




Programme sellers, stewards, tea ladies, car park attendants, caterers: the list is long, and I thank you all. Without your continued support, we would not be the club we are.





25th January 1954. After drawing at Kenilworth Road and at Bloomfield Road, the Town went down by two goals to nil.

2. Jimmy Ryan has just scored the equalising goal for the Town in a FA Cup tie at Port Vale in the 83rd minute although Allan West and Jimmy Husband don't look too pleased about it. Former Town captain Brian Horton is between the Luton players and is no doubt making some comment to someone.




3. This goal was scored by Barry (Bullet) Butlin and proved to be the most important one of the season. The match was at West Bromwich Albion on Saturday 27th April 1974 and this goal put the Town in the First Division. The result of the match was a 1-1 draw.

4. Supporters won't forget these scenes for some time. The place was Maine Road, Manchester, the time approximately 4.35 pm and Raddy Antic has just scored the goal that gave Luton victory over Manchester City by 1-0 and kept the Hatters in the First Division and sent City down to the Second. Raddy is pictured here somewhere under the pile of jubilant colleagues. We have other pictures of goals for and against in different seasons and if you would like to see some more and make it a regular feature just let the editor know.



Coventry manager Bobby Gould was hoping to give the Highfield Road fans an early Christmas present when he made a £110,000 bid for Heart's Scottish Under-21 midfielder David Bowman just before the Festive Season got underway.

'We've been searching for a ball winning midfielder and Bowman comes into that category,' said Gould who has been concerned for some time about City's failings in midfield.

'In all successful sides the midfield is the engine room . . . and for a variety of reasons we've not had the balance I would have liked there this season,' he added.

It has been another spell of inconsistency and disappointing results for Coventry since the season kicked off and just before entering the busy holiday programme, City found themselves in the bottom three with just four wins to show from their first 18 matches.

Gould, who returned to Coventry as manager in May 1983, has certainly rung the changes in players since taking over. He's been involved in 25 signings, totalling in excess of a million pounds.

Before his moves to sign Bowman, his two most recent trips into a transfer market he knows so well were for former England men Cyrille Regis from West Bromwich Albion and winger Peter Barnes from Leeds.

They were added to a list of new faces signed during the summer that included Kenny Hibbitt from Wolves, goalkeeper Steve Ogrizovic from Shrewsbury, Luton's Kirk

Stephens, Notts County defender Brian Kilcline, another former England striker Bob Latchford and Dutchman Martin Jol, taken on a free transfer from West Bromwich.

Not surprisingly, the side took a while to settle in, starting off the campaign with a defeat at Aston Villa, a home draw against Norwich and then their first win against Leicester.


Injuries, too, have not helped the Sky Blues find a pattern over the first half of the season and as Gould says: 'It really would be nice to be able to announce an unchanged team every now and again. That's not really been possible so far and new players need time to settle in and adjust.'

Coventry's successful move for Regis surprised a few people in the game. Gould had been promising his supporters a big name buy and after a bid for Villa's England man Peter Withe had been turned down he switched to Regis who had been struggling for a while to find the form that made him an England target man not so long ago.

Barnes spent three unhappy years with Leeds, including a season when he was loaned out to the Spanish club Real Betis and at the time of the signings, Gould said that he hoped he could help Regis and Barnes rediscover the form that made them England men a few seasons ago.

It's early days yet, but the Coventry boss was delighted with Barnes' form in a recent defeat at Liverpool.

Probably the best displays from Coventry's new men over the first half of the season have come from keeper Steve Ogrizovic, once understudy to Ray Clemence at Anfield

before a move into the Second Division with Shrewsbury.

Although Coventry's defensive record includes heavy defeats at Chelsea (6-2) and West Bromwich (5-2), the former policeman has been in fine form and Coventry's problems, as Gould had pointed out, have tended to be further forward in midfield.

Former Kenilworth Road favourite Stephens has settled in well at full back with former Gillingham man Micky Adams occupying the other slot alongside big man Kilcline and skipper Trevor Peake.

City have used various permutations in midfield involving Hibbitt, who spent 16 years at Wolves, Dave Bennett and Michael Gynn with Barnes out wide on the left in recent games.

Up front Regis shares the main striking roles alongside former Tottenham man Terry Gibson who was the Sky Blues' leading scorer last season with 17 League goals, including a hat-trick against Liverpool.

Latchford, back in England after a brief spell in Holland, has mainly been on the sidelines since Regis' arrival while young defender Ian Butterworth who won his first England Under-21 cap in Turkey recently, lost his place following the defeat at West Bromwich at the end of last month.

As the New Year approaches, Coventry have a proud tradition to maintain. Although they've rarely looked like setting the First Division on fire in recent seasons, the Sky Blues have been in the top flight now for 18 seasons . . . and only Arsenal and the two Merseyside clubs can match that record of First Division consistency.

With an ambitious manager, a wealthy chairman who has pledged that funds are available for further strengthening the side, Coventry will be hoping that 1985 brings a change of fortunes and a speedy climb away from the relegation zone.

City would also like to make some progress in the FA Cup after a disastrous defeat by Third Division Walsall in an early round of the Milk Cup. Manchester City are the visitors to Highfield Road next week for a game that gives City the chance to open the New Year in style.


