



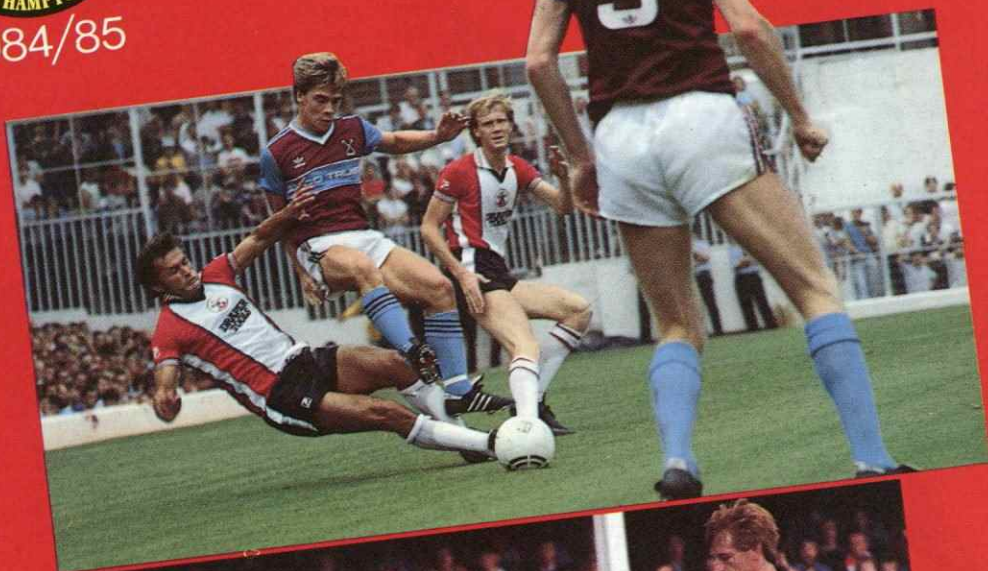

When Luton manager David Pleat realised in November that death by relegation was looking almost inevitable, he decided to give his fading team the boost of a heart transplant. Five new players, two of them internationals, have been grafted into the team and recent performances suggest the Hatters will pull clear of the bottom three places in the table.

Foster and Nicholas are both internationals. Foster, a £75,000 signing from Aston Villa, began his career as a none-too-successful striker with Portsmouth. He switched to defence and moved along the coast to Brighton for £130,000. Nicholas, who signed from Crystal Palace for £150,000, was recalled to



the Wales' side this season, picking up his 34th cap against Spain. Peter began his career with Palace as a full-back but later converted into a forceful midfield player. Harford was quickly off the mark for the Hatters, scoring at Leicester in his first match following his £250,000 move from Birmingham in December.

Mick first came to the fore with Lincoln City, topping their scoring list with 16 goals in 1979/80. When he had scored 15 times for the Red Imps the following season, he was snapped up by Newcastle who paid £200,000. Steve Foster who has formed a good understanding with N. Ireland

international Mal Donaghy at the heart of the defence. Mal was signed from Larne for £20,000 in 1978 and is now a regular member of the N. Ireland team, winning his 33rd cap against Finland this season.

Tim Breaker and Mitchell Thomas have been filling the full-back positions. Tim completed his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road and made a couple of appearances in the First Division last season. Mitchell served

his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road, made his League debut two seasons ago and won a regular place towards the end of last season.

Les Sealey has now regained his place in goal. He began his career with Coventry, making his League debut against Q.P.R. in 1977. He completed more than 150 games in the Sky Blues' First Division side before joining Luton for £120,000 in 1983. Les was ever-present last season but lost his place to Andy Dibble this term. When Dibble was injured in November, Les returned to re-establish himself as first-choice. Ricky Hill and Wayne

Turner have been the most consistent performers in midfield but Gary Parker, Frankie Bunn, David Preece, David Moss and, more recently, Ray Daniel, have all appeared here.

Hill joined the Hatters as a schoolboy and has been a first-team regular for six years. Two seasons ago his performances were rewarded by a call up to the England squad and he won full caps against Denmark and West Germany.

Turner developed in the junior teams and made his League debut in 1979. He was only an occasional first-teamer at first, joining Lincoln on loan in 1981/82, but has been a fairly regular member of the side for two years now, playing

both in midfield and at left-back.

Parker is a former Hatters' apprentice who made his first senior appearance two seasons ago. He earned a regular place towards the end of last term.

Bunn served his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road and first played in their League eleven in 1980/81. But he was only an occasional first-teamer prior to last season.

Moss has twice been Luton's top scorer since transferring from Swindon in 1978. He earned his name as a goalscoring winger with Swindon, claiming 60 goals in just over 200 League games. Daniel is a former Hat-

ters' apprentice. He made his First Division debut two seasons ago but, until recently, had been only an occasional first-teamer. Last season he was loaned out to Gillingham.

Brian Stein normally partners Harford in attack. Brian was blooded in Luton's first-team in 1977 and led their scoring list for the first time in 1980/81 with 19 goals. The following term, when they won promotion, he led the way again with 21. Brian has played once for the full England team and also has three under-21 caps.

Chuk Nwajobi often plays in attack or is nominated as substitute.

He was born in Nigeria and previously played for Dulwich Hamlet.

Luton have won only one away game in the First Division, on Queen's Park Rangers' artificial pitch (3-2) in October. They drew at Ipswich (1-1), Leicester (2-2) and Sheffield Wednesday (1-1) but have been beaten in their other away games at West Bromwich (0-4), Nottingham Forest (1-3), Tottenham (2-4), Sunderland (0-3), Norwich (0-3), Manchester United (0-2), Arsenal (1-3), Liverpool (0-1), Everton (1-2), Newcastle (0-1) and Watford (0-3).

The Hatters did win at Orient (4-1) in the Milk Cup and, by winning their

home-leg 3-1, took that tie by 7-2 on aggregate. In the third round they scored a useful 3-1 home victory over Leicester City but then went out to Sheffield Wednesday (2-4).

But they are still in the F.A. Cup. After being held 1-1 at home by Stoke City, Luton won the replay at the Victoria Ground by 3-2. In round four they scored an easy 2-0 home win over Huddersfield Town. They then beat Watford (1-0) in a third replay and Millwall (1-0) to move into the semi-final for the first time since 1959. The Hatters now face Everton to decide who goes to Wembley.

Luton battle on

Life has been quite a struggle for Luton since they last gained promotion to the First Division in 1982. They were saved from relegation at the end of their first season by a dramatic late goal against Manchester City, at Maine Road, in their final match of the season. That sent City down in their stead.

The Hatters made a good start last season but later suffered a few set-backs and ultimately took 16th place. However, they are thankful for small blessings at Kenilworth Road and count themselves fortunate to enjoy First Division status at all after the traumatic events of recent times.

The Hatters are, in fact, the only club in Football League history ever to drop from the First to the Fourth Division and later reclaim their place at the top. In the five years between 1960 and 1965 they

sank right through all the divisions.

Their recovery started with the Fourth Division championship in 1968. By 1970 they were back in Division Two and in 1974 they stepped proudly back into the First Division once again. Sadly, they survived for only one season on that occasion, but they rebuilt in the lower division and, after showing steady improvement, won the Second Division Championship in 1982.

Steve Foster started out in soccer determined to win fame as a top goalscorer. But he switched roles at a fairly early stage and went on to play for England as a central defender.

Born at Portsmouth, Steve went along to Fratton Park for a trial and was eventually signed as an apprentice. It was sad for him that Pompey were on the slide at the time and he found himself playing in a struggling side when he made his League debut. He played his first game at Orient in August 1975 and during the course of that season made a total of 11 appearances in attack or as substitute. But Portsmouth finished bottom of the Second Division and faced a future of further uncertainty. Steve could scarcely look back on his first season with satisfaction. That he looked unhappy in a striker's role was not entirely his own fault. The service provided from midfield did not make life easy for any Pompey forward of that time.

So Steve decided to try his hand as a central defender and, after a few games as substitute the following season, he returned to the Portsmouth side in the number five shirt in November 1976 — and hasn't really looked back since then.

After two seasons as a regular first-teamer, Steve found himself down in the Fourth Division following another relegation. He stayed on at Fratton Park for one more season but, when Pompey failed to gain promotion, he realised that he would have to move on if he was to reach the top.

Brighton paid £130,000 for him during the summer of 1979 and that move gave Steve what is believed to be one of football's off-beat

records. During a period of three years and just over five months, he played in all four divisions of the Football League.

He played his last game in the Second Division for Portsmouth in March 1976, then slipped down with them through the Third and the Fourth Divisions. He made his First Division debut for Brighton against Bolton in September 1979. It was soon evident that he had taken the right decision for, towards the end of his first campaign at The Goldstone Ground, he played as substitute for the

England under-21 side against East Germany and he was by then in line for inclusion in the full England squad.

His chance eventually came in February 1982 when he played for England against N. Ireland in a British Championship game at Wembley, partnering former Saint Dave Watson in the middle of the England defence.

Steve helped England to a convincing 4-0 victory and in May he won his second cap in a friendly against Holland at Wembley.

He had done enough to earn himself a place in England's World Cup squad in Spain, striking up an acquaintanceship with current Saints' players Mick Mills and Peter Shilton who were also in the party.

Though Phil Thompson and

Terry Butcher had at that stage become the accepted central defensive partnership Steve played in the final group game against Kuwait in Bilbao.

More excitement was in store for him the following season. Though Brighton spent the entire season struggling, unsuccessfully, against relegation from the First Division, they enjoyed a remarkable run in the F.A. Cup.

The Seagulls defeated Liverpool 2-1 at Anfield and survived all the way to Wembley itself.

Then came one of the worst moments in Steve's life. He received a caution in one of the League games leading up to the final and that took his total of penalty points to the limit. The cold truth hit him — he would miss the F.A. Cup final.

In spite of vigorous Brighton appeals to get the decision changed, Steve had to watch from the stand as his colleagues played splendidly to hold Manchester United to a 2-2 draw.

Steve was then free to play in the replay so he did get an unexpected chance to savour the Cup final atmosphere. Sadly, Brighton had given their all in the first game and were well beaten 0-4 in the replay.

The disappointment of that defeat, plus relegation, led to many changes at the Goldstone Ground so, when Aston Villa went in with a bid of £200,000 the following season, Steve was happy to return to the First Division with them.

Then Villa had a change of manager and he clearly wasn't happy at the way things were going. So he was pleased to join Luton's battle for First Division survival, joining the Hatters for £70,000 in November.

ENGLAND ON TARGET FOR MEXICO

Only a disaster of catastrophic proportions can now prevent England from qualifying for next year's World Cup finals in Mexico. N. Ireland have a good chance of accompanying us yet Wales' super win over Scotland, at Hampden Park last week, could well have sabotaged both countries' chances of qualifying.

England complete their away fixtures in May, when they play Rumania and Finland, and it is reasonable to assume that they will collect at least two points from that exercise on current form.

Bobby Robson's men then complete the run in at the start of next season with Wembley encounters against Rumania, Turkey and N. Ireland and, with the top two teams from this group going to Mexico, England already look well on target.

Bobby Robson now has one of the largest squads in England's World Cup history. He has used 24 players so far this season and now probably has about 30 players who can be considered top-quality international material.



Mark Wright is just one of about half-a-dozen central defenders in line for duty in Mexico, competing with Terry Butcher, Dave Watson, Terry Fenwick, Alvin Martin and Graham Roberts for the two centre-back positions.

Waiting behind Peter Shilton are two fine goalkeepers in Gary Bailey and Chris Woods so England, who have yet to concede a goal in the qualifying competition, have absolutely no problems in defence, even though top quality full-backs are a little thin on the ground.

It is in midfield where Bobby Robson has his biggest worries. Ray Wilkins and Bryan Robson will, barring injuries, certainly fill two of the midfield places in Mexico but both have such a big influence that, if they are unavailable or have a rare off day, England can look very poor indeed in the middle of the field.

With Robson absent in Northern Ireland, England were outplayed for much of the match in this department. Wilkins, with internationally inexperienced players like Trevor Steven and Gary Stevens, found himself swamped at times.

And with skipper Robson looking well below form — and eventually going off with an injury — in last week's friendly against the Republic of Ireland — Wilkins took over as the motivating general in midfield.

When fully fit, Wilkins and Robson are world-class players of the type capable of dictating play against the best teams in the world. But Bobby Robson must occasionally wake up in a cold sweat, wondering what he would do if *both* players, for any reason, should not be available in Mexico. Glenn Hoddle, of course, is a great player when on top of his game but he has proved inconsistent in recent months. And, with little more than a year left before the finals, England do not have many other midfield players — with international experience behind them — who can control a game like the current pair.

England is better endowed with talented forwards than for many a year. John Barnes is a player of fine balance, great ball skills and magnificent crosser of a ball. Mark Hateley is superb in the air and also has speed and skill to keep an attack flowing. Gary Lineker is an instinctive goalscorer who flits around picking up balls flicked on by the likes of Hateley and Peter Davenport and he scored his first goal for England, against the Republic of Ireland, with the coolness of a seasoned international.

Then we have big centre-forwards like Paul Mariner and Peter Withe and skilful attacking players like Mark Chamberlain and Chris Waddle who operate on the flanks and provide ammunition for the men in the centre.

Trevor Francis and Tony Woodcock are also players who can turn on the magic when the situation is right for them.

So, allowing for those reservations about the midfield, England look set to qualify for the finals and, probably, do very well indeed in Mexico.

N. Ireland manager Billy Bingham, though disappointed at losing to England when he felt his side played better on the night, still believes his team can accompany England to Mexico.

Ireland carry the burden of having lost their opening match in Finland but they did beat Rumania 3-2 at Windsor Park in the only match completed so far by the Rumanians. Rumania are at home to Turkey tomorrow and certainly should chalk up their first two points. N. Ireland have the chance of catching England on points when they entertain Turkey in May.



The group table will begin to take shape in September on the day N. Ireland travel to Turkey and when England face Rumania at Wembley. Victory for the two British teams — especially if the Irishmen defeat Turkey in the first game — would put them in a very strong position.

A conclusion will be reached in November when England meet N. Ireland at Wembley. Ideally, both teams will have qualified by then. But we could be left in the embarrassing position of England having qualified and the Irishmen needing one or two points to make sure.

What then would Bobby Robson do? Would he go in for the kill, or might he be persuaded — in the national interest — to soft peddle and make it easier for N. Ireland?

Britain's hopes in group seven could virtually disappear unless Wales win their home game with Spain later this month. Scotland appeared to be coasting away when they won their opening two games at home to Iceland and Spain. A 0-1 defeat in Spain came as something of a set-back but nothing like as big a blow as their home defeat by Wales last Wednesday, by courtesy of an Ian Rush goal.

If Wales beat Spain then they would become favourites to top the group. But, if Spain win, they will then have home and away fixtures against Iceland and a virtual bye into the Mexico finals.

To keep their hopes alive, Scotland must win in Iceland in May and then gain revenge over Wales when the return game is played in September.

Many neutrals will probably be backing Spain to win the group. But, even if that

happens, all hope would not be lost. For the second team will play at home and away to the runners-up in the Oceania/Israel group.

This involves Australia, New Zealand, Israel and Taiwan and the matches are not scheduled to start until September. So, if Scotland or Wales do take second place, they could be involved in the longest journey ever undertaken by a British team to complete a World Cup qualifying tie.

The Republic of Ireland's group remains wide open though defeats away to both Norway and Denmark have left them with a great deal to do if they are to finish in one of the top two positions. After beating the USSR 1-0 at home in their opening tie, the Irishmen later disappointed.

But the USSR were then held to a 1-1 draw in Norway which seems to suggest the Norwegians could prove to be a dark horse in this group. The Russians, with four home games still to play, are expected to recover to take one of the qualifying places. Switzerland, at the moment, look the best bet to accompany them to Mexico.

LEAGUE MEETINGS

When we visited Kenilworth Road in September this season, Alan Curtis scored his first goal for the Saints to put us in front in the 50th minute. Unfortunately, we con-

ceded a penalty three minutes later and David Moss converted it with his usual efficiency. The game ended 1-1.

Two years ago Luton picked up an invaluable point from The Dell when they were waging a desperate battle against relegation.

Luton got off to a flying start when centre-back Paul Elliott put them in front after only five minutes. Coincidentally, it was one of the Saints' central defenders, Mark Wright, who levelled the scores about a quarter-of-an-hour later. David Armstrong then put the Saints up in front but his effort was nullified within three minutes by Raddy Antic. The score was 2-2 at half-time and there was no addition.

Luton's previous League visit was in December 1977 when we were in the Second Division and a goal from Ron Futchter fifteen minutes from the end gave them full points.

The Saints' biggest wins of the series were all by a three-goal margin — two of them in the same season. In September 1961 George O'Brien scored a hat-trick at Kenilworth Road with Harry Penk adding another before Gordon Turner scored a consolation for Luton close to the end. When Luton came to The Dell in the February, O'Brien scored again and efforts from Derek Reeves and Tommy Mulgrew made it 3-0 to The Saints.

We equalled those victories when we went to Kenilworth Road in October 1976. A penalty from David Peach set us up for a win and the same player scored again to make it 2-0 by the interval. Brian Chambers pulled one back for Luton but Ted MacDougall and Nick Holmes both scored in the later stages of the game to make it 4-1. Luton scored their best two wins over us in the same season, winning 6-2 at Kenilworth Road and 4-0 at The Dell in the final season prior to the last war.

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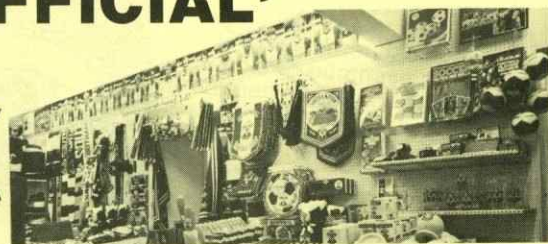
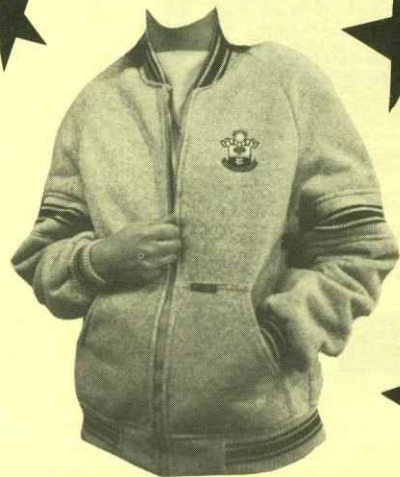
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Jimmy Case was delighted to get back into First Division football with the Saints and now he's hoping to help us qualify for next season's UEFA Cup and enjoy once again the very special challenge of European football.

"It was good to be back in the big match atmosphere at Tottenham," Jimmy smiled. "Though I was disappointed with the result, I didn't think we played too badly. At one stage I thought we were going to win but in the end everything they hit seemed to go into the net. It was one of those games."

Though Jimmy had a happy time at Brighton he often found himself looking at big games on television and wishing he was playing. "I was on a five-year contract with Brighton but I was quite happy to fulfil it and, hopefully, help them back into the First Division."

"But, when I heard that I had the chance to join the Saints I didn't need any time to make up my mind. Naturally, I would be pleased to get back into Europe with the club. The last time I played in a European tie was in the Champions' Cup final, for Liverpool, in Paris in 1981. I came on as substitute." Jimmy played in three winning European Cup finals for Liverpool. "Football in Europe is a special challenge," he says. "Over there they have an entirely different concept of the game and you can often learn a lot from them."

Recalling his early days in the game, Jimmy revealed that, when Liverpool first wanted to sign him,

he turned them down!

"I was playing football for a pub team and for a local club in the Northern Premier League," he explained. "But I was two years into a four-year electricians' apprenticeship and I didn't want to break it. So I turned Liverpool down."

"But they later came back and offered me part-time terms. I was 18 by then and agreed to combine football with my job. It was hard work for two years but I'm glad I did it." He made his First division debut for the Reds against Q.P.R. on the final day of the 1974/75 season and he began to earn a regular place the following season. One of the highlights of his Liverpool career came in the 1977 F.A. Cup final against Manchester United. After United had taken the lead, Jimmy replied almost immediately with a spectacular goal.

"They were great years at Liverpool," says Jimmy. "I had about eight very happy seasons but, in the end, I felt it was time to move on. I had suffered an injury. It was only a minor one and I can't even remember what the trouble was. But Sammy Lee won the first-team place and, though I had fought back before, I felt

I needed a complete change.

"And that's how it turned out. We moved right to the other end of the country to Brighton. They were in the First Division at the time and we had the thrill of getting to the F.A. Cup final in 1983."

"But we were also relegated that year and that was a big disappointment. For some reason — it could have been financial — it was decided to break up that team. Fine players like Gary Stevens, Steve Foster (whom I hope to meet in the Luton side this evening) and Michael Robinson were all sold."

So life became a bit flat for Jimmy. But he never thought of asking for a transfer. "I wouldn't do that," he said. "I had been given a five-year contract and I was committed to carry it through."

"I think so much loyalty has gone out of the game today. If you have a contract, you should honour it. I was prepared to fight to get Brighton back into the First Division."

"I missed the atmosphere of First Division football and many times wished I could get back because that's where all professional footballers want to be. But I would have remained with Brighton had

they wanted me to."

Jimmy is currently looking around for a new house in the Southampton area. At the moment he lives in Brighton with his wife Lana and two daughters Emma (4) and Jodie who is just five weeks old.

"I'm the sort of person who likes to get settled quickly," he says. "That doesn't mean I'll take anything that comes along but I do want to find something soon."

Jimmy was sad to miss the Everton game on Saturday but hopes to make his Dell debut for the Saints this evening. "Everton are a very good team and they look likely to win the Championship. "I think we have to accept that our own chances now depend upon clubs above us slipping up. But, even if one does, it is unlikely that they will all do so at this stage of the season."

"But there is so much still for us to play for. It's a matter of prestige, for both players and the club, to play in Europe. So it's a prize well worth fighting hard for."

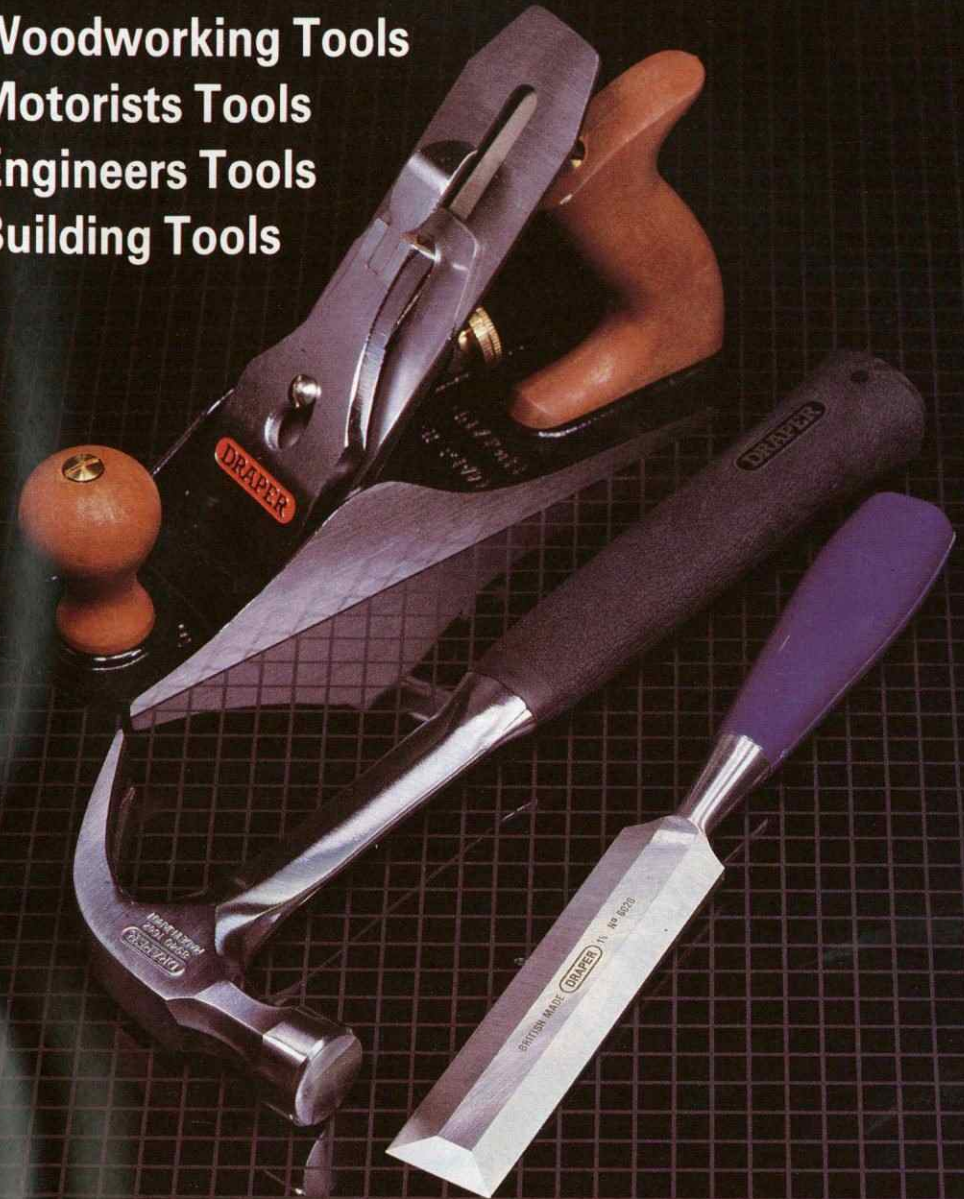
