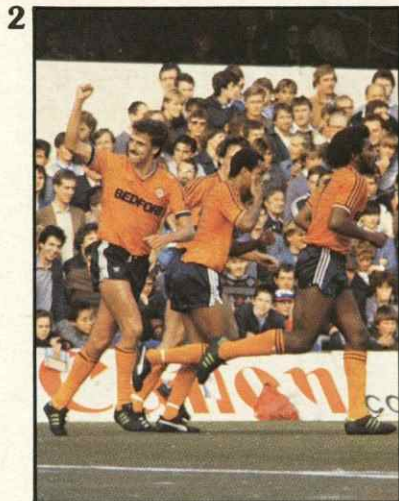

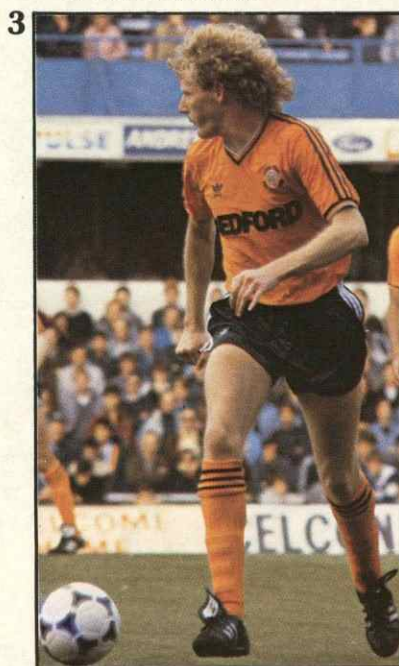

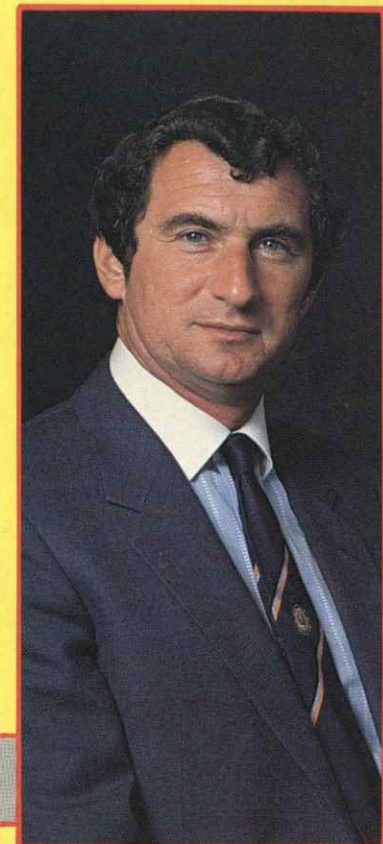

JACK CHARLTON

Newcastle United manager Jack Charlton has sold full-back John Ryan to Sheffield Wednesday for £40,000 who in turn have let midfield player Pat Heard join Newcastle. This is the second time Charlton has signed Heard. He bought him from Aston Villa when he was manager at Wednesday.

French international Didier Six has joined Aston Villa for the rest of the season from Mulhouse. He impressed manager Graham Turner in a private trial. He is a veteran of two World Cup final series.

Ken Brown, Norwich City's manager has signed former England goalkeeper Joe Corrigan on a month's loan from Brighton. He replaces Chris Woods who was recently injured.

Birmingham City have failed in a bid to bring Arsenal goalkeeper John Lukic to St Andrews.

Leicester City are to experiment with morning football. The match against Aston Villa on October 27th will kick off at 11 a.m. Club Secretary Alan Bennett said he has been disappointed with the attendances so far this season. 'We have spoken to the police and they are quite happy with the new time,' he said. 'Hopefully visiting fans will now go direct to the ground rather than hang around town and we also hope that it will cut out any drinking before the game.'

Luton Town goalkeeper Les Sealey has joined Plymouth Argyle on loan for one month and made his debut against Hull City last week.

Everton winger Terry Curran has been banned for two matches after being sent off in his team's 5-4 win at Watford. He will miss games against Aston Villa and the local derby with Liverpool.

Neither Arsenal manager Don Howe or his Everton counterpart Howard Kendall saw the controversial penalty incident that took Arsenal to the top of Division One last week. Howe said: 'I couldn't see because there were three or four players in my way'. Kendall said: 'I couldn't tell you what the penalty was for. The linesman gave it and it is unfortunate to lose on such a decision. The lads seemed to think it was for pushing, but I did not see the incident'. Charlie Nicholas scored the important penalty kick.

Aston Villa manager Graham Turner was full of praise for his new French signing Didier Six after his side's 3-0 victory over Manchester United. Turner said of Six, who had not played a competitive match for several weeks, 'He did very well and we hope there is a lot more to come.' United's manager Ron Atkinson said 'We have no complaints, the better team won. I could not believe the way Six played, he got them fired up.'

West Ham came from behind to beat Leicester at Upton Park. Veteran Billy Bonds, Ray Stewart and Tony Cottee, who got the winner only minutes from time, were the Hammers scorers and Lynex got the goal for the visitors.

Chelsea kept up their good start to the season with a hard earned point at Norwich. Joe Corrigan, on loan from Brighton, saved the Canaries with a super save from David Speedie.

Watford are still anchored at the bottom of the table after Terry Gibson scored in the eighty-ninth minute to give Coventry City the points.

West Brom snatched a point at Anfield against an off colour Liverpool although Tony Godden in the Albion goal made some fine saves.

Newcastle got the quickest goal of the day by the courtesy of Ipswich defender George Burley who lobbed home a back pass after only 20 seconds. Allan Waddle and Pat Heard, his first for his new club, were United's other marksmen.

Tottenham were knocked off the top spot by a Steve Moran goal for Southampton. The Saints were good value for their win and showed no signs of the mid-week defeat by Hamburg.

A penalty scored by Davenport four minutes from the end robbed Stoke City of a deserved win at Nottingham Forest. City went ahead after 11 minutes through George Berry.

Sheffield Wednesday let slip a two goal lead against Sunderland. Lee Chapman and Brian Marwood putting the home side in front but Paul Atkinson and Clive Walker saved a point for the Wearsiders with second half goals. Super saves from former Wednesday goalkeeper Chris Turner denied the Owls of victory.

SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY



Last season's Second Division champions Chelsea were our last League visitors to Kenilworth Road and today sees a visit from the side they pipped for the title on goal difference.

Yes, Sheffield Wednesday are back in the First Division after an absence of 14 years and back where they belong when you consider the Owls' magnificent Hillsborough ground and support.

After several seasons in the League's backwaters, Wednesday can now proudly claim the title of Yorkshire's number one club and a highly effective start they have made too on their return to the top flight.

There was not much doubt that Wednesday were heading back to the First Division last season when they were unbeaten in their first 15 games and throughout the season they were never out of the top two places in Division Two.

It was a great start to manager Howard Wilkinson's return to the club where he played in the 1960s. Wilkinson had been recruited as manager from Notts County to replace Jack Charlton for last season and he carried on the progress the club had made during Charlton's time when he took them from the depths of Division Three to the threshold of promotion and the semi-finals of the FA Cup two seasons ago.

Wilkinson built on the squad he inherited from Charlton and made three major signings during the summer when two players who were

very much part of the promotion effort moved on from Hillsborough at the end of their contracts.

Gary Bannister switched to QPR, Gary Megson to Nottingham Forest with Lee Chapman joining the club from Sunderland, Brian Marwood being recruited from Hull City and Andy Blair switching from Aston Villa.

Chapman, a powerfully built striker first caught the eye with Stoke and cost Arsenal a £500,000 fee when they signed him in 1982. After only 25 games and four goals, Chapman moved on to Sunderland (15 games — three goals) before joining Wednesday.

Marwood was an important part of the Hull side narrowly pipped for promotion by Sheffield United from Division Three last season, scoring 16 goals in 39 games while Blair, a Scottish Under-21 cap, originally cost Villa £300,000 from Coventry City in 1981.

Three newcomers joined a squad that has plenty of experience and there's an Everton connection at goalkeeper and centre half with Martin Hodge and Mick Lyons both former Goodison Park players.

so well in recent England Under-21 games that Bobby Robson named him in the squad for last month's full international against East Germany only for injury to keep the man Wednesday fans nicknamed 'Zico' on the sidelines.

Former Millwall and Charlton defender Lawrie Madden was a regular in the side last season, his first at Hillsborough, and the signing of Irish international defender Nigel Worthington from Notts County midway through last season, has increased the competition for places in the back four with England Under-21 man Mark Smith also in contention.

Sharing Wednesday's midfield duties alongside Blair is another former Aston Villa man, Gary Shelton, originally with Walsall and new man Marwood.

For the majority of their goals, Wednesday look to Imre Varadi, who settled at Hillsborough last season after stints with Sheffield United, Everton and Newcastle where he scored 42 times in 90 League and Cup games, a high scoring ratio that made him a big favourite at St James' Park.

Varadi lost none of his touch in his first season back in the steel city and his 17 goals in 38 games last season were a big factor in the team's success.

Although he has played for four northern clubs, Varadi is a Londoner by birth who began his career in the non-League game with Letchworth.

Chapman is his regular partner but Wednesday rate young striker John Pearson highly. He joined the club straight from school and has now topped 100 appearances for the club.

Wednesday's most recent newcomer is defender John Ryan who moved to Hillsborough a fortnight ago from Newcastle with Pat Heard going to Tyneside.

Ryan, an expensive signing by the North East club from Oldham, never settled at St James' Park and now links up again with Howard Wilkinson who was in charge of the England Under-21 squad when Ryan won one cap eighteen months ago.

Wednesday opened the season in style with a 3-1 win against Nottingham Forest and their first seven games back in the First Division produced eleven points with further wins at home against Southampton and Tottenham and a draw at West Bromwich.

Manager Wilkinson has expressed his satisfaction with the start the side has made back in the big time and although it's still early days, the side looks well equipped to challenge for a place in Europe next season.

Considering they were in the Third Division only four years ago Wednesday's climb back to the top in the last few seasons makes impressive reading.

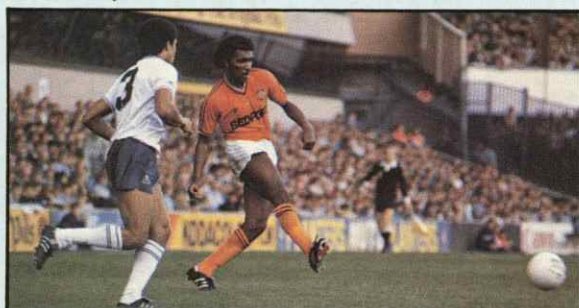

'Why Blame Football'

What kind of society have we created? We now read daily of violence which 20 years ago was not only unheard of but totally unacceptable in the discipline of our lives. Criminals had a certain ethic which took elderly people, disabled persons and children outside their accepted potential.

Today, the elderly are beaten up and mugged causing them horrific injuries, disabled persons are attacked for a few pence, and babies are threatened and slashed in their prams by thugs wanting money from the mother.

Respect for authorities, whether it is for parents, teachers or the Police, is diminishing fast.

Who would have thought we would have had scenes that we have had on the picket lines this summer? Who would have thought that, in Britain of all places, the elderly would not be safe in their homes? Who would have thought that in some areas you could not go out safely at night? What has happened to us all over the past 20 years or so to allow this to happen?

Football is a manifestation of society's problems reflecting both good and bad. Misconduct by a minority of persons attending our matches has caused us enormous problems, many of which we have tackled without complaint and at substantial costs, knowing that whatever steps we take these can only suppress the misconduct inside the grounds but do little to alleviate the problem outside our grounds.

It is acknowledged that incidents inside grounds are diminishing rapidly, but this does little good to our image when the minority spread havoc in the shopping centres, along the streets or overseas. But what can we do about this except not play our matches, and even if we did this, this would not affect violence in our society one jot.

The Police state that football compared with the extent of the problem as a whole, is minute. Nevertheless, it causes and attracts publicity out of all proportion to the incidents.

For instance, in the season 1982-83, 18,766,000 spectators attended League matches. Arrests inside grounds totalled 1,994, outside grounds they totalled 1,907. There were 4,641 ejections, or half of one per cent of those attending.

From September 1982 to May 1983 a comparison of indictable crimes in the Leeds Holbeck Division of West Yorkshire where Leeds United play, shows the following:

The public rightly are concerned at violence at football. They should, however, be doubly concerned at the other types of crime and violence which are now a daily occurrence in our lives.

In the AMA Report it also states that violence at football is society's problem, and yet the Government in their Report issued in August 1984, totally ignores the broader social issues which are inherent in the problem. Without tackling those, and we have been asking successive governments for a number of years to do so, the problem in some form will continue.

In the Government Report it is full of words explaining what we and others might or should do. It proposes that central Government need not do anything. We have been active for 20 years — it is about time central Government stopped putting the responsibility and action elsewhere. The problem is society's; it is for central Government to tackle society's problems. Stop passing the buck, the figures speak for themselves. Talking must end — action must begin, before it is too late, and we lose what Britain has always stood for — self-respect, self-discipline, toleration and goodwill.

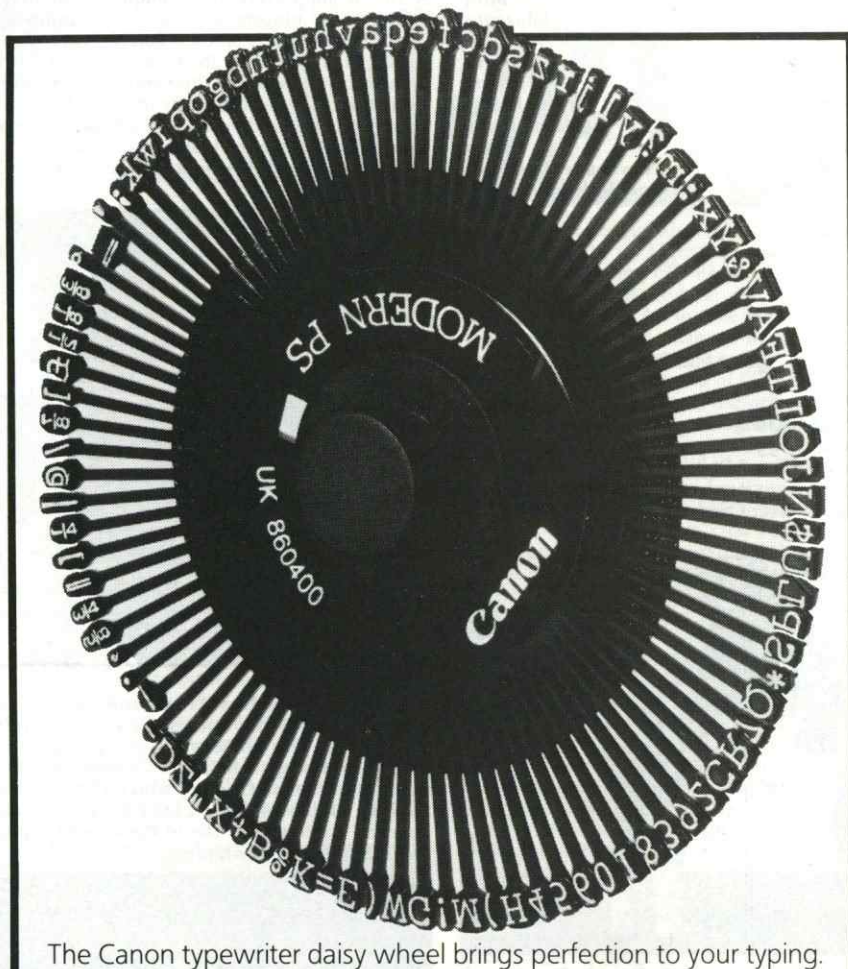

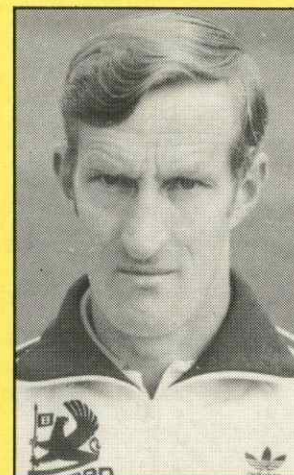

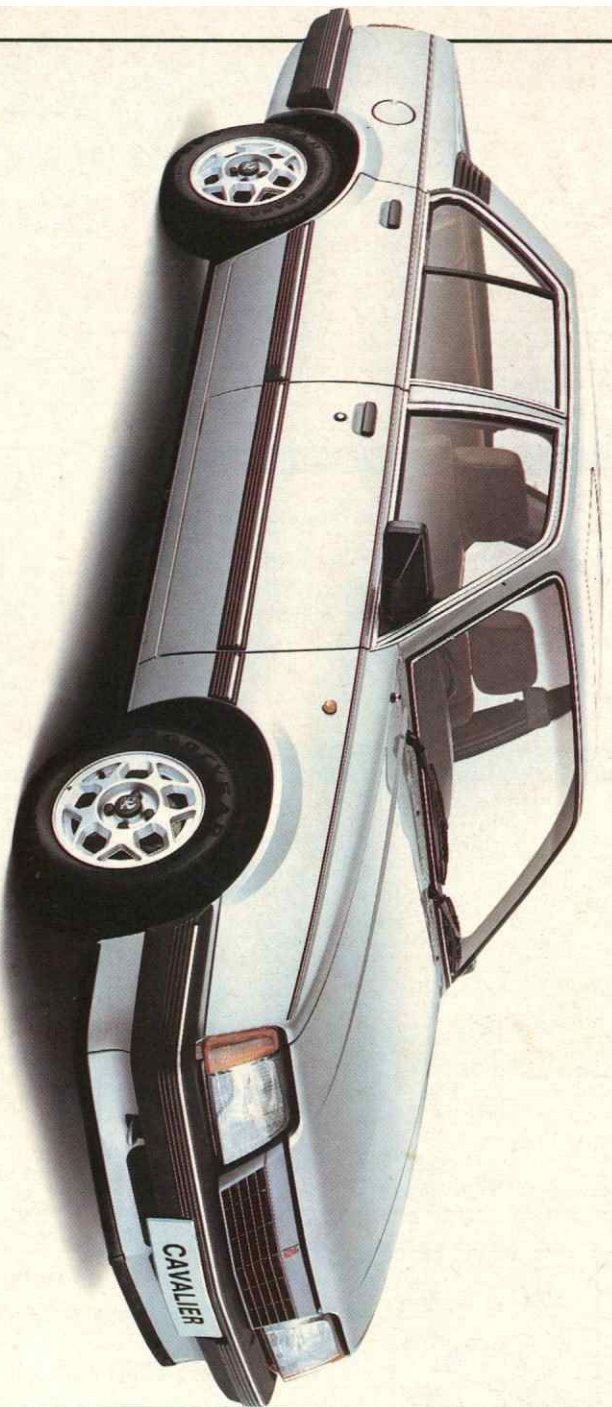
If the teams score an equal number of goals in a month, then the Award will go to the club which has played the fewer Canon League matches in that month.
