When you are 2-0 down in a Cup-tie, you have to be happy to get another chance, but things are far from over and done with just because we now have home advantage for tonight's replay with Luton Town.

Arsenal did exactly the same in the last round — and they are out of the Cup. Luton are a good side and we had to work hard for what we achieved on Saturday. We adapted quite well to the artificial surface and I was very pleased by the performance. If we had gone out, I would still have thought we had done as much as we could.

There were some good individual contributions and the team work was excellent. Alan Harper did well alongside Pat Van den Hauwe as deputy for Kevin Ratcliffe who has damaged ankle ligaments, although we don't think the problem is too serious.

Obviously, we are pleased to be still involved in the Cup after two difficult away matches last week. At Tottenham, we had to do a fair amount of defending, but we always looked dangerous on the break, and certainly, we seemed unfortunate not to get a penalty when Paul Bracewell went round Ray Clemence.

Spurs were in a determined mood and it was a very competitive game. They left out John Chiedozie and brought in a more defensive player in the middle. This meant there were a lot of bodies in midfield and there was very little time to create anything.

But Trevor Steven had an excellent match. The quality of his crosses from the right was brilliant. He got a lot of pace on them, bending the ball away from the keeper and into our front players.

When we went two up, it might have been all over, but Mark Falco got one back with a great header — and it does take something special to beat Neville Southall at the moment. The back four did a tremendous job, considering that after Kevin Ratcliffe's injury, no-one was in the position they occupied in last season's team. *Although the weather caused a hold-up in the Cup, the undersoil heating at Anfield and Goodison enabled us to win two more League games and open up a six-point gap at the top.*

To be honest, the match with Aston Villa wasn't the best of games. The swirling wind made it difficult for the players and the sun probably added to the problems. The game seemed a little dead, although we had chances in the first-half from mistakes made by their defenders.

Villa troubled us on only two occasions, and one of those was near the end, but the longer it went on, the more you feared it could stay at 0-0. We kept plugging away and in the end, we fully deserved our victory, even if several players were disappointed by their performances. Certainly, there was not a lot of flowing football, but you will always get that these days, and the main thing is to win when you are not at your best.

The good news off the field was that Kevin Sheedy and then Graeme Sharp signed new four-year contracts. Naturally, we want to keep the squad together, and we were very pleased to come to an agreement with Kevin and Graeme.

We decided to announce Graeme's contract over the tannoy before the kick-off against Villa. Normally, the fans tend to hear things secondhand, through the newspapers, TV or radio, and I thought it was a good idea that they should be the first to be given the news on this occasion. They responded well and Graeme was given a tremendous reception.

After the Villa match, we left the heating on so that Paul Bracewell and Kevin Sheedy could come in on Sunday to assess their recovery from injury. Paul proved he was ready to travel to Tottenham and Kevin played in a Reserve game only 15 days after a cartilage operation. That must surely be something of a record, although Luton's Mick Harford got back in slightly less than three weeks after similar surgery in January.



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
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


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Comment

The second coldest February this century brought football close to a standstill in parts of the Midlands and the South-East. Arsenal, Villa, Ipswich, Leicester, Watford and West Ham were laid up for a full month in the League.

The repercussions will be considerable. *Certainly* in terms of fitting in the outstanding fixtures in a World Cup year. *Possibly* in terms of persuading clubs to review their options for pitch protection.

The immediate problems are obvious. Starting from 8th March, the scheduled day for FA Cup quarter-finals, the season had only nine Saturdays to run. Counting eight mid-week dates, this gave 17 playing days in the normal construction of two games a week.

However, two of the mid-week periods are due to be kept clear for England's World Cup warm-up games against the Soviet Union and Scotland. Add the inevitable postponements for FA Cup ties and the Milk Cup Final, and you reach only one conclusion — some clubs may have to play three times in a week.

West Ham, for example, have reached the 'quart into a pint pot' situation. Their fourth consecutive blank Saturday in the League, on 1st March, left them five games behind Everton . . . WITH NO MORE THAN 15 SCHEDULED DATES AVAILABLE FOR THEIR LAST 16 MATCHES. *No doubt the situation will resolve itself. Somehow the games will be played in the time permitted. What we would hope, though, is that the unusually long period of bad weather will lead to more clubs installing undersoil heating.*

Our system at Goodison Park has been in operation for five years, during which time only one game has been lost — and that because of a late snowfall. The original £70,000 investment has more than paid for itself, firstly, in maintaining cash flow, and secondly, in keeping fixture congestion to a minimum in seasons when the team has pursued the League Championship.

We also believe that our spectators benefit. They KNOW that the games here will be played, and our experience surely quells the frequent argument that supporters do not want to turn out in cold weather.

On 28th December, when three First Division games were postponed because of snow and ice, we had the highest attendance of the day — 41,536 against Sheffield Wednesday. On 11th February, when we slotted in the Manchester City game at a time when most other grounds were frozen solid, we had a gate off 30,006.

As always, in a year of severe temperatures, there has been much debate on how to tackle a freeze-up. We have heard all the old chestnuts — a mid-winter break, summer football etc — and, not without good reason, some support for artificial pitches.

Queens Park Rangers and Luton Town were able to play throughout the cold snap, although their motive for 'going plastic' was the wider one of maximising the use of their ground for other sports and entertainments. It is hardly a secret that many First Division clubs have reservations about playing on an artificial surface. Had the choice been left *only* to the other 20 clubs in the top Division, it's possible that Queens Park Rangers and Luton would not have gained the necessary permission.

But, unlike other major decisions in the Football League — which are decided largely by the votes of the 44 full member clubs — the issue of artificial pitches was put to the vote by all 92 clubs.

However, that is another question. What we will say in conclusion is that Everton Football Club believes 100 per cent in undersoil heating as the most satisfactory method of beating the frost.

This is the projected newsletter to keep supporters informed during the close season. As we said from the start, we WILL produce one if the demand is sufficient, but, frankly, the scheme has NOT yet attracted enough support to remotely justify the cost.

We have received only TEN requests, which would seem to be a lukewarm response, to say the least. If the idea is to become workable, it would need the backing of a lot more fans.

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However, you still have time to convince us of the need for a newsletter, and we will wait until April before making a final decision. Now . . . on to some of your letters.

• **GRAINGER ROCK**, of Brindle, Chorley, is a season ticket holder but finds it difficult to get to the ground to buy tickets for Cup replays. He suggests: 'If I could place a stamped addressed envelope, with the usual proof, on a Sunday, it would then be possible to get to a replay.'

In fact, the offices are almost always open on Sunday if a Saturday game is to be replayed on, say the following Tuesday. Even if we were in possession of the SAE on Sunday, you could be disappointed by any delay in the post.

Mr Rock, incidentally, is now a true Everton 'convert' after following other clubs. He says: 'I am to supporters what the much-travelled Bobby Gould was to playing staff.'

And he explains: 'I first saw Everton at Roker Park in 1939, and

as a young Sunderland person, remember being thrilled by Everton's score of 2-1. Everton became my favourite team, and in 1949, when the RAF thoughtfully placed me at West Kirby, I was able to come to Goodison. Since then, I have supported Newcastle, Bristol City and Arsenal, who won the double when I switched to them. Finally, I made it back to Goodison two years ago — and brought the League title! My childhood dreams are fulfilled — I am now at Goodison with no intention of moving on.'

• **KARL MASTERS**, of Whitstable, Kent, has a firm recommendation for all Evertonians living in the south — join ESCLA!

He points out that the newsletter issued by our London Supporters Club contains all the information he would expect to find in a club newspaper and also notes that ESCLA produced a half-hour video, showing all the goals, from every home game and a lot of away matches as well.

Mr Masters echoes a previous gripe that he had to buy Everton's replica kit from a private company. He says: 'Everton should advertise the Toffee Shop in Shoot! and

Match Weekly. The cost of advertising would easily be covered by increased sales.'

EDITOR: We do have a series of advertisements running in both Match Weekly and Football Monthly but not Shoot!

• **JOHN COX**, of Edgbaston, Birmingham, welcomed our earlier feature on long-distance followers but responds: 'I was obviously wrong in expecting an improvement in communication of information to this breed of Evertonian.'

His complaint is that ticket arrangements for the derby match at Anfield were not given on the telephone information service. 'One of the main reasons I hold a season ticket is to ensure I can attend matches like this,' he added. Well, Mr Cox, the first thing to say is that in previous years we have NOT had any allocation of tickets for League games at Anfield. This year, however, we did receive a very small supply.

The selling arrangements were announced in the programme versus Manchester City on 11th February and were on the information line at that time. As virtually all the tickets were sold on Thursday 13th February, the information was then withdrawn from the telephone service.

• **NOW** to a supporter who signs himself 'News-hungry Blue'. He left Liverpool six years ago to go to University and now works in the Midlands.

He'd like to subscribe to a newsletter but also has an idea to extend regular information to out-of-town fans . . .

'Why not extend the 24-hour recorded message line to carry news as well as ticket details? Sheffield United operate such a system, called Bladesline. This carries transfer news, injury news, team selection and even reports and scorers for mid-week matches. As a club, I think you sometimes underestimate the anxieties of your supporters and how easy it would be to allay such worries by feeding us small nuggets of information.'

EDITOR: After recent correspondence, there is no way we can fail to recognise our fans' thirst for news!

This supporters' idea is certainly interesting, although the existing phone is already too busy with ticket information for us to add general news. Therefore, it would require a new line. We will give the matter full consideration.



HOW MERSEYSIDE STOOD SIDE BY SIDE

By now, most of you will have seen the unique photograph (above) which brought together the two Merseyside teams. You will also know that its publication in the Press and the match programmes at Goodison and Anfield launched a project aimed at improving the image of football on Merseyside.

What you won't know is why, where and how the picture was taken. THE IDEA stemmed from the formation of Merseyside Unites, which, in itself, was a joint initiative between Everton, Liverpool and Tranmere Rovers in an attempt to create a safe and happy atmosphere for soccer-lovers in this area.

THE BACKING was provided by the Prudential Assurance Company. It will be distributed in poster form to schools throughout Merseyside and will also be available, on application, from local Prudential offices or Prudential representatives.

THE VENUE for the now-famous photo-call was Everton's training ground on a rather chilly morning in February. The Liverpool players drove up from Anfield and popped in for a few minutes before moving round the corner for their normal training session at Melwood.

THE CAMERAMAN was Everton's official photographer, Terry Mealey. No doubt the colour picture will take a special place in his personal album — together with the black-and-white shot (below) which shows him recording the day when the two Merseyside teams stood side by side.

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Behind The Scenes



Nigel Coates, who was appointed Lotteries Manager in February, took a roundabout route to his new job in football. He graduated from Brunel University (London) with an Honours Degree in Engineering and then opted for a banking career with NatWest. He worked in their branches at Chester, Frodsham and Warrington before moving to their Marketing Department in London. But he didn't particularly enjoy living in the capital and was looking to move closer to his home in Chester when the opportunity to join Everton cropped up. 'I saw the job advertised and it appealed to me straightaway,' he says. 'Having worked in marketing for a financial organisation, I now have the chance to put my ideas into practice on the other side of the fence. It's no good rushing in with two big feet, but there will be changes. The present structure is not what it should be, and at the moment, we are discussing plans to offer new incentives to Agents.'

Nigel's appointment is part of a drive to re-build the Lottery after a tapering-down period which has affected most sports clubs' fund-raising. As Promotions Manager Ralph Williams says: 'The prize money offered has not really changed for six or seven years and has been overtaken to an extent by newspapers bingo competitions.'

'Things have dropped off generally, but Nigel is starting with new ideas. We'll be getting a canvassing team on the road, with the object of getting back the support that has been lost in recent years.'

Although the job itself was an obvious attraction for Nigel, there was a spin-off in his arrival at Goodison Park. He has been an avid Evertonian since he was 10-years-old, and even when he was working in London, he took every opportunity to watch the Blues in matches in the south. 'It's nice to be able to see them at Goodison again,' he says. 'As I've joked with the staff, the object is for us all to work hard enough to make the time for me to watch the matches!'

For those fans who couldn't get a ticket for Anfield, the match at Goodison was an enjoyable diversion. 'The pitch was good and there was some good football by both sides,' said Alan.

'Overall, we probably had the better chances and were a bit unlucky not to win when Adrian Heath lobbed the ball over Gary Bailey, only for it to come back off a post.'

'When we manage to get a few goals, we'll be on our way. We're starting to knock our passes around, and as always, this has to go hand in hand with hard work.' The versatile Darrin Coyle switched to centre-back with good effect, Bobby Mimms did all that was required of him, and there was a steady midfield performance by Jason Danskin.

training for schoolboys and two friendly games before what was largely an Under-16 side faced South Liverpool in the Lancashire League.



From: Ian Hughes, Bromborough . . . I am writing to express my disgust at the timing of the postponement of the Spurs v Everton FA Cup tie. Having left the home at 7.30 am, to be on the coach for 8.30 am, we were already on the M6 when we learned the match was off.

Surely, the same decision could have been made at, say 7.30, as was made at 9.30? Everton should have put pressure on Tottenham Hotspur FC for an early pitch inspection.

Also, as an incentive for top clubs to install effective pitch protection, such as at Goodison and Anfield, the FA should rule that when an 'away' team could stage the fixture, the 'home' team lose home advantage and the match be played at the 'away' ground. Within a couple of years, most First and Second Division clubs should have installed such protection.

Then, a situation such as today's (16th February) shambles would only occur where travelling distances are great (e.g. the postponed Middlesbrough v Southampton tie in January) or when there is a heavy snowfall at the last minute.

EDITOR: We did everything possible on that Sunday morning and no-one booked on official travel organised by Everton FC departed before the news of the postponement.

Train and coaches were due to leave at 9 am, but when Tottenham informed us the inspection would be at 9.25 am, the departure was put back to 9.30 am. As soon as the match was off, we telephoned Press Agencies and Radio stations, but it seems this information was too late for many people, like Mr Hughes travelling with independent operators.

Mr Hughes' other point about switching venues obviously has its attractions. Sadly, though, it would be impossible to make the arrangements at a few hours' notice.



Team Talk

Peter Reid ended his 21-week exile from First Division affairs with a vital goal — and thanks to his teammates 'for doing all the hard work while I was away.'

The fact that his comeback coincided with Everton's climb to the top of the table for the first time this season was, in Peter's opinion, a tribute to the squad rather than to his winning goal against Spurs.

'Everyone at Goodison always said we had depth in the squad and this season we have proved it by doing well despite so many injuries,' he stated when the championship-winning midfield players were eventually re-united after five months' disruption. 'We have got to the top of the League with a squad effort,' he explained. 'Lads like Alan Harper and Kevin Richardson come into the side and do a terrific job whenever they are required. And that can't be stated often enough.'

'Adrian Heath, too. We all know he's a front man, but he's been in midfield and has got 10 goals. That's a tremendous achievement when he's not in his best position.'

'Likewise, it was an outstanding effort by the whole team to claw back 17 points on Manchester United. They have done all the hard work, and as far as I'm concerned it's just great to have come back into a side firing on all cylinders.'

'It's a wee bit different to last season, now that we have Gary Lineker up front, but there's no doubt we are the same sort of confident outfit. It's always nice to be on a good streak; football seems easy when you are on a run.'

'Speaking as a spectator — which I was for such a long time — the side is very exciting to watch. We've scored more goals than anyone and conceded a few as well. If there's a more entertaining team, I haven't seen them.'

Having had his share of serious injuries during his time with Bolton Wanderers, Peter was mentally prepared for the long slog back to fitness, but this season's problems with Achilles tendons were, in some ways, the most frustrating of his career.

He is the reigning PFA Players' Player, he is anxious to help Everton to more success and he naturally wants to be in Mexico with England.

'The timing was frustrating,' he agrees. 'But it was probably more frustrating from the club's point of view because I was injured in an international.'

'The real disappointment for me was that I got over the original injury to my right ankle but then, on my first day back at work, I did the left one and had to have a second operation. I was thinking I would be back quite soon and then I was back to square one. If there is a silver lining, it is that I should be fresh for the run-in.'

Hopefully, with a few more games, I'll be firing at my best. Different types of players probably do need more match practice than others. I'm involved in the short passing and tackling and need sharpness more than anything. 'So far, I've improved a little bit with every game. I was really shattered after the first one and I did tire in the last 10 minutes against Manchester City. But that's something you expect and it's a case of gritting your teeth.'

The title race was already simmering when Peter returned to duty and straightaway he was caught up in the self-belief that 'we will be there or thereabouts at the end of the season.' And he added: 'It's an old cliché, but the championship is not a sprint but a marathon. I felt it was significant that the crowd never seemed to think we were out of it. They kept coming along in their thousands and played an important part in helping the team over the injury problems. Now they will be just as important for the final push.'

'There are four or five teams who could win it, and I wouldn't bet against us. In saying that, our feet are firmly on the ground — we know what we have to do and we'll be battling all the way.'

Life at the top has been very sweet for Peter in the last two and a half years. He had his share of setbacks with Bolton — suffering relegation and a number of injuries — but everything came good for him after his transfer to Everton in December 1982.

'I did take time to settle,' he says. 'Like anything else in life, you need time to get used to new surroundings, but



once I got in there, things went all one way for me.'

'The greatest thing in football is winning trophies. I'm thankful to have played at Wembley so many times and to have won League and European medals. I can honestly say I would have settled for half as much, but once you're involved in success, you want more.'

'My belief is that you get what you put into this game. I've always worked hard, and fortunately for me, I got into a football side that has everything — power, skill and now the habit of winning.'

Aside from team triumphs, the greatest moment for Peter was obviously when he won the PFA individual award last March.

'That was a very proud moment,' he says. 'With no disrespect to the sports-writers, the ultimate is to be voted Number One by your fellow professionals. It was a terrific personal honour, but as Neville Southall would agree after winning the Footballer of the Year award, we couldn't have done it without being part of a very good side.'

Peter doesn't hold out any hope of retaining the trophy — 'I don't think four games is enough to qualify,' he joked — but he does have another major ambition to fulfil.

'My eyes are on Mexico,' he agrees. 'I'm not counting on anything because I only take things bit by bit, but it is the ambition of any player to appear in the World Cup finals. I'm just keeping my fingers crossed, and if selected for the warm-up games, I'm hoping to be bubbling along.'





Down The Years

5 YEARS AGO:

We were engaged in another sixth round FA Cup replay, at Manchester City. Though we held out to the interval at 0-0, two goals after the break from Bobby McDonald and another from Paul Power gave City a 3-1 win. Peter Eastoe scored our goal. We had drawn 2-2 in the first game at Goodison Park, Peter Eastoe and Trevor Ross (penalty) getting our goals.

Luton were out of the Cup but were trying to catch up in the chase for promotion from the Second Division. A goal from Brian Stein had given them a useful 1-0 victory away to second placed Notts County the previous Saturday.

Arsenal, out of the Cup, saw probably their last chance of catching the main contenders for the Championship disappear when they went down 0-1 at Leicester the previous Saturday. Tommy Williams scored Leicester's goal.

Three of the four sixth round FA Cup-ties had gone into replays, the only outright winners on the Saturday being Tottenham who beat Third Division Exeter City 2-0 at White Hart Lane.

A goal from Arnold Muhren gave Ipswich a 1-0 replay victory over Nottingham Forest at Portman Road. The teams had drawn 3-3 at Nottingham.

Wolves, who had drawn 1-1 at Middlesbrough, won their replay 3-1. Mel Eves, John Richards and Norman Bell got the goals. In a mid-week League match, Tottenham were held at home to 2-2 by Stoke City.

15 YEARS AGO:

Our opponents in the sixth round of the FA Cup were Fourth Division Colchester, who had created a sensation by knocking out the then all-conquering First Division leaders Leeds United in the previous round. But, from the moment when Howard Kendall put the Toffees in front in the 23rd minute, there was never any chance of another giant-killing act. The 53,028 fans at Goodison relaxed as Kendall scored again and further goals came from Joe Royle and Jimmy Husband before the interval. The pace slackened after the break but Alan Ball added a fifth for the Toffees in the 83rd minute.

In addition to the big crowd at Goodison, a further 54,731 packed Anfield to watch the goalless draw with Tottenham in the sixth round. Liverpool later won the replay 1-0 at White Hart Lane to qualify for a semi-final confrontation with the Toffees.

A Charlie George goal was sufficient to give Arsenal a 1-0 replay win over Leicester at Highbury after the teams had drawn 0-0 at Leicester.

Two goals from Ken Wagstaff gave Second Division Hull City an early 2-0 lead at home to First Division Stoke. Terry Conroy scored for Stoke on the stroke of half-time and two goals from John Ritchie after the break took Stoke through.

In League football, a hat-trick from Tony Brown helped West Bromwich to a 4-3 home win over Manchester United.

Blackpool lost 0-2 at Chelsea and, in another First Division game, Burnley went down 0-1 at home to Southampton.

25 YEARS AGO:

We were no longer interested in the FA Cup but, on the previous Saturday, a goal from Jimmy Gabriel had given us a 1-0 home win over Fulham.

An own-goal by former Everton player John Bramwell left Luton a goal down at home to Derby in a Second Division game. Jim Fleming scored the goal that earned the Hatters a point.

Arsenal, out of the FA Cup, drew 2-2 at Aston Villa on the Saturday. Joe Haverty and John Barnwell were their scorers. Tottenham, holding a nine-point lead in the First Division, were trying to become the first club this century to win the Cup-League double. Though Cliff Jones gave them the lead at Sunderland in their sixth round tie, Willie McPheat equalised.

A crowd of 64,797 packed White Hart Lane for the replay and thousands more were locked outside, as Spurs really went to town. Les Allen, Bobby Smith, Terry Dyson (2) and Dave Mackay all scored as Tottenham won 5-0.

Only one of the four sixth round ties was resolved at the first attempt, a hat-trick from Bill Russell giving Sheffield United a 3-1 win at Newcastle.

After drawing 0-0 at Hillsborough, Burnley beat Sheffield Wednesday 2-0 in their replay, seen by 48,000 at Turf Moor.

Third Division Barnsley were highly optimistic after holding First Division Leicester to 0-0 at Filbert Street. Their replay drew 39,250 to Oakwell but it was Leicester who came out on top 2-1. Wimbledon, the club currently chasing promotion to the First Division, were in the Isthmian League but they also had Wembley in sight. The Dons drew 2-2 away to Whitley Bay in a third round replay in the FA Amateur Cup.

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





his tally to 30 this season.



NEIL'S NEW LANDMARK

Neil Pointon reached another landmark in his fast-climbing career when he made his first appearance in the Merseyside derby.

'And it lived up to all my expectations,' said the 21-year-old left-back who surpassed his wildest dreams by playing in a dozen League games in his first three months after leaving



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the Fourth Division with Scunthorpe United. 'The atmosphere at Anfield was tremendous,' he added. 'I was almost frightened to look at the crowd, but I had a good look as I was coming off at the end. I regard it as a privilege to have played on one of the best-known grounds in the world.'

'The pace of the game was very quick and I thought it passed me by at times. I was trying to do the right things, but there wasn't always the time to get the ball down. Still, it was good experience and I enjoyed every minute.'

When Neil joined the club, we were 12 points behind Manchester United and he didn't expect to be in the first team. Yet now he has been in a side leading the League for more than a month.

'Only the other day, I was looking in the paper at the table showing current form, and to be part of a run like we've had is tremendous,' he says.

'But all I'm hoping is that I'm showing signs I can be a good player for the future. At first, I didn't find the First Division too different, but I'm finding it different now. The players I'm up against are top-quality, and I've got to step up my game to deal with them.'

NOT-SO-NEUTRAL!

Derek Mountfield did not claim to be a neutral when he joined the BBC Radio Two team broadcasting the second-half from the derby match at Anfield.

'Neutral? You must be joking!' said Derek. 'I was the most excited person on the commentary stand when Kevin Ratcliffe scored the first goal.'

'Peter Jones was commentating at the time and I was a couple of seats away from him. When Kevin got the ball, I was shouting, "Rats — don't shoot!" But he did and when the ball went in, I was up out of my seat like any supporter!'


'It was the first time I had done any broadcasting on national radio, and I enjoyed the day. It was nice to be asked and

even nicer to do so because we won.' Derek came back from three weeks at a rehabilitation centre in Farnham in good spirits and confident that his knee is ready to stand the test of a comeback game, around six months since his cartilage operation.

'I think it was nearly right before I went to Farnham,' he says. 'Going there was the last stage. The knee gave me no trouble at all, and the only problem was that I got a thigh strain in my other leg when I came back here.'

'It was hard work down there — seven sessions a day. But everything was different and better for me than doing the same things every day at Bellefield.'

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LUTON TOWN

Tonight's re-run of last season's Everton-Luton Town FA Cup semi-final takes place in very different circumstances for David Pleat's talented side from Kenilworth Road.

When the teams met at Villa Park last April, Luton were in 20th place and heavily involved in relegation matters, but this year, The Hatters went into the quarter-finals holding sixth position in the First Division.

Their development is a credit to Mr Pleat's skill as a transfer wheeler-dealer — not forgetting that Luton also have an excellent Youth policy — and his passion for playing the game in the right spirit.

After eight years' building up the club from the lower reaches of the Second Division, the 41-year-old East Midlander is now the fourth longest-serving manager in Division One. Only John Lyall, Brian Clough and Graham Taylor

have been in their present jobs for a longer period of time.

Mr Pleat is perfectly cut out for Luton's requirements, both as a businessman and a football purist. A good example of his ability to make money for the club came when he bought Paul Walsh and Paul Elliott for around £545,000. He has since doubled his money by selling the former Charlton pair.

The present side cost in the region of £800,000, most of which was spent on four players who were brought in to lift Luton to safety last season. Steve Foster, Peter Nicholas and Mick Harford

introduced inspirational qualities through the middle of the team, while David Preece moved in from the Third Division and immediately became an important figure in the play-making area.

Nicholas and Preece were ineligible for the FA Cup exploits, but the big men — Foster at centre-half and Harford at centre-forward — were figureheads on a trail that ended one stop short of Wembley.

If one of the newcomers could be picked out as a special influence on Luton's impressive progress, then many people would nominate Harford. The 27-year-old striker is now on the fringe of the England squad and has a considerable fan club, supporting his claim to be on the plane to Mexico in May. The change in Luton's fortunes since they bought him from Birmingham City for £250,000 some 15 months ago must be linked in part with Harford's goal-scoring.

When he made his debut in December 1984, The Hatters were 20th in the League with 17 points from 18 games. They finished last season with 51 points and already this term, they have 51 from 31 matches.

Significantly, Harford scored 16 goals in 22 League games last season and has reached 16 in 28 League outings in the current campaign. It's a record which puts him alongside the best, and with Brian chipping in with 14 League goals so far this season, Luton have one of the most successful partnerships in the country. Mr Pleat sees Harford as 'another option' in a side that has always been noted for its footballing

ideals. 'If we get stuck, we can just knock the ball in the box, knowing that somebody might get on the end of it,' says manager.

'We've always had to work for every chance before.'

Luton have again been busy in the transfer market since they were last at Goodison Park in the League in September.

Former Everton favourite Andy King returned in December to the club where he began his career. Luton paid a five-figure fee to sign him from Wolves, for whom he scored 10 goals in 20 League games in the early part of this season.

Paul Elliott, who lost the centre-half position to Foster while recovering from a broken leg, moved to Aston Villa for £400,000 soon after King's arrival. Mr Pleat then invested £85,000 in Wigan's top scorer, Mike Newell, to provide valuable cover when the regular strikers hit injury troubles.

Nigerian international Emeka Nwajiobi was out for more than three months because of a broken bone in his foot. Harford was also missing in January but made a remarkable recovery from a cartilage operation, returning to the side in less than three weeks. Almost as soon as Harford came back, Stein went into hospital for a similar operation. As Newell was Cup-tied, this meant an extended run for teenager Mark North, until Luton recalled Stein's younger brother, Mark from a loan spell

with Aldershot. The 21-year-old striker responded by scoring in the fifth round replay win against Arsenal.

In February, Mr Pleat was busy again, selling midfielder Garry Parker to Hull City for £70,000 and loaning Welsh Under-21 goalkeeper Andy Dibble to Sunderland. In an unusual swap deal, Sunderland loaned their keeper, former Liverpool Reserve Bob Bolder, to Luton.

Bolder was then the deputy for Les Sealey, the former Coventry player who proved himself the No. 1 at Kenilworth Road after originally losing the job following Dibble's arrival from Cardiff City last season.

Sealey plays behind a very settled defence. Tim Breacker, 20, and Mitchell Thomas, 21, have been the regular full-backs for more than a year, while Foster, an England player during the 1982 World Cup Finals, is well entrenched alongside Northern Ireland's Mal Donaghy in the middle of the back four.

The midfield department is equally well settled. Nicholas, a shrewd capture at £165,000 from Crystal Palace, is the ideal foil to the attacking style of Ricky Hill, who collected a well-deserved third England cap in Egypt in January. Until Nwajiobi's injury at the end of November, Luton's attacking formation was well established, but with Brian Stein, Newell and Nwajiobi unavailable for last week's Cup action with Arsenal, King was brought into the side. Luton were also without full-back Breacker for a month and this vacancy was filled by Rob Johnson, who courageously won a long battle to overcome three operations on his left knee and another on the right. Johnson is part of a back-up squad which includes Eire international Ashley Grimes, young midfielder Ray Daniel (who scored in a 7-0 win against Southampton in October) and Mark North's brother, Stacey, a defender who was on loan to Wolves before Christmas.



Back Track

Until being held to a draw at Kenilworth Road, the Toffees had a 100 per cent record against Luton in Cup-ties. On both occasions, when we have met at Goodison Park, the tie has gone our way by a large margin. We hit the Hatters for six in this corresponding round in 1933 whilst, in September 1968, we put five past them in a League Cup tie.

There was nothing so clear-cut when we met at Villa Park in last season's semi-final, though. We were chasing a Treble of FA Cup, European Cup-Winners' Cup and League Championship and we went into that game unbeaten in 21 matches.

Luton rose superbly to the occasion and Emeka Nwajiobi considered himself unlucky not to have scored twice before Ricky Hill thumped home Luton's goal in the 37th minute.

Luton controlled the game for long periods and defended superbly. It just looked like one of those days when nothing would run for the Toffees.

Hopes were running out when, four minutes from the end of normal time, Everton were awarded a free-kick a few yards

outside Luton's penalty box. Luton protested vehemently about the decision, but Kevin Sheedy kept his cool and curled a perfect free-kick through Luton's defensive wall and goalkeeper Les Sealey had absolutely no chance of reaching it.

Luton fans might still consider Everton lucky to have been awarded that free-kick. It came at a critical moment and, from that point, Everton gained control.

Just to rub salt into the wound, Sheedy took another free-kick five minutes from the end of extra-time and Derek Mountfield rose to head the ball home for Everton's winner.

Howard Kendall could not disguise his delight. 'My team has lost the capacity to surprise me,' he said. 'There's incredible character in the side. They never accept defeat until the final whistle blows.'

Luton manager David Pleat, left to reflect upon what might have been, said: 'We looked winners and felt winners, but teams in Everton's position make their own luck.'

Tonight he hopes his team will take the opportunity to atone for that hard-to-bear defeat.

Insight

Luton's fifth round replay victory over Arsenal was particularly sweet for Peter Nicholas, the Hatters' Welsh international midfield player. Almost three years ago his career was at a crossroads when he was squeezed out of the Arsenal side following the arrival of his namesake, Charlie Nicholas.

Though the highly priced Scot was a striker at the time, the Arsenal side was rearranged to accommodate him and Peter was the man pushed out. 'I realised that there would be no future for me at Highbury,' he said. 'So when my old club Crystal Palace invited me to return, initially on loan, I agreed.'


For a while it seemed the bottom had fallen out of his career. It meant stepping down from a successful First Division outfit to a club struggling to hold onto its Second Division place. He was dropped from the Wales team and the future looked black for him. But, true to character, he gritted his teeth and fought back. By the end of the season he was playing so well that he was recalled to the Wales team and, not long after that, he would be playing First Division football again.

Yet, when he first returned to Selhurst Park, Peter wondered if his wheel had turned full circle. Would his career end where it had begun with Palace?

Newport-born Peter initially joined Palace as an apprentice. In his early days he was a full-back and it was in the number two shirt that he made his League debut for the club, at Millwall, on the opening day of the 1977-78 season.

By December he had won a regular place in the Palace side though he was used mainly in midfield. In February, only two months after becoming a firm member of his club side, he was in the Wales' Under-21 team against Scotland — at right-back. Peter won three caps at that level. By 1978-79, he had switched permanently to a midfield role for Palace and his performances reached such a high level that he was invited to join the full international squad.

He made his debut in the Wales team when called on as substitute against Scotland in the British Championship in May 1979. He played as substitute again in the N. Ireland match and he played his first full 90 minutes against Malta, marking the occasion with one of his rare goals. The following season he played himself into the Wales' team. Though playing exclusively in

midfield for Palace, he was usually played in defence by his country.

Palace had by now won promotion to the First Division but life was always a struggle for them at that level and the time seemed ripe for Peter to move on to a more successful club.

He eventually did that shortly before transfer deadline day in March 1981, Arsenal paying £500,000 for him.

His firm tackling brought a touch of steel to the Gunners' midfield play and, for much of the 1981-82 campaign, he held a regular place in the side. During the closing weeks, however, the up-and-coming Stewart Robson took over from him. Peter overcame that challenge, plus a bout of injury, and during the latter weeks of 1982-83, he was back in the Arsenal side.

He did not read much into it when Arsenal invested £750,000 in Scotland international striker Charlie Nicholas during the summer of 1983. But, as things turned out, the Arsenal team was rearranged and Peter became the odd man out. So he returned to Crystal Palace to sort out his career. With his usual determination, he regained his old form and last season Luton signed him for £165,000 to take him back into First Division football.

Now he is part of the most successful Luton team in club history and he is still adding to his collection of international caps. Peter played his 41st game for Wales in Saudi Arabia last month.


