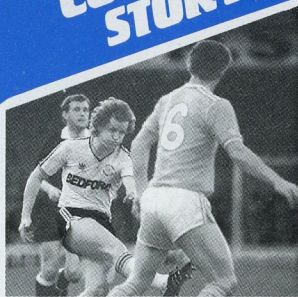

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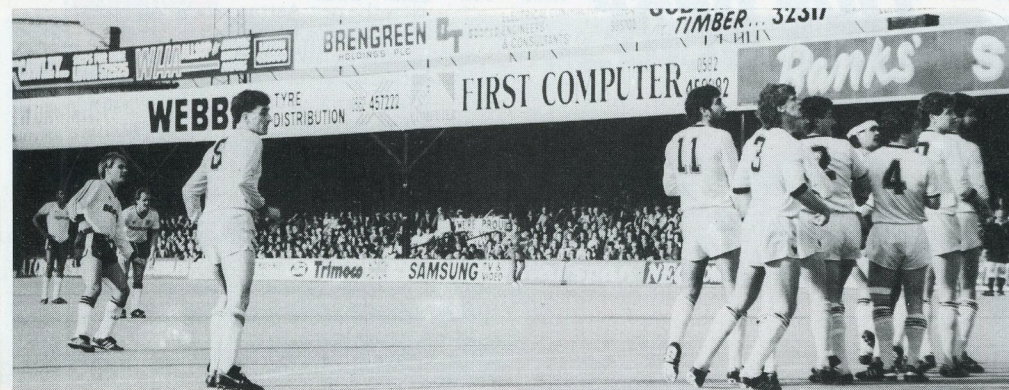

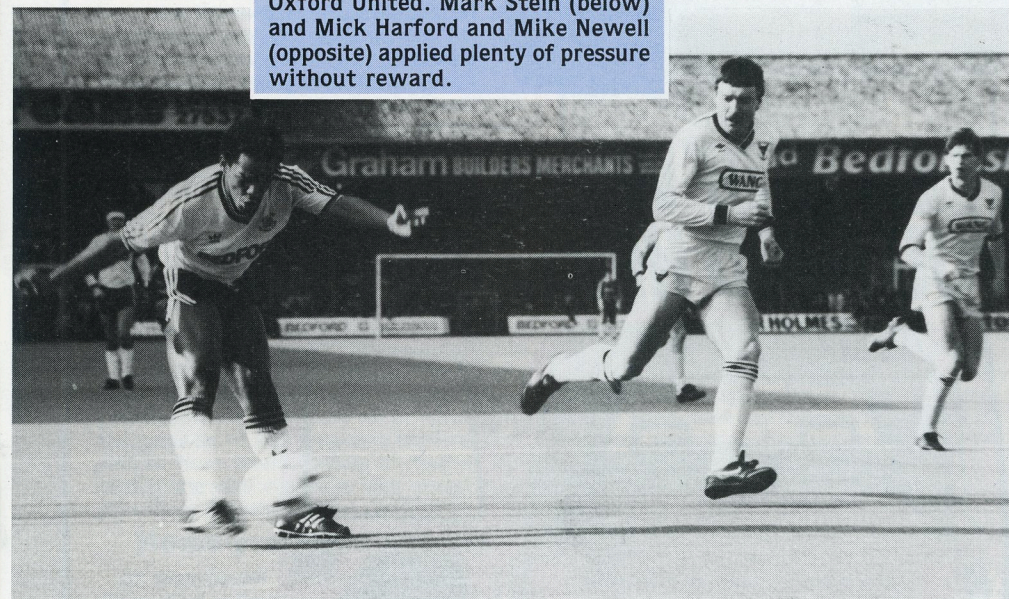
● **Powerhouse:** Peter Nicholas has been in superb form in the Town midfield this season and will be hunting his first goal today.

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100 Years On

WELCOME back to Everton. They have twice been the thorn in our side in the last two seasons' FA Cup competitions, but we shall progress steadily and become good enough to reverse those disappointments.

The secret of any successful club is continuity and the stability of the team. Last season, Everton carried all before them with the same side that fans could roll off the tongue. When Spurs and Arsenal in 1961 and 1971 won the double, everyone could name their team. It was the same each week. Liverpool's success in the 1970's was founded on a settled side week after week.

Of course, injuries can ruin the best-laid plans. Manchester United have received much sympathy this season as they have lost vital players like Robson and Moses. The big city sides have the squads to counter these problems—it is not easy for a club chasing the game on 10,000 crowds in the First Division to have internationals in reserve. But that is the very challenge that makes such jobs more demanding and rewarding.

Home-produced players

At Manchester Utd on Wednesday now fewer than eight of our players joined Luton as their first senior club. Johnson; Stacey North; Donaghy; Thomas, were our solid back four—Hill, Breacker and Daniel in midfield and Mark Stein up front. We shall continue to keep producing our own players.

However, if we see a good value-for-money player we shall endeavour, with the board's support, to supplement our youth policy. We will never be in the market for £500,000 players, but we shall continue to give honest



skilful players the platform to further their ambitions with us.

We are optimistic that Emeka Nwajobi and Brian Stein will soon be fit enough to join Mick Harford and Mike Newell to compete for places. Mark Stein and Marc North have made excellent progress—their opportunities have been a real bonus.

Finally, thank you to those wonderful people that went to Old Trafford on Wednesday. It was just another chapter in our education.

Get behind the team today—we can win if we all believe it.

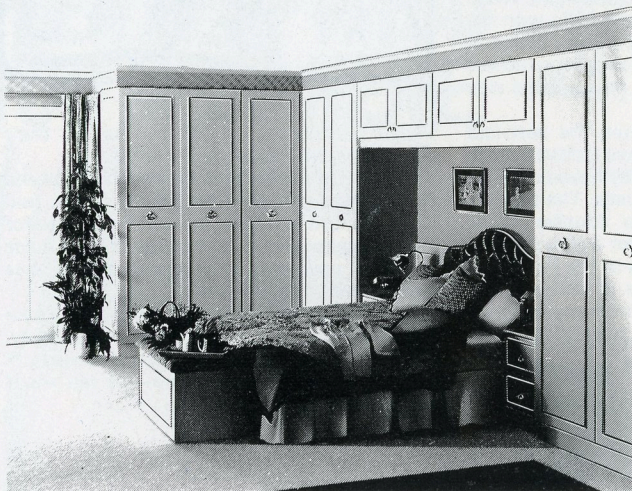

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GirlTalk ARE THE CLUBS SERIOUS?

Football clubs are increasingly worried about the destructive image, propagated by the media, of football grounds as dangerous places—and are keen to attract females and families. Women and girls are far less likely to be violent than men and boys; lads are less likely to cause trouble if their girl friends or sisters are with them, or their mothers are watching them; and if football is perceived as family entertainment then it will not even attract those bent on causing trouble.

I sometimes wonder, though, how serious clubs are in their intention to appeal to women. Could they do more? The stadiums themselves are often woefully inadequate, with even basic amenities such as toilets and tea bars often being either spartan or non-existent. The personnel the female comes into contact with at grounds are too often male—hardly conducive to making her feel at home.

Sexist

The programmes, too, are often unhelpful in this respect. In Ipswich's, for example, the only reference to women is the sexist cartoon female in short, tight football kit—hardly a positive image with which female fans could identify. And are we really any better with "Luton Strikers"?

Women have a high profile at Arsenal and Watford, for example, by organising the "Junior Gunners" and Family Enclosure. More clubs should follow their example and extend the areas where females are employed beyond the decorative hostess for businessmen or pre-match spectacle for ogling male fans. Once women are commonly seen in positions of responsibility and authority, the average female will not view football as a male preserve, and she is more likely to be attracted to grounds—and bring her family with her.

If famous clubs like Liverpool hadn't ruined the game in the first place by forcing the price of players up to a ridiculous level then no club would be in the position which we all find ourselves in today—with astronomically high wages and transfer fees.

Of course the likes of Liverpool and Everton can have such attendances—look at the money they have to spend on players! It's like Princess Diana trying to dress on my clothing allowance for Luton to compete with Liverpool. YOU try to manage on what Luton have to survive on each week and I expect it would be a different story then.

Family

We all, as a family, enjoy watching football and going to First Division matches. At least my children feel safe in a Family Enclosure. Luton are a good team with the interests of football at heart—don't close them down.

I agree that the surface of the QPR pitch is not good or true, but they were the first to try it. Can you say Luton's pitch is not good or has not got good bounce. Liverpool have, as yet, not even played there. Any player I've heard on the TV that has played on it has nothing but good to say about it. Don't condemn Luton as the same as QPR—it isn't.

Small clubs need extra revenue. Synthetic surfaces provide it. Think carefully as to what you are doing. Many clubs will go out of business. The children of today want football for tomorrow. My son adores going to a football match—why not let other children adore more clubs. It is much harder for a child to support small clubs than big names but at least they can watch their own idols in "the flesh". If you have your way Liverpool and Everton will be playing each other along with Man Utd and not many more.

What about everybody south of Birmingham—we like football too.

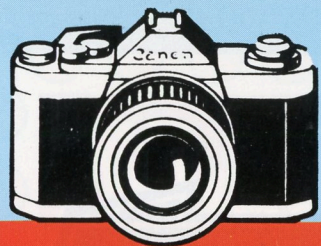

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First Team ACTION

Luton Town 1 Oxford United 2
After all the excitement of the FA Cup ties it was something of an anti-climax to return to Canon League action against Oxford last week when fatigue and bubbling opposition combined to bring the Town only their third home defeat of the season.

Oxford, who had clinched their place in the Milk Cup final only three days earlier, were still riding on a high.

It was no surprise, however, when Luton took the lead in the 15th minute through a perfectly-placed curled free-kick from David Preece.

Penalty dummy

Oxford retaliated with several brisk attacks and several times had the Town defence in some disarray before they finally equalised through a penalty by John Aldridge. This time Peter Nicholas was adjudged to have fouled Aldridge, who dummied Les Sealey with a break in his run.

On the hour, Oxford took the lead when a long ball forward from Peter Rhoades-Brown enabled Jeremy Charles to burst between Mal Donaghy and Mitchell Thomas and roll his shot wide of Sealey.

The visitors might have added to their total, but for spectacular goal-line clearances, notably one by Steve Foster from Ray Houghton.

from the fans

Originally from Eaton Bray—where his parents still live—Geoff Evans, 34, played South Midlands football with Eaton Bray in the early seventies. He worked as an apprentice with "Kent Instruments" Biscot Road, Luton, and then moved as a Services Engineer in 1972. He has since developed his own business in Workshop. Today he gives his views on long-distance supporting of Luton Town and talks about his unique banners in the Bobbers Stand.

"Supporting "The Hatters" from 120 miles up the M1 has obvious disadvantages. But supporting one of the most attractive teams brings its own "reward". What makes people support clubs some distance away, when successful teams like Nottingham Forest and Sheffield Wednesday are only half-an-hour's drive from home? Well, in my case it's because once it's in the blood, it's difficult to rid the system of the obsession!

"I was initiated into regular "Town" action by the likes of Bruce Rioch, John O'Rourke, Graham French and his rival for the No. 7 shirt at that time—our every own "Messiah"—David Pleat.

Stability

"What Luton Town FC and David Pleat in particular, have achieved during that time is nothing short of miraculous. The stability brought to the club over the past decade has resulted in a gradual improvement in playing, coaching and administration standards to an extremely high level of quality and entertainment.

The "flair", skill and "happy" atmosphere at Kenilworth Road, I personally try to capture in regular "banners" placed in the "Bobbers Stand". Sometimes they may appear "corny" but being a "Mad Hatter" doesn't bother me. On the Continent, especially in Holland, Italy and in West Germany they go into banners in a big way. Unfortunately, spectators must suffer with numerous items "strung" across their view. I personally try to make my banners topical, encouraging to our team (without insulting the opposition), and if possible with a sense of humour, to capture the "sense of the occasion".

As with footballers and managers themselves, I think wives and families of ardent football supporters also have to be patient and understanding. My wife Annette and my three young children are now familiar with my "Saturday routine" during the football season. What with spraying up the "family car" in Town colours and having banners everywhere—my wife HAS to be very understanding!

Competition

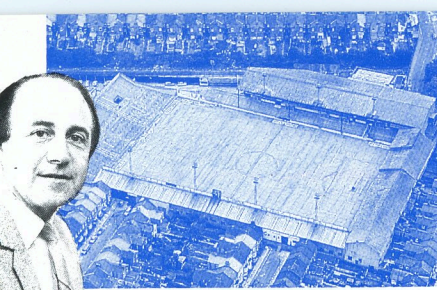

"I have played and enjoyed my football this season. I think I have settled down now. If I owe special thanks to anyone, it is probably to Mal Donaghy who has been great to me.

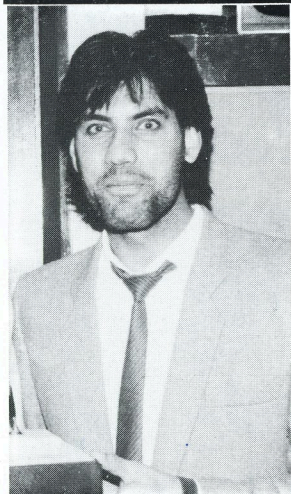
"We play a game of snooker every Sunday. He has helped me a lot, giving me advice and looking after me since I came over.

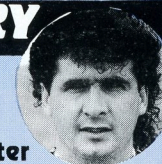

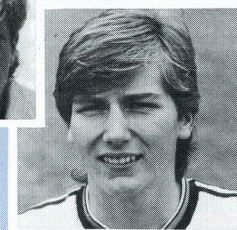

Introducing Everton



Once again, welcome to Everton, recent victors against us in the FA Cup when they won our sixth round replay at Goodison Park by the only goal from Gary Lineker. They were two tough, hard-fought games in which the current league champions, holders of the European Cup Winners' Cup and beaten FA Cup finalists of last season proved their worth.

Under manager Howard Kendall they have gone from strength to strength and last Sunday maintained their long unbeaten run when they came from behind to draw 1-1 with title rivals Chelsea.

Kevin Sheedy, who was absent from the Everton line-up here two weeks' ago, scored the only goal. He is likely to be on duty again today in a team which has shown it is possible to ride the bumps and bruises of hunting for honours on two fronts at once.

Players likely to be on duty today:

Kevin Sheedy—Republic of Ireland midfielder
Kevin signed for Everton from Liverpool in

1982 and quickly established himself as one of the classiest left-footed players in the game. Formerly with Hereford United.

Alan Harper—Another who served his apprenticeship at Anfield before crossing the city in 1983. Since then he has become a valuable and versatile reserve who Kendall described as "Franz" for his performance in the Cup-tie.

Neville Southall—The Welsh international goalkeeper and current Footballer of the Year is a great competitor, trainer and character. Signed by Everton from Bury in 1981.

Pat Van Den Hauwe—Born in Belgium, Pat has since qualified to become another Evertonian Welsh international as a versatile full-back or central defender.

Neil Pointon—21-year-old defender Neil has taken over the left-back spot in the absence of injured team-mates after moving from Scunthorpe.

Derek Mountfield—Centre-half Derek was signed from Tranmere for £30,000 in 1982 and established himself in the team the following year. He returned after injury last Sunday against Chelsea.

The pressure for tickets

I am sorry to say we did have some disappointed supporters making complaints after failing to claim their tickets in the periods allocated to them. This is disturbing for the loyal supporter and for the club. And we do feel for them and apologise for their disappointment.

Letters of thanks

However, it must be said that we were required to carry through our plans in a disciplined way. The number of fans who finally missed out was also very small and only a minimal proportion of those who wanted tickets. We had several letters thanking us for our efforts, incidentally.

One group of appreciative season-ticket holders wrote and said: "Just a little thank you for the kind and courteous way you have dealt with a very difficult situation. We know you can not have had time to eat or drink." It explains the position well.

Smooth service

Unfortunately for some fans, they did not react quickly enough to the situation. As a club, we are not as experienced in dealing with such big matches at short notice as some others and we will have learned from the experience. I hope our fans understand this. We do our best to provide a smooth and fair service, but it is not made easy by such people as ticket touts or forgetful regular fans who feel aggrieved.

I can understand that some fans were frustrated. We shall take note of the suggestions made and will adopt many in the future.

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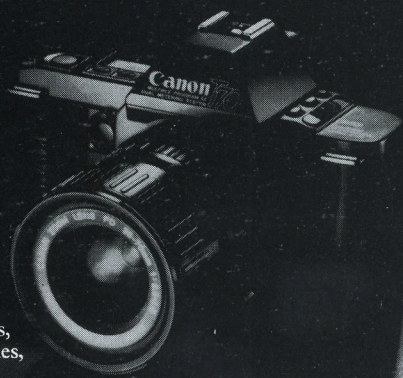

A memorable goal in 1952

Considering the length of time that both Luton and today's visitors Everton have been in existence, it is surprising that we have only begun to meet in the league in relatively recent time.

Our first league game did not take place until October 27, 1951, following the "Toffees" relegation from the First Division. The match was played at Kenilworth Road where a crowd of 16,667 saw a 1-1 draw with Roy Davies scoring for the Town.

In the return at Goodison Park on March 15, 1952, Luton—still smarting from a 4-1 home defeat by Doncaster three days before—played out of their skins and won 3-1.

Brilliant Taylor

It was reported afterwards that had Luton doubled their score, no Evertonian could have grumbled. One goal, scored by Jack Taylor, who completed a move started by goalkeeper Bernard Streten only three seconds before "will remain in the memory for a long time," wrote one reporter. Dave Sexton, now the England under-21 manager, made his debut incidentally.

In the following season, our unbeaten record continued with an emphatic 4-2 home win and a 1-1 away draw, but in 1953-54, it came to an end with a 2-1 defeat at Goodison to a promotion-chasing Everton outfit on December 19, 1953.

We had drawn 1-1 at home earlier in the season in a game that saw Hugh McJarrow score in his only outing of the campaign and by the time of our visit to Goodison we had strung together a 10-match unbeaten run. Unfortunately in winning 2-1 at Oldham the previous week, we had lost the services of Jesse Pye with a broken leg.

A reshuffled Town team had much the better of the game in the first half at Everton but the

Jimmy Husband joined the Town from Everton in November, 1983, and went on to make 143 league appearances, scoring 44 goals, as we won promotion to the First Division in 1974. He stayed for five years before leaving for America. He won a championship medal with Everton.



Andy King joined the Town from Wolves last December for a small fee and so returned to the club where he began his career in 1975 where he made 33 league appearances before joining Everton.



Yesterdays

Toffees edged through with two goals in the second half, the first of which saw Streten impeded and the clincher supposedly well offside. The Luton consolation was netted by ex-Evertonian George Cummins.

Everton were promoted at the end of that season, but we followed one year later to resume battle at the highest level.

The First Division games in the fifties finished evenly with each team managing to win twice on their opponents' soil, but in our relegation season of 1959-60 we earned a creditable early season draw at Goodison which spread false hopes and won 2-1 at home to rekindle those hopes among our lowest—at that time—First Division crowd of 9,799.

Dented hopes

Fifteen years were to pass before we met again in the top flight. Then we lost 3-1 away, but dented the title hopes of Everton by winning 2-1 at home during our marvellous run-in which almost saw us avoid relegation.

In more recent times, we suffered a 5-1 hammering in our final home league game of the 1982-83 season. It was a traumatic result as all the other First Division strugglers won on that day, leaving us with a mountain to climb in Manchester and United at City. Famously, we did it.

We lost the away game that season 5-0 on Merseyside to a Terry Curran-inspired team, but turned the tables when we won

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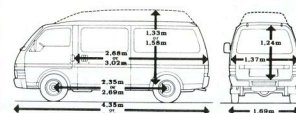
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
