CLUB COMMENT

We were subjected to unprecedented, premeditated, violence before, during and after our Cup match versus Millwall. The infamous scenes have made national and international publicity and comment, culminating in the personal intervention by the Prime Minister.

The following is a copy of the letter we have sent to all daily national newspapers. We have also written to the Prime Minister.

The Board offers its utmost regrets to the people of Luton, and our supporters. We will do all in our power to prevent this happening again. In our view, the only feasible short-term measure is to refuse to play these games in future. People are more important than football. That decision we have taken.

We are conducting a thorough investigation into the arrangements for the match. However, we have complied with every safety and crowd control regulation laid down by the Government and the Football Association.

Two factors remain. The policing, the club paid for the maximum policing requirement required of them inside the ground. Control outside the ground is for the Police themselves to determine, and not for us to comment upon.

Should the match have been all-ticket? All-ticket matches serve in the main two purposes (1) to provide segregation and (2) to control numbers. We are required by law to hold a Safety Certificate, which is issued by the County Council. This certificate regulates the numbers permitted, where crush barriers are placed, numbers of exit gates required, etc.

Our Kenilworth Road terrace complies totally with the requirements of the law, is regulated to hold 8,700 spectators, segregated into three sections, all fully self-contained.

Millwall average attendance, including seating and (standing) visitors, is around 7,000.

The estimation of numbers travelling including seating, was 5-6,000. Millwall did not sell all their seats, some were returned. All previous estimates over the past five years have proven accurate to within 20 per cent. Allowing for an unprecedented 50 per cent error in estimations, we could still cope with 10,000 seated and standing visiting supporters. So numbers were not a factor in the all-ticket equation, nor was segregation. We have already stated our terrace complies totally with the theory and the requirement of the law.

In any case we believe it is naive in the extreme to suggest that the organised pre-meditated act by the large numbers who broke down the entry gates and turnstiles prior to the match, would have been prevented by a piece of paper. Quite obviously, the type of person concerned has no regard for theories or regulations.

No, the whole terrifying affair was organised from the start. Their frenzy developed by the consumption of alcohol on the way (NOT at the ground). The motive? To prove their masculinity, to be above the law, and to be anti-police.

The consequences on society are truly frightening, unless the Prime Minister acts decisively. Her intervention is opportune. If we want a law and order society, based on decent morals and respect for all, then write to the Prime Minister now and demand it.

Welcome to our friends from West London. We have enjoyed many good games with QPR over recent seasons, and today we are playing to record a vital double. Earlier this season, we won 3-2 on their much improved synthetic surface. Since that time, they have changed their management and several players have left, such as Gary Micklewhite, Simon Stainrod and Jeremy Charles, whilst they have signed John Byrne and Robbie James. Last Friday, we played an exciting 0-0 Reserve game at Luton with Rangers, which could well be an important pointer to the Combination Championship.


I would like to say a massive thank you to all those who are here today to support us. I can understand your sickening feelings after witnessing such mob hooliganism that outraged us all when we played Millwall. Until all enquiries have been made by all parties, it is both unwise and unfair to draw conclusions about that evening. The problems on the night were horrendous. At this stage, all I can do is congratulate the referee and linesmen for showing a cool calm authority, the players on both sides for playing and concentrating on the football amid the wild scenes, our supporters, who willed our side on despite great provocation all round, and not least, the policemen who made valiant attempts without over-use of force, to contain the marauding army that damaged our town, our good name and our ground.

We have experience and emerging youth. Once Paul Elliott, Frank Bunn and Stacey North are fit, I will be happy with the squad here. What I do know is that the cavalcade that leaves Luton for Villa Park will be a group of well behaved people who, we hope, have appreciated the way we try to play the game. We must come away on the terraces with a glowing report of good natured but noisy support!

Last Saturday's game at Sheffield was two points lost in view of the way our composed play rattled the home side. It was a day when chances were created and not taken. It was good to fight back after conceding an early goal but the absence of clinical finishing was decisive. We are playing better and more organised, and have a good record in the last 10 games. Now is the time to push our efforts even more. Only 110 per cent will do if we are to escape the scramble to avoid the drop.

Finally a word on our discipline. In a competitive three games with Watford, we emerged without a booking. So far, no one has accumulated a 21 point total. Against Watford the referee was firm but not petty and because the players acted responsibly no one abused his occasional leniency. Refereeing has an important relationship angle.

On Sunday the Milk Cup Final is played and in the evening the PFA will enjoy their

Watford's decision to have a Saturday morning kick-off against Chelsea to avoid any possible crowd trouble found that their trouble was on the pitch and not off it. Chelsea went into the lead after 11 minutes when McClelland deflected a Dixon cross into his own net. Blissett's goal in the 20th minute brought the home side back into the game, but second-half goals from Speedie and Dixon, his first goal for six weeks, sealed the points for Chelsea.

Bryan Robson came off the substitute bench to earn Manchester United a 2-2 draw at Lyston Park. United's other goal was a brilliant header from a John Gidman free-kick. A penalty from Ray Stewart had a deflected effort from Paul Goddard were the West Ham scorers. After the game Robson said 'It was great to be back. I have been out for two months and it was the most frustrating time of my life. To come on and score when we were 2-1 down was more than I could ever have dreamed about. Good news for England, that the injured shoulder gave him no problems.'

Garth Crooks ended the best known jinx in football when he gave Tottenham Hotspur victory over Liverpool at Anfield, 73 years to the day since the last one. Spurs had Ray Clemence to thank for keeping out Liverpool while Ian Rush and Kenny Dalglish were sadly off form. The goal came when Bruce Grobbelaar brilliantly saved from substitute Mike Hazzard but the ball fell for Crooks who made no mistake. Spurs manager Peter Shreeves said of Clemence. 'What a day to play a blinder.'

Mick Harford gave Luton a precious point at Sheffield Wednesday who had gone in front through Imre Varadi after six minutes. Wednesday's Icelandic youngster Siggs Johnson stood out on his leave debut before Harford struck in the 55th minute.

A tremendous free-kick from Gary Owen gave West Bromwich Albion an

unlikely victory at Nottingham Forest. Tony Godden kept Albion in the game with some fine saves before Nicky Cross put them ahead. Peter Davenport levelled the scores before Owen's cracker 15 minutes from the end.

Wayne Fereday was QPR's hero as his side put Ipswich deeper into relegation trouble at Loftus Road. He struck twice in 20 seconds to put Rangers on top with almost identical shots. Gary Bannister scored his 20 second goal of the season to give Rangers one of their easiest victories. After the match Ipswich manager Bobby Ferguson said 'This was one of our worst performances of the season,' and then went on to say 'There could be sweeping changes before our next match.'

Everton were just seven minutes from victory when Alan Evans saved a point for Aston Villa with a penalty kick after Stevens had brought down Walters. Kevin Richardson had put the Toffee men in front but they didn't look like League leaders without Peter Reid and Kevin Sheedy.

Arsenal's Steve Williams netted his first goal for the Gunners in a lively match at Highbury against Leicester City. Although the visitors fought back Raphael Meade sealed it with a goal four minutes from the end.

Sunderland won the Milk Cup rehearsal at Norwich after being given a flying start by Ian Wallace. His first goal for the Roker club came after 10 minutes and an own goal from Greg Downes put them further in front. John Deeham pulled one back for the home side but a goal four minutes from the end from David Hodgson made the game safe.

Stoke City had Chris Maskery taken to hospital after a clash of heads with Southampton's Mark Dennis but managed to hold out for a point in a goalless draw.



LETTER TO NATIONAL PRESS

Dear Sir,
Much has now been written concerning the devastating scene at our ground last Wednesday.

- However, the following ought to be recorded:
1. I personally have been dealing with hooliganism for over 20 years. It is not new.
 2. It first manifested itself during a period of high employment.
 3. The peak was reached during the late sixties and early seventies, prior to the introduction of the Safety of Sports Grounds Act in 1975.
 4. The introduction of the Safety of Sports Grounds Act was suppressive legislation, forcing the problem into the streets.
 5. There has been only one curative political initiative during the past 20 years. This was the Football and the Community Scheme, introduced by the then Sports Minister, Dennis Howell MP.
 6. Football has introduced every practical suppressive measure asked of it, at the cost of millions of pounds.
 7. We have investigated on a number of occasions, the introduction of membership cards. However, until the law is changed, it has no teeth. It is also naive in the extreme to think a piece of plastic would prevent hundreds of marauding hooligans from wreaking havoc.
 8. The banning of alcohol inside football grounds again fails to recognise the facts. Most responsible clubs do not sell alcohol to standing spectators. At Luton, we withdrew it from sale in 1979. No spectator, was able to buy alcohol on our standing area at the Millwall match. However, hundreds were already drunk when they arrived at the ground. The first Millwall coach (Clarkes of Plumstead) arrived before 5 pm. The occupants were already the worse for drink, and the Police were alerted.
 9. The measures taken by Luton at the match followed precisely those laid down by the Minister in his Report on Football Spectator Violence, dated August 1984.
 10. In our view, the breakdown of control at the match was the result of the unlawful entry of nearly 2,000 spectators after exit doors and turnstiles had been broken down.
 11. There have been many conferences and Reports on hooliganism. The recent Government Report mentioned in (9) above contained little that was new, and ignored totally the broader social issues. The most far reaching Report containing short, medium and long term solutions, was produced in February 1984, by the AMA.
 12. We welcome with a sigh of relief, and a great deal of optimism, the Prime Minister's initiative. We would respectfully suggest that the AMA Report, mentioned in (11) above, forms the basis of her initiative. Football must grasp the opportunity provided by the dreadful scenes at Luton, with enterprise and realism. Out of darkness some light has been provided.
 13. Finally, the most worrying aspect arising from the match was that the violence may be judged to have been premeditated and seemed to be anti-Police.


In the first-half we started off very well and our sharp interchange of passes gave us the greater possession and it only took eight minutes for Mark Stein to give the lead for us.

They were overwhelmed by a first-half display where in the whole 11 players performed to their maximum both as individuals, and more importantly, collectively.



QUEENS PARK RANGERS



Today's Kenilworth Road visitors edged further clear of relegation worries last Saturday when they beat Ipswich 3-0 at Loftus Road to climb up to 13th place in the table, 12 points clear of the bottom three.

For a side that finished fifth last season and qualified for the UEFA Cup, Rangers' performances since last August's kick-off have been somewhat erratic. They went out of Europe in Yugoslavia, badly beaten after taking a healthy lead from the first leg and soon after manager Alan Mullery parted company with the club leaving his number two Frank Sibley in charge.

Sibley has made changes to the make-up of the side in the last few months signing Welsh international Robbie James from Stoke, Liverpool striker Mike Robinson and John Byrne from York City and departures from Loftus Road have included Jeremy Charles to Oxford, Gary Micklewhite to Derby and Simon Stainrod to Sheffield Wednesday.

Rangers, having eased their way clear of immediate trouble, can now look towards consolidating a mid-table position and hope for a return to the impressive form they showed last season, next year.

One of Rangers' problems in the last few months is that they no longer carry an invincibility tag at home on their highly publicised artificial surface. To date they've been beaten three times in the League at home, including Town's 3-2 win at Loftus Road back in October, but they've also been forced to share the points at home in six other games.

They also, perhaps surprisingly, went out of the Milk Cup in front of their own supporters, beaten by Ipswich in a fifth round replay. Away from Loftus Road, Rangers have managed only two wins on their travels and their goals record of nine is the third lowest in the Division.

That's a slightly surprising fact because there is plenty of scoring potential in the Rangers' line-up, headed by Gary Bannister who has done so well in West London since moving from Sheffield Wednesday in the close season.


Bannister leads the club's scoring lists and has found the net consistently throughout the season so far. Robinson had a useful record at both Brighton and Liverpool for finding the net while Byrne, a £100,000 buy from Third Division York, was top scorer at Bootham Crescent last season with 27 League goals, and has been called up for the Eire squad since his move to Loftus Road.

Former apprentice Wayne Fereday, too, has shown himself to be a useful chance-taker this season and netted two of Rangers' three goals in their win against Ipswich seven days ago.

England Under-21 keeper Peter Hucker remains first choice in goal although Rangers added competition when they signed Paul Barron from West Bromwich Albion recently.

Steve Wicks, in his second spell at Loftus Road, and England cap Terry Fenwick operate at the heart of the back four with Warren Neill and Ian Dawes, both former apprentices, the usual full-back pairing.

Rangers' midfield combination has been changed quite a

lot over the course of the season and there's plenty of experience to call on with James, former Chelsea man Mike Fillery, John Gregory — another England cap — and Gary Chivers competing for places.

Robinson, Bannister and Byrne provide Rangers' fire power up front with Irish international Ian Stewart another useful member of the squad.

It seems likely that Rangers will have a new manager in charge for next season. Sibley, despite holding the fort since Mullery's departure regards himself essentially as a coach and among names who've been linked with the job are West Ham's John Lyall, former Loftus Road number two Alan Harris, now working at Barcelona with Terry Venables, and even a return to England for Venables who has made such a big impression in Spain in the last few months.

Rangers have probably left it too late to match last season's run which carried them into Europe but after one or two problems earlier in the season, the club will probably be satisfied to claim a mid-table berth and hope for an honours challenge next season.






Evening Standard Five-a-Side Competition at Wembley
