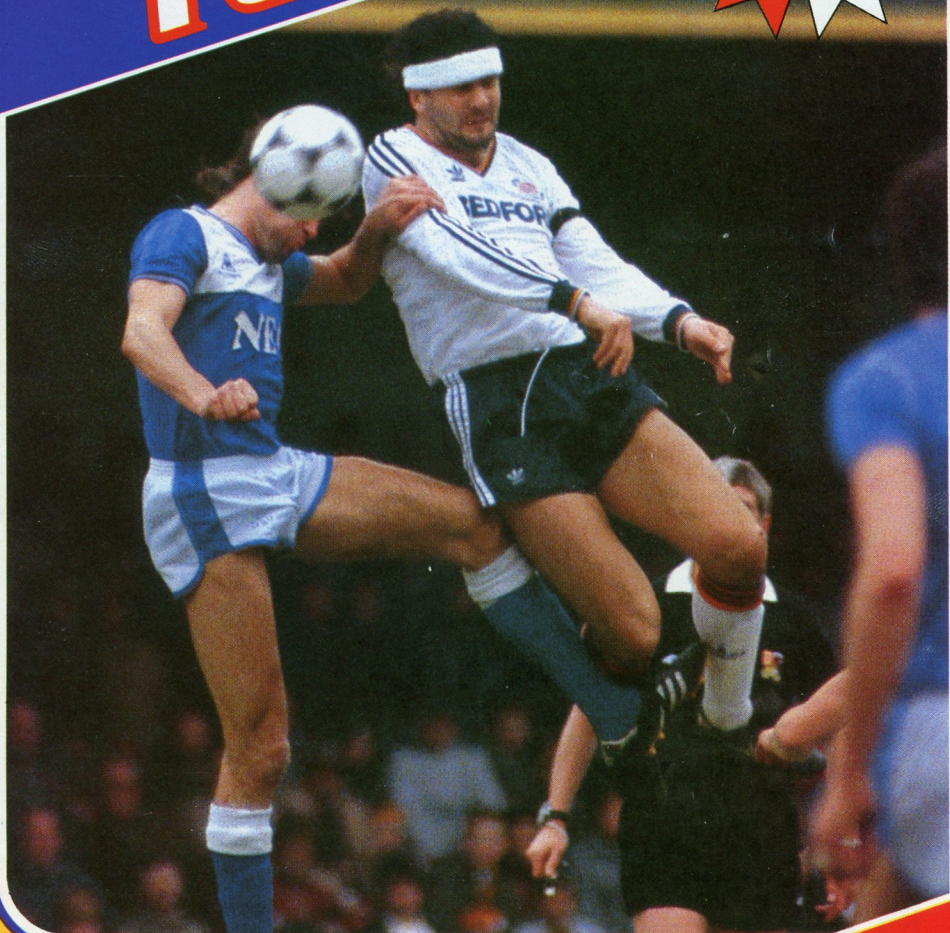


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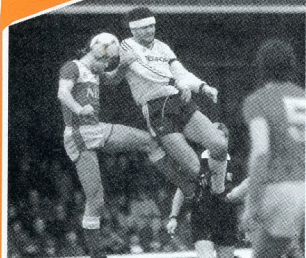

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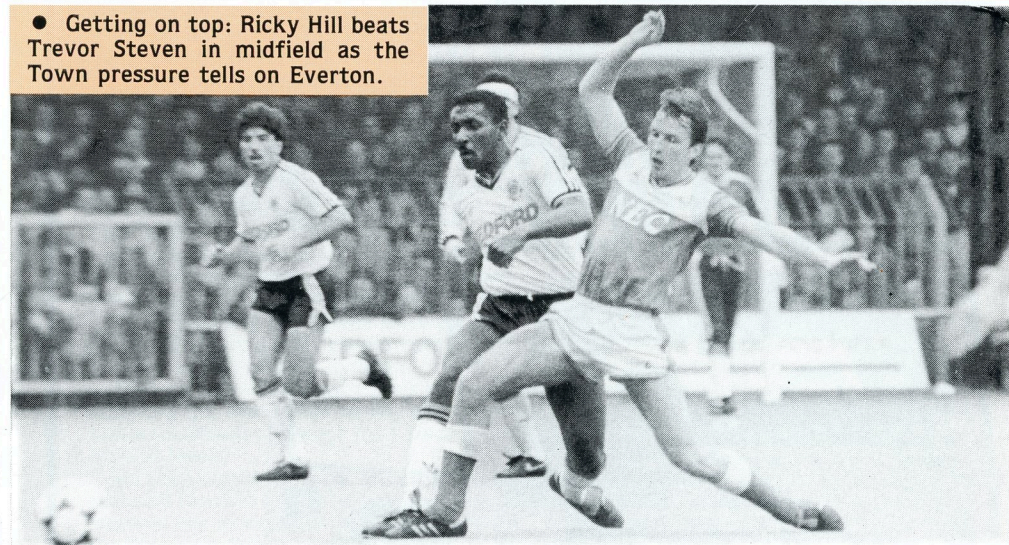

● Getting on top: Ricky Hill beats Trevor Steven in midfield as the Town pressure tells on Everton.



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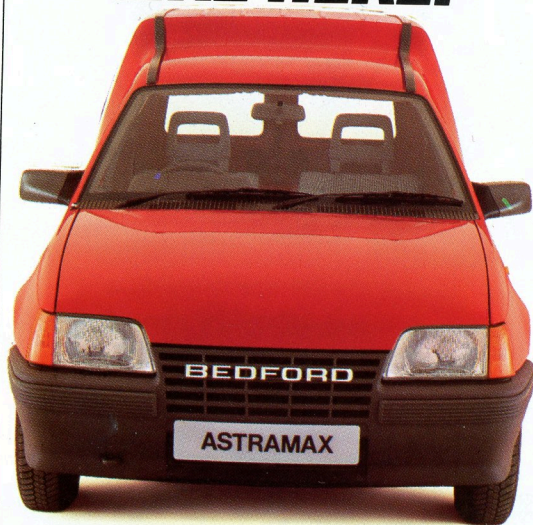


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100 Years On

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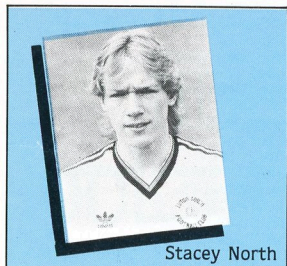

Move into area

Dear Sir,
Since moving into the area some six years ago my sons and I have become regular fans at the majority of Luton Town's home matches. Usually I also bring along a couple of my younger son's friends and normally stand behind the goal at Kenilworth Road although I do sometimes get tickets for the more popular games and sit in the Stand or the Bobbers.

There have been very few games when I have been unable to buy tickets or been unable to pay at the gate. However for the Arsenal game on February 15th, I was unable to purchase tickets because they had all been sold.

The point I am making is that, although I attend matches regularly, because I often fetch between 1-4 children I cannot afford season tickets (my son and I are the only regular visitors who watch nearly every match) and have to accept that there are going to be occasions when we will struggle to get tickets, but feel for Cup games in particular you should set aside so many tickets for regular fans who like myself do not have season tickets.

This can be done quite simply by putting cup voucher tickets in every home programme so that when the tickets are on sale fans with 5-10 vouchers (current season) get first choice. This would stop the fans who only watch the top games getting preference over the regular supporter who goes nearly every week.

I would also add that I purchased all my sons Luton kit etc from the club shop and before Christmas spent some £60 on Luton FC gear.

I really don't understand why you don't try some arrangement as mentioned because in every other way you are a superbly-run club and the way the two days in early January were run for the kids soccer school was brilliant and my son thoroughly enjoyed himself but really could not then understand why he had to miss one of the best games of the season—the Arsenal cup-tie.

Norfolk Schools Thank-you

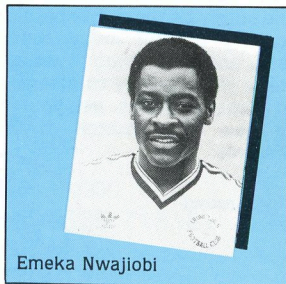
Dear Sir,

There was no disguising the sweet revenge tasted by the Town with our exciting victory over Everton, two goals in the final 10 minutes bringing a breathtaking victory amid emotional crowd scenes.

But when Kevin Richardson put the Toffeemen in front with their first attack after the interval, it had seemed such a finish was again to be beyond the reach of the brave and positive Hatters.

Gary Lineker set Richardson up and the midfielders shot took a wicked deflection off Steve Foster to arc beyond the committed Les Sealey and into the net. Memories of two FA Cup knockouts returned briefly.

Foster power

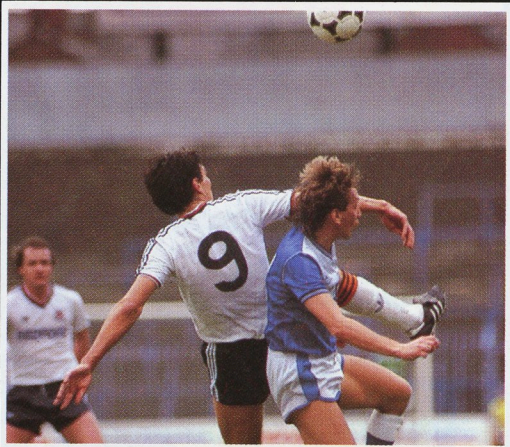
Everton had earlier been hard-pressed to stay on level terms as the Town had torn into them with real purpose, but no luck. Their fortunes changed however after 81 minutes when Ricky Hill took a free-kick, curled it beyond the far post and saw Foster power an equaliser beyond Neville Southall.

The winner came five minutes later. David Preece, who had a superb game, took a corner on the left, Foster met it again and Mike Newell forced it over the line from close range in ecstatic fashion.

Views looking back 50 years

One of our guests tonight will have more cause than anyone else for casting her mind back half a century to a muddy Easter Monday afternoon here at Kenilworth Road in 1936. That lady is Mrs. Peggie Payne, widow of the great Joe Payne—"Ten-goal Joe"—who took his chance in the number nine jersey that day to write his name into football history. Mrs. Payne still lives in Luton today and we hope she will enjoy a nostalgic recollection of Joe's famous day as much as we shall tonight, in reproducing the following from the official centenary history of the club, *The Luton Town Story 1885-1985*, by Timothy Collings.

"The most famous victory in Luton's history, one of the great individual goalscoring feats of all time . . . this was the match in which 'Ten-goal Joe Payne' arrived. The story is so unlikely, it would be rejected as fiction, but it is true: A reserve wing-half, barely rated as a worthwhile prospect, is called into the team in an emergency due to first-team injuries. He scores 10 goals and takes Luton, Bedfordshire and the football world by storm.

"It was Easter Monday and the Town were due to play Bristol Rovers in a Division Three (South) fixture. Joe Payne, a 22-year-old reserve team wing-half, arrived at Kenilworth Road expecting to watch the match from the terraces. But because of injuries, he was unexpectedly included in the Luton line-up and given the number nine shirt to wear.

"Payne had not played centre-forward in the first team before and he was as surprised as anyone when told to lead the attack. Payne was an absolute sensation. He scored

an amazing 10 goals including seven in a row as Luton destroyed Bristol Rovers 12-0. It was one of the greatest individual scoring feats of all time and made him a legend in the space of an afternoon.

Brain packed in ice

"Afterwards, Joe insisted on giving much of the credit for his goals to winger George Stephenson. He said: 'It would be silly on my part to say that it was all luck, for I do believe I played well. I am a very happy fellow today. Please give your praise to Stephenson who made all our goals.'

"Frank Poxon, reporting the match for the *News Chronicle*, described Payne as a study, fast and a whole-hearted team player. He wrote: 'To me yesterday, he looked an international all over. He is a real team man and quite unselfish. But what an odd thing that Luton have been entertaining an angel unawares in Payne. For myself I just cannot understand it. If Payne is not a first-class centre-forward, I am no judge at all. True, many chances were made for him, but he was always there.'

"Payne could do no wrong. He was living his moment—and how well he lived it. Payne is a native of Bolsover. I think he may be a native of England's team before long. He is a real centre-forward with tremendous dash and a sure shot in each foot. He stands 5ft 11 ins and weighs 12 stone. Yes, and when a chance comes along, his brain is packed in ice.'

"The Luton team that day was: Dolman, Mackey, Smith, Finlayson, Nelson, Godfrey, Rich, Martin, Payne, Roberts, Stephenson."

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American Football at Kenilworth Road

Dan Marino, one of the biggest stars of the American National Football League will be at Kenilworth Road on April 20th when his exhibition will precede a match between the Oxford Bulldogs and the Cambridge County Cats. 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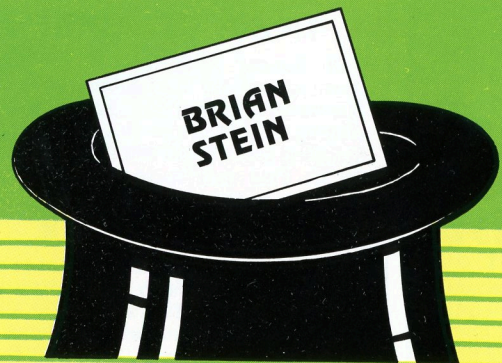
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TOP HATTER



Born in Cape Town, South Africa, in October 1957, Brian was only eight when his family left from South Africa for England. He joined the Town from Athenian League Edgware Town in October 1977 and quickly developed into a prolific goalscorer and dangerous forward. He scored 21 goals in our promotion season from the Second Division and claimed full England status two years later when he made his debut in Paris against European Champions-elect France. Owing to injury, he has been out of action recently, a brilliant season curtailed.

TENNIS PLAYER

Brian Stein was having an exceptionally good season until struck by injury during our first FA Cup fifth round tie against Arsenal here at Kenilworth Road in February. He had scored 16 goals and shown fine form in a dangerous role floating "in the hole" behind the two main strikers.

His injury not only meant a lengthy spell out of the game following surgery on a damaged knee ligament, but also a spell out of action on the tennis courts.

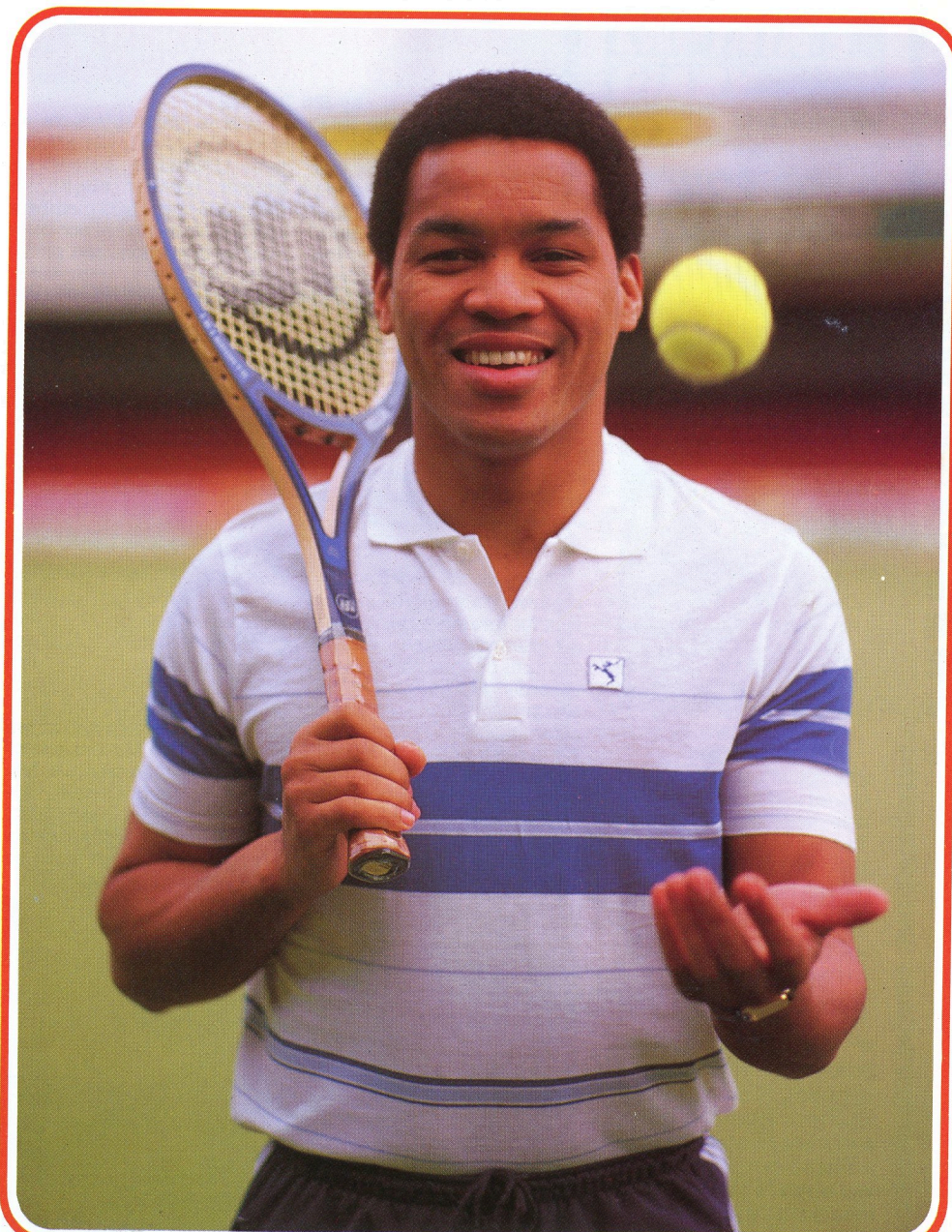
Exercise

For Brian enjoys tennis among several other sports when he has the opportunity away from the pressures of big-time First Division soccer with Luton Town. "I've always liked most sports, but I particularly like playing tennis. It helps me keep fit and is really good exercise. I am looking forward to being able to play again."

Now back in training after the operation, Brian is looking forward to a return to first team action before the end of the season. If it had not been for his unlucky blow he would almost certainly have been in contention for a place in England's World Cup squad in Mexico.

"I am joining in things again a bit now," he said. "I can run about and join the kickabouts. But there is nothing like a match to test you out and I am looking forward to playing again in earnest."

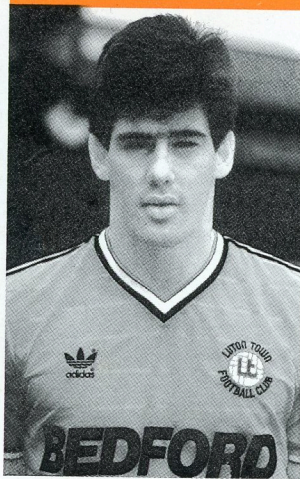

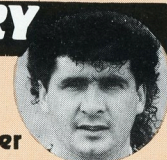

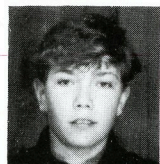

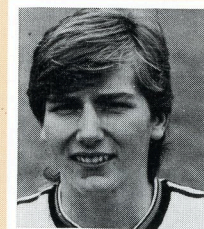
Congratulations to Richard Harvey and Ian Scott

Players likely to be on duty today:

Craig Madden—Born in Manchester, Craig, 27, joined Albion recently from Bury where he has been a free-scoring striker for several years since joining from Northern Nomads in 1977.

Stuart Naylor—Born Wetherby in December

1962, Stuart was recently signed from Lincoln City. A former England youth goalkeeper, he guested for the Town in the Blau Wit tournament two years ago.

Clive Whitehead—Utility player Clive was born in Birmingham in November 1955. He played for Northfield Juniors and Bristol City before joining Albion in 1981.

Derek Statham—Born Wolverhampton in 1959, Derek has three England caps. An attacking left-back, he has been plagued by injury, but now has more than 300 senior games behind him.

Martyn Bennett—Born in Birmingham, 1961, Martyn is the strong man of the Albion defence and a former England under-21 cap.

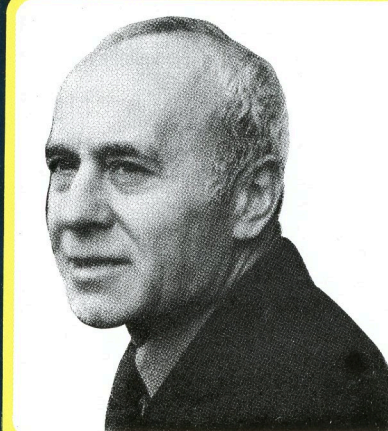

Saunders played for Everton, Gillingham, Portsmouth, Watford and Charlton during his league career, totalling close to 400 appearances and scoring 201 league goals.

Imre Varadi—Once on the books at Kenilworth Road, Imre, 26, has played for Sheffield United, Everton, Newcastle and Sheffield Wednesday after leaving Letchworth. A quick goalscoring striker.

George Reilly—Formerly with Newcastle, Watford and Cambridge, George is a tall and dangerous striker. Born Bellshill, 1957, he began his career with Corby Town and Northampton.

Steve Mackenzie—Born Romford, 1961, Steve is a classy midfielder who made his name when he moved from Crystal Palace to Manchester City in 1979. Joined Albion in 1981. England youth, "B" and under-21 caps.

Garth Crooks—Experienced striker Garth is now 27. Spent six years at Stoke City before joining Tottenham where he won FA Cup winners' medals. Arrived at Albion for £100,000 in 1984.

Jimmy Nicholl—Experienced Northern Ireland international defender Jimmy has enjoyed a long career including spells with Manchester United and Newcastle United and a great showing in the 1982 World Cup finals.

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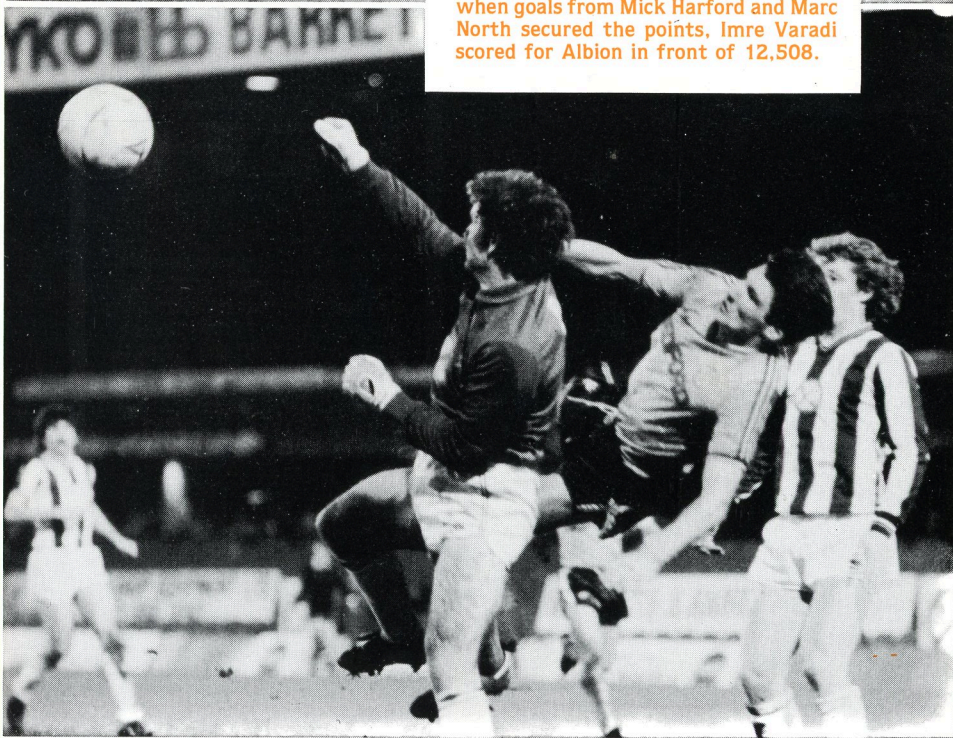

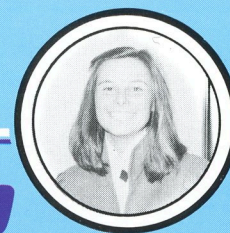

A WOMAN'S ROLE IN SOCCER

There can have been few better examples of the editorial freedom provided by our matchday programme than the column it carried last week in Girl Talk. Contributor Gale Waller wrote about the part that women play in top-class football and aired her own independent views. Today on behalf of our club and after close liaison with my commercial director, I am taking the opportunity of answering some of her points.

To begin with, Luton Town Football Club, it must be said immediately, are wholly serious and active in their appeal to attract more women spectators. I am, for example, employed by the club as marketing executive. This is by no means a purely decorative position, but involves strenuous day-to-day work inside the club, organising events, promotions and sponsorships and providing the direct link in our commercial office with many would-be advertisers and sponsors.

Busy and hard-working

Furthermore, I am not the only woman employed by Luton Town. Indeed, this very programme has been distributed to the programme sellers by a woman—Cherry Newbery—who is also busy and hard-working. Cherry also has to provide all the sales details and figures to commercial director Bill Tomlins on a weekly and annual basis.

Many other women are employed elsewhere in the catering, kit and laundry departments as well as on match-days when they represent only a part of the total number of stewarding staff. It was generally felt that a proportion of stewardess would add balance to the successful running of our club suites.

Finally, I am sure the Luton Strikers who all work very hard at their routines and enjoy their pre-match spots on Saturday would all agree with me when I say they do it for fun and in no way feel victims of a sexist attitude. It is hard work and a display of fitness and discipline.

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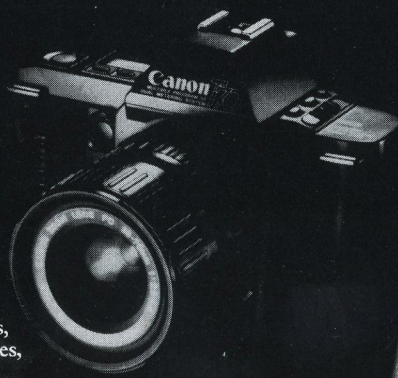

Sweet revenge makes the headlines

Even the most Liverpoolian of correspondents covering our victory over Everton last week seemed to enjoy and acknowledge the justice of our triumph and the satisfaction taken from exacting a measure of revenge for two successive FA Cup defeats in the last two seasons. Here is a selection of the comments made in the Press following our 2-1 win:

The Observer: "Steve Foster, praised by his manager David Pleat as 'a naturally gifted strong man' turned this match upside down single-handed in a tumultuous last 10 minutes to snap an Everton unbeaten run stretching back 18 games and more than three months."

Impressed

The Mail on Sunday: "Everton were considerably concerned at the clear menace provided by the aggressive Mick Harford. The Luton striker might well have impressed the watching England manager Bobby Robson

with splendid examples of his prodigious heading ability. Neville Southall won his personal battle with Harford with timely help from one of his posts, but lost the overall war.

"For while anxious eyes were fixed on the Luton striker, centre-half Foster was able to rise unopposed and head a super equaliser from a Ricky Hill free-kick. Three minutes from time Foster was there again with another bludgeoning header that Newell turned past Southall at the far post."

Famous Foster

The Sunday Times: "Not until the 82nd minute did Luton get the goal they had been threatening and deserving all afternoon. When the famous head of Foster thumped the ball into the right hand corner of the Everton goal, it was only the prelude to what he would do in a similar position only four minutes later."

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Tony Grealish joined the Town in 1979 after five seasons with Orient during which he established himself as a Republic of Ireland midfielder. He joined Brighton in 1981 and moved on the WBA in 1984.

THE LUTON TOWN STORY



Back in 1897, the Town met West Bromwich Albion in an FA Cup first round tie on January 30th. The result was 1-0 defeat in front of a crowd estimated at between 6,000 and 7,000. The attendance receipts were a record £184 15s. 0d. It was more than £50 better than for any previous known match at Luton.

The Throstles had been losing finalists in the 1895 final and were a great attraction. "The club's coffers received a substantial and welcome contribution," wrote one local reporter. Last season, a crowd of 7,286 saw our home defeat shortly before Christmas. What price progress?

That early match is just one reported among several in a selection of great matches in the second edition of the official centenary history of the club *The Luton Town Story*, back on sale after its reprint.

The book includes sketches of the great players, pen pictures of the managers and directors and a fully-researched statistical section produced by club statistician Roger Wash.

Hunting our second double against the Albion

WE feature tonight another of our "bogey" teams as our record against the "Baggies" shows.

Although we met—and lost—in 1896-97 and 1924-25 in the FA Cup, league encounters did not get underway until just before the war following Albion's relegation from Division One.

Our first game of season 1938-39 was at the Hawthorns and a shirt-sleeved crowd of 24,377 were present to see whether their side would bounce back at the first attempt. They were not disappointed as the home team ran out 3-0 winners despite the debut of Tom Dunsmore in the Town's colours.

Billington goal

By the time of the return fixture, Dunsmore was being recommended for an international cap and a, by then, settled Town team won 3-1 through goals by Bill Redfern (2) and George Stephenson.

The war then intervened and ruined the careers of many footballers, Dunsmore included, and two much-changed teams met at West Bromwich on December 7th, 1946, when we won 2-1 through goals from Dally Duncan and Hugh Billington, the only Town survivor from our previous meeting.

We completed our only "double" against Albion with the 2-0 win at Kenilworth Road the following April with Billington again on the scoresheet, but from then, until West Brom's promotion in 1949, we were unable to field another winning team.

Following our promotion to the First Division in 1955, results tended to go Albion's way, although the Town suffered bad luck. During our game at the Hawthorns in 1955-56 for instance, two of the home side goals were caused by wild deflections after the ball hit solid lumps of earth!

The next season's games saw the last appearance of Irish international Bud Aherne in the

away fixture and the debut of his successor Brendan McNally in the match at Kenilworth Road.

Big win

Season 1957-58 finally saw a long-awaited win over West Brom on December 14th, 1957, with a 5-1 result. The scale of the win was more gratifying because, so far that season, West Brom were undefeated away from home.

Billy Bingham made his first Town appearance next season in the 1-1 draw at home with Mike Dixon and Alan Daniel having their first outings in the 2-0 away defeat.

After our relegation, it was 13 years before we met again. In a Division Two fixture on December 1st, 1973, a promotion-chasing Town bowed out 2-0 on a frosty pitch. Jim Husband was another player to make his Town debut against Albion.

The return at the Hawthorns on April 27th, 1974, is a game indelibly etched on the minds of the many Town fans who made the journey.

A point was required to ensure promotion and all seemed to be going well when Barry Butlin headed the Town into the lead early on. Disaster struck, however with only a few minutes remaining.

A concussed John Faulkner was adjudged to have fouled an Albion player in the box. The penalty kick was subsequently converted and an agonising wait was in store before the referee, aided and abetted by the Town supporters, whistled the Town to promotion.

Our Division One stay was short-lived and by 1975-76 we were again meeting Albion for league points.

We lost an early season encounter at the Hawthorns 1-0 but avenged this with a 2-1 home win with goals from Andy King and John Aston.

In recent seasons, the home game in 1982-83 saw the debut of Paul Elliott. In the away game the following season, final ap-
