

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
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

Those people who have been having a dig at us over the last few months should perhaps now sit up and acknowledge that we have a team who can bring credit to the town.





Now we can devote our attentions entirely on the First Division and we must focus all our efforts on the battle to climb away from the relegation zone.

FOOTBALL FOCUS

ATTENDANCE FACTS

Stoke City had their lowest First Division gate since the war when Everton visited the Victoria Ground on Saturday 14th January. The 7,935 audience saw a 1-1 draw but by the time the final whistle was sounded less than 4,000 were in the ground.

Birmingham City are averaging their lowest League attendance since the war—a mere 12,637. And the last three turn-outs at St. Andrew's have been around the 10,000 mark.

Liverpool, too, are well down on their normal crowd at Anfield; the average this term being just on 29,000; while over the New Year Ipswich Town had their second lowest First Division gate in their history (1962-84) when 14,146 saw their game with struggling Notts County, who themselves are pulling in less than 8,000 for their home matches at Meadow Lane.

BOSS MAN MacLEOD

Former Scotland manager Ally MacLeod is the new boss of Airdrieonians. MacLeod, who took the Scots to the 1978 World Cup Finals, has been out of football for two seasons following a spell as manager of Motherwell.

TRANSFER NEWS...

Welshman Micky Thomas has got himself yet another new club. This time it's Chelsea who secured his transfer from Stoke City in mid-January. Another Stoke player on the move is defender Robbie Savage who has joined cup-giant killers Bournemouth for £15,000. Ian Handysides has switched across the West Midlands—from Blues to promotion-chasing Walsall, and Mike Flanagan has returned to Charlton Athletic from First Division Q.P.R. in a £50,000 deal. Garry Stanley has signed for Portsmouth on a free transfer from Swansea City while winger Carl Francis has been loaned to Hereford from Birmingham City.

MANAGERS ON TRIAL...

Two Managers—Don Howe with Arsenal and Bill Asprey of Stoke City—have been given until the end of the season to prove they can boss First Division clubs as well as anyone else! Howe, (pictured right) a former player with West Bromwich Albion, Arsenal and England and now Bobby Robson's understudy on the international front, believes he can succeed at Highbury while Asprey, also a player with the club he is currently in charge of, has stated that he is fully qualified to do the job at The Victoria Ground. Time will tell—in both cases.

And still on managers...Liverpool's long-serving full-back Phil Neal is looking ahead a very long way! He wants to follow in the footsteps of two former Anfield favourites, Bob Paisley and Joe Fagan, and become manager of Liverpool—perhaps in 1990, or thereabouts...



EX-BOXERS

There are two former boxing champions currently playing in the Football League. There is the Notts County striker Justin Fashanu who fought as a youngster at light heavyweight and Bolton's tough defender Gerry McElhinney who was a king-size middleweight champion of Northern Ireland. Gerry also won international recognition as a Gaelic Footballer, representing the all-Ireland team on many occasions.

MARADONA BACK WITH A BANG

Diego Maradona, the highly skilful Argentinian who was badly injured some months ago, bounced back in style in the New Year by scoring two superb goals in Barcelona's 3-1 win over Seville in the Spanish First Division.

BEST RETURNS...

George Best, the former Manchester United and Northern Ireland superstar is back in soccer, playing for the Irish club Tobermore United, who he has joined on a short-term basis.

A COMMENTATOR'S NIGHTMARE...

Think of the poor old commentator—or the reporter—who is continuously referring to Luton Town's new-signing, CHUKWUEMEK MWAJIOBI! This coloured lad isn't even a foreigner...he was born in Dulwich Hamlet! He got his first taste of success over the Christmas holiday by scoring against Nottingham Forest at Kenilworth Road—and the Luton scoreboard spelled it out: WELL DONE CHUCK!

FOOTBALL FOCUS

CUP COUNT DOWN!

Bournemouth, as we well know, pulled off one of the biggest cup upsets in years when they dumped mighty Manchester United out of the FA Cup. But the south coast club were not the only giant-killers in the Third Round. Little Telford powered through into Round Four by smashing Rochdale 4-1 at Spotland and now they have to play at Derby. Middlesbrough, halfway down the Second Division, put out Arsenal 3-2 and Huddersfield knocked out Q.P.R. Crystal Palace knocked out Leicester City and Fourth Division Blackpool won 2-1 against Manchester City.

There will obviously be some more surprises in the next round, and on looking through the list of matches these could be the major ones... Gillingham away at Everton; Shrewsbury at home to Ipswich; and Charlton against Watford. Cup football is a great leveller. Anything can happen, and it invariably does. But the odds at the moment favour Liverpool to win at Wembley in May. You can't bet against that right now but remember last season when Brighton won at Anfield. That can easily happen this time round—a minnow upsetting the big-shots!

THE 1984 PLAYER-MANAGERS

There are more player-managers performing in the Football League than ever before.

At the start of the year there were eleven who were turning out on a regular basis for their clubs: Trevor Cherry (Bradford City), Alan Buckley (Walsall), Terry Cooper (Bristol City), Bryan Hamilton (Tranmere Rovers), Eddie Gray (Leeds United), Roy McFarland (Derby County), Jimmy Greenhoff (Rochdale), Graham Turner (Shrewsbury Town), John Toshack (Swansea City), Gerry Francis (Exeter City) and Denis Smith (York City).

THE UNITED SCOTS

Many years ago Sheffield United Football Club was an all-England establishment, without a single outsider—and that included the backroom staff at Bramall Lane.

How times change. Today the manager Ian Porterfield, his chief coach Jimmy McGuigan and reserves coach Johnny McSevney all hail from Scotland and they all played professionally for Sunderland.

Oxford United's 21 year-old midfield star Kevin Brock was voted Young Player of the Month—the first Third Division player to receive the honour. Mark Walters (Aston Villa), took the Midlands area award.

GOAL FOR THE 'KEEPER



FLASH-BACK

This afternoon Wolves take on Luton Town for only the 16th time in Football League action.

The teams first met in the top division in season 1955-56 and it was Luton who pulled all the strings in both of those encounters, winning 2-1 at Molineux and 5-1 at Kenilworth Road when Wolves were led a merry dance by a forward line which included ace goalscorer Gordon Turner.

The following season Wolves won a ding-dong battle at Molineux by 5-4, but Luton gained revenge when taking the points from a 1-0 home win.

The 1957-58 fixtures favoured Luton once again. They took a point when visiting Wolves (1-1) and then eased through 3-1 when the teams did battle at Kenilworth Road.


Wolves then completed the double over Luton in 1958-59. They stormed to their best win over 'The Hatters' at Molineux when Peter Broadbent (2), Colin Booth, Eddie Clamp and Jimmy Murray gave them a 5-0 scoreline and took both points thanks to a lone goal win away from home.

There were plenty more goals during the next campaign when in fact the teams met three times—twice in the League and once in the F.A. Cup.

The League matches went according to form—Wolves heading for the title (which they failed to claim at the death) and Luton nose-diving into Division Two—and they ended in victories for the Wanderers, 3-2 at Molineux and 5-1 at Kenilworth Road, where Norman Deeley (2), Murray, Broadbent and Booth hit the target.

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


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



SAMMY TROUGHTON

Two months ago Sammy Troughton was making dustbins out of sheet metal—now he is helping to rebuild Wolves survival hopes from the wreckage of a disastrous season.

The 19-year-old came to Molineux from Belfast where he combined his job as a sheet metal worker with his duties as a part-time midfield player with Glentoran.

Glowing reports were received by Wolves about his football qualities and after a couple of scouting missions they agreed to pay £10,000 for him.

Several games in the Central League side and Troughton was knocking on the first-team door and he was eventually given his First Division debut against Ipswich Town on Boxing Day.

That was hardly a rip-roaring success but injuries caused him to be given a second chance against Everton a day later when he began to show his skilful ability.

His third game against Norwich City confirmed his promise when he netted his first goal for Wolves first-team and he has retained a regular place since.

“My chance came a lot sooner than I expected,” said Troughton. “But I have enjoyed my first taste of football in the First Division.

“The biggest adjustment for me has been to get used to full-time training. At Glentoran we just used to do a couple of nights a week and I did a bit extra at a technical college in my home town of Lisburn.”

Unlike an illustrious predecessor—George Best—who made the trip across the Irish Sea, Troughton has not had trouble settling into his new surroundings.

“I have been fortunate to be fixed up with some very good digs,” he said. “And I have not really had time to get home-sick yet because my brother and sister have been over to watch me play already and my dad is coming over soon.”

“It has meant a big change in my way of life but I think I have adapted well—both on and off the field.

“I realise I have a long way to go yet because a couple of games do not make you a good player. But I am willing to learn and I already realise that once you have played in the First Division it is the best League there is.”

TODAY'S VISITORS LUTON TOWN

Luton Town, without a shadow of doubt, are having their best-ever season in the First Division.

Following last term's disappointing form when they survived relegation by the skin of their Kenilworth Road teeth (a last-ditch win at Maine Road saved their bacon and sent Manchester City down instead), Luton, under the shrewd guidance of manager David Pleat, have kept basically the same set of players but they have obviously worked hard at their game and they've got increasingly better as top-line footballers.

Mixing it week in and week out with quality professionals in the First Division obviously improves one's skill, knowledge of the game as a whole and makes one more determined than ever to succeed in the top bracket. Luton—and their players—have done precisely this. They've battled away—and now the goods are being produced.

Admittedly they've took a few hammerings—0-6 at Liverpool for one—but overall they have performed with good technique, a lot of strong noble effort and above all, will-power, which has carried Luton through many, many times. They never give up the ghost. A game—in David Pleat's mind can last two hours—and until the referee blows that final whistle, then he expects his players to keep on going until they hear it!

The Luton squad this afternoon consists of many seasoned professionals, players who have been in the game long enough to know all the ins and outs of Association Football, and manager Pleat, whoever he sends out on the park, will know full well that he will get 100 per-cent effort (and more).

The Luton players...

LES SEALEY—Goalkeeper. Signed from Coventry prior to this season, he made almost 200 senior appearances for the 'Sky Blues.' A Londoner, he stands 6ft 1in tall and is 26 years of age.

KIRK STEPHENS—Full-back. Born at Coventry he joined Luton from Nuneaton Borough in 1978 for £5,000. Kirk has now played over 200 League games for the 'Hatters' and he will be 29 next month.

MAL DONAGHY—Defender. Northern Ireland international who comes from Belfast. Mal was signed in the summer of 1978 and he is fast approaching 250 League games for the club. He is aged 26.

PAUL ELLIOTT—Defender. Cost Luton £145,000 when secured from Charlton Athletic last season. A man of colour, Paul was born and bred in London and he has already represented his country at Youth and Under-21 levels.

MITCHELL THOMAS—Defender. A local lad who made his debut for Luton last season against West Ham United. A six footer, he plays on the left and is not yet 20.

WAYNE TURNER—Defender/Midfield. A utility player who has been with Luton since 1976, and a 'pro' since 1978. He has made

barely 25 appearances for the club to date having been on loan to Lincoln City in recent seasons.

BRIAN HORTON—Midfield. Club captain and one of the most experienced players in the team. Born at Huddersfield, he joined Port Vale in 1970 and played almost 300 times for the North Staffordshire club before transferring to Brighton in 1976. Added a further 250 plus outings to his collection with the 'Seagulls' and in 1980 he joined Luton, for whom he has now topped the 150 mark in League and Cup football. A great competitor—even at the age of 34.

RICKY HILL—Midfield. English international who started with Luton back in 1974 as a teenager. He turned 'pro' two years later and has now amassed more than 300 appearances for the club (50 goals).

RADDY ANTIC—Midfield. Yugoslavian international who was signed from the Spanish club Zaragoza for £50,000 in July 1980. At 34 he has all the experience one needs to play in the First Division and he's given Luton splendid service in some 100 matches.

BRIAN STEIN—Striker. Rated by many as a future England player, Brian has speed and an eye for goal—he's already popped in 100 for Luton in the 260 games he's played so far. Born in South Africa in 1957, he has been

with Luton since October 1977 when he left Edgeware Town for Kenilworth Road.

PAUL WALSH—Striker. Nimble front-runner and one of the classiest strikers in the game today. Capped by England, 21 year-old Paul cost Luton £400,000 when signed from Charlton in 1982 and last season he scored 15 goals in 47 games for the 'Hatters.'

DAVID MOSS—Forward. Prefers to play outside-left, David is a penalty-expert and he began in League Football with Swindon back in 1969, moving to Luton for £110,000 in May 1978. Hit 60 goals in 230 League games for Swindon and up to the end of last season had netted 77 in 186 for Luton. He will be 32 in March but still looks as fit as a 22 year-old.

TREVOR AYLOTT—Striker. Lanky 6ft 1½in target man who can score goals from all angles. This 26 year-old Cockney played 32 games for Chelsea before moving to Barnsley in 1979. From there he switched to Millwall and became associated with Luton last season. To date Trevor has scored over 60 goals for his four clubs in a total of 230 matches.

Luton aren't a defensive team. They attack, they like to score goals, and they have at least eight players in the team who can hit the net. Expect a fast open game this afternoon and hopefully we shall see plenty of goals one way or the other!
