophy at Wembley, intends to keep it that way.

Says the Scottish international: "We've won the trophy for the last two years. We won the competition the year before as well when it was the Football League Cup, and the ambition of everyone at Anfield is to make it four wins in a row."

"We owe the fans of Liverpool a great debt for the way they have supported us over the years, particularly lately when money has been so tight on Merseyside."

"We owe it to the club, too, to do well in the competition."

"Now, thanks to the sponsorship of the National Dairy Council, there is £64,000 awaiting the winners — which I'm told is the biggest single prize in British sport. So we have all the incentive we need, though I would hate that to be interpreted as meaning that it takes money to motivate us."

"It doesn't. The Milk Cup is now a very prestigious competition, and that is incentive enough."

"Frankly, the players at Anfield did not mind whom we drew in this second round. We'll go out and do our stuff whoever we play. As it is we are matched with Brentford and I think that is great. The one thing about seeding the round is that it gives us a chance to help one of the smaller clubs to make an extra bob or two and I like that."

"That's the only help they will get from us though, as I say we want that Milk Cup for a record fourth time."

If in the first and second round both teams are level on goals after 180 minutes, then an extra half an hour shall be played. If the aggregate scores are still level at the end of extra time, the tie shall be decided by goals scored (away from home counting double). If the teams remain equal after this procedure, the tie shall be decided by a penalty competition played in accordance with the Laws of the Game.

In the event of the scores being equal after 90 minutes in the Third, Fourth and Fifth round matches, the match shall be replayed on the ground of the visiting club. In the event of the score being level at the end of 90 minutes in the replayed game, an extra half an hour shall be played.

If the match is still undecided, the venue for further replays shall alternate between the grounds of the competing clubs, the venue for the third match being determined by the toss of a coin.

In the semi-finals, if the aggregate score is level after the end of the second leg an extra half an hour shall be played. If the score shall still be level at the end of extra time the match shall be replayed on neutral ground. If the score is still level in this replay at the end of 90 minutes, extra time shall be played, and if the match is still undecided the winners shall be determined by a penalty competition played in accordance with the Laws of the Game.

If the score is still level at the end of 90 minutes in the final tie, an extra half an hour shall be played. If the score is still level after extra time, then the game will be replayed on a neutral ground. If the score is still level at the end of a replay, an extra half an hour shall be played, and if then the scores are still level, the outcome will be determined by penalty competition played in accordance with the Laws of the Game.

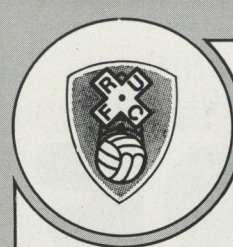
## CHESTER'S REMARKABLE RECOVERY

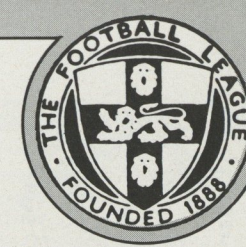
Sure enough they put their League form behind them and surged to a 3-0 win which made the aggregate score level at 3-3.

## HISTORY OF THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE Chapter 5

With the end of the Test Matches to decide whether or not teams at the top of Division Two should replace those at the bottom of Division One, promotion and relegation became automatic. The first teams to be affected by this were Burnley and Newcastle, who went up at the end of 1897/8. In fact the bottom clubs in Division Two at that time, Blackburn and Stoke, did not suffer relegation because both Divisions were extended from 16 to 18 teams. Thus Blackburn and Stoke stayed up and Barnsley, Glossop, New Brighton and Port Vale were added to Division Two.

Around this time a protracted wrangle about the rights and wrongs of the transfer system led to umpteen Football League resolutions and the issue was not really settled until 1910 when clubs accepted the following proposals:

1. That clubs be allowed to retain players on offering wages of £200 a year.

2. That if a player be transferred at his own request his wages shall initially not exceed £4 per week.

3. That no bonus be permissible to a player on re-signing for his old club. The only bonus payable should be £10 initial signing-on fee.

4. Talent money up to £275 could be distributed amongst players in the top five teams in each division.

5. Players should be due for benefits after each five years of service.

6. Accrued share of benefit should be paid to players transferred at a club's request.

7. Clubs should be entitled to insert a clause providing for a player to be given 14 days' notice to terminate a contract where he proves inefficient or guilty of serious misconduct.

# Three View

As usual league and cup games have been shown recently to be completely different entities even when teams meet each other in one competition within a few days of the other. Hull for instance after drawing the home leg and losing the away leg of the Milk Cup-tie with Lincoln proceeded to beat the 'Imps' 2-0 in a league game. BILLY WHITEHURST got both goals and three days later he again got the matchwinner. The 'Tigers' are proving one of the season's surprise teams on their return to Division Three this season and in nine league and cup games they have kept seven clean sheets.

Sheffield United also improved on a 1-1 draw against Bradford City at Bramall Lane in the home leg of their Milk Cup-tie by beating them 2-0 last Tuesday, MIKE TRUSSON for once taking over the goalscoring role from KEITH EDWARDS by getting the two goals.

On the other hand Bristol Rovers have won at Bournemouth in both league and cup games this season and with three wins in a row without conceding a goal Rovers seem to be getting into their stride for a promotion challenge. Bournemouth on the other hand are already looking like possible relegation candidates after losing six of their first seven league games, their only relief being last Saturday week when they beat Gillingham 2-0 with ex-Coventry, Q.P.R. and Fulham man JOHN BECK getting both goals.

The Port Vale v Wigan game ended 1-1 last week for the third time in four games between the clubs in recent years. Oddly enough the goal which RUSSELL BROMAGE got for Vale was the first which Wigan have conceded away from home this season and in fact Athletic have one of the best away records in the country with two wins and two draws in their first four games on their travels.

Also showing improved form this season are Preston North End, whose only defeat so far was at Plymouth, who have just won three home games in a row and have scored nine goals in the process though still without a point away from home.

Argyle have scored only one away goal up to the time of writing and so have Scunthorpe though the Irons too are a vastly different proposition at home and are still unbeaten at the Old Show Ground.

Lancashire clubs Burnley and Bolton may have suffered relegation together last season, but they are currently showing every sign of being equally united in a promotion challenge this season. Bolton have conceded only goal at Burnden Park this season (and that netted by ALLY BROWN in Walsall's 8-1 defeat) and gates have gone up steadily from 3,992 in their opening game to 4,375, against Walsall, 5,392 against Rotherham and 9,709 for the goalless draw with Burnley. This was Burnley's third successive draw in away games and the only real blot on JOHN BOND's lads' record this season is the Milk Cup defeat by Fourth Division Crewe.

The Railwaymen are one of several Fourth Division teams showing considerable improvement this season, two others being York and Hereford, who are at the time of writing holding the top two positions.

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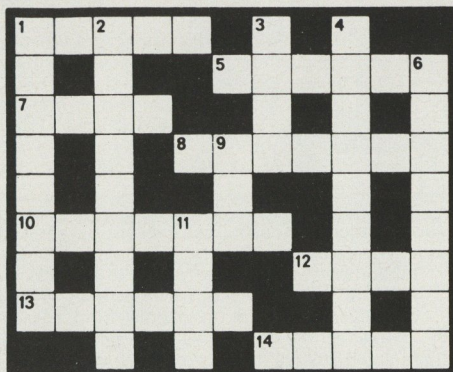

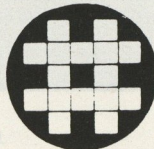

It is interesting to see BOB PAISLEY on the mark in lowly Liverpool's 2-2 draw with Sheffield Wednesday while there were only 37,000 at Old Trafford to see Manchester United go down 2-1 at home to Burnley.

### TWENTY YEARS AGO

BRIAN TILER got our solitary goal on October 5, 1963 as we went down 2-1 at Portsmouth on October 5, 1963 with RON SAUNDERS and ALBERT MCCANN on the mark for Pompey in this mid-table Second Division game. Teams:

# PERSONALITY PAGE

## ROY IRONSIDE — ONE OF ONLY THREE

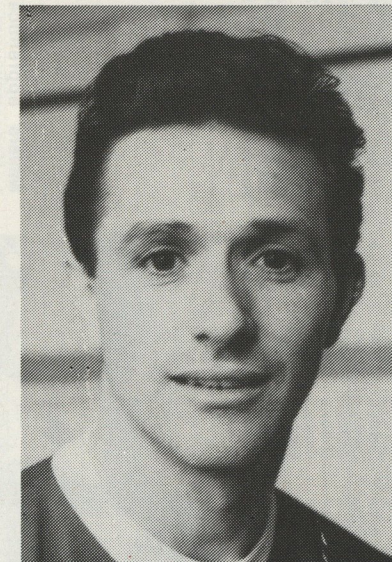
Brian Jackson had such sporting talent that he was both a soccer and cricket professional, and if he hadn't decided in 1956 to concentrate mainly on soccer there is not much doubt he would have played cricket for the Yorkshire County XI.

Brian was born at Maltby and on leaving school worked at Maltby Main Colliery. His all-round sporting abilities were such that at the tender age of 15 he was in the Colliery football team in the Yorkshire League and opening the bowling for the cricket team in the Yorkshire Council. A medium-pace bowler, his style was likened to that of Alec Bedser and he topped the Council bowling averages in each of his first 3 seasons. Fred Trueman was a family friend and during those summers took him on two evenings each week to net practice at Headingley and in 1953 he won a regular place in the Yorkshire Colts team and was twice 12th man for the County side.

Brian signed as a part-time pro with the Millers in 1954. He started in the Juniors and was in the team which that season won the Northern Intermediate League title. Despite the success of that team he was the only member of it whom the club retained. He then played regularly in the Reserves, mainly as an inside-forward but also in both full-back and all the half-back positions. Former Sheffield United player Ernest Jackson was the Reserve team trainer and at 47 years old had brilliant ball-control and was the most football-knowledgeable man Brian ever met. He encouraged Brian to train with him in the afternoons and taught him to intercept rather than tackle and to anticipate moves and read the game, and he sent him to Bramall Lane to learn from watching Joe Shaw who Brian considers was the best centre-half he ever saw. When National Service came later that year the club valued his services so much that although he was mainly a Reserve team player a taxi was provided for him to travel to the match each weekend from his RAF station in Lincolnshire. On leaving the Forces he severed his connection with the County Cricket Club to concentrate on soccer and soon won the regular first team place which he was to retain for his remaining 8 years with the club. In a match at Norwich in icy conditions in February 1963 he sustained a knee injury which kept him on the sidelines for several weeks. When he returned to the team he was only able to be fit to play each Saturday by having treatment throughout the week. And for 12 months he had treatment instead of training, but that was acceptable because manager Danny Williams was then building a team of young players and although Brian had by then lost a bit of pace his presence in it was essential to its proper development.

In July 1965 he was transferred to Barnsley where in Alan Hill he saw the best young goalkeeper he ever met, and it was his recommendation to Jack Mansell which resulted in Alan's transfer to Millmoor. Brian was popular with his new colleagues and was appointed club captain. But the effects of the knee injury still persisted and the almost continual treatment it required was not as acceptable at Oakwell as it had been at Millmoor and limited his stay there to just the one season. But happily it didn't end his cricketing, and the next two summers were spent as professional with Upton and in each of those seasons the team won the Yorkshire Council championship. He then had another 5 seasons with Maltby and in 1975 moved to Thurcroft to play higher grade cricket in the Bassetlaw League and in 3 seasons his team progressed from the 3rd to the 1st Section of the League. He retired from the game in 1980 and his sporting involvement now is his long-time interest in horse-racing which he follows most keenly but is consistently unable to make a profit out of. When he left Oakwell he took employment at Byfords Knitwear Factory near his Maltby home, then in 1978 went back to Maltby Main Colliery and is still there, working as an On-setter.

Brian Jackson's versatility made him one of the most valuable assets the club has ever had. He had a light-hearted approach to life and playing football was so easy for him that he never realised just how good he was and he was content with his lot with Rotherham United. But his talents deserved a bigger stage than Millmoor and if he had taken the game more seriously than with hindsight he acknowledges he did, he could well have spent most of his career in the First Division.



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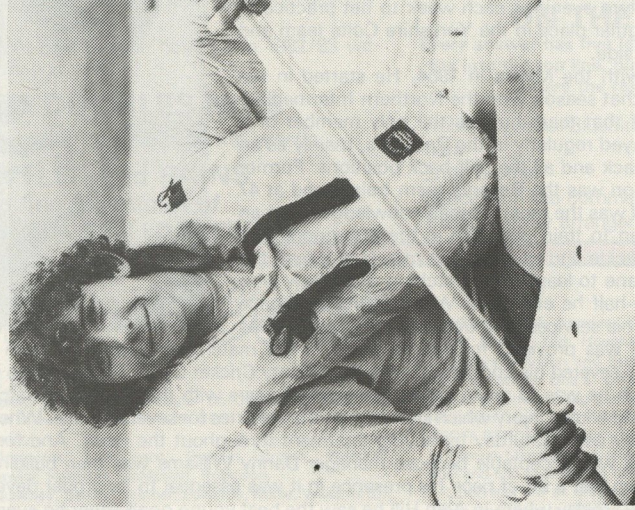

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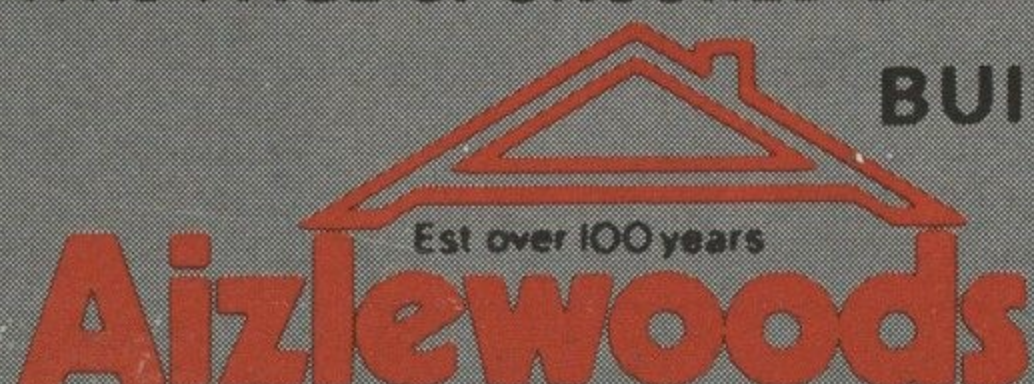
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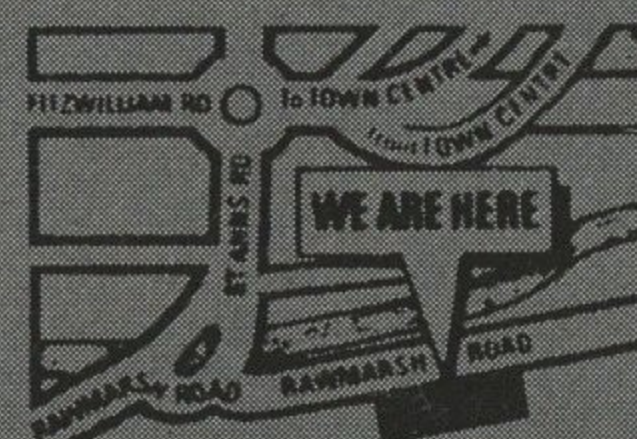
