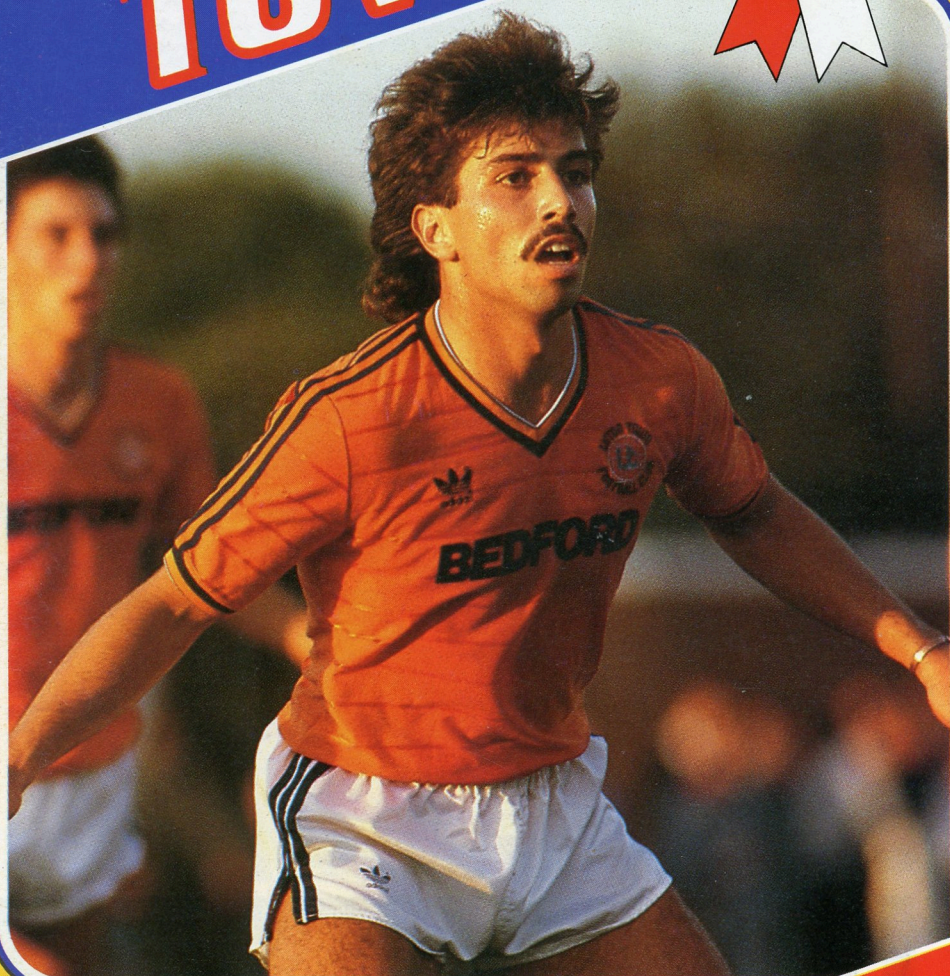

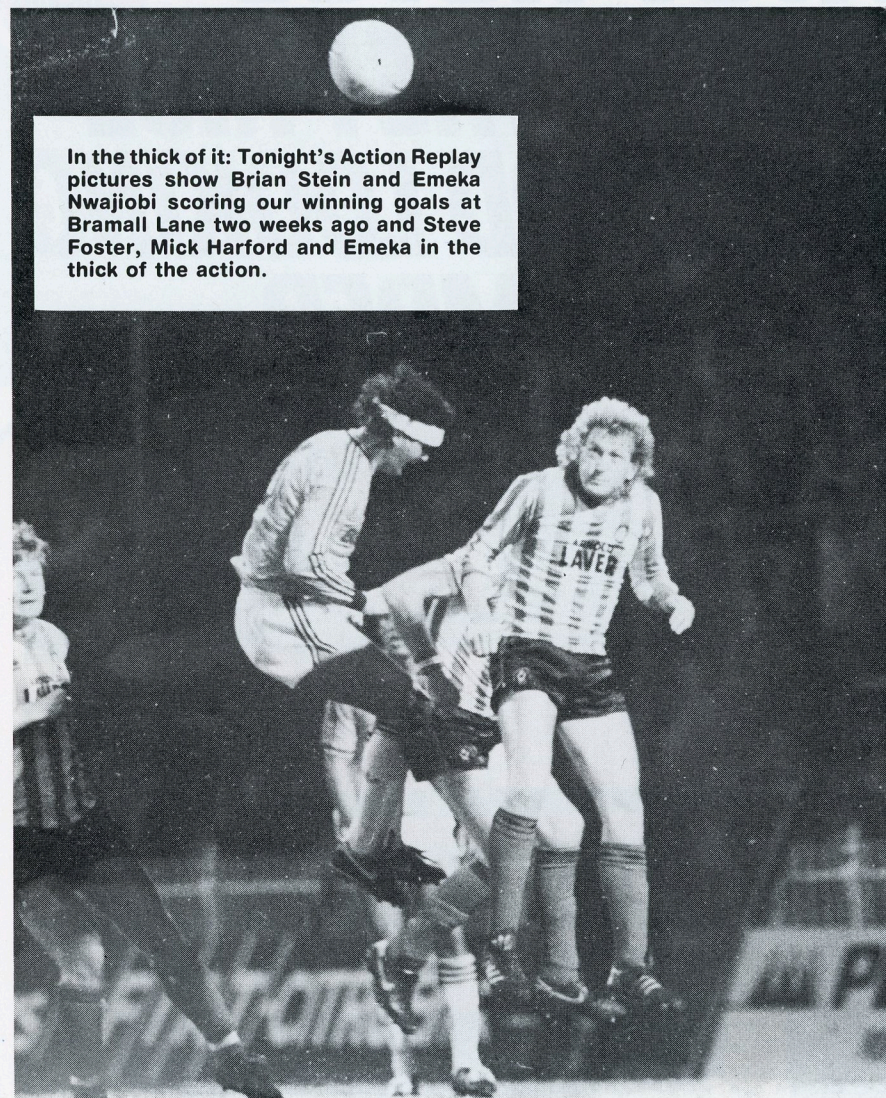

100 Years On

NEXT season the Football League Cup will not have the backing of the Milk Marketing Board. It is unfortunate that our sponsors have dropped out; this competition has gained considerable momentum since its inception. Last season there were some classic ties as Norwich and Sunderland battled through to the Wembley final.

Cup football has a special magic. The pairing of clubs from different divisions lends an excitement that cannot be reproduced in the League. It is nice to welcome opponents Sheffield United who have shown quite positively their intentions this season. During the close season, Mr. Ian Porterfield, the manager, persuaded Peter Withe to join from Aston Villa and Phil Thompson from Liverpool. Two players who both have won European Cup final winners' medals. Also joining ambitious United were Ken McNaught from Aston Villa, Ray Lewington from Fulham and Peter Foley from Grimsby. In terms of experience, their players have had more competitive games in the Football League than any other Second Division club.

Our apprentices are now settling and beginning to show the ability which dictated that we took nine of them on at the end of last season. After beating Crystal Palace 4-1 they hit another four goals at Bournemouth but more importantly three of the boys have adapted well to the Reserve team demands. Standards are high and there is a need for quick progress—it is a young man's game and if a boy has the



natural ability we will not hesitate to push him into the First Division scene.

I would like to thank the Luton Schools FA for inviting me to become their new President. It is an honour which I have readily accepted and I hope we enjoy a successful relationship. I am aware of the present day problems in the teaching profession and also the fact that there is less football in schools now than ever before. However, I find it unacceptable that some teachers do not respond to circulars asking for recommendations for town or city schoolboy sides. It is most unfair to deny boys these opportunities.

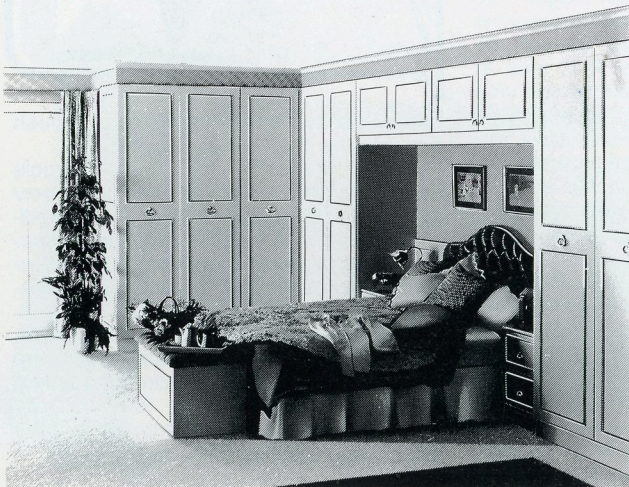

Dear Sir,



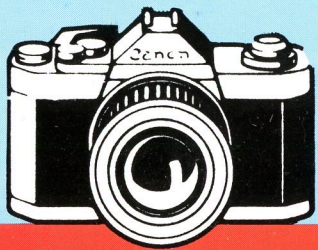
I have for some seasons now endeavoured to make contact with supporters of other clubs with the idea of meeting them at matches and enjoying their company and friendship.

Emeka Nwajobi was the Town's hero last Tuesday night when his close-range goal on the hour brought us our second home league victory of the season and sent Ipswich home pointless.

Nwajobi's goal was scant reward however for a persistent team performance which, though some way below our fluent and inventive best, was more than good enough to beat a team prepared to defend in depth and hope for a goal on the break.

And the goal was certainly worth the long wait—Mitchell Thomas taking a pass from Peter Nicholas, foraging forward and then releasing Brian Stein with a penetrative ball down the left. Stein turned and ran into space to deliver a quick low cross that was swept home by Nwajobi from six yards.

With a little more luck, further goals would have followed, but efforts from Mick Harford, in a very hungry mood on his last appearance before starting a two-match suspension, and Steve Foster were pushed round by the 'keeper and cleared off the line.

Brian Stein, who was in superb form, was also unlucky not to put his name on the scoresheet with one scorching turn and shot that forced a great save from Paul Cooper in the second half.

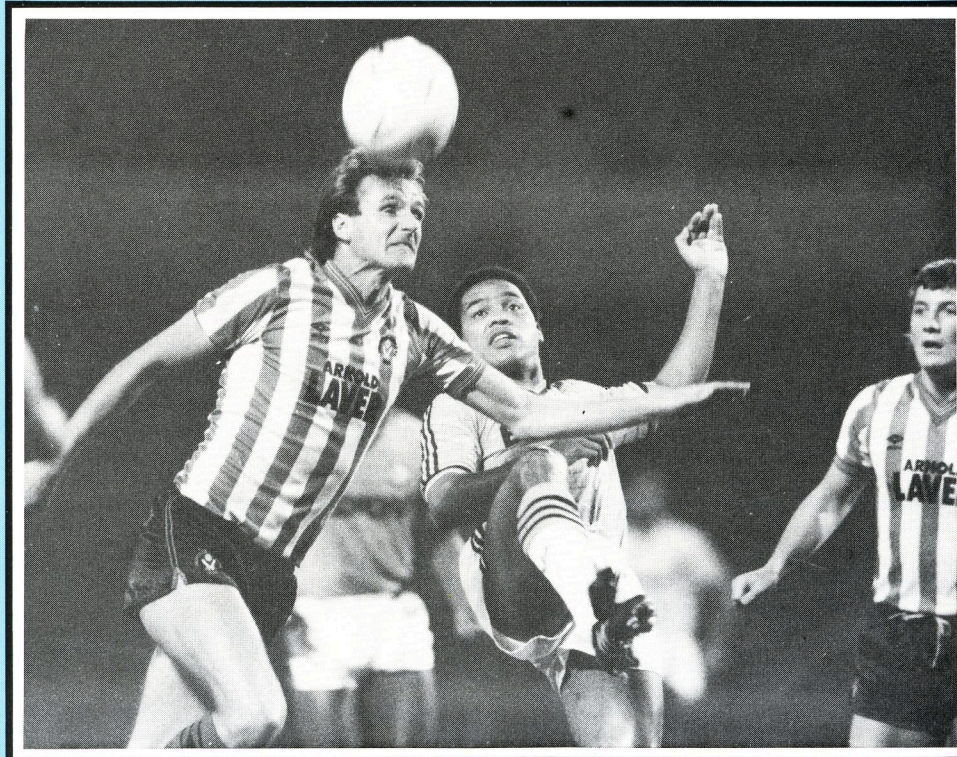


ACTION REPLAY from Bramall Lane

DICK WASSELL

Views

from the bench

Dick Wassell joined the ground staff at Kenilworth Road in August 1969 when the team was on its way up the league and playing some bright football in the Third Division. He became assistant groundsman in 1973 and took over as head groundsman in 1975. Following the installation of our synthetic pitch, Dick was appointed as Recreation Supervisor and today he gives his views on how much the game has changed in recent years both on and off the pitch.

"In my opinion I believe the new pitch is part of the progress that is essential in the game and unless you have been on it and worked with it as I have, I'm sure you won't be able to fully appreciate the benefits.

Apprehensive

Obviously I was apprehensive when the club first announced their interest in investing in the new En-Tout-Cas Sporturf Professional Pitch. I was concerned about my position with the Club having worked here for 17 years I feel a part of the place and really love the football environment. My immediate thoughts were, was it going to be a case of sack the Groundsman and my assistant Robert Scott, and of course being recently married I was concerned for my wife Linda as well. We have just taken on a new home so naturally I was very worried.

I am pleased to say things have worked out really well to date. I have taken on new responsibilities which have added an extra dimension to my job and in fact have made it even more interesting and worthwhile. For instance only

this week Robert and I were privileged to meet and liaise with Bernard Cotton, the Great Britain Hockey Manager, the following day we had showjumping internationals John Whittaker and Suzie Gill, plus of course their horses, and today (Friday) I'll be liaising with Ron Atkinson and the United staff as they train for their match.

Idiosyncracies

But of course to me the old pitch with its mud, its grass, its bumps and all the other idiosyncracies was a personal and special thing. It was my life! I knew it so well of course. I could always find the best points to work on and so on and I always knew where the wet would be. I knew where it would cause problems—and so did the players, of course, who sometimes gave me stick!

On a technical note there is much for me to learn and digest. For instance I will be using our new Hako machine to spread ICI urea prills to combat the frost. These prills are a form of anti-freeze. Then there is the adaption to marking for other sports such as Hockey and American Football. We are holding private trials with local clubs and marking their pitches in yellow, similar to the local authority sports complexes. I am equipped with the Halo Snow Blower and I feel I'm ready for the Space Age.

Realistically I would compare myself with the Office Manager who first encountered computers. You need to adapt, be prepared to learn and use modern research and equipment to your advantage. After all, when I watch the game, even I forget the pitch is artificial!"

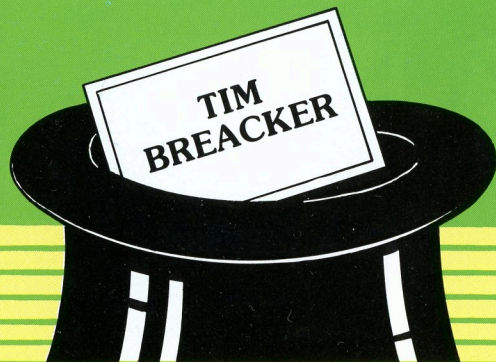

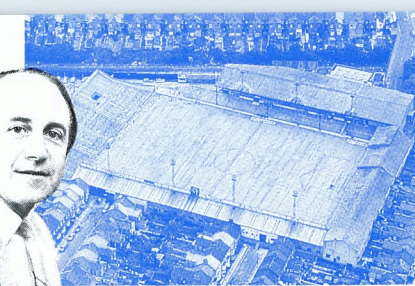

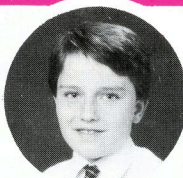

Phil Thompson—Now 31, Phil remains a classy central defender well respected for all his years of top-flight experience.

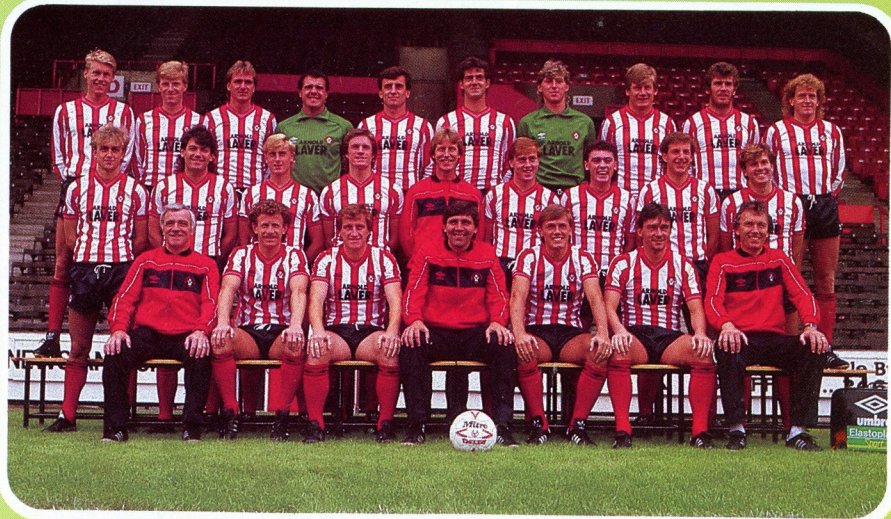

Club Comment

The perfect pitch

WHEN the Club were considering re-locating to an indoor stadium this, of necessity, meant playing on an artificial surface. Our concern was that the majority of synthetic surfaces had not been designed for football. They were just multi-use surfaces and could be used for an abundance of activities.

We felt it was essential that the next surface installed in the league was a good football surface. How could we ensure that this was so? No criteria existed on what made a good grass surface. We quickly came to the conclusion that this was needed so we asked Sir Walter Winterbottom, CBE, to form a group for this purpose. He felt this was best achieved through the Sports Council. This resulted in an advisory group being formed and they published their report in May 1985.

The report tested ball bounce, rolling resistance, traction, sliding and impact, as well as other additional tests.

Meanwhile En-Tout-Cas were doing their own scientific work on the same subject. After all they have had 70 years in the business and have installed many synthetic grass pitches both here and abroad.

We decided to instruct En-Tout-Cas and the evidence of all that is there to be seen today and, to-date, it has been well received.

The specification of the installation is: 1. Graded stone and bitumen macadam above a piped drainage system; 2. Synthetic rubber skock pad bound by polyurethane; 3. A specially-designed carpet infilled with spherical silica sand. The fibres are polypropylene woven on a backing of the same material with a porous secondary backing.

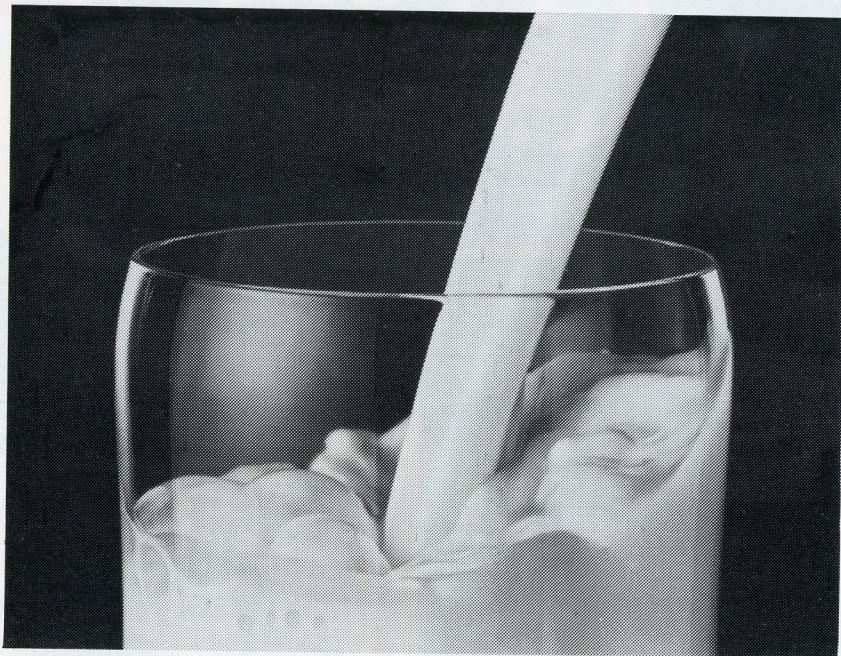

And such was the power and the determination of United's challenge that even the redoubtable Peter Nicholas twice hit the deck clutching a leg in agony.

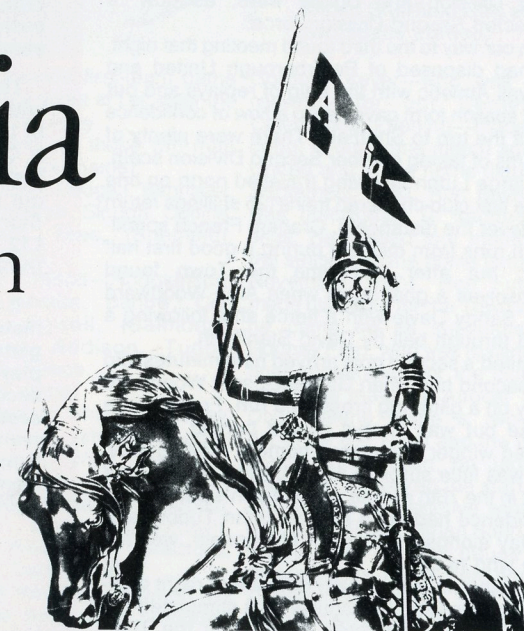
Luton might well have given themselves protection when a sweet sideways move left David Preece in the clear midway through the first half. But his angled shot bounced back off the foot of a post."

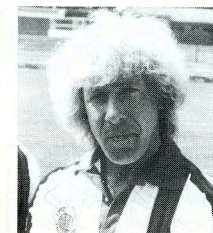

Our second meeting came in October 1974 when both clubs were in the First Division. Again it was in the third round and again at Bramall Lane. We were then enduring a dreadful patch of form on our return to the top flight and had managed only two wins to that date all season. One of those had come against Bristol Rovers in the previous round of the League Cup.

Our dismal form continued at Sheffield where we were beaten 2-0, with Keith Eddy and David Bradford scoring for United. The only bright spot was a very promising performance from a young left-back called Steve Buckley playing

only his second first-team game following his debut at Leicester the previous Saturday.

League meetings between the two clubs have also produced some memories. In February 1938

Gordon Dreyer—who was here recently for our Centenary Celebration Evening—made his debut in our home match against United and in the home fixture in September 1960, Ron Baynham was unfortunate to fracture his skull. He missed four months of the season. In the home fixture in November, 1974, Ron Futch made his debut for the Town when he came on as substitute for Rodney Fern, who was making his final appearance for the club. In the home match in August 1976 Dixie Deans made a two-goal debut for the Town and the away match that season, on January 22nd, 1977, marked the start of a run of nine consecutive wins for our team. Finally, Brian Stein probably has good cause to remember the match here against United in December 1977 as he scored two goals in a rousing win—his first goals for the club.

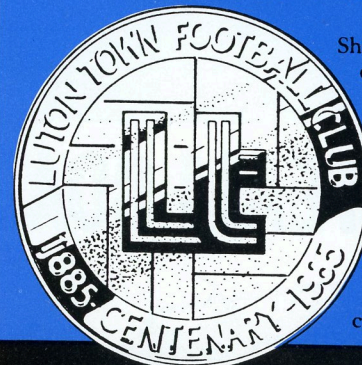
