



Last week I was delighted with our attitude, approach, and the result. We have now met Liverpool, Everton and Tottenham away and Manchester United and Arsenal at home. I can only describe the half-term report as "improving steadily". There will be no complacency.

Our young reserve and youth team players must force the issue and impose their abilities on the coaching staff. Although John Moore and John Faulkner are doing excellent work with the junior sides and achieving good results, we eagerly seek the young player of



skill breaking through who shows us the character and confidence to make the grade. The opportunities are there.

In meeting Coventry today, I particularly welcome Wayne Turner an honest, skilful professional. Never under-rated by myself during his efforts for Luton. In transferring Wayne, at a tribunal for £75,000, we lost a valued player—possibly similar to us taking a player of Terry Gibson's ability from Coventry for about £100,000. Freedom of contract has added much excitement to football but to managers it has increased the headaches!

Next week, Watford; hope you will be with us.

OUR Chairman's wife Janice Evans chose Steve Foster as her subject when she agreed to be a guest contributor to Girl Talk and today she reveals an interesting view on the Town captain's lifestyle and feelings. . . .

Steve Foster has wanted to be a footballer since he first kicked a ball. He missed lessons and got into trouble at school to play football but finally achieved his ambition when he became an apprentice at Portsmouth where he learned to toughen up in a professional world. "It was hard for me," said Steve, "because it was not all natural. But when I was about 16 or 17 I found a lot of the more skilful boys didn't make it and I did. I was crazy about football and my family gave me a lot of support."

At Portsmouth, Steve had to clean the star players' boots and well remembers one first-teamer who made him kneel down to check if they were clean by looking for his reflection in their polished leather! "It did me the world of good," said Steve, "because it helped me become a man. It's a tough game." A keen all-round sportsman at school, Steve hated cricket—"I wanted to bowl every ball and then bat all the time"—and concentrated on football. But he was good enough to be picked for Hampshire Schools in the summer.

Steve's sartorial elegance is due to his careful selection of clothes—all from a friend's shop in Brighton. "Kipper ties on their way back," he said. "They are! When I first wore turn-ups the lads all laughed—but not now. It's the same with my boxer underpants."

His wife Jo never comes to see him play because of the abusive chants about Steve—but Steve just shrugs them off as part and parcel of the game today.

On one topic, we fully agreed—there should be a bigger part for women to play in the future of football though Steve insisted: "Not in the team, please. Unless she is a centre-forward who can score 35 goals a season!"





First Team ACTION

Spurs 1 Luton Town 3
Superb goals by Mick Harford, Brian Stein and Ricky Hill carried us to our first victory at White Hart Lane since April 5, 1948, last Saturday. After the comfortable 2-0 defeat of Birmingham City here two weeks ago, the win in London consolidated our position in the First Division's top 10.

But while the forwards struck the goals and deservedly earned much praise for a lively performance, the honest and skilful displays of our defenders were also vital. Steve Foster, suffering from a sore throat, and Peter Nicholas, who spent much of the previous night looking after his 15-month-old son, were in particularly good form.

"Danny had the measles and was up for an hour and a half," said Peter afterwards. "We had to call the doctor at three o'clock in the morning. But we had a great win didn't we?".

Harford put the Town in front after 20 minutes when Emeka Nwajiobi flicked on a pass from Brian Stein. Stein added the second in the 63rd minute when he took a long ball from Sealey and fired in a glorious 20-yard left-foot shot on the run. The third came in the final minute, Hill drilling a shot beyond Clemence.

ViEWS from the bench

Club physiotherapist John Sheridan has nursed many players from serious injury back to full fitness since joining the staff at Kenilworth Road in 1978. In such circumstances, he always pays great attention to the injured player's diet—a subject he dwells on today when he gives his views on the right sort of food for footballers and anyone else with an interest in a fit and healthy life.

"My message to players and everyone else is always to aim for a balanced diet and to avoid eating too much junk food. Avoid it altogether is even better! Fresh, healthy food is much better for everyone, including the active and the inactive. It has more of the essential vitamins we all need and it contains less fat. I always advise against fried food.

"We do, however, advise the players to eat more carbohydrates towards the end of the week before a match because they provide energy and will be burnt off during the game. Even so, I always say that chips, hamburgers and so on should be left out. Quality is the thing to aim for. Not greasy stuff and not junk.

Pre-match meal

"On Saturdays, diet is very important. We try to control the players' diets here on a Saturday as much as possible. As you know, we nearly always meet for a pre-match meal which should be consumed at least three hours before the game. Generally, it is a very light meal, fish, for example, or a light egg dish. There is usually tea and toast, some tinned fruit, some cornflakes, honey and jam on

the table. It is all the players need at that time.


"I know some players in weekend teams, Sunday leagues and so on probably don't have the time to worry too much about their diet during the week, but really they should. It can be very effective in terms of training, fitness and performance. We try hard to emphasise this. It is no good running out on to the pitch with a big meal in your stomach or a cigarette hanging out of your mouth is it?

"Some of our players feel hungrier or have bigger appetites than the others. But on match-days I never let them eat more than a light meal. It is no good. Others prefer to starve themselves when they have a match. I believe Sir Stanley Matthews actually used to fast for 24 hours or something before a match.

Attention to diet

"When our new apprentices or even the older players arrive at the club, I always try to make sure enough attention is paid to diet. The youngsters need plenty of protein for example, because they are still growing. They need lots of reminders to stay off the junk and fried foods of course.

"We also make sure everyone has a correct intake of vitamins. Especially vitamin C which is very helpful in players' recovery from injuries. The players take multi-vitamins to make sure they take all they need. I also think glucose drinks are useful particularly if they are taken all week and not just on Saturdays. And finally, I advise people always to eat some breakfast. A light meal in the morning every day of the week is essential."

TOP HATTER





A tall and agile goalkeeper with a tremendous ability to recover from one shot for another, Les spent nine years at Highfield Road before coming to Kenilworth Road where he has fought to establish himself as first choice goalkeeper in stiff competition with Andy Dibble. Now 28, he remains a keen trainer and great enthusiast for the game.

Les Sealey's escape from the pressures of the First Division is to go away on his own fishing pike all night long at his favourite angling reservoirs in the greater London area. It is a chance for total solitude and peace for our goalkeeper, an individualistic sportsman whose other chief interests are his family, most other sports and the renovation of classic cars. Unfortunately, in recent years, Les has dropped his car-rebuilding hobby and found less and less time for his fishing. But it still remains a great pleasure for him, particularly during the close season.

"I've always been interested in fishing," said Les. "Since I was about nine or ten, I suppose. It is very relaxing and a great way to get away from it all. I do a lot of pike fishing with live bait, especially in the summer when I can go out all night on my own. I used to catch them for myself to eat, but now I throw them back in. I prefer to go out on my own, but when I was with Coventry I used to go with John Beck, who was there at the time. He would enjoy it for the same reasons I do.

"Apart from my fishing I like to be at home with my family. I go straight home from training. I'm not one for the snooker and so on. I like a quiet life—but you don't get too much of that in a football dressing room. It's all jokes all the time. We've got a great team spirit here with a great bunch of lads and we can really go places this season."


On a more serious note, I extend a particularly warm welcome to today's match sponsors the Rotary Club of North Luton. Luton handicap-

COVENTRY City arrive here this afternoon seeking their first win in five games and their first goal in the First Division since a 1-0 victory at Birmingham on October 26th. The goal that day was scored by the prolific Terry Gibson, his tenth of the season, but since then the Sky Blues have been knocked out of the Milk Cup by Midlands rivals West Bromwich Albion and been beaten by Manchester United and Liverpool in the league.





THE LUTON TOWN STORY



All Our

THIS afternoon we welcome another of our "bogey" teams to Kenilworth Road. With only one win in 23 visits to Highfield Road and our victory here last Christmas representing our first success over Coventry City in 32 years, it is clear we have some catching up to do, particularly on our away trips to the Midlands.

Our first home meeting with Coventry was in April 1927 when a crowd of 6,900 witnessed a 4-1 victory which avenged a defeat of identical proportions earlier in the season. Such a crowd was attracted by the prospects of what was then regarded as a derby fixture in our pre-war Division Three South days. Results reflected the close rivalry between the clubs with the goals and points being more or less shared before the war.

One prolific marksman for the Hatters in this period was Andy Rennie who was frequently on the mark against the "Bantams" as Coventry were then known. He scored both goals in the two 1-1 draws of 1928-29 on his way to a record 43 goals in a season and then added two more at Highfield Road in our solitary win at Highfield Road in 1930-31.

The matches which stand in the memory, however, are the two titanic struggles of 1935-36 when Joe Payne was on the rampage and we were chasing promotion to the Second Division. Joe Payne had scored his record 10 goals against Bristol Rovers on Easter Monday and followed it up with both goals in our 2-0 win at Newport the following Saturday. After seeming to be out of the promotion race, we found ourselves back in contention, level on points with the leaders Coventry City who we were due to meet twice on our last three games.

The combined effect of Joe Payne's curiosity and promotion talk drew a then-record crowd of 23,142 to Kenilworth Road. Payne obliged, but the Town could not clinch victory and the huge attendance had to settle for a 1-1 draw. The return match at Highfield Road the following

TODAY'S meeting with Coventry City will be our 47th in the Football League and extends our long association with a club with which we have shared some exciting times, as spotlighted in this episode of our regular All Our Yesterdays feature. Supporters of both clubs will no doubt recall the great battles of the past particularly in the heyday of Joe Payne when we were promotion rivals in the Third Division South. They were famous footballing occasions and are fully recorded and described in our club history, The Luton Story 1885-1985, a book which would make the perfect Christmas gift.

Yesterdays

Monday attracted an even-bigger number of fans with a then record for the Third Division of 42,975 pouring in through the turnstiles to see the Town become only the second side that season to return from Coventry with any reward. The teams drew 0-0. It was not enough for Luton. Coventry won their final match. The Town drew and had to wait a further 12 months to clinch promotion by way of the Third Division South Championship.

Once our meetings resumed, it was never quite the same. Compared to the past, the Second Division matches were tame affairs. Indeed, in our final Second Division meeting in 1951-52, shortly

before Coventry's relegation, our programme stated "great and glorious battles have we had in the old Third Division days, but somehow that same keenness has been missing since we were both promoted."

The later period threw up some interesting footballing landmarks however—Dave Sexton scored his one and only goal for Luton in 1951-52, Gordon Turner made his debut for the Town in the game at Coventry in 1950-51 and Billy Hughes our then-record signing and "the finest full-back in the land" made his first appearance at Highfield Road in 1947-48. Sexton of course later became the Coventry City manager.
