

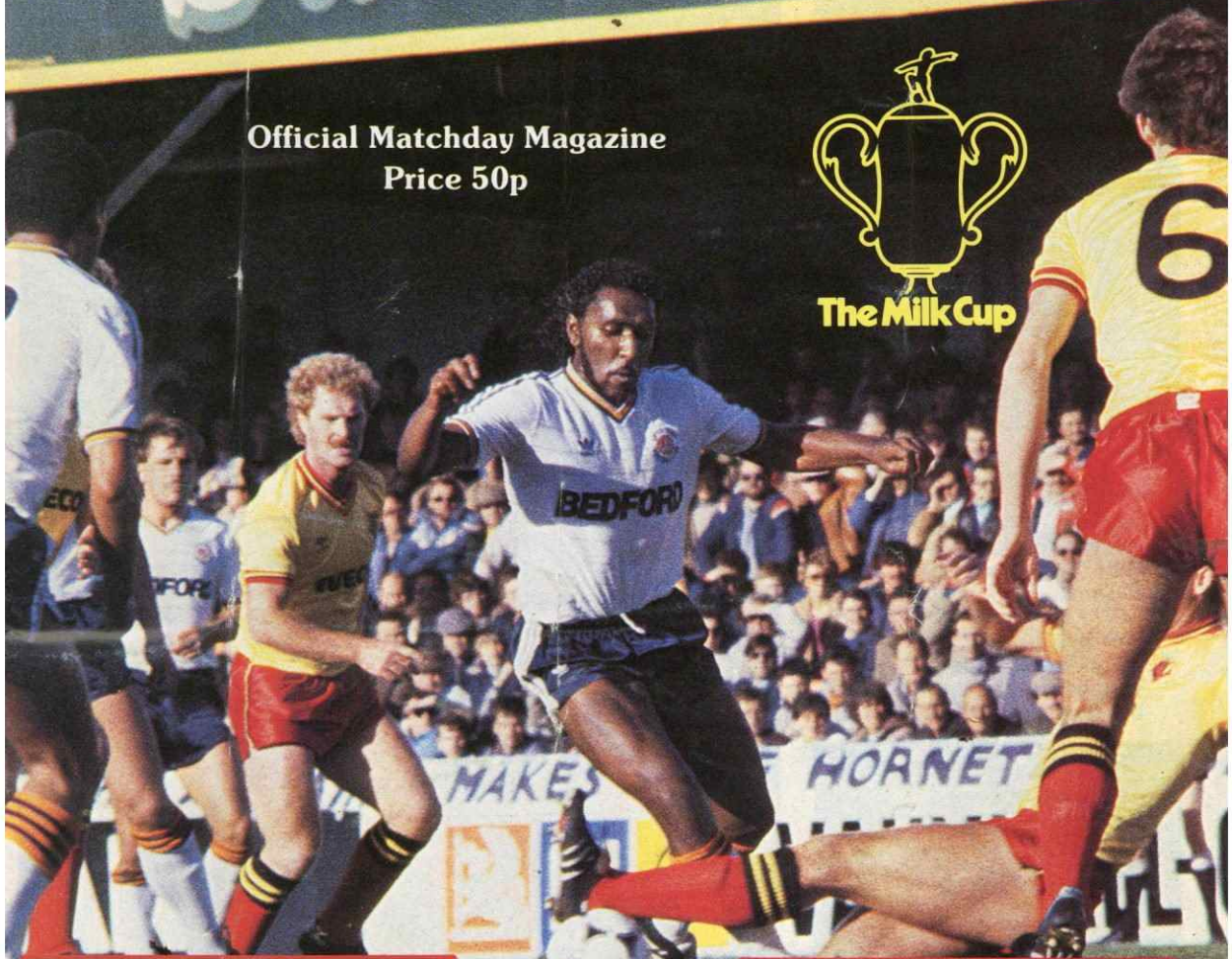

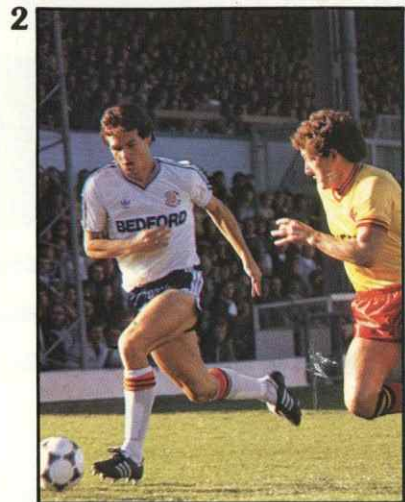

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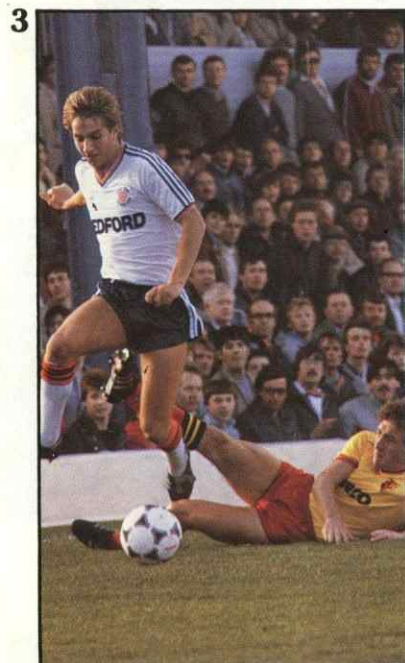

With nine minutes remaining, Brentford led by 2-0. In an amazing finish Leicester scored four to bring the smiles back to their directors' faces and turn the supporters' jeers to cheers. Never was the great excitement of our fascinating game more clearly illustrated.

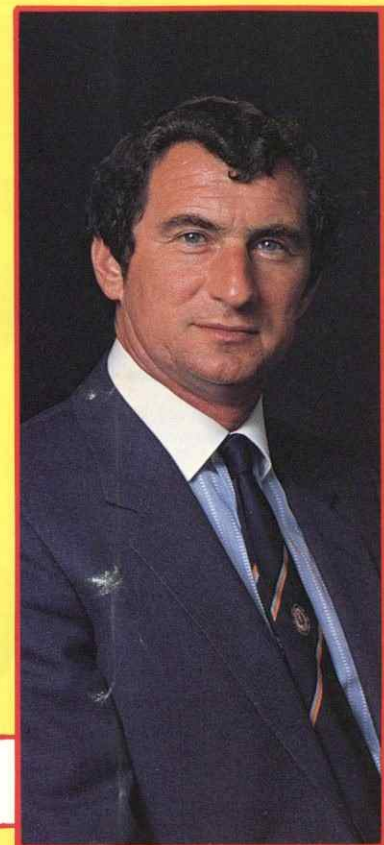
Our visitors tonight, like ourselves, are battling against the problem of unsatisfactory attendances. They have lost people on the terraces although they have played attractive football. Unfortunately, they too have a tiny minority of youngsters bent on causing them embarrassment. Recently, they have made a big decision to computerise their system and ensure ticket holders are club members. Against Watford, we had a smooth day and the supporters were basically good natured in their chants. But irresponsible comments, exaggerating club rivalries and suggesting I had a personal vendetta with Graham Taylor,

wonder what responsibility some of the Press boys have, and to whom?

I do not wish to sweep hooliganism under the carpet. I do know of one incident at the Watford game in the Bobbers' Stand that was disgraceful. One person can give the whole club a bad name. Last week, one of our most popular players of recent years was back in town. Radomir Antic came over with Partizan Belgrade for their game with QPR. He sends his regards to all his many friends. He has settled back in Yugoslavia, but being a versatile traveller. With his great football knowledge, I would not be surprised to see him coaching away from his home country in seasons to come.

We were all delighted with England's success against Finland. Good World Cup results will stimulate the club team's players and spectators. Some times it can be difficult defeating inferior sides who make no attempts to 'come out and play'. The Finland side

their manager, ruined the day. Terrace warfare was suggested. It cost this club 3,000-4,000 spectators and vital revenue. There are some gentlemen of the Press who are delighting in biting the hand that feeds them. It didn't surprise anyone at the club that no mention was made in the media after the game of the splendid behaviour of the faithful 12,000 from Luton and Watford who did come along. I believe, as a manager, that I have a responsibility to the game to play entertaining football to try and induce bigger crowds. I

were obviously not unhappy to lose with honour but made no attempt to win. To score five goals was satisfactory, as was the Under-21 result the previous night. I am sure Bobby Robson has a sound basis for planning for Mexico. Our own Ricky Hill is back to good consistent form, and as such might catch the England manager's eye and be a threat to Southampton player, Steve Williams. If we can string together some efficient results, our players will gain the necessary projection.

I believe we are on the right lines also. Dedication and hard work backed by your support can help us achieve our goals.

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MILK CUP SCENE



The second round matches produced a few shock results but the majority of matches went with form. Alan Brazil scored twice as Manchester United shrugged aside the brave resistance of Burnley with a 3-0 victory at Turf Moor. The troubled United striker's first came after 46 minutes with a 20-yard drive and his second in the 78th minute. Olsen scored the other goal to give United a 7-0 aggregate win.

Birmingham City had Mark Halsall sent off in the 31st minute just four minutes after Clarke scored the goal which put them through on a 5-1 aggregate score against Plymouth. A missed penalty stopped Hull City taking Southampton into extra time and the runners-up in Division One went through on a 5-4 aggregate.

Gary Bannister brought his total goal tally to 12 in 12 games as Queens Park Rangers beat a brave York City 4-1.

An own goal by Stoke City defender Steve Bould sent Third Division Rotherham into the third round.

Centre half Chris Nicholl was sent off in the first half but ten men Grimsby earned a 1-1 draw at Barnsley to go through to the next round.

Cup holders Liverpool only disposed of Stockport County in extra time with goals from Robinson and Whelan.

Only 15,000 fans watched Spurs beat Halifax in a match that turned out to be shooting practice for the home side. Hazard with two goals, Crooks and Hughton scoring one each.

Arsenal were never given a chance to repeat their four goal performance at Highbury, having to settle for a 1-1 draw against Bristol Rovers.

Millwall looked capable of pulling back their 2-1 deficit against Chelsea when Lovell gave them a seventh minute lead but Cusack wrecked Millwall's hopes 18 minutes later with an own goal.

Two goals late in the game from Dale Banton took Fourth Division Aldershot into the third round for the first time in the club's history. Aldershot trailing Brighton 3-1 from the first

leg went ahead through Foyle and Banton's first goal in the 83rd minute to put the match into extra time. Banton clinched the Soldiers victory three minutes from time with a fierce shot that Moseley in the Brighton goal let slip through his fingers. Luton Town defender Paul Elliott was taken to hospital as his side beat plucky Orient 3-1. Manchester City beat Blackpool 3-1 with two goals from Tolmie.

David Kelly set up Third Division Walsall for another giant killing run scoring twice as they beat First Division Coventry City 3-1 at Highfield Road. Walsall reached the semi-finals last year before falling to Liverpool, fought like tigers as they destroyed Coventry's 2-1 lead in 28 minutes. Kelly hit his first after 53 minutes which was followed by O'Kelly adding a second shortly after. He got his second by lobbing the ball over the City goalkeeper.

A five goal blitz in the second half destroyed Third Division Bristol City, who had given West Ham United an uneasy time in the first forty-five minutes. Cottee put the Hammers in front after 24 minutes before Alan Walsh equalised from the penalty spot. The City were then taken apart with two goals in six minutes from Goddard in the second half. Whitton, Cottee again and Walford were all on target.

Asa Hartford returned to English football with two goals as Norwich City thrashed Preston North End 6-1 at Carrow Road to go into the next round with a 9-4 aggregate. Aston Villa's Gordon Cowans scored his first goal since his return from a broken leg in a 3-1 defeat of Scunthorpe at Villa Park.

At Elland Road, Leeds United finally wore down Gillingham after twice trailing to the Third Division side. Veteran Peter Lorimer settled the issue when he scored in the 72nd minute.

Billy Hamilton scored his second hat-trick in the Milk Cup this season and took Oxford United into the next round. Blackburn were the victims but they did take United into extra time.

Tommy Docherty's Wolves were held to a goalless draw at home to Port

Vale but scraped through thanks to a 2-1 win in the first leg.

West Bromwich Albion could afford to miss a penalty in disposing of Wigan Athletic at The Hawthorns. Gary Thompson was the guilty party but he made up for it later by scoring one of the three goals.

A Chris Waddle goal in the 63rd minute gave Newcastle United victory at Bradford and a 4-1 win over the two legs.

Nottingham Forest finally overcame Alan Ball's Portsmouth but the Second Division side took them to extra time.

Everton last season's finalist moved into the next round with a decisive 4-0 victory over Sheffield United and Crystal Palace were held to a 0-0 draw with Sunderland who go through to the next round.

LEICESTER CITY



If last season is any guide, tonight's Milk Cup visitors to Kenilworth Road should emerge from their early season slumber and fire into action around any time now.

A disappointing start with only two League wins from their first ten games is, in fact, an improvement on twelve months ago when Leicester had just two draws to show from their opening ten matches.

But then things picked up and City lost only two of their next 15 games to climb well clear of trouble in their first season back in the First Division.

Gordon Milne and his team must be hoping that there's a similar change in their fortunes around the corner and no doubt he will be looking for further success in the Milk Cup to boost confidence after the uncertainties over the first couple of months of the season.

'It's difficult putting your finger on the problem,' Milne explained in a *Sport on Two* radio interview recently. 'We thought the problems we encountered early last season were behind us but we've not been producing the results I know we are capable of. Too many key players have been off form and that's put extra pressure on the side as a whole.'

City are celebrating their 100th anniversary this season and a long and successful run in the Milk Cup would add a touch of cream to the centenary celebrations. They overcame their first hurdle, not without a problem or two, against Third Division Brentford in the last round.

Brentford were 2-0 in front in the first game at Filbert Street before City pulled four goals back in a burst of scoring towards the end and then increased their aggregate lead with a 2-0 win at Griffin Park in the second leg.

That sets up tonight's short journey down the M1 for Milne and his men. So far as League/Milk Cup pedigree goes, Leicester met with a fair amount of success in the pioneering years of the League Cup.

While some clubs snubbed the League's new baby back in the sixties, City found it a rewarding tournament, winning the Cup in 1964 and reaching the Final a year later.

They've not reached those heady heights since but over the years Leicester have earned themselves a reputation as a Cup side of some note and it's only three seasons since they reached the semi-finals of the FA competition as a Second Division outfit.

Their side on duty tonight is unlikely to have changed too drastically from the line-up that played in the League at Kenilworth Road last March and shared in a goalless draw.

Mark Wallington remains first choice keeper, with more than 400 League games behind him for the Filbert Street club. City's back four is built around two strong central defenders, former Wolves and QPR man Bob Hazell and Irish international John O'Neill, with a couple of Scots at full back — Bobby Smith and Ian Wilson.

It's only recently that Wilson discovered that he had been playing for several months with a fractured leg... 'an X-ray showed I'd been playing with a fractured fibula that had somehow healed on its own,' a surprised Wilson announced.

Another Irish cap, Paul Ramsey, had played at full back but is more often seen in midfield while former Hereford apprentice Andy Feeley opened up the season as first choice at right back.

Skipper Kevin MacDonald is a key man in the middle of the park alongside Ramsey and local youngster Andy Peake who packs quite a shot.

Steve Lynex, a former West Bromwich apprentice who moved to

Filbert Street from Birmingham City, operates out wide on the right and has been in good form despite City's sticky start. He is a useful scorer and that can also be said of Gary Lineker, capped as substitute against Scotland last season and a late call up into England's World Cup squad against Finland a fortnight ago.

Lineker was the side's leading scorer last season with 22 League goals and his partnership with Alan Smith, recruited from the non-League game a couple of years ago, has proved a profitable one for City.

Mark Bright joined the club from Port Vale during the close season and has proved a useful addition to the squad and from the Filbert Street junior ranks, Robert Jones and Robert Kelly have come through to gain first team recognition.

Coming up to the quarter-way mark of the season, City had home wins against Ipswich and West Bromwich under their belts although their only away points had come from draws at Tottenham and Stoke.

Gordon Milne must be keeping his fingers crossed that the side will quickly find the form it eventually showed last year when the horrors of the first couple of months were put aside and the team knitted together to climb the table with a flourish.

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MILK CUP HISTORY



TOP TEAMS

The Milk Cup (and its predecessor, the League Cup) is in its 25th season. The competition has been won by 15 clubs, starting in 1961 with Aston Villa, who share a record of five appearances in the Final with Liverpool.

Villa have a unique claim in that they reached the Final while in the Third, Second and First Divisions, and their total of three victories was not beaten until Liverpool completed their fourth success last season.

Needless to say, Liverpool are the only club to have won the trophy for four years in succession, but Nottingham Forest were the first to play in three successive Finals, winning the first two and then losing to Wolves at the third attempt.

Everton were involved in the longest-ever Final (a record not beaten in the FA Cup) when they played three matches against Villa in 1977 — a total of 330 minutes before they were beaten in extra time at Old Trafford.

How many people realise that in the early days of this competition some unfashionable clubs use to appear in the Final which until a few years ago used to be a two-legged affair.

Talking earlier of unfashionable clubs, just over fourteen years ago we played one of these clubs, Workington, in the second round of the Football League Cup. The date was Tuesday 8th September 1970, in front of 11,072 spectators, saw us come out winners of the game by three goals to nil after being one up at half time. The teams that day were Luton Town: Read, John Ryan, Slough, Guild, Nicholl, Moore, Macdonald, Court, Tees, Keen, Givens. Substitute: Jimmy Ryan.

Workington: Burridge, Wilson, Butler, Geidmintis, Spencer, Wood, Tyrer, Spratt, Massie, Goodfellow, Martin. Substitute: Wookey. The goalscorers for the Town were Don Givens after nine minutes which was the only goal of the first half, Malcolm Macdonald got the second after fifty minutes and Givens got his second and the Town's third twenty-seven minutes later.

Another interesting feature was the gate receipts of this game came to £3,867.14s.6d. This after all expenses had been paid had then to be shared by the two clubs. The

grand total at the end came to £1,374.1s.9d. Other features included payment for the Police £41. Floodlight cost £20. Gatemen £41. Ticket printing £42.17s.6d. Monies paid into the Cup pool and to the League came to £830.3s.6d. These sums are a far cry from today's astronomical figures that clubs have to pay out.

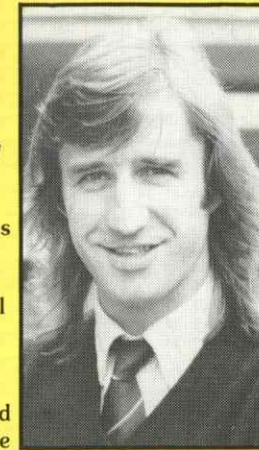

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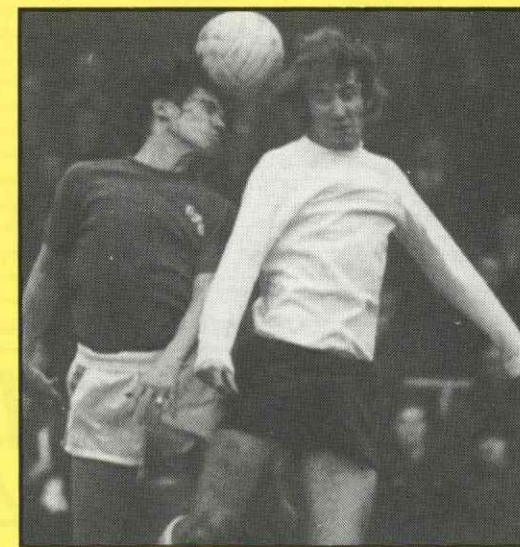
WHERE ARE THEY NOW

CANON LEAGUE GATES ARE UP

League crowds have a smile on their faces — put there by the prospect of four of the most exciting and tightest championship chases for years.

The leaders of each of the four Canon League Divisions have changed almost every week since the season began — and the fans are responding by coming back to the League grounds in increasing numbers.

Official returns to The Football League up to the end of September show an overall increase in attendances of 2.8 per cent at an average of 9,671 per match.

In the First Division, where no more than five points blanket the top six teams, the average is as high as 22,481 a match.

The total attendance at all League matches up to the end of September was 3,268,655, the highest figure since 1981-82 and an increase of over a quarter of a million on the corresponding period last season.

The first two weekends of October have confirmed the uplift in attendances as championship and promotion races gain momentum.

More people watched Canon League matches during the weekend of 6th October — the unofficial figure is some 450,000 — than at any weekend since the opening day of the season when the figure was 460,000.

And last weekend, when the provisional figure was approximately 240,000 the attendances again showed an increase on the corresponding figure 12 months ago.
