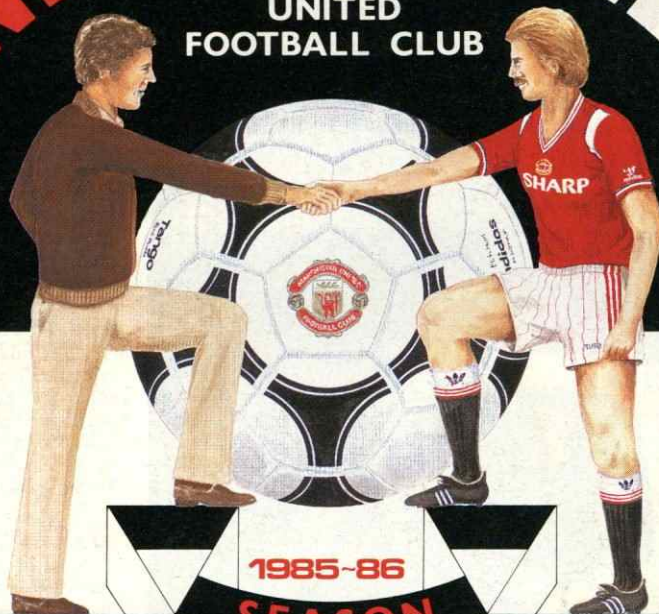

## 'ROBBO' IN THE DRIVING SEAT

Before his latest injury, United skipper Bryan Robson handed over the keys for a General Motors Midi-Van to Lynne Hughes of Brookvale, the Prestwich home for the mentally handicapped. Out of the proceeds of the General Motors — FA Charity Shield match, back in August last year, money was put aside for the purchase of four Midi-Vans, a recipient each being nominated by Manchester United, Everton, The Football Association and General Motors, with United naming Brookvale. £187,700 was made available for distribution following the fixture between Manchester United and Everton at Wembley Stadium. On Sunday 13th April United take on Sheffield Wednesday here at Old Trafford and to accommodate 'live' television coverage, the match will kick-off at 2.35 pm. Reserved seats are now available to postal applicants and are priced £4.80 in Stands A, B, C & D and in the Family Stand, £2 for children and £4 for accompanying adults.

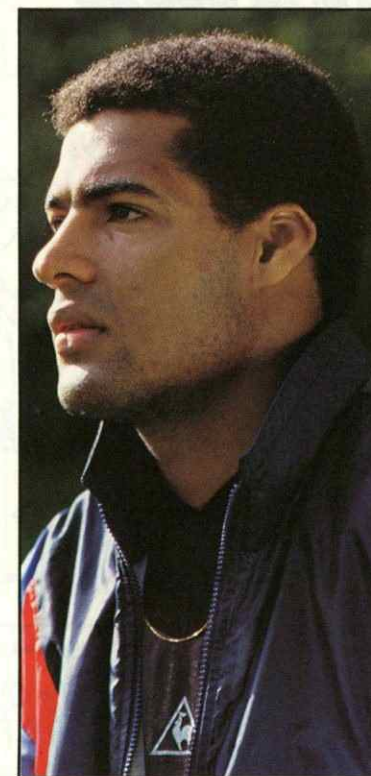

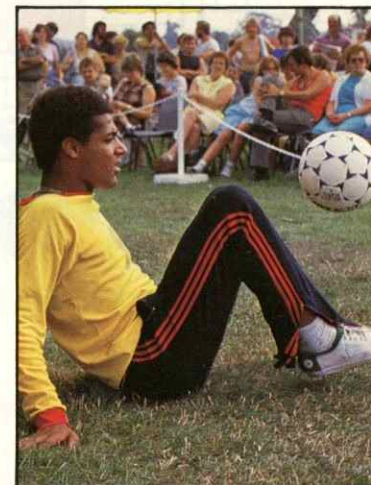

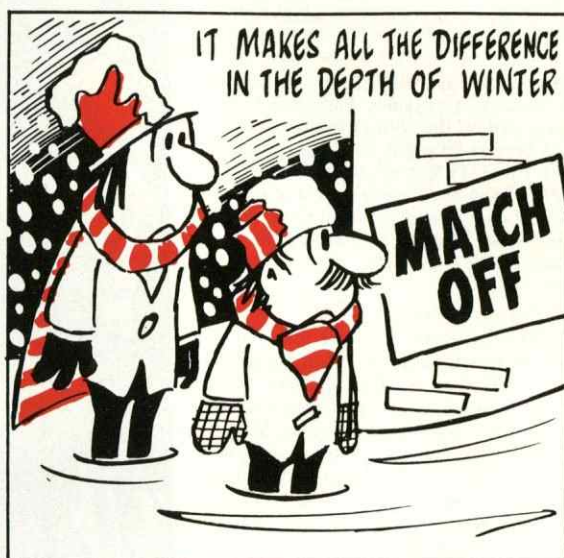

Bryan Robson is going to need all the qualities that made him captain of both Manchester United and England.

For his dislocated shoulder in the FA Cup-tie at West Ham must have seemed to him like the final blow in a distressing season.

The Reds' skipper could well be excused if he felt overwhelming despair after this latest set-back. Every professional footballer expects injuries, and while frustrating at the time, are shrugged off as a hazard of the job.

But Robson has every right to feel that someone, somewhere just doesn't seem to like him any more. For his share of injuries is really over the top.

Dislocating his shoulder for the second time in 14 months is a particularly cruel twist full of irony. For since his return from the Amsterdam sports clinic where he went for specialist treatment after hamstring and calf muscle injuries he has been following a fitness regime designed to prevent injury.

### IRONIC

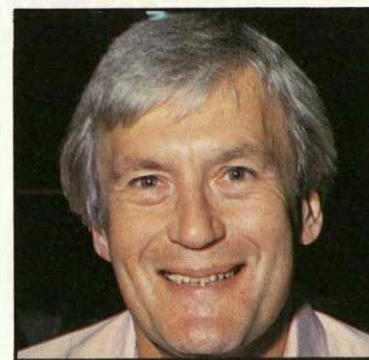
He explained: 'Since coming back from Holland I have been doing special exercises, mostly geared to help prevent muscle strains. But they also included a lot of press-ups aimed at strengthening the upper body and it seems ironic that I should now dislocate my shoulder. 'It's not as bad as the last time and I don't think I have done as much damage, so hopefully I will be back in four or six weeks time.

'There is a certain position of your arm when you are most vulnerable to putting your shoulder out of joint, and I think I was just at this angle when I landed on my elbow.'

### TESTED

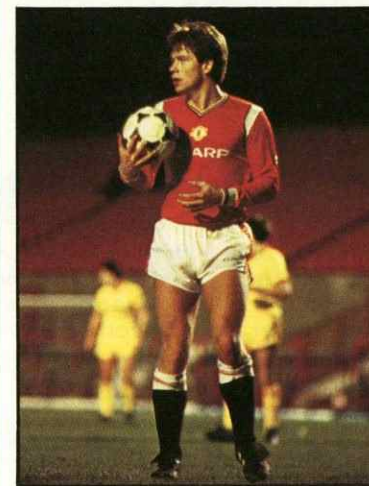
Certainly the Reds' skipper is going to have his spirit tested as well as his physical powers of recovery. Fortunately he has always had great strength of character. It was his determination mentally as well as physically that earned him the captaincy of both club and country. As I say, he is going to be tested as he battles to overcome his latest bitter experience, but manager Ron Atkinson and his teammates are confident that if anyone can do it,

Bryan Robson is the man. He has certainly had plenty of practice with this season really piling on the agony.

Everything seemed to be going so well as the Reds steamed into a 10-point lead at the top of the table under Robson's forceful command. Then a hamstring injury, a breakdown with the same problem followed by a calf strain, cost him three months. United fans and those interested in England doing well at the World Cup in Mexico this summer will wish him a quick and long-lasting recovery. It's the least he deserves.

### TIME

We will soon hear more of John Sivebaek.

The manager is convinced that by next season his Danish defender will be an influential player for Manchester United.

'Circumstances with injuries meant that we threw John into first-team action much earlier than I intended, and in his first game, out of position as well.

'I think foreign players need time to adjust to English football, especially defenders, because our system of play is quite different.

'Sivebaek is really a signing for next season. We only moved when we did because other clubs were showing interest and if we had waited any longer we might have lost him.

'He just needs a little time and then you will see a very fine player.'

The Dane faces fierce competition for the right-back position, but this season's experience with injuries suggests United are by no means over-stuffed.

No-one has been more pleased to see the pitches get a little softer than Remi Moses.

It's a year since Remi played regularly. Now after two operations on his ankle and a lot of hard work he is on the point of a come-back. 'Frozen grounds are not very helpful to start playing again after injury, so I am delighted with the thaw. I am just about ready to try again,' he explained.

## CLUB MUSEUM (Part 2)

As Chairman of the Museum committee, United director Michael Edelson has been responsible for determining how best to exhibit the various trophies and items that will comprise the display in the unique showcase currently nearing completion here at Old Trafford. A great many ideas have been discussed at the various committee meetings and as he explains, 'Many of the original suggestions have had to be reconsidered in order to accommodate the vast number of exhibits now available and, also, to enable us to ensure that the museum concept is both

attractive and educational. 'One of the original design ideas included an audio theatre in which a 'talking head' soundtrack would welcome visitors and provide a brief commentary on the history of the club and list some of the major items on display.

'This has now been shelved in order to accommodate the vast number of items submitted by supporters of Manchester United for display in the museum and these, together with our own exhibits will enable us to chance displays on a more regular basis than first thought.

'In fact, visitors who come to the museum, perhaps twice in the same year, will find that up to half of the exhibits are different to those viewed first time around. This is felt to be important to the overall concept.

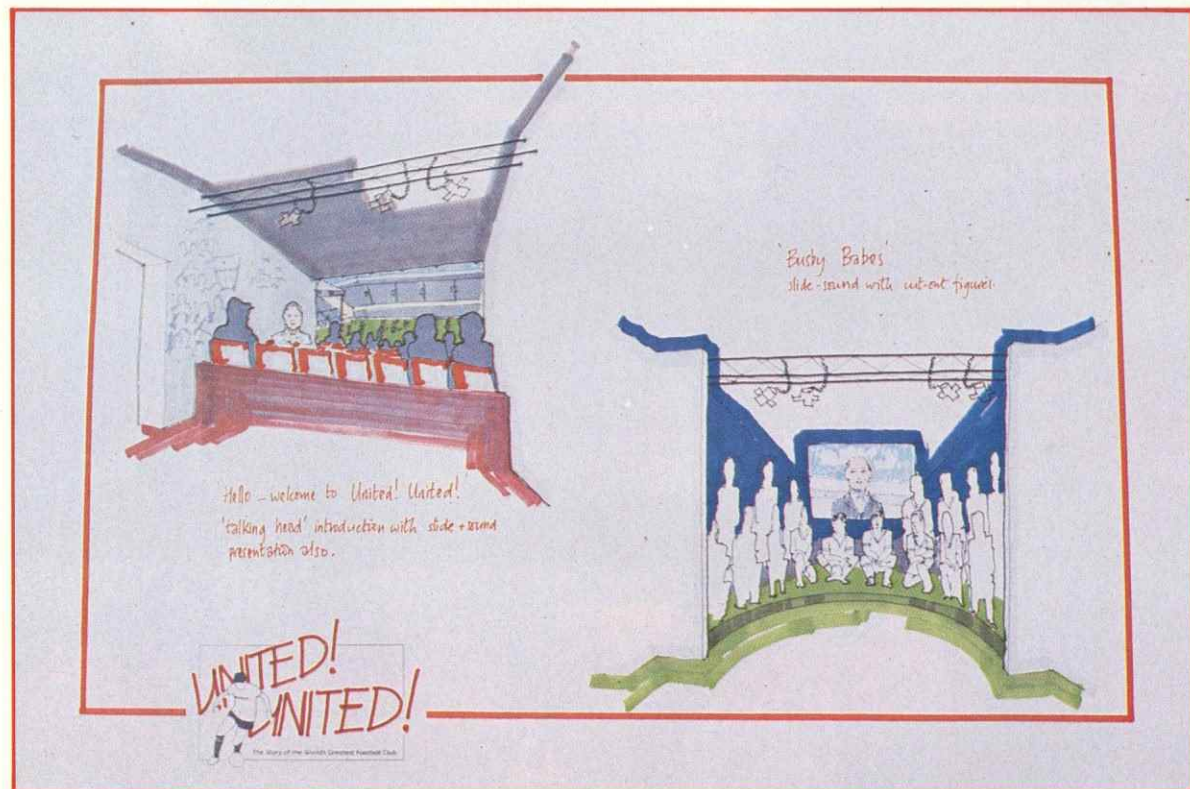
'At the same time, we have endeavoured to cater for the individuals and groups wishing to combine their visit by way of projects and, teachers or group leaders will be able to supply questionnaires; the answers to which will only be found by careful examination of the exhibits, as opposed to a cursory viewing of the general displays.

'It has been and, I am sure will continue to be, an absorbing project and we are all now looking forward to the official opening towards the end of the current season.'

# RON ATKINSON

## IT'S TIGHT AT THE TOP

Our first problem this evening will be to overcome the disappointment of going out of the FA Cup.

It's particularly painful to bow out as holders after all the excitement of last season's successful trip to Wembley. No doubt Luton will be feeling similarly dejected after losing to Everton.

But that's Cup football for you, and the last thing we can afford is to let it deflate us; and in our case especially there is no reason for us to be despondent because we still have an awful lot at stake this season.

In fact I am hoping that the Cup knock-out will serve as a spur to rekindle our championship ambitions. We won our last League game at Old Trafford, accounting for West Bromwich quite comfortably. But then came the set-back at Southampton. I am not going to make excuses about the difficult playing conditions. Over the course of an English winter you have to expect to play two or three times on snow or a frozen pitch. It's all part of the long haul of a League championship and it's the same for everyone.

At the same time I have got to



say that I will welcome the return of a decent surface. When it comes to banging the ball down the field and chasing after it, our lads might not be as good as some of the other people. We don't really train them for that and so we shouldn't be too surprised if they don't excel at that kind of game. But hopefully now the weather has turned and we can look forward to playing on the kind of pitches that saw us at our best early in the season. We have lost ground in recent weeks, and suffered a severe setback with Brian Robson's dislocated shoulder injury at West Ham. But we must still get our game back together and put together the kind of run that will make even Everton sit up and take notice.

### NOT LONG

Certainly on our ground we need a string of wins, and with Everton still to play here as well as holding a game in hand on the leaders, all is far from lost.

It's a tight pack at the top and we may well see a good deal of jockeying before the issue is finally settled. I can certainly tell you that after the Cup blow our lads are determined that we will be one of the clubs involved in that last sprint for the line. Everton have taken over as front-running favourites, but that could change with Liverpool, Chelsea, West Ham and ourselves all hard on their heels.

I must also include tonight's visitors in that group after beating Sheffield Wednesday recently. Luton have come strongly of late and we will have to be on guard if we are going to go up a gear in our championship bid.

## David Pleat brings high-flying Luton Town to Old Trafford

Cliff Butler takes a look into the past

●Luton Town visit Old Trafford tonight in the midst of one of their best ever seasons of League football. We were, you remember, given an indication of what could be expected from 'The Hatters' back in early October when they brought to an end our 100 per cent record. Victory for United at Kenilworth Road would have equalled Spurs' record of 11 straight wins at the start of season 1960-61. **Mark Hughes'** goal after 61 minutes raised hopes that we were about to re-write the history books, but a Luton equaliser by **Brian Stein**, eight minutes later, shattered that dream.

●It is ironic that it fell to Luton Town to bring down the curtain on our blazing start to the campaign, for their record against us could only be described as poor.

●Just three times they have tasted victory in League confrontations against United and one of those was the inaugural meeting of the clubs in Manchester on 18th September 1897 when they took the points with a 2-1 win at Bank Street, Clayton.

●**Mick Harford's** brace last term at Kenilworth Road was sufficient to grab the points in a 2-1 win. The Luton striker opened the scoring in the 69th minute, but within three minutes United were level with **Norman Whiteside** the scorer. There was a lapse in the goalscoring activity following Whiteside's equaliser and a draw looked the most likely outcome until Harford struck again, with a couple of minutes to go, after reacting swiftly to a Steve Foster free-kick that had rebounded off the United bar.

●Their only other win in the series was also on their own territory, when they won 1-0 in season 1937-38.

●United have heaped the goals up in pursuance of their 17 wins against 'The Hatters'. Three times a nap-hand has been recorded, but we shall not dwell on the 5-0 wins of 12th April 1899, 31st March 1900 and 12th February 1984.

●Each and every one of our home clashes against this afternoon's visitors (since that defeat of 1897) has ended with us collecting the points after scoring at least two goals. Since the Second World War we have inflicted a trio of defeats at Old Trafford by a margin of three goals. ●On Christmas Day 1957 we extended festive greetings to 'The Hatters', but that was about all for goals from **Tommy Taylor**, **Dennis Viollet** and **Bobby Charlton** registered a 3-0 win in our favour. Incidentally, the teams met again the very next day at Kenilworth Road, with a 2-2 draw being the result.

●Two years later, on 21st November 1959, United were again the successful side with **Dennis Viollet** (2), **Albert Quixall** and **Freddie Goodwin** our scorers in a 4-1 triumph. John Kilgannon notched the Luton Town goal on the day the teams lined up as follows: Manchester United — Gregg, Foulkes, Carolan, Goodwin, Cope, McGuinness, Bradley, Quixall, Viollet, Charlton, Scanlon. Luton Town — Baynham, Dunne, Daniel, Groves, Kelly, Brown, Bingham, Kilgannon, Pacey, Cummins, Gregory.

●The other occasion when we won by three clear goals was almost three years ago (9th May 1983) and our last home fixture of the 1982-83 season. It was also the day that **Paul McGrath** scored his first senior goals. He scored two in our 3-0 win with **Frank Stapleton** getting the other.



### WHEN WE LAST MET AT OLD TRAFFORD . . .

The game was overshadowed by an injury to Luton keeper Andy Dibble, who fell awkwardly and damaged a knee in the 64th minute. He was replaced in goal by Northern Ireland international Mal Donaghy, who did remarkably well in his 'new' position until Norman Whiteside scored his and United's second goal with five minutes left on the clock.

# LUTON TOWN

## Tony Pullein introduces the men from Kenilworth Road

Luton's inspired run of success has given them an outside chance of winning the League Championship. But, even if that prize proves beyond them in the end, Luton seem almost certain to finish higher in the table than they have ever done previously. Their best season was 1957-58 when they took eighth place. Luton could be in with a chance of winning the Cup and League double! Victories over Crystal Palace (2-1

away) and Bristol Rovers (4-0) took them into the fifth round of the FA Cup and, though they were held at home to 2-2 by Arsenal, Luton went into the Highbury replay still confident of making further progress. The Hatters have won five away games in the First Division — at West Ham (1-0), Tottenham (3-1), Watford (2-1), WBA (2-1) and Southampton (2-1). They drew at Newcastle (2-2), Oxford (1-1),

Ipswich (1-1) and QPR (1-1) but were beaten at Aston Villa (1-3), Everton (0-2), Sheffield Wednesday (2-3), Liverpool (2-3), Nottingham Forest (0-2), Chelsea (0-1) and Arsenal (1-2). Luton appeared to have received a major blow to their ambitions when leading scorer Mick Harford was forced to undergo a knee operation in December. Manager David Pleat moved smartly to sign striker Mike Newell from Wigan for £85,000 as a replacement. Yet, within three weeks, Harford was back in action and adding to his goals tally.

Mr Pleat confirmed his determination to continue his attacking policy by playing both Newell and Harford in attack, with Brian Stein dropping a little deeper.

In the Milk Cup, Luton won 2-1 away to Sheffield United, later winning their home leg by 2-1 to win 5-2 on aggregate. The Hatters were then rather surprisingly beaten 0-2 at home by the holders Norwich City in the next round.

There were few early signs that Luton would enjoy such a fine season. The Hatters looked to be book for yet another relegation battle by mid-October. Then they scored an extraordinary 7-0 victory over Southampton at Kenilworth Road

and that seemed to transform their confidence. Though they lost their next game at Liverpool 2-3, they twice pulled back from behind with another morale-boosting display. And they really haven't looked back since then.

Should Luton pull off that extra something needed to win the League Championship this season they would become the first club ever to win the Championships of all four Divisions in the Football League.

When Luton's plans to move into a new stadium were blocked last year, the club decided to give their own Kenilworth Road ground a facelift. And they opened this season with a new artificial pitch — one of only two in the Football League.

The Hatters have often had to battle against the odds but they are now establishing themselves as a good First Division club. And that's something most fans felt was an impossibility during the sixties and seventies.

Luton are the only club in Football League history ever to drop from the First to the Fourth Division and later reclaim their place at the top. In five years between 1960 and 1965 they sank right through all the Divisions. Their recovery started with the Fourth Division Championship in 1968. By 1970 they were back in Division Two and in 1974 they stepped proudly back into the First Division once again.

Sadly, they survived for only one season on that occasion, but they rebuilt in the lower Division and, after showing steady improvement, won the Second Division Championship in 1982.

Apart from difficulties on the playing side, Luton also faced severe financial problems following relegation in 1975. At one point it seemed the club would fold but they pulled through that crisis.

Now Luton can look back with pride upon past achievements — and anticipate the future with optimism. Though the Hatters have yet to win any of the game's top honours, they did reach the FA Cup Final in 1959 when they lost to Nottingham Forest. They seemed booked for Wembley again last season when they led Everton 1-0 with only a few minutes remaining in the semi-final. But Everton snatched a rather fortunate equaliser and then won in extra-time.

## Luton's Team Choice

### LES SEALEY (Goalkeeper)

Les has played himself back into the Luton side this season. He began his League career with Coventry in 1976-77 and completed well over 150 First Division games before moving on to Luton in 1983 for £120,000.

### TIM BREACKER (Defender)

Tim is a former Luton apprentice. He made his early League appearances in 1983-84 and established himself in First Division football last season.

### ROB JOHNSON (Defender)

Rob served his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road but actually made his League debut whilst on loan to Lincoln City two seasons ago. He returned to make a couple of appearances in the Hatters' First Division side but then went back into the Reserves for more than a year before being recalled this season.

### STEVE FOSTER (Defender)

Steve started as a striker with Portsmouth but soon switched to a defensive role and Brighton paid £130,000 to sign him in 1979. He won three England caps and played for the Seagulls in the 1983 FA Cup Final replay against United but moved on soon afterwards to Aston Villa in a £300,000 deal. Luton signed him for £70,000 in November last season.

### MAL DONAGHY (Defender)

Mal has played both as a central-defender and at left-back for Luton and Northern Ireland. He was signed from Larne for £20,000 in 1978 and is now a regular member of the Northern Ireland team, winning his 40th cap against France last month.

### MITCHELL THOMAS (Defender)

Mitchell served his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road, made his League debut three seasons ago and has been a regular for the past two seasons.

### PETER NICHOLAS (Midfield)

Peter won his 41st Welsh cap against Saudi Arabia last month. He began his career with Crystal Palace as a full-back but later converted into a forceful midfielder player. He joined Arsenal in a £500,000 deal in 1981 but found himself eased out following the arrival of his namesake Charlie Nicholas in 1983. He returned to Palace in 1983 but Luton signed him for £150,000 last season.

### RICKY HILL (Midfield)

Ricky joined the Hatters as a schoolboy. Three seasons ago his performances were rewarded by a call-up to the England squad and he won full caps against Denmark and West

Germany. He also played against Egypt this season.

### DAVID PREECE (Midfield)

David, who joined Luton from Walsall in a £150,000 deal last season, developed in the Saddlers' Junior teams and made his League debut in 1981. David won a regular place in the Walsall side three seasons ago.

### MARK NORTH (Midfield)

Mark developed in the Hatters' Junior teams and has been blooded in the first team this season. He has been holding a place in midfield since December. He did enjoy a brief run in League football last season whilst on loan to Lincoln.

### GARRY PARKER (Midfield)

Garry is a former England Youth international and made his first appearance in Luton's senior side in 1982-83. He has now made more than 40 League appearances.

### MICK HARFORD (Forward)

Mick scored his 17th goal of the season in Luton's FA Cup draw with Arsenal. He first came to the fore at Lincoln City, topping their scoring list with 16 goals in 1979-80. When he had scored 15 times for the Red Imps the following season, he was snapped up by Newcastle who paid £200,000 — a record for a Fourth Division player. In 1981 he moved to Bristol City for £150,000 but when the Ashton Gate club was devastated by financial problems, and failed to maintain payments due, it was arranged to sell him to Birmingham for £100,000. But to enable Newcastle to recoup the money due to them, he was transferred back to them on a free transfer then, moments later, sold to Birmingham. Luton signed him for £200,000 last November.

### BRIAN STEIN (Forward)

Brian was blooded in Luton's first team in 1977 and led their scoring list for the first time in 1980-81 with 19 goals. The following term, when they won promotion, he led the way again with 21. Brian has played once for the full England team and also has three Under-21 caps. Brian has scored 16 times this season.

### MIKE NEWELL (Forward)

Mike was signed from Wigan for £85,000 a few weeks ago. He began his League career with Crewe two seasons ago but, after only three games, he was transferred to Wigan. Last season he scored 13 times and he had netted 19 times for Wigan this season before his transfer.

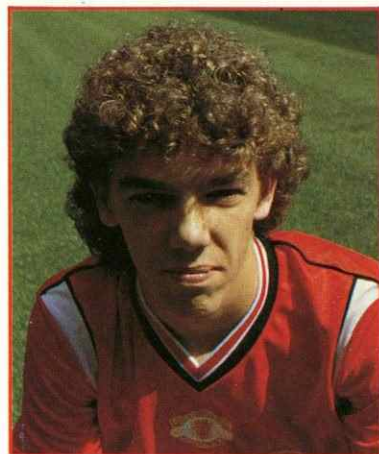

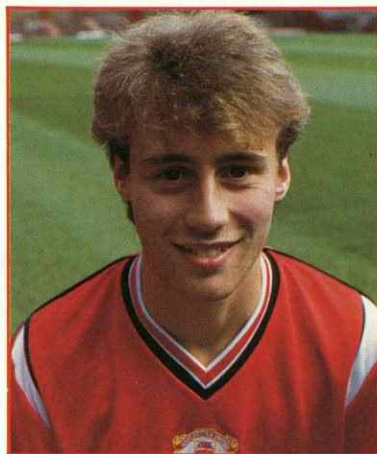

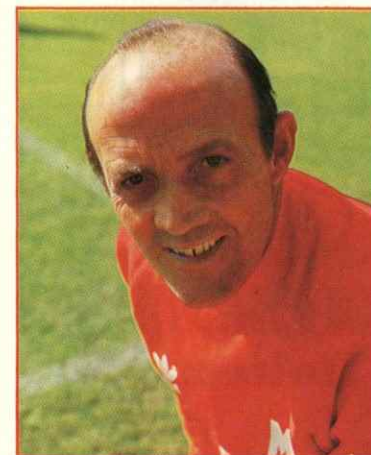
# BELOW THE SURFACE

## STEVE BATES talks to United's Mick Brown



The attacking style for which United are universally famed is the one image immediately conjured up whenever the club is mentioned. But at the foundation of United's success over the past few seasons is a defence feared and respected by managers and coaches through the First Division. The credit for that rests almost entirely with assistant boss Mick Brown who has taken enormous pride from a defensive record which since 1980 has consistently bettered all their major rivals.

As Ron Atkinson's number two Mick rarely has the spotlight of attention focused on him but his dedicated graft in shaping the defensive rock on which strikers like Ian Rush always seem to flounder is recognised by most of football's 'insiders'. Luton boss David Pleat recently gave a glimpse of the respect Brown commands during the televised League game at West Ham. Praising United's back four stability during his summary Pleat singled out

United's assistant manager as the man responsible for fashioning the solid base which enables the Reds to flourish.

Says Brown: 'I suppose I'm more defensive minded than Ron and I've always concerned myself with working closely with our defenders. I take the view that if you don't concede goals then you can't get beat and that gives you the chance to win games especially away from home. 'Being tight at the back gives you a launching pad but I don't mean by defending in numbers. If your defenders are quality players it's not necessary to pack your own penalty area with men. One of the biggest problems for defenders is the ability to concentrate — especially at Old Trafford when we have teams on the run for long spells. 'Defenders are judged on how they cope under pressure but on a couple of occasions this season we've been caught on the break and that hasn't pleased me. When you are in a winning situation, as we have been, and time is running out there is no necessity to leave the back door open. 'We have been desperately unlucky over the past two or three seasons because we've had more central defensive partnerships than most other teams chasing honours. In any successful side you need a stable partnership at the back to promote continuity.'

Brown quite rightly points out that Liverpool's Alan Hansen and Mark Lawrenson have formed a long and successful partnership at Anfield but it is their ability to carry the ball which has added an extra dimension to their stature as supreme defenders. 'We insist that our defenders have to be confident and comfortable on the

ball. We like them to play from the back and although there is always an element of risk involved, if you have the right players there shouldn't be a problem.

'Paul McGrath is in that category and his ability to play football, even at the back, is an asset we don't intend to stifle. Paul has done exceptionally well in a short time considering he had a couple of bad injuries some time ago. He's come on leaps and bounds and I believe there is room for him to get even better. 'He is becoming more dominant in the air which has pleased me but his single biggest gift is his pace. Paul's touch on the ball is as good as any player at the club which isn't bad for a defender he can go in midfield and hold his own against the best. I suppose he is my idea of the type of centre-back we want at Old Trafford.'

Like every great double act, Brown is the perfect foil for Atkinson and although he has tasted life as a manager at Oxford he is content to be number two at the club he calls 'the greatest in football'. We are two very different people but that is probably why we have a successful working relationship. The art of being a number two is being just that and if Ron is away from the club the show goes on as if he were here. 'I probably do more at Old Trafford as assistant than I would as manager at another club but I'm quite happy doing that. I love working with the players in training and so does Ron because we have a duty to make sure the fans see the type of football expected at Old Trafford.'



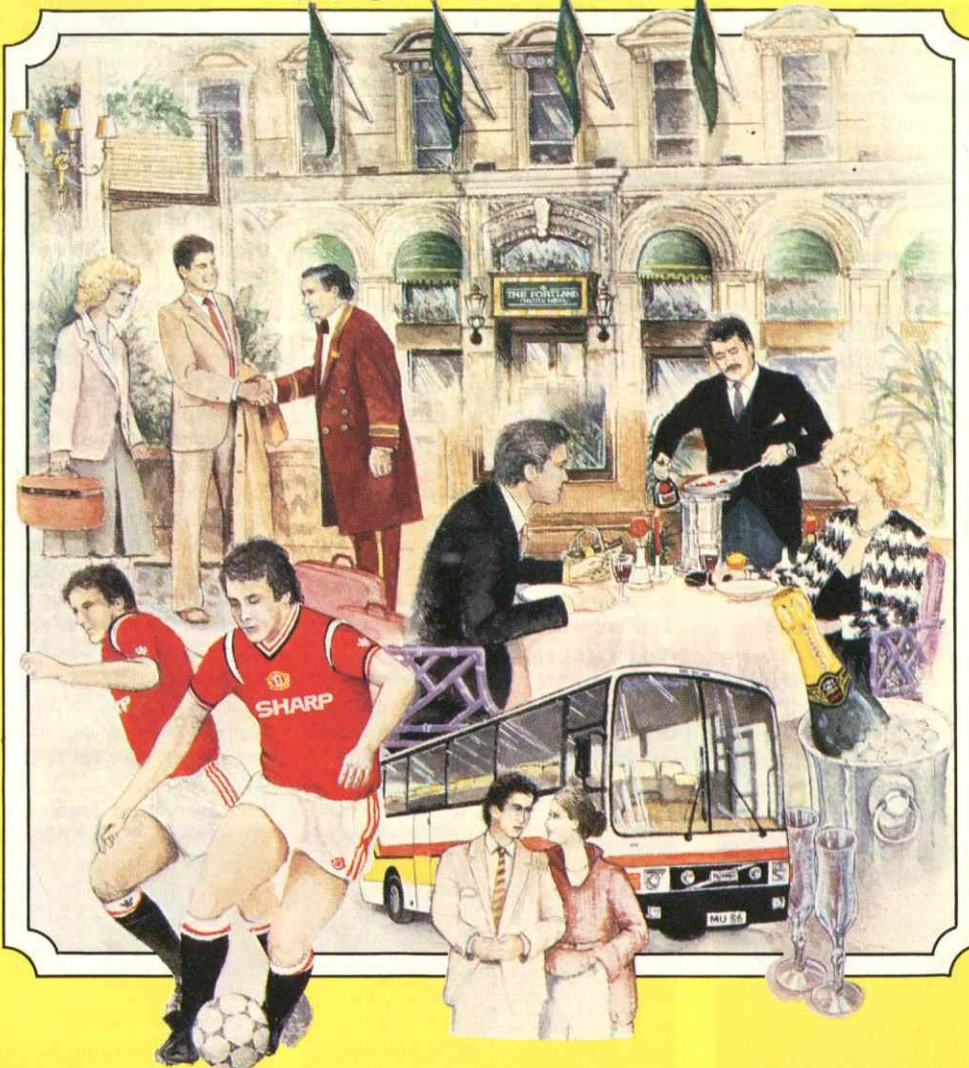

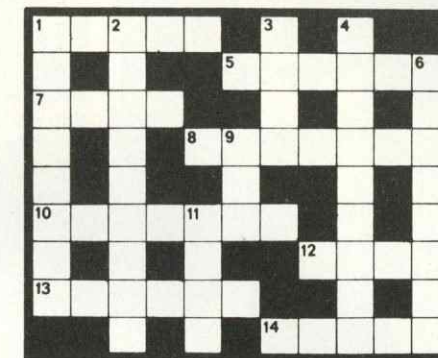

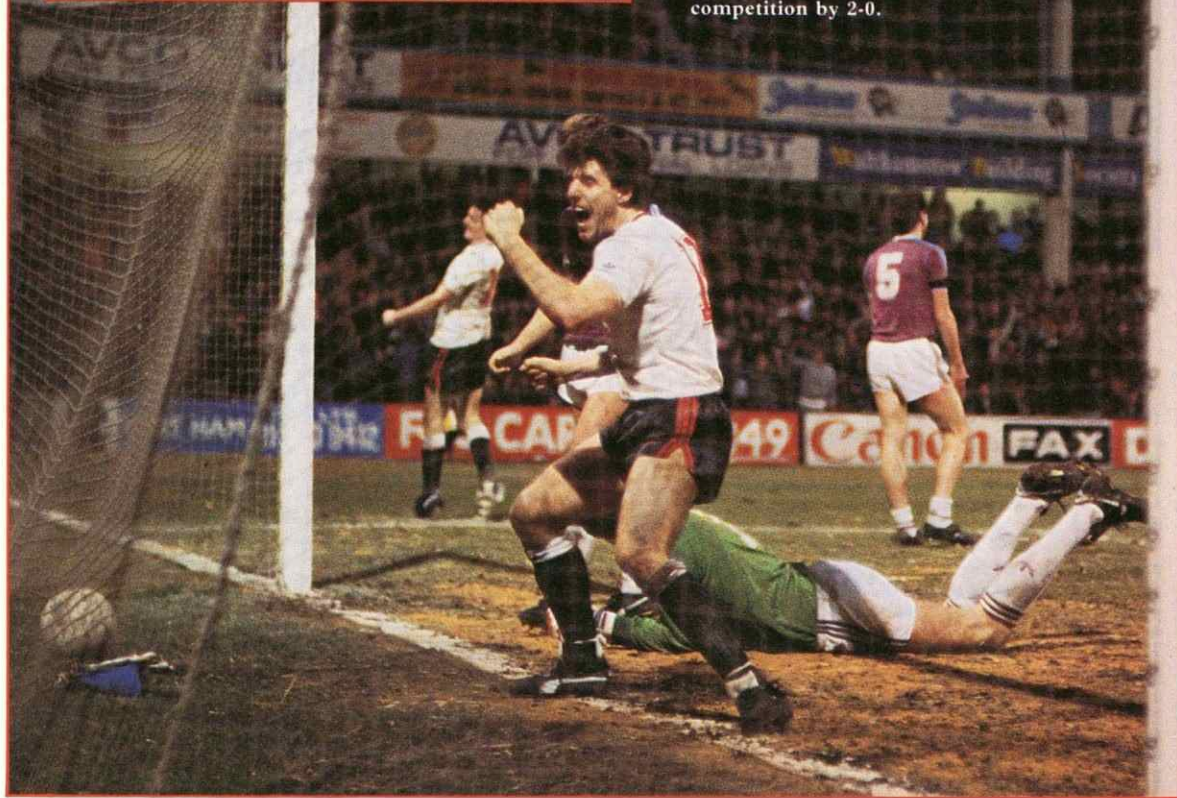
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## REDS HIT BACK

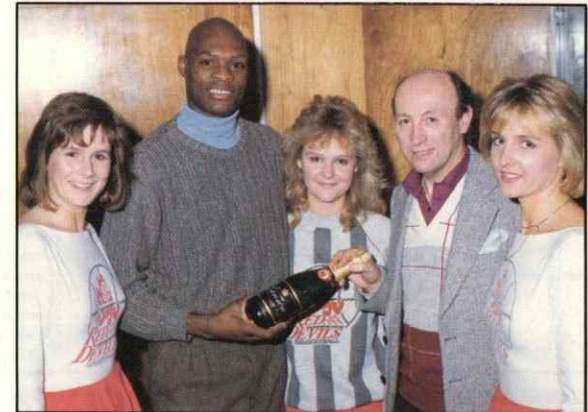

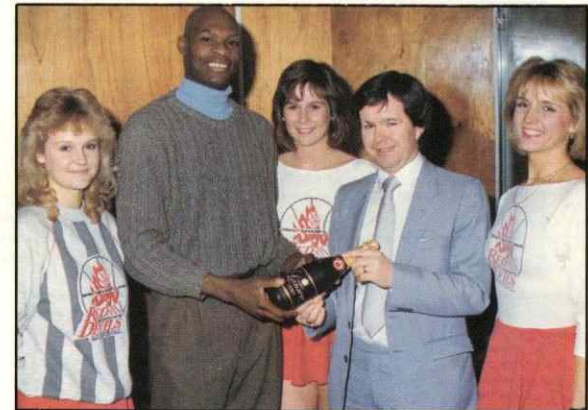
## BASKETBALL

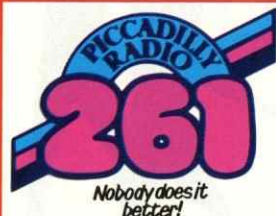

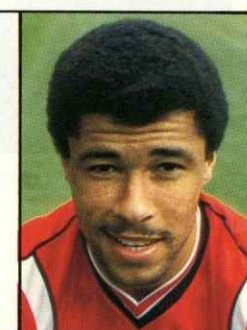

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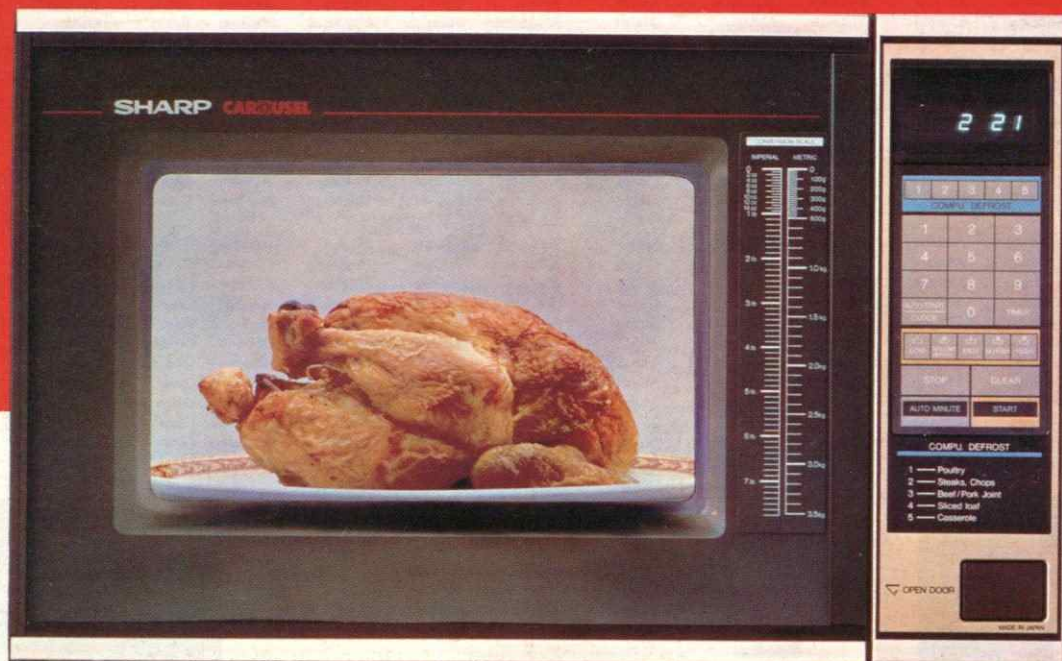
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
